


DEAR SISTERS IN GAMMA PHI BETA:

Idaho State College Celebrates Golden Jubilee

C lege or ISC, as it is known throughout the state, had its start in 1901 as the Academy of Idaho. At that time the campus consisted largely of sagebrush, with a junior-size mountain as background. The following year the academy opened with only one building, Swanson Hall.

In 1915, the academy became Idaho Technical Institute and two years of college work were added to the high school curriculum. Twelve years later the school became a junior college and was known as the Southern Branch of the University of Idaho. In 1947 the school was established as a separate, four-year, degree granting institution known as Idaho State College.

Today it has a College of Liberal Arts housed in a new \$800,000 building, a College of Pharmacy acclaimed throughout the country and a School of Trade and Industrial Education. To Swanson Hall have been added 17 other buildings, including a modern million dollar gymnasium complete with swimming pool, a handsome Student Union building with a large ballroom, a girls' dormitory and four men's dormitories, and many temporary buildings to provide housing for married students. A new library building is being planned.

ISC has attained its growth as a college under the leadership of a young president, Dr. Carl W. McIntosh, who was only 32 when he became president in November, 1947. The faculty of 140 has been drawn from leading institutions in practically every state of the Union and from 12 foreign countries. The student body is equally cosmopolitan. As is natural at a state institution, most of the students are from Idaho. But there are also 150 students from other states, Canada, Hawaii, Alaska and several foreign countries.

Although the ISC enrollment has dropped from a peak of 1700, the decrease has been gradual over a number of years and the annual loss is lower than the national average. At one time, the men students outnumbered the girls four to one, but the percentage has dropped to two and one-half per cent! Members of the four national sororities sponsor exchange parties with the various fraternities.

Although Idaho has no commercial television, ISC has its own

television shows, from studios in the School of Trade and Industrial Education. Television in the ISC classrooms is still a thing of the future, but there are weekly shows in both the Student Union lounges and the snack bar. ISC is one of the few colleges in the country where all the television equipment was made by students.

ISC coeds compete for such honors as Homecoming Queen, Ski Queen and "I" Club Queen, the latter elected by the ISC athletes, the Bengals. In turn, they select the King of Hearts to reign at the annual Court of Hearts ball sponsored by the Associated Women Students and the campus "Ugly Man," a most coveted honor.

Vying in importance with the Court of Hearts Ball and the All-College Ball and numerous other

dances are annual Homecoming, Mothers' Weekend, Sadie Hawkins' day, the week-long Winter Carnival and the Women's Athletic Association play-day. High school students from all parts of the state take over the campus each year for Campus Day, an all-day speech and drama conference and a journalism convention.

Because of its beautiful natural setting, ISC provides many opportunities for outdoor activities. Picnics, swimming parties in the college pool and in nearby hot springs, skiing, hunting, fishing and barbecues are featured.

Beta Iota chapter of Gamma Phi Beta was the first national sorority to be installed at Idaho State College. Coming on campus in October of 1949, the chapter is still in the process of establishing activities and traditions. Taking part in all the campus activities, the chapter has its share of cups and plaques won at Homecoming, Song Fest, and other competitions, among them last year's scholarship award.

The four sororities and four fraternities at ISC have many exchange parties, and all of the Greek organizations combine efforts for the annual Panhellenic-Inter Fraternity dance.

Other activities have been apron, rummage, and cooked food sales, a fashion shop, and a card party. One of the well established traditions is an annual Dinner-Dance, which is the outstanding event on the social calendar. The pledge class sponsors one all-school dance every year. Beta Iota's most recent project is local philanthropic work within the community.

Showing Horses Is Her Hobby

I F BECKY BURKES FYOCK pinned her horsemanship ribbons end to end she would have quite a few nice fat bolts of bright satin, for she has won over fifty prizes at shows over the country. The silver platter, trays, bowls, and cups make a neat display, too.

Becky is my niece and she has been riding and winning ribbons and trophies since she was eight years old. She was Champion Junior Rider of Oregon in 1940.

In the past two years with her new venture, a hackney pony "Bugle Call," she has taken eleven firsts, seven seconds, five thirds, three fourths, two fifths, and seventeen hundred dollars in prize money at eight horse shows.

Now my sister, Genevieve Burkes (Lambda '23) never thought of blue ribbons and silver trophies when she drove Becky out for her first riding lesson. She only wanted her daughter to be able to look a horse in the face and to feed him a lump of sugar without shuddering. For our mother, Genevieve's and mine, although brave as ten thousand lions in some matters picked up her skirts when she saw a horse, and ran. She taught her children

to do the same.

When Genevieve was living at the Gamma Phi Beta house at the University of Washington she used to see Janice Parker and Dos Hager go off happily to their Boots and Saddles Club and wished she had their nerve and courage. Since those days she herself has learned to ride although it was a struggle, but she is not afraid now to put a lump of sugar into a horse's mouth.

So in the Burkes' family through the years there were horses along with pet guinea pigs, skunks, goats, cats, dogs and rabbits. But the prize registered Shetland pony, "Sylvan King," a fine American saddle-bred gaited mare, "Easter's Bonnet" and her colt "Satin Streamers" brought out the fact that Becky possessed a real skill with horses, which no doubt accounts for her continued interest along these lines. At the present time she is limiting her showing to the driving of Hackneys (which, by the way, are a sturdy, small brood of English pony, in early English history trained for drayage and carriage purposes, but now imported into the U.S. exclusively for exhibition).

Becky has only "Bugle Call" now, which she keeps at Ellendale Farms near Eugene, Oregon, where her husband, Bill Fyock, University of Oregon, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, is manager and trainer for Georgia Ellen Dale, owner of the Farms. Last fall on a tour of horse shows through the Northwest and California, Bill won twenty-five blue ribbons and thirty other ribbons with six horses.

Becky herself does all the training of "Bugle Call." She is out with her jogging cart nearly every day except in the worst weather, getting the pony into championship shape. Next summer she will acquire another Hackney. She keeps in touch with the pony world by being Oregon correspondent of *Your Pony*, a magazine devoted wholly to that subject.

Recently the Burkes acquired a farm at "Whalecove," a scenic spot on the Oregon Coast highway, one mile south of the deep-sea fishing village, of Depoe Bay. And the Fyocks are busy reading government pamphlets on beef cattle, poultry, and garden produce, and dreaming of extending the existing barns to include the horses and ponies which will be part and parcel of their future farming interests.

Stanford Corporation Funds Placed In Endowment Fund

Final disposition of the funds held by Mu's House Corporation from the sale of the chapter house to the University has been made. A committee, appointed by Mu alumnæ drew up a "Plan for Assignment," and this plan which transfers approximately \$34,000.00 to the Endowment-Crescent Fund under a trust agreement was approved by a substantial majority of former members of Mu chapter. Although acceptance of the plan was voted more than a year ago, considerable time was necessary in order to follow the proper legal procedures, dissolve the old house corporation and establish the terms of the trust. Actual transfer of the funds was made in February of this year.

Under the trust agreement, the principal of the Fund, known as the Mu of Gamma Phi Beta Fund, can be used for chapter loans. The net income is to be used for scholarship grants to one or more qualified Stanford students, men or women, preferably descendants of Mu chapter alumnæ. A Stanford University Scholarship Committee will determine the amount to be assigned

and number granted from applications referred to it. Mrs. Raymond Byler (Olivia Boezinger, Mu '23), is Secretary of the Committee. In the event of the reactivation of a chapter at Stanford, the funds will be used for re-establishing the group.

Many loyal Mu alumnæ have participated in solving the problem of a disposition of these funds which would benefit the entire sorority, and yet evidence their continued allegiance to their University. They are to be congratulated, and Gamma Phi Betas everywhere are most grateful to the Mu Committee for arriving at a conclusion which has been approved by the Mu alumnæ, and keeps alive the former happy and successful years of Mu chapter. Mildred Hayes Roth has acted as President of the Corporation, now dissolved, and the officers who signed the "Assignment Plan" were Dorothy Brown Bryant, Peggy Boothe and Ruth McLaughlin Benz. A large committee worked with these officers to achieve the happy conclusion of this important project.

Thailand Is Home To Jane Plitt Bishton

Fix to Thailand one of these days and you might find yourself in the midst of a localized coup d'état, teaching at a truly international school, or doing some informal preschool rushing for Gamma Phi Beta! Those are just samples of the experiences which Jane Plitt Bishton has reported since her arrival in Bangkok with her husband and children a year ago. Her husband, Robert Bishton, is Assistant Commercial Attaché there, which means that he attempts to solve any and all problems among the local merchants and performs other duties such as obtaining quotations on rice and timber for the Japanese

Logistical Command.

Jane met Bob at the

ence major in Education. Bob was an Alpha Tau Omega man at College Park, majored in political science, and after service in the Navy, did graduate work at Georgetown School of Foreign Service until 1946.

When the family left for its first overseas assignment in Dublin the following year, Patricia was two and Sandra, just a few months old. As a

signment in Dublin the following year, Patricia was two and Sandra, just a few months old. As a visa officer in the Consular section of the Embassy, Bob signed all of the immigration visas for people desiring to enter the United States. And as his wife, Jane learned a great deal about the im-

migration laws of our own country. They traveled extensively throughout Ireland during their three year stay, and chose the bleak, rugged Northwest section beyond Galway as their favorite spot. The Irish are very friendly people, Jane remarks, though the majority of Irish maids are definitely not the beautiful colleens of fiction! The Bishtons' big news from Dublin was the arrival of a son, Jeffrey, on June 25, 1950—the day the fighting began in Korea. A few months later they were back in the U.S. visiting with their families and friends and preparing to fly to Bangkok.

Since their arrival in Thailand's capital city, they have lived in a large three-bedroom stucco house of Asiatic design. Jane writes that the house is lavishly equipped in the line of bathroom facilities on both floors. However, only the bedroom windows are screened so that flying roaches, mosquitoes and other small insects often join them for dinner! Small harmless lizards, called Chinchooks, crawl on the walls and eat the insects! A Tokay, which is a larger brightly colored biting lizard, occasionally comes in the house, too.

The household staff is composed of six Thai servants whose wages range from eleven to twenty-three dollars per month and whose duties could probably be performed more efficiently by just one or two servants in this country! The social customs of Thailand require that a family has an ayah for its children; and the additional servants are necessary because, as in other Asiatic countries, each is trained and hired for just one type of work. In addition to the children's fine ayah, they employ a wash ayah, a gardener, a cook, a coolie who cleans and helps with the children, and another girl, known as a No. 1 boy, who serves the meals, cooks the breakfast, helps with the cleaning, and is supposed to keep the house in order.

Bangkok is situated in the flat delta section on the southern coast. Hills and mountains rise in the northern part of the country. The tropical climate means a very hot season between March and May, and holds a constant threat of fungus infections, worms, tuberculosis, and sudden fevers which doctors cannot explain. There are two classes of people in Thailand: the wealthy, who are educated in Switzerland or France, and the poor, who are very poor.

Perhaps you wonder how Jane and Bob spend their leisure hours. They do belong to the Royal Bangkok Sports Club which

has its own pool and recreation area. Both girls swim and dive, and Jeff, who is not quite two, is learning to swim, too! The girls also take riding lessons from a German woman. So far, Jane's sightseeing has been limited to spots in and around Bangkok, such as the King's Palace, the Emerald Buddha, and the summer palace-for you see, her fourth child, Michael, was born in Bangkok last September.

That event did not stop her activities for long, though. She is teaching again in the school maintained by the international colony for its own transient children. A Thai law prohibits the operation of any school for more than seven students unless the language used is Thai, thus forcing the numerous Chinese to attend Thai schools. It was necessary, therefore, that the growing international group get special permission from the government to start its own school. The first term began last May with ninety enrolled, and now there are one hundred and forty-five students from twenty-three different countries in the nine grades. Jane teaches the ninth grade, her subjects being algebra, American history and geography, English literature, and social science. Could her college training be any more useful to those boys and girls?

Jane is doing some informal rushing for Gamma Phi Beta, too! She was quite surprised one day to hear a pupil in her class mention the sorority. The girl's aunt is a member, and she hopes to be one, too, so Jane is encouraging her.

Bob's work has not been without its excitement and anxieties, either! He was present at the ceremony last June at which E.C.A. gave a dredge to the Thai government and the Prime Minister was taken captive by some Thai Navy men armed with submachine guns. During that coup d'état which lasted two and one-half days the Bishtons' house was even fired upon be-

Harpist Retires From Long Teaching Career

THE closing of Mrs. Mildred I Faulkner Rice's harp studio in the Clark Music Co. building has marked the end of a musical era in Syracuse.

However, for Mrs. Rice it means continuation of her second career, that of social worker in the Onondaga County Welfare Department. It was a position that she took to naturally nine years ago when her husband died. As a teacher she had always liked working with people and while at Syracuse University she had taken all the social science courses she could.

For 34 years, 1916 to 1951, Mrs. Rice taught the harp to thousands of young musicians in the East.

Mrs. Rice's twinkling eyes and vivacity belie her remark that she is "probably the great-grandmother of the majority of the harpists in the East." Centering of harp study in Syracuse was due in great part to the fact that the Irish harp is manufactured by Melville Clark in the Clark Music building.

BEGAN AT PIANO

Her musical career began when she was 4 years old and she started piano lessons. She was among the first pupils of Charles Courboin, noted organist, when he taught in Oswego.

"My earliest recollections are of being carried by mother to all kinds of musical events," she said.

Until she was 15, she continued study of piano but found that her hands were too small for concert work.

Among the many artists she went to hear was Caruso and the family bought a victrola from Clark's to play his records. While going through the building, mother and daughter saw the Irish harps and concert harps. Mr. Clark explained that her hands were adapted to the harp and so she started lessons with Maude Clark, Melville's sister. Later she transferred to Miss Bertha Becker, who had a harp college in S. Salina street. Since she knew the theory of music, it was just a matter of getting acquainted with the instrument.

LIKED PEOPLE

Enrolling at Syracuse University, she found that there was no harp taught so she took courses in Fine Arts and elected Liberal Arts. Psychology and sociology were just being taught and the young music student elected every course she could "because I liked people." In 1917 she was graduated from Syracuse Univer-

Her next teachers were Mr. Clark and Van Vichten Rogers. These two gentlemen were the two singled out to play in a Carnegie Hall concert of 100 harpists-98 girls and two men.

Mrs. Rice also did concert work throughout the state and was harpist with the Syracuse Symphony Orchestra.

On graduation from college, she opened her studio in the Clark Music building and at the time of her marriage in 1919

had 75 pupils.

Her husband, George B. Rice, was an insurance man but an amateur pianist and as Mrs. Rice says, "my most severe critic and best teacher." Their home was the center of music for 23 years where friends would often gather on Sundays for informal musicals.

She has a daughter, Mrs. Muriel Urey, who lives in New Mexico.

During her marriage she continued teaching except for three years when her daughter was young. Among her pupils were Claudia Race, child harpist who toured the United States and South America; Grace Weymer, now of Chicago; Barbara Haight Jackson, widely known in the south and with the Atlanta symphony; and last year, Lenny Herman, the radio and television band leader.

As a child Mrs. Rice had been shy and stricken with stage fright when appearing at recitals. Therefore, when she started to teach, she went on the theory that music should be fun.

"I wanted children not to suffer

as I had and encouraged small children to appear in public early," she stated. "It was good to have people love the harp and play for enjoyment."

cause it is situated directly between two naval stations, one of which was captured by the Army! Needless to say, Jane and the family spent a great deal of that time on the floor to avoid being hit by stray bullets. Since a second coup d'état the government has been controlled by military leaders, the commanders of the various military branches also holding a domestic ministerial post. It is impossible to predict the time or outcome of the next incident-Thailand may be the next scene of intensified fighting.

Jane's concluding remarks from Bangkok are that their stay in Thailand is rich and unsurpassed in experiences, but she hopes that future assignments will not take them back to South-DDD east Asia.

Marilyn Hunter, Homecoming Queen at North Dakota State College, is now serving as commanding officer of the Air Debs, newly organized auxiliary to AFROTC. Lois Fitzloff, also of Alpha Omicron chapter at North Dakota State, reigned as Queen of the Jack Frost Winter Carnival and Connie Hogan was selected as an attendant.

Old Vermont Mansion Is New Gamma Phi Beta Home



Beta Nu Chapter at the University of Vermont has a new home and one that truly is part of historic New England. On September 1, they took possession of the famous "Gates House," three-story mansion of a former leading lumberman of Vermont who used the waterways of Lake Champlain to bring woods of every description to the then-noted inland port of Burlington. Only after fifteen years of discriminatory saving of choice woods did he build his house. The rich black cherry wainscoting in the dining room and the curly birch in the housemother's room still bring cries of admiration. There are hardwood floors in all eighteen rooms and an impressive oak stairway with suspension landing, leading from a spacious entrance hallway. There are four fireplaces on the first floor and four on the second! The basement was ready made for a sorority with large rooms, floored with asphalt tile, appropriate for chapter room and rumpus room.

Mrs. Roger F. Howe, International Housing Chairman, traveled from Chicago to assist and advise local alumnæ in the intricacies of acquiring the property. As soon as the title was obtained, actives, pledges, parents and alumnæ went to work to transform "Gates House" into their chapter home. Brothers and their friends found themselves guiding power mowers over the spacious lawn and scrubbing woodwork. Fathers were invited to bring their tools and come see the house! Out-of-town members returned to college early to lend a hand. Mothers appeared with cakes for the workers—and their polishing cloths.

All wanted to climb first to the widow's walk, the railed area around the topmost cupola. Up winding stairs the wife of a seafaring man would climb to this little lookout to watch for her husband's ship in early New England days, but the watch atop

the Gamma Phi Beta house provides a good view of the Alpha Chi Omega and Kappa Sigma houses across the street and of Grassmount, senior woman's dormitory, adjoining the property.

Located only a block from the University of Vermont campus, the house boasts a larger capacity than any of the other sororityowned houses. Thirty-four Gamma Phis are enjoying their new quarters.

Rugs, small tables, an adequate number of chairs, beds, desks and chests, as well as some dishes and linen were included in the house purchase.

Beta Nu is grateful for the gifts from individuals and chapters, especially the Westchester and New York City alumnæ chapters, and for the help from the Endowment-Crescent Board which made the purchase and furnishing possible and for the untiring aid of Mrs. Howe. They point with pride to their loyal, hardworking alumnæ: Mrs. W. S. Carlson, Miss Eleanor Luse, Mrs. L. S. Ramsey, Mrs. John Swan, Mrs. Robert Thompson. They also remember the contributions of Mrs. Rolf Haugen and Mrs. S. Willard before they left Burlington. University administrators gave generously of advice and assistance too. To them all, the chapter aims to say "thank you" by maintaining an inviting home which every Gamma Phi Beta is urged to visit when traveling in the vicinity.

Do you know what the American freedoms are and why we treasure them?

In hundreds of cities and towns throughout the Nation on May 14 to 20, 1952 Fraternity Women will participate in Know Your America Week. The benefits and opportunities of the free way of life are increasing in importance to more and more people in every American community. Citizens will rededicate themselves to the preservation of the basic American principles which will be exemplified and dramatized through numerous and varied programs planned in the respective communities during Know Your America Week.

What can you do?

Fraternity Women can plan programs within their Chapters and Panhellenics as well as volunteer their services to the local organizers, or if no organizers, can volunteer such leadership themselves to the civic authorities or broadcasting studios in their communities. In observing Know Your America Week, Fraternity Women can volunteer to present or take part in historical pageants; college Chapter Houses can display the Flag throughout the Week, (Do our Chapter Houses

own such emblems? They should!) Fraternity Women can contribute choral groups; they can offer to staff booths for the dissemination of information; they can speak on radio and community programs; and they can offer organizational experience or the "know how" to get things done. Fraternity members are among the most experienced and devoted group of volunteer workers in the United States. Put the leadership training and organizational experience your Fraternity helped to develop in you at work during Know Your America Week.

All programs throughout the United States will highlight the story of our Nation; its laws and liberties, its faiths and national origins; its schools and churches; its clubs and free associations; its rights and responsibilities.

We College Women have responsibility as Citizens because we enjoy the freedoms our forefathers won for us.

In recognition of this responsibility, the National Panhellenic Conference joins with 54 other National organizations representing approximately 800,000 Citizens all associated in the All-American Conference in urging their memberships to observe and participate in Know Your America Week.

At a called meeting of Delegates of the National Panhellenic Conference on March 29, 1951 in Chicago, Illinois, the following Resolution was unanimously adopted:

"The National Panhellenic Conference becomes a member of the All-American Conference to Combat Communism, as a dem-

Dr. Daniel Å. Poling who serves as Chairman of the *All-American Conference* in an address on World Peace on June 27, 1951 before the Supreme Council Session of the United Commercial Travelers of America said among other things:

"The price of freedom first of all is knowledge. We need to know these United States of America. . . . We need to know what is going on in America.

"Freedom is not free. Always freedom has its price. And that price has been paid. Freedom is both an inheritance and an achievement. . . . We have it from those who went before us, who in their time paid the price. . . . Theirs is a finished work. But in some sense, at least, this freedom must be re-born

in me, it must become alive in me. I must make my contribution here and now."

Fraternity Women have their opportunity to contribute here and now in Know Your America Week, May 14-20, 1952.

As Mrs. Fred Sharp, National President of Alpha Sigma Alpha editorialized in a recent issue of their publication:

"In the security of friendship, we can review the basic values of fraternity and the ever-widening boundaries for the application of the principles. In mutual reverence we can experience the inspiration and the meaning of the fraternity rituals and their eternal truths. Together as groups of American women wherein cooperation and understanding are strong realities, we can discuss the American spirit, the American idea. For these ends we will take time, carefully and thoughtfully as our own. We will take it with respect and compelling gratitude. There will be no complaining about the lack of time, for our days and our hours will be worthy of themselves and equal to the urgencies and the crises of our time. Each individual fraternity member can be armed against communism and subversive influence's because through serious conscious practice, she will have learned and can say to others, 'Take time to think; it is the source of power.' " DDD




After teaching Home Economics for two years, she gave up her profession to practice what she had taught, becoming the wife of Martin H. Baldwin, Pi Kappa Alpha.

Scholarship Committee Outlines Award Policies

A HIGH point of every convention is the presentation of scholarship awards. To every Gamma Phi Beta chapter, scholastic achievements of its members are a source of pride and to be tops on campus is a distinctive and enviable position.

This year, some changes have been made in the manner of choosing the award winners, in order to make the selections fair to all, whether the chapter is competing with just a few other sororities or many.

We wanted to encourage well-rounded chapters. To this end there seemed to be some merit in awards for general excellence. We felt, however, that if the chapters chose their pledges wisely, with sufficient but not exclusive emphasis on high scholarship, the purpose would be achieved. A good chapter would then consist of a group of intelligent girls with many interests and activities in common.

We therefore set up a plan which would recognize Gamma Phi Beta's expectations of scholastic excellence. We believe scholarship to be a matter of personal pride in each chapter and each person. We cannot force high scholarship, and we do not exclude other desirable qualities in a chapter, but we do encourage a personal responsibility for scholarship.

We hope that each chapter will endeavor to complete its reports satisfactorily in order to meet the requirements approved by Grand Council.

The following plan will be used as a basis for determining the awards:

Where Gamma Phi Beta is the only sorority on campus no award will be given. Where there are between two and six sororities, an award will be given for first place only in the official campus ranking. Where there are from seven to twelve groups, an award will be given for first or second place. Where there are from thirteen to eighteen groups, an award will be given for first, second or third place. Where there nineteen or more sororities, an award will be given if Gamma Phi Beta places in the first

quartile. The size of the chapter in each case will be immaterial.

These awards will be given for the biennium preceding the International Convention at an important session of the Convention. They will be in the form of handsome engraved citations and will be known as the Chancellor E. O. Haven Awards, in memory of Chancellor Haven who gave Gamma Phi Beta its name at Syracuse University in 1874.

We feel that this award will encourage a higher type of social responsibility in our sorority without minimizing the thrill of personal achievement. When a chapter has received three of these citations the Grand Council will present a special award to that chapter. We do not at this time contemplate improvement awards.

Chapters that do not send in scholarship reports will of necessity be disqualified from participation in the awards, although every effort will be made by the International Scholarship Chairman to obtain the reports. Likewise chapters that are unable to obtain the Panhellenic ranking from their college or university will be ineligible for awards. It is hoped that colleges that do not normally publish campus rankings will make the information available at least to the International Scholarship Chairman.

On the alternate years we will again publish our *Honors in Gamma Phi Beta Booklet* covering the preceding biennium. This publication recognizes in an attractive manner the individual girls with high scholarship. It emphasizes for the whole membership, and for those outside, the value which we place on high scholarship in all fields. Certainly other aspects of college life are given emphasis in numerous ways. There is this definite need to encourage all members of Gamma Phi Beta to work at the highest level of their ability.

Graduate Assistantships Available At Syracuse And Ohio Wesleyan

Syracuse University again is offering graduate assistantships to young women interested in work as Deans, Advisers of Girls, Counselors, Social Directors, etc.

Each assistantship is equivalent to a grant of twelve to fifteen hundred dollars per year, awarded in terms of room, board and tuition. Work for a master's or doctor's degree may be taken in any field of the Graduate school for which the appointee's previous work will have fitted her. The master's degree may be earned in two years of study.

These scholarships are limited to students who are willing to give two years to the program of study and will be awarded on or before June 1.

Six Graduate Assistantships for women in Counseling and

Guidance are now available at Ohio Wesleyan University. Women between the ages of 20 and 30 who have earned a bachelor's degree with distinction are eligible. Appointees will serve as assistant to the Resident Councillor in a dormitory, which provides an opportunity for experience in guidance and personnel work.

A minimum of 12 months will be needed to acquire the 30 semester credits required for a Master's degree.

Each assistant occupies a single room in the dormitory and receives room, board and tuition. Appointments are made for the academic year, from the opening of dormitories in September through commencement in June.

Application should be made no later than May 15 by addressing Miss Audrey M. Parker, Dean of Women, Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, Ohio.


Christine Hedge has been serving this year as secretary-treasurer for the San Francisco Bay Area Intercity Council, and Helen Mangin continues as

Greek-Letter Chapters

PRESIDENT:

In odd years, send Central Office acknowledgement of bound CRESCENT as soon as it is received. Use postal card in volume.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By August 1, either send 7 rushing calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary or notify Central Office if Panhellenic has not released rushing dates.

By September 15, send 7 college calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary.

By September 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at fall council meeting; include business for consideration of convention in fall preceding convention.

Immediately after pledging (immediately after opening of college if pledging is deferred), send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

By February 15, send list of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

Not later than March 25, send name and home address of new membership (rushing) chairman to Central Office.

By March 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at spring council meeting.

Immediately after appointment is made, send name and home address of Crescent correspondent to Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.

As soon after April 1 as information is available, send 7 lists of new chapter officers to Central Office and 1 list each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary on standard blanks.

By May 15, send to Central Office list of chapter members (undergraduate and alumnæ) who have passed away since preceding August 1.

By July 1, send list of graduates (include members who have dropped out of college) with home addresses to Central Office and Province Director.

TREASURER:

Pre-initiation and final fees due in Central Office within two weeks following pledging and initiation. (See schedule of CRESCENT subscriptions below.)

By October 1, annual audit due Chairman of Finance, Mrs. Newman. DO NOT SEND TO CENTRAL OFFICE.

By December 1, due Central Office: first installment of International dues and \$7.50 for bound CRESCENTS and subscriptions to Banta's Greek Exchange and Fraternity Month.

By March 1, due Central Office: second installment of International

Fiscal year begins August 1, ends July 31. All dues paid between those dates shall apply to the current fiscal year unless otherwise specified.

SCHOLARSHIP CHAIRMAN:

Comparative rating of NPC sororities on campus for preceding year due Scholarship Chairman, Mrs. Stoddard, immediately after reported, if possible by November 1.

PLEDGE TRAINER:

Immediately after pledging, order pledge manuals and song books from Central Office.

By May 15, send report for new edition of Pledge Manual to Central Office.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

By October 1, for December issue, January 10 for March issue, February 20 for May issue, July 1 for September issue, glossies, features, honors due Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.

By January 10, chapter letter due Mrs. Marek for March issue. Do not send chapter letter for other issues.
