A Visit To The University Of Vermont

The University of Vermont sits at the top of the hill overlooking Lake Champlain at Burlington, the largest city in Vermont. For a backdrop there are the Green Mountains which give Vermont its name. From the latin name Universitatis Viridi Montanae comes the popular name for the University, UVM.

The main campus, well-scattered with large old maple trees is beautiful with color in the fall, and in the winter after a snowfall it is a fairy wonderland. The Ira Allen Chapel, named for the founder of the University, is a landmark in the city, and the recently built Administration and Student Union building as well as the new Agricultural and Home Economics buildings show that Vermont has grown steadily. UVM is especially noted for its fine Medical College which ranks with the best in the country. Also included in the University is the State Agricultural College, School of Technology, Education and Nursing, and Arts and Sciences.

Justly proud of their school's history and growth, the members of the honorary society Staff and Sandal began the Memorial Lounge, presenting and honoring graduates and faculty members of UVM. A prominent place was given, of course, to the most famous of these alumni, John Dewey. Also under the first president of the University, John Marsh, UVM was the first university in this country to carry on a successful progressive education program.

Among the many social events of the year, by far the biggest and best is the annual Kake Walk. A combination Winter Carnival and something entirely Vermontish, Kake Walk cannot be described, although it was written up last year in Life. Gamma Phi Betas had an especially gala occasion last year for their candidate, Nancy Storm, was chosen queen and their sculpture won second place.

Beta Nu Chapter of Gamma Phi Beta is one of the youngest of nine sororities on campus but in three short years it has climbed very close to the top. Initiated by Alpha chapter at Syracuse in the fall of 1950, Beta Nu first gained recognition for having the highest scholastic average for the sororities and in the spring of 1951, exhibited the winning float in the Junior Week Peerade.

Kake Walk the next year was, of course, the big event with both a queen and a prize sculpture, but also in the fall Beta Nu took another first with its Homecoming Poster. The theme of Home, Sweet Home fitted right in with the first Open House at Beta Nu's brand new home. This year Gamma Phi again had a prize winning poster for Homecoming and at Kake Walk time had a record-breaking crowd for their Open House for the king and queen candidates.

An international element was added to Beta Nu last year with Marliese Lang. Marliese was a German exchange student who lived at the Gamma Phi Beta house while she was at UVM. It was a wonderful experience for all and very hard to say goodby to a girl who had become such a close friend.

Besides winning prizes, Gamma Phi Beta carries on a full social life with open houses, teas, and exchange dinners as well as participating in the Interfraternity Sing and other campus events. In intramural sports competition Gamma Phis have proved to be all-round girls by winning the basketball cup and doing creditably in all other sports. Well represented on the honoraries, Gamma Phi Beta has two Mortar Board members plus the junior and sophomore honoraries, All-Sports and Omicron Nu members. Gamma Phis have also had the leads in the University's Opera and two plays of the past year.

Wisconsin Gamma Phi Beta Wins National Speed Skating Crown

 $I^{\rm F}$ YOU plan on taking up speed skating, you'll dine heartily on T-bone steaks but have to give up most of your "night life."

That's the sage opinion of pretty, 18-year-old Patricia Jane Gibson, the University of Wisconsin freshman who has brought the spotlight of fame once again to Madison for her skating ability.

Miss Gibson has just added the national senior women's championship title to her long list of awards. She won the national crown at St. Paul, Minn., on February 1.

As a member of an athletics-conscious family, Pat said she took

up skating at the age of 9 in "self defense."

Her father, Edward H. Gibson, who is field secretary for the University of Wisconsin Alumni association, was a Badger half-back in the early 1920's. He and her brother, Edward George Gibson, a university alumnus who is now employed as an engineer with the Chain Belt Co. in Milwaukee, did nothing "but talk sports, sports, and more sports."

"I decided when I was just a little girl that if I ever wanted to get a word in edgewise, I'd have to do something in the sports world," says Pat. "For awhile it was ski jumping, but my mother thought that was too dangerous. Then I took to the ice."

State Title in 1950

Pat won her first state skating title in the junior division in 1950. In 1951 she won the state and national titles in the intermediate division, and in 1952 she again won the state title. (She sprained her ankle in 1952 and was not in peak condition for the national meet.)

Although Pat skates twice a week to keep in trim, skating is only one of the many interests of her full and well-rounded life.

She is a "straight B" student in the physical therapy course at the university and was initiated into Gamma Phi Beta on March 1. She also works Saturdays, and whenever else she can find a spare moment, in the women's sportswear department of the Wisconsin-Felton Sporting Goods store.

Played Violin

Pat, who played second violin in the West High school orchestra for three years, regrets that she no longer has time for her violin studies.

An extremely attractive and personable young lady, Pat's main complaint about her skating is that it necessitates a drastic reduction of her "social life" during the season.

"I am the most chaperoned girl in Madison," she says. "My father and my coach, Fred Milverstedt, make the rules—and I stick by them. They say that I can only go out one night a week during the skating season—and even on that night I have to be in bed by 11!"

Pat attributes much of her skating success to Mr. Milverstedt who was an intercollegiate skating champion himself some years ago.

Praises Her Coach

"I give the credit for my skating success to Freddie," says Miss Gibson. "He has been simply wonderful to me all these years and

has given up so much of his leisure time to coaching me. I never could have accomplished what I have without his help."

Pat says that one of the nicest things about skating is that she "just lives on steaks" when she races!

"It's nice not to have to worry too much about dieting," she says. "Skating is so strenuous that I have to eat more proteins and body building foods than most people."

Pat's father is her most loyal fan and accompanies her to every meet. Her devoted mother is a fan, too, but by remote control!

Mother Can't Look

"Mother only saw me skate once—at the Great Lakes meet in Milwaukee last month—and then she closed her eyes most of the time," says Pat.

Miss Gibson plans to take part in five more meets this winter and then she intends to relax and have "some fun."

"Madison is lovely in the spring time, don't you think?" she asks with a slight gleam in her eye.

Governor's Lady - Georgia Benson Patterson

Waen Oregon's Governor Douglas McKay was appointed Secretary of the Interior all Oregon waited for word of his successor. Gamma Phi Betas were particularly thrilled when Paul Patterson, president of the state senate, was appointed Governor for the remaining two years, for the Governor's lady is our own Georgia Benson Patterson. Georgia comes from a prominent Oregon family. Her grandfather, Simon Benson, and father, Amos Benson, were well known lumbermen who gave generously to civic projects. Georgia's aunts, Alice Benson Allen (Mrs. Pat), and the late Caroline Benson Unander, were both Gamma Phi Betas at California and Stanford respectively. Mrs. Unander was godmother to Nu chapter at the University of Oregon giving the chapter its present site and helping with the financing of the house. Caroline's son, Sigfred Unander, is Oregon's state treasurer.

At the University of Oregon Georgia had wide interests in college activities which culminated in the presidency of Associated Women Students. Following her graduation in 1924 Georgia became secretary to the Dean of Women. Two years later she married Paul Patterson (Chi Psi, Oregon B.A. '23, J.D. '26). The young people settled in Hillsboro where Paul practiced law. They have three children: Searle (Patsie) Smithson (Mrs. John L.) who has a five year old daughter and a new baby son; Paul, Jr. (Chi Psi, Oregon '51) who is married and father of year old Paul, III; and Virginia (Jinx), a sophomore at Stanford.

In spite of a busy family life Georgia has maintained outside interests serving on the state board of AAUW as chairman of education for three years and as present by-law chairman; on the state board of the PTA for eight years; as well as on the state board of the American Legion Auxiliary. Six years ago the late Governor Snell appointed Georgia to the State Board of Education on which she is still serving.

Georgia was president of Nu Corporation Board for two years

and attended the Del Monte Convention in 1938.

Georgia and Pat represented Oregon at President Eisenhower's inauguration. Georgia wrote that "The inaugural program was well organized and everyone was most gracious. The line-up of Governors' cars was impressive. At the ball the beauty of the gowns was lost in the crush, but the entertainment was super colossal extravaganza. However, the most amusing part of the evening was to see the white ties and tails and fabulous formals crowding into the hamburger stands for post-ball snacks. The grand finale for us was the daylight flight home across the United States. It was really a dramatic lesson in geography!"

On February 8 Portland Gamma Phi Betas gave a reception for Georgia and Paul Patterson at the hillside home of Janice and Walter Holman. Panhellenic officers and representatives, Gamma Phi Betas and their husbands turned out three hundred strong. It was a perfect day with the panorama of the city, river, and mountains spread out before the guests in the spring sunshine. Friendly and gracious, the Governor and his lady "made" the party with their genuine warmth.

Gamma Phi Beta has every right to be proud of Oregon's first family for they truly represent all that is fine and good in public life.

Silver Chalice Presented to Gamma Phi Beta

I MAGINE my surprise when during convention a stranger in the lobby of the Del Coronado asked me if I could introduce her to the Gamma Phi Beta historian. Imagine her surprise when I assured her she was then speaking to the historian. This attractive graduate of Syracuse University, Mrs. W. G. Laidlaw of La Jolla, explained to me that her late husband was the nephew of Clara Worden Wilcox. In the Worden family for many years, said Mrs. Laidlaw, was a small silver chalice which she thought might be a welcome addition to Gamma Phi Beta's historical collection.

In La Jolla, the following Sunday, Mrs. Laidlaw's son, Mr. Donald Worden, a grandnephew of Clara Worden Wilcox, presented the chalice to me. It is engraved on one side with "Clara" and on the other with the date, "December 25, 1874."

The chalice is a prized acquisition, to be added to Gamma Phi Beta's historical treasures, for it belonged to the first initiate, the first mother and first grandmother in Gamma Phi Beta, Clara Worden Wilcox. Mrs. Laidlaw's thoughtfulness and generosity will be long remembered.

Los Angeles Critics Praise Soprano Grace Ann Schwennesen

A YOUNG Gamma Phi Beta alumna of whom the Alpha Iota chapter at U.C.L.A. is justly proud is Grace Ann Schwennesen. On January 11, she made her Los Angeles debut recital before a capacity audience at the Assistance League Playhouse, where her lyric and dramatic soprano voice impressed the critics very favorably. The review published in the February, 1953, issue of the Music of the West Magazine mentioned her "velvety tone" which was "projected with a direct sincerity in a manner indicative of real innate artistry." It added that she has a "rare ability for interpretation," excellent diction, and "was at her best in the works of dramatic character and could very well be a Wagnerian Soprano," which is rare praise indeed.

Mme. Queena Mario with whom Grace Ann studied at the Juilliard School of Music in New York, sent her to Ruth and Mario Chamlee when she returned to Los Angeles with her family. The young singer has studied voice for the past six years with Mme. Chamlee (Ruth Miller, formerly of the Metropolitan Opera Company). She has coached at the University of Southern California in the opera classes of Mario Chamlee (the noted tenor who sang for many years with the Metropolitan and other opera companies, including the Grand Opera of Paris). Grace Ann's operatic repertoire includes "La Boheme," "Faust," "Madame Butterfly," "Aïda," "Pagliacci" and "Cavaleria Rusticana." She has also received dramatic training from Armando

Artist Turns Writer

WHEN Florence Harvey Pettit (Northwestern '30), a former professional artist, first took up the hobby of Block printing on fabrics, she hunted for books on the subject and found none. So she wrote her own book!

"Block Printing on Fabrics" was published by Hastings House last September, and is the first complete text on how to hand-print fabrics with linoleum blocks ever put out in this country. Mrs. Pettit spent six years gathering information and experience in fabric printing before she was ready to write about it. Her book, primarily for beginners, describes in simple terms what tools are necessary and how to create designs, cut linoleum blocks and ink and print them. The book is profusely illustrated with line drawings by the author and action photographs, as well as reproductions of designs by many leading artists.

"Fabric block printing is one of the least expensive and most interesting crafts I know of," says Mrs. Pettit. "You can start with as little as three dollars, including your tools, paint, linoleum block and fabric. And you don't have to be an artist. Anyone can do it."

A native of Des Moines, Iowa, Mrs. Pettit received her degree from Chicago's Art Institute. She has designed packages, displays and containers for a manufacturing druggist and was a member of the Association for Color Research in Chicago.

Her marriage to Robert M. Pettit (Purdue '29) took her first to Baltimore, where she studied ceramics and taught crafts to disabled veterans as a Red Cross volunteer. At present Mr. Pettit

is a personnel executive with Lever Brothers in New York, and they are making their home in Stamford, Connecticut, where Mrs. Pettit is a member of the Society of Connecticut Craftsmen. She was awarded second prize for her block printed drapery material at the Silvermine Guild Exhibition last summer. Currently she is researching on another book, dealing with fabrics.

Former president of the London, Ontario alumnæ chapter of Gamma Phi Beta, Mary Tasker tells of her experiences at the Golden Jubilee Conference of the Anglican Young People's Association in Britain. The A.Y.P.A. is a leisure time interest of Mary's, for in the business world she is secretary to the President of the Kellogg Company of Canada. She was elected Dominion President of A.Y.P.A. in 1951, thus heading a group which includes 550 branches and some 9,000 members.

London' my ticket read. It scarcely seemed possible to me last July 31 that the great day had really arrived and I was about to set off for a three weeks' visit to Britain. Now in the past were typhoid vaccination, securing of passport, anxiety about plane reservations, preparation of notes and other related material (for this was not to be the usual type of holiday)—and I was boarding a T.C.A. plane at London, Ontario, bound for London, England, to be the Canadian representative at the Golden Jubilee Conference of the Anglican Young People's Association in Britain. Since the A.Y.P.A. was founded in Canada, the British organization had asked for a delegate from the "parent" group for this special occasion and, as Dominion President, I was chosen to go.

Overshadowing the responsibility of representing abroad our Dominion-wide organization and, in a sense, the Canadian Church (since the Dominion Council is the official committee on young people's work of the Church of England in Canada) was the anticipation of seeing with my own eyes the mighty, little island so familiar already from pictures and books. Our otherwise uneventful flight was delayed approximately twelve hours at Goose Bay, Labrador, because of engine trouble, and we arrived finally at London, England, shortly after 1 A.M. Greenwich summer time, where I was met by the President and other members of the All Britain Council. Thus for me the first experience of driving along the left side of the road came at an hour when there was very little traffic about.

There were about 100 delegates assembled at the Welsh Girls' School, at Ashford (Middlesex), where the conference was held; young people from nearly every section of England, as well as Wales and Scotland.

During the first few days, by far the most popular question turned in my direction was, of course—"From what part of Canada do you come?" The fact that my home was not only in another London, but on another Thames River and in the County of Middlesex seemed to astonish most of my fellow delegates; and I was more than once prompted to confuse them further by mentioning that near London, Ontario, also were the counties of Oxford, Kent, Essex and Norfolk!

Young people with common interests are pretty much the same the world over and I found myself settling easily into the routine of this A.Y.P.A. conference 3,700 miles from home. It was in the recreational activities where our national differences seemed more apparent. I missed the opportunities for swimming

which one usually finds at summer conferences in Canada. Tennis was popular, and rounders—a game in which (so it seemed to me) the spectators were under almost constant fire. Country dancing appears to be regaining favor in Britain, as square-dancing is on this side of the Atlantic, and I had the pleasure of learning several delightful country dances at Ashford and also while attending a Welsh Provincial Conference at Yeaton Peverey, near Shrewsbury.

Half-way through the conference we took a little holiday and visited Hampton Court and Windsor Castle. This tour was fortunately timed in one respect. Since the Royal Family was then in Scotland, the Castle was open to the public and I had the rare privilege of seeing the beautiful St. George's Chapel where George VI and many other Kings of England are buried, and the impressive "state apartments" in which the

Queen resides when at Windsor. This was actually my first opportunity for sight-seeing since arriving in Britain, and my feelings on visiting these two places, so steeped in history, are difficult to describe. One could almost imagine Henry VIII sauntering around the corner of one of the buildings at Hampton Court. The fountains at play, many surrounded with pretty blooms are breathtaking.

Ashford itself is a charming suburb of London, where we enjoyed a number of leisurely walks. Here I saw holly growing for the first time. Here too I received my first reminder of the restrictions under which the British still live, for I had to call at the local Ministry of Food Office for my visitor's ration allowance. One could not at that time buy "sweets" without points.

Approximately half my time in Britain was spent at A.Y.P.A. camps and conferences, since this, of course, was my reason for going. However a veritable whirlwind tour of the Island was planned for me by my A.Y.P.A. hosts and hostesses.

What do I recall now as being particularly memorable? Well, as a member of the Anglican communion my visit to Canterbury Cathedral was a most inspiring experience; Canterbury, with its Martyr's Shrine where Becket was struck down, its Tomb of the Black Prince, Huguenots' meeting room; seeing Mary Morris in "The Young Elizabeth" at the Criterion Theatre on Piccadilly Circus; wandering through the famous London shops on Regent Street; travelling on London's underground trains alone (I had never seen a subway before); hearing a telephone operator say, upon receiving my number-"Canada, isn't it?"; punting on the Cam River along the "backs" of the colleges at Cambridge; visiting the Scots' War Memorial in Edinburgh Castle; lunching at the Mitre Inn at Oxford; walking along a country lane at Yeaton Peverey; visiting a 300 year-old rectory at Bishop's Castle, Monmouthshire, which had a beautiful Elizabethan stone staircase; Thistle Chapel in St. Giles' Presbyterian Church in Edinburgh; fine old Tudor buildings at Shrewsbury; and London,

This little résumé would not be complete without mention of the marvelous hospitality which I received from my A.Y.P.A. friends in Britain. Indeed it was almost impossible for me to acquire any practice at all in the use of English currency! If I sound like a booster for the British Travel and Tourist Association, it is because I have given you a "bird's-eye view" of three of the most delightful weeks of my life.

Stately Georgian Home Houses Vanderbilt Chapter

The Crescent Moon still shines over a magnolia-scented campus in the Southland but the lazy days of half-forgotten dreams have long since passed. Bustling progress is the watchword now, with the university center of Nashville, Tennessee, continuing to expand as an educational mecca extending its influence even to foreign lands.

Right in step with the times is Vanderbilt University's Alpha Theta chapter, a vibrant part of the community life of this Athens of the South.

Contributing to her status is the fact that Gamma Phi Beta now has one of the most distinctive houses in the Vanderbilt Panhellenic family.


Set well back from the street on a spacious lot is the old Georgian home—two stories of solid brick in the time-honored tradition of high ceilings. This once red-brick house has been painted a soft gray with white columns and trim. It holds its own well with such neighbors as the SAE house, standing like a feudal castle just a stone's throw away, and other fraternity and sorority houses close by.

The house has been remodeled and refurbished under the direction of an experienced architect, a contractor and an interior decorator working in cooperation with Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ and actives.

Brass letters signifying Gamma Phi Beta catch the eye as one approaches wide double doors from the front porch. The latter extends all across the front and is popular in mild weather. Focal point of interest in the spacious entrance hall is a distinctive mural of tropical plants with a Gamma Phi Beta color motif. In the main downstairs rooms, tones of green, gold, rose and brown blend to create a decor at once arresting and yet bespeaking southern hospitality.

A black marble fireplace is featured in a formal reception room connecting with the dining room, where prismatic light shines through a trio of cut-glass windows of fruit design in amber and green. In the television and game room, which doubles as a chapter room, one wall cleverly simulates a bookcase with unusual novelty wallpaper. Adjoining the spacious kitchen is a breakfast room and large, walk-in pantry. Also on the first floor is a powder room.

Upstairs where extensive remodeling has taken place are four bedrooms, designated by color scheme, where sixteen girls live (Continued on page 25)

In Memoriam

Millicent Lees Hoffman Former Grand President of Gamma Phi Beta February 9, 1953

All of Kappa chapter, and Gamma Phi Betas everywhere, are saddened by the loss of our distinguished Millicent Lees Hoffman who died suddenly on February 9, while on vacation in the Virgin Islands. We know of no one who more truly embodied the ideals of Gamma Phi Beta.

Millicent Lees attended the University of Minnesota with the class of 1909, where she met and married Arthur Hoffman. As a busy young mother of two sons, she devoted much

love, loyalty, and time to alumnæ work for Gamma Phi Beta, this same love, loyalty and time to be given freely for forty-seven years.

Always adept with a needle, she was the motivating spirit behind the bazaars that helped finance our present chapter house. Our plucky sisters of that time gathered together to sew exquisite hand made lingerie and other articles, selling them at annual bazaars.

Later in her life of service, Millicent was chairman of the 37th International Convention held in Bemidji, Minnesota. She served ably and wisely as International Grand President of our order from 1931 to 1936.

It had long been her belief that paraphernalia used for Gamma Phi Beta initiation ceremonies should be hand-detailed, and of handsome, lasting materials. So her project was begun, a dedicated work that lasted sixteen years. It was for this work that Millicent was elected to the International Service Roll at the 1952 Convention, an honor she richly deserved.

Locally, Mrs. Hoffman served as president of the Minneapolis Alumnæ chapter, president of House Board, treasurer of House Board two terms, and alumnæ advisor to Kappa chapter. At the time of her passing she was serving as alumnæ pledge advisor and State Rushing Chairman.

In recent years, she has made beautiful lamp shades, sold them, and donated the proceeds to local and national charities and to Gamma Phi Beta.

Preceded in death by both her husband Arthur Hoffman, and their son Peter, she leaves a son Walter Lees Hoffman, prominent physician, his lovely wife Jean, and three grandchildren. To Kappa chapter she leaves the use of two beautiful Gamma Phi Beta pins to award to honored girls. In her name the Minneapolis alumnæ will join with the active chapter in the purchase of silver candlesticks to be used in initiation.

We shall miss her sorely here at Minnesota, and her loss will be felt throughout our order. To Gamma Phi Beta she gave 47 years of loyal and loving service, and to those who knew her she gave inspiration and courage. No member of our organization ever "lived" her pledge more beautifully.



Designer in Oklahoma

Anna Jean Gray (Missouri U.), native Oklahoman and a designer by trade, finds herself in a fascinating career. Sometime ago she was sent by the Indian Arts and Crafts Board in Washington to develop a project of self-help for the Indians of western Oklahoma, Through her efforts, a line of unique fashions of contemporary Indian design are now on the market.

She started out making contacts with Indians in her territory, discovering their talents and crafts and developing ideas for putting them to their gain. She has a business manager and four department heads, all Indians, who assign work for other Indians to do at home, preparing kits for beadwork, cutting material for the Indian women to sew and storing the finished products.

Modernized patterns are made at the Anadarko museum, where material is cut. The Indian craftsmen themselves choose their own designs for beadwork and appliqué. They are extremely adept in achieving a contemporary effect without losing the integrity of their original Indian symbols. Members of the Woodland tribes do most of the appliqué work, while the Plains tribes do the bead and leather work.

Anna Jean's distinctive designs have found favor among women seeking the unusual in resort and travel wear. They have proved popular in the outlets which Anna Jean has secured in Arizona, Washington, D.C., and Florida, and have just recently been introduced in her home state of Oklahoma,

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Notes from N.P.C.

Fred Hughes, in a speech made before the 61st Continental Congress of the D.A.R., April 15, 1952, said that a survey of more than 450 of the most widely used high school textbooks in social science has showed that "every one of them encourages socialistic thinking in the students." He added: "Even the Brookings Institute in a recent survey declared that texts 'subtly condition the student to accept the thesis that the role of government over economic life must inevitably be progressively greater." Mr. Hughes declared that an organization of 8,000 public and private school teachers, called The American Education Fellowship, has pledged its members "to channel the energies of education towards the reconstruction of the economic system-a system which should be geared with increasing socialization and public controls." The June, 1952, American Legion Magazine has an excellent article, "Your Child Is Their Target," by Irene Corbley Rich, telling the story of how the Public Educational Committee "has been perverted from imparting sound basic education to the attempt to create a new social order based on collectivism and socialism." An encouraging news note tells that at its August meeting The American Federation of Teachers "reversed itself from its former stand and declared that it will no longer defend Communist teachers who are found out and forced to resign." "Aroused parents" are credited with having forced such action on organizations which had been covering up or defending Communist teach-
