A Visit To Ohio State University

On September 17, 1873, a group of 20 students assembled to start their studies in the new Ohio Agricultural and Mechanical College. Thus began the college which in 1878 was renamed The Ohio State University. At the present time, approximately 4,000 courses are offered in ten colleges, a graduate school, and nine special schools. The physical appearance of the campus has also been altered. In 1873, University Hall was the only campus building and provided space for classrooms, laboratories and offices, for student and faculty housing, and for all other necessary activities. Today there are some 100 permanent buildings and the university property includes 1,400 acres of campus and farm, a 400-acre airport, and two 18-hole golf courses.

Beta Xi chapter was founded at Ohio State University on April 28, 1951 and is the 23rd sorority to be established at the university. With a beginning of 13 initiates, we have grown to

a chapter of over 65 in two

short years.

The campus life at O.S.U. is very exciting. It all begins with rushing held either directly before or during the first two weeks of school. Sorority rushing is regulated through the Panhellenic office with every sorority giving the same kind of parties and the rushees choosing the parties to attend from the invitations received.

Every Saturday afternoon, when there is a home game, there are 75,000 or more people migrating down to big, beautiful Ohio Stadium, shaped in the form of a horseshoe, to see one of the top-ten football teams as well as the noted 120 strong Ohio State Marching Band. Phyllis Briggs (Dalton) was one of the three girl cheerleaders last year and many of the Beta

Xi girls participated in Block "O," a campus cheering section. On October 31, around 20 Ohio State Gamma Phis migrated to Northwestern for the Ohio State-Northwestern game. Many had a lovely lunch at the Epsilon chapter house. Beta Xi had several well attended open houses after the games and many exchange dinners with fraternities. There was a Hallowe'en party for members and dates and a Christmas party in collaboration with our neighbor fraternity for some needy children. We also went caroling at various hospitals in town before Christmas vacation.

After Christmas vacation Beta Xi had other honors. Mary Ann Conald was on Pledge Princess Court and Scabbard and Blade court. Carolyn Snook brought honors to our chapter by being elected to Queens Court of the Mardi Gras. The sorority basketball team was runner-up in the tournament again this year and several of the girls on the Gamma Phi team played on the O.S.U. team. The biggest thrill came to our chapter when the Gamma Phi Beta singers won the sorority sing (last year the pledge class won the pledge sing) and were asked to sing at many important entertainment functions.

After finals were over, approximately 30 Gamma Phis went

down to Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, for spring vacation. Everybody had a wonderful time and came back with plenty of vim and vigor.

During Spring Quarter, we won the Sundial Trophy (campus humor magazine) and Sue Heath was Dream Girl of Pi Kappa Alpha. During May Week, the chapter campaigned for two of our girls for political offices. Sonya Patterson just barely missed getting Junior Class Secretary and Pat Bailey was elected as a Senior Class Senator. Pat was also named associate business manager of the Makio (campus yearbook). Susan Scott was elected secretary of the YWCA. Beta Xis also worked on a float that resulted in a picture being published in one of the local newspapers.


Although it is just a young chapter, Beta Xi has already made many traditions. Soon after formal rushing is over, the actives

give an active-pledge slumber party and afterwards the pledges choose their big sister. Later on in the quarter, the new pledges take over the chapter house for a weekend and the actives move out. Last year we had our first formal and expect to make this a tradition. Near Christmas the actives got all dressed up like little girls and gave a surprise Christmas party for the pledges that was even complete with Mrs. Santa Claus. In the spring the chapter has a picnic which includes favors and plenty of food. A steak and beans dinner is held at the beginning of each quarter for the chapter. All girls raising their point hours to .3

raising their point hours to .3 eat steak and those not achieving the above eat beans. The pledges give the actives a dinner and also take them on a little journey during the year. When the pledges are initiated, each one gives her big sister a paddle that has been hand painted and the big sister gives her little sister a crescent necklace. A dinner is given at the end of the year in honor of all the seniors and those girls leaving the chapter for other reasons. This is followed by an Honors Day Tea which is given by the alumnæ living in or near Columbus. The undergraduate chapter provides the entertainment and the alumnæ award a beautiful pearl crescent necklace to the most outstanding pledge, a trophy to the Sophomore with the highest accumulative average, and a bracelet to the Junior who is most outstand-

Although Beta Xi is one of the youngest chapters of Gamma Phi Beta, it is already proving itself capable and energetic.

Women in a Democracy

College Women Discuss Their Role

What are women students thinking and doing in colleges today about preparing for responsibility? From screaming headlines, depicting escapades to obscure articles of attainment, the public draws its conclusions.

This spring a group of approximately three hundred women students representing the Associated Women Students* from eighty-six colleges and universities from coast to coast met on The Ohio State University campus to talk about "College—Your Pathway to the World." They did not confine themselves to just college, but rather the role they anticipate, uncertain as that may be.

They listened to outstanding speakers give statistics of college women who preceded them, site examples of accomplishments of women, and set sights for future achievement; then these students spent hours in workshops charting their own course.

What is this course? It is well for all college women to be aware of some of the thinking of their representatives at this meeting.

The tools for a rewarding and productive life for women they suggest as subjects in areas of economics, political science, geography, family life and appreciation of the arts. But beyond these specific subjects they also recommend that an integration of these subjects would be worthwhile. The interpretation of student activities is in the light of training for citizenship. Basic to this is the application of skills of human relationships, of careful training of leaders to take the responsibilities for the growth of members.

Important are some clearcut channels of communication between faculty, administration and students. In this program should be included social relationships of faculty, administration and students as well as committee relationships. The integration of faculty advisers of organizations into the groups as participating members with their role clearly defined and mutually understood was the recommendation.

Campus elections came in for considerable discussion, with the emphasis on the importance of citizenship training. Mock political conventions in cooperation with community service projects so that when students leave college the transition is not a confusing one. It was recommended that college branches of League of Women Voters, Community Chest, American Red Cross, preparation for membership in the American Association of University Women, all these and many more be included.

From the national outlook they moved to discussion of international affairs. The relationship of the American student to the foreign student was given due consideration. International dinners, international weekends, inclusion of foreign students in national, state, and local conferences were all recommended.

There was discussion concerning National Student Association and the relationship to Intercollegiate Associated Women Students. Their plan for the ensuing two years is to have representatives attending both regional and national meetings.

This convention brought to light the common concerns of faculty, administration and students. The interest and goals are the same from each of these groups, to help prepare those in training to meet the problems of our future.

With women students as directly concerned as these women were at this meeting, we should have little to worry about as we look forward to the future mothers and career women that the colleges and universities of this country are turning out.

Evanston's Showcase Theater— Another "First" For Hope Summers

DYNAMIC, personable Hope Summers has done it again! Her biggest venture, in a series of big ventures, Evanston's Showcase Theater is now in its ninth successful month, and promises to become a fixture in Hope's home town. Cautioned two years ago that television's increasing popularity would make legitimate theater as dead as a dodo, Hope went ahead to prove her advisers were wrong. Says she, "When someone tells me a thing can't be done, that spurs me on. For each 'insurmountable' problem usually dissolves and something good results therefrom."

The Showcase theater has enjoyed great popularity and has been a rewarding experience for Hope. She wants it to become even more highly professional . . . a real showcase for old and new talent. "It's a very rewarding thing," says Hope, "to have experts from New York find that the Chicago atmosphere and people are more conducive to creative effort than anywhere else in the world."

An average day for Hope starts at six a.m. to make breakfast for her husband, James, son Jim and daughter Bambi. Downtown in Chicago and on the air at eight a.m. An interview at nine. Coaching lesson in Evanston at 10:30 and a session with the Showcase business manager. In the afternoon she supervises rehearsal for an upcoming show, interviews actors for parts, meets with a club president concerning a forthcoming club appearance, shops for groceries, dines at home. Then back to the theater for an evening performance in which she plays an important role, policy conferences and a session to make final choices on future plays, and finally into bed at 1:30 a.m. This is an average day for Hope.

How does she do it? Born with great health, Hope says she is fortunate in having a healthy mind as well. "I'm not a complicated person. I never worry. I don't permit myself any excesses, except loss of sleep, and I don't smoke or drink. I think anyone can achieve a measure of poise and assurance through self-discipline."

Over the years Hope has played in many radio and TV shows, including the Chicago theater and Hawkins Falls. Her professional life has been a busy one, even when her children were small. Yet she has managed to be a devoted mother and efficient homemaker, as well as taking her part in civic and community affairs. Even if she can't make it to the church supper, she sends

her family along with her contribution of homemade cherry pies. She teaches a Sunday School class and has maintained a keen interest in Gamma Phi Beta affairs.

"Anyone can do it," she cheerfully asserts, "provided they have a fair amount of talent, a routine, some self-discipline, the stamina of a peasant and the experience of being a Cub Scout den mother!"

Corky Major Nydle became the new queen of Iowa golf when she defeated Ann Casey Johnstone, 4 and 3. And perhaps Corky gives credit to Ann for her success at the game, for Ann coached Corky in golf when the latter was

Ann had won the state championship in 1941 and again in 1951 and she was the medalist in this year's tournament with a 76 to Corky's 78. In her final match against Ann, Corky's approach shots were so deadly accurate that many times she needed only two or three foot putts to hole out. Ann had tough luck with her pitching and putting and although she was outdriving Corky, her short game cost her the match.

Cedar Rapids Gamma Phi Betas were out en masse to cheer the finalists, and made up some of the crowd of 500 who watched Corky Nydle win her first Iowa State golf crown. DDD

Mrs. Eisenhower Receives Washington City Panhellenic And Guests

Four French girls attending American colleges were received at the White House by Mrs. Eisenhower on May 14. The girls came to Washington for a gay week-end as guests of the Washington City Panhellenic Association. Among other things they had luncheon in the Speakers' Dining Room at the Capitol, were interviewed on television, and saw the play "Arms and the Man." The French girls were Paulette Renoe Ducatez, who is attending Sweet Briar College; Anita Kirgo, University of Delaware; Monique Simone Klein, Hollins College; and Madeleine Viard, Bucknell University.

Shortly after their arrival on Thursday, May 14, the girls and 250 members of the 25 sororities represented in the Washington Panhellenic Association were received at the White House at 12:50 P.M. by Mrs. Dwight Eisenhower. Following this, they had luncheon at the Capitol with Speaker of the House Joseph Martin, Congressman Arthur Younger, California and Congressman Laurie Battle, Alabama. A visit to the Senate was arranged through the courtesy of Senator J. Allen Frear, Jr., of Delaware.

Friday morning was spent in sightseeing the famous places in Washington, followed by a luncheon. The afternoon was very busy with a television appearance on Nancy Cagood's program at the Wardman Park Hotel. At three P.M. they were met by Mme, Pierre Francfort, wife of the Counselor of the French Embassy, representing Mme. Bonnet, who escorted them through the embassy and drove them to Mount Vernon.

Friday evening the four girls were escorted by young men from George Washington University to see the production "Arms and the Man." On Saturday, May 16, the members of Panhellenic entertained them at luncheon at the Mayfair Restaurant, followed by another sightseeing tour of the embassies, Lincoln Memorial, Lee Mansion and Arlington Cemetery.

The girls left Washington on Sunday morning to return to their

respective universities.

The entire expense of their trip to Washington was met by the Washington Panhellenic Association through funds received from a benefit tour of the French Embassy. The students will return to France this summer and the Washington Panhellenic felt that their American experiences will be enriched by a visit to our nation's Capitol. Mu Of Gamma Phi Beta Scholarship

Afton Armour Sweigert Is First Recipient Of Award

As announced in the May 1952 issue of The Crescent, Stanford Corporation funds were placed in the Gamma Phi Beta Endowment Fund. The net income from this fund, known as Mu of Gamma Phi Beta Fund, was to be used for scholarship grants to one or more qualified Stanford students, men or women, preferably descendants of Mu chapter alumnæ.

After careful study of applications, Mrs. Olivia Byler, Secretary of the Stanford Scholarship Committee, announced that the award had been made to Mrs. Afton Armour Sweigert.

With the permission of Mrs. Sweigert, her letter to the Endowment Board is quoted here:

"I can hardly begin to tell you how thrilled I was when Mr. Raymond D. Harriman and Mrs. Olivia Byler of the Scholarship Committee here at Stanford University notified me that I had been awarded the Mu of Gamma Phi Beta Scholarship for the Spring and Summer Quarters of 1953. It is a great honor to be the first recipient of this award and I wish you and the other members of your organization to know how deeply I appreciate it.

"I am one of the married students here at Stanford. My husband is

an Ensign in the United States Navy, now serving overseas. It might be of particular interest to you to know that my mother-in-law, with whom I now reside, is a member of your sorority, having been initiated at the University of California, at Berkeley. She is Mrs. Eleanor Atkinson Sweigert.

"I began my studies here at Stanford with the Winter Quarter of 1953. During this time, I have worked in one of the University Offices as many hours per week as there has been time, and have done baby sitting in the evenings as often as the opportunity has arisen. Through these various endeavors, I have managed to earn the major portion of my University expenses.

"Because of your generous scholarship, I am now able to decrease the number of hours I shall work and devote more time to my studies. I trust this will result in a scholarship average worthy of the honor you have accorded me."

Mrs. Sweigert is not sure about her plans for next year. Should she not return, the scholarship will be open to applicants who are not descendants of Mu members. Mrs. Afton Sweigert has a very good record during the quarter she has completed at Stanford. She is the daughter of Alice Whiffen Armour.

She came to this position well qualified, as she has done public relations work since her graduation. During World War II she was civilian stenographer for the Navy Department, assigned to the Kansas City Branch of Public Relations. That is where she got her first and very lasting taste for publicity and public relations work

Lambda Chapter Celebrates 50th Anniversary

THE WEEK END of May 15-17 marked an important milestone in the history of Lambda chapter, when alumnæ from Mexico, California, Idaho, Oregon, Canada and many parts of Washington gathered to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the installation of the chapter at the University of Washington.

A formal banquet at the Sunset Club was the opening event where the honor guests were ten of the charter members. Those present were, Alma Delaney Teal, Blanche Winsor Rice, Ruby Brown Rucker, Helen Wetzel Giboney, Louise Wetzel Clarke, Katharine Edwards MacDonald, Alice Taggart Livingstone, Jessie Ludden Horsfall, Jeanette Perry and Lillian Eisenbeis Welch. They were escorted to their places by ten Gamma Phi Beta daughters now in the college chapter. The program consisted of a television broadcast, "Lambda's Show of Shows." Hilarity knew no bounds as Katharine MacDonald gave "Yesterday's Newsreel"; Airdrie Pinkerton, "Candid Camera"; Virginia Douglass, "The Comedy Hour"; Audrey Jensen, "Break the Bank," and Margaret Holm, "Strike it Rich," each attired in a costume of her own decade. On the steps behind the performers was a

chorus from the college chapter, which sang popular and Gamma Phi Beta songs of each era.

Penelope Simonson represented Grand Council and Eta chapter which had had the responsibility of installing Lambda Chapter fifty years before. She brought first-hand accounts from some of those Eta girls as well as some pictures taken at that time. It was also especially fitting to have Airdrie Pinkerton on the program, since it was her sister, Zoe Kincaid Penlington, who chose the original twelve as founders of the Alpha Sorority in 1899.

Following the banquet, smaller gatherings of those who had been in college together were entertained in private homes where the reminiscences could continue on into the night.

For the fourth time, the Margaret Meany Younger award was made to the one in the chapter, who has exemplified to the highest degree the qualities of friendship, inspiration and loyalty in Gamma Phi Beta and the University of Washington. The award went to Elizabeth Lovsted. She has a tremendous list

of accomplishments and certainly merits this honor. It is particularly interesting to note that she was Secretary of the Associated Students which was an office held fifty years before by one of our charter members, Ruby Brown Rucker.

It was a great thrill to be able to announce that over \$1,000 had been contributed by members of Lambda, as a gift to the University on this fiftieth anniversary. It is planned to use this fund to build a beautiful drinking fountain in the wall of the University Library Building. It is to be dedicated to four outstanding former faculty men whose letters of recommendation were instrumental in securing the charter. They are Dr. Thomas F. Kane, President of the University in 1903; Arthur S. Haggett, Dean of Liberal Arts and husband of Winifred Sunderlin Haggett of Beta chapter, who persuaded the Alpha Sorority to petition Gamma Phi Beta; Professor Edmond S. Meany, father of Margaret Meany Younger, and Dr. Frederick M. Padelford, Dean of the Graduate School.

The chapter members proved wonderful hostesses and the alumnæ enjoyed seeing the house and the historical display in the Margaret Meany Younger library. There is no more beautiful place than Seattle in the month of May with the azaleas, rhododendron, hawthorne and dogwood in bloom and the boulevard leading to the campus lined with chestnut trees in flower. To all of us who had the opportunity of sharing in this semi-centennial celebration, these beauties of nature and the joys of friendships will mingle in fond memories.

In Memoriam

Mary Endicott Shepherd—March 6, 1953 International Grand President of Gamma Phi Beta, 1911-12



The news of the passing of Mary Endicott Shepherd (Boston University) on March 6, 1953, came with such suddenness that it left all her friends in a state of unbelief, for only a few hours before we had seen her, well and happy as usual, planning with her committee for the fiftieth reunion in June of her class at the University.

She was born in Lynn, Massachusetts, where she lived all her life, the daughter of Col. William Shepherd, who had been mayor of the city for many years.

Mary was graduated from Boston University with the class of 1903 and for 53 years was a faithful and loyal member of Gamma Phi Beta. During these years her sympathy and enthusiasm were a very vital support in all the projects and undertakings of her chapter, and her attendance and concern were constant. In 1911 and 1912 she served her sorority as its International Grand President.

For several years she taught at the Lynn English High School, then became its dean of girls, librarian and guidance director where, as counselor and adviser, she did outstanding work until her retirement a year ago.

An active member of Saint Stephen's Church, she early became interested in establishing an Episcopal Boys' Camp in Maine, and every summer gave all her time, gratuitously, to this work which has proven such a success.

With her passing, something has gone from our meetings. We miss her air of deep sincerity, her ready smile and her enchanting sense of humor which was one of her most delightful qualities. Mary was seriously interested in the arts and was, herself, a talented pianist.

She was the last of her immediate family, her brother having preceded her by a few years. With customary thoughtfulness, a generous bequest was left to her beloved Boston chapter, and we shall always, in appreciation, remember her as a living expression of that Love, Labor, Learning, Loyalty, for which we are so ceaselessly reaching.

President's Page

m ECENTLY}$ it was the privilege of your president to attend the annual meeting of the All-American Conference to Combat Communism. Since I found the meeting inspirational and informative and since through National Panhellenic Conference Gamma Phi Beta is indirectly a member, it seems appropriate to tell you something about this organization.

The Conference came into being officially in May of 1950 in Chicago, although preliminary meetings had been held earlier that year in New York City and Indianapolis. The Conference is composed of 60 member groups of which the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National Federation of Business and Professional Women, the American Legion and other veterans groups and their auxiliaries, the NEA and NPC and NIC are a

The purpose of the Conference is "to promote Americanism; to preserve our freedoms; to expose and combat primarily communism but also all other subversive movements." Its functions are "informational, educational and advisory." "Protection of our freedoms through aiding Americans to become more alert to the personalities, purposes, programs and front organizations of the communists in this country" is a further function as recorded in the Statement of Policy of the Conference.

It further recognizes "the obligation to create and inform public opinion and assist in the prevention of secret infiltration of our institutions and organizations by communist agents."

At this year's meeting held for the first time in Washington, D.C., Dr. Daniel Poling, prominent Philadelphia clergyman and editor of The Christian Herald, retired as chairman of the Conference after having served for three years. Dr. Ernest E. Irons, former national president of the AMA, accepted the chairmanship for the coming year. During the two day conference we were privileged to hear such speakers as Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Senator Karl Mundt, Dr. Robert L. Johnson, Administrator of U. S. International Information Administration, Governor George Craig of Indiana, one of the founders of the AAC, Brigadier-General Howley and Mrs. Robert Vogeler.

In this limited space it would be impossible to do more than to give you one or two of the thoughts which struck me as being

particularly pertinent.

Attorney General Brownell told us that the registered membership in the United States of the Communist Party today is less than 25,000, but the Communists claim that for every Party member there are 10 sympathizers. Mr. Brownell then quoted from Wm. Z. Foster's History of the Communist Party of the U.S. to give us a good idea of exactly what the Party has dedicated itself to accomplish. "After a generation of hard struggle, the Communist Party has laid a foundation for what will eventually be a powerful mass Party in the United States. It has created a solid, indestructible core of trained Marxists-Leninists. This is its most vital achievement of all. The Party, it is true, is relatively small; but like all Communist Parties, it has the capacity for swift growth when the political situation demands it."

Mr. Brownell urged us to rid ourselves of pessimism and apathy. He further stated that "every effort to educate the people as to the dangers of Communism is a worthy contribution to the fight against the treacherous foe."

Senator Mundt said that "Communism creeps into a society like old age moving in on an individual human being." He further said "Communism can never destroy America from within by any single spectacular putsch."

In attendance at the meetings were members of the NPC citizenship committee, Mrs. Joseph Grigsby of Delta Delta Delta, Mrs. Beverley Robinson of Alpha Xi Delta and Mrs. Cicero F. Hogan of Gamma Phi Beta.

I wish that more of you might have attended these meetings. I am certain that you would have come away with a greater respect for the enemy within and a greater confidence in our ability to conquer. DDD

The Standards of Gamma Phi Beta

A highlight of the Province II Conference at Springfield, Ohio, was this talk by the International Chairman of Standards, Mrs. Clyde M. Campbell.

To talk about standards is to talk about all the values that human beings hold, both good and bad. A standard conceived in isolation is like a tent that covers everything and touches nothing. If standards are to be meaningful to us we must break them down into some form of action program. One standard that surely should stand uppermost in the minds of Gamma Phi Betas is the standard of developing the right ATTITUDES, VALUES AND BELIEFS. It should be our primary task to develop attitudes that will carry on throughout life. In other words, our standards should be enduring not ephemeral standards.

The way we develop standards is through our daily behavior. The more I think about the subject the more I am convinced that companions, neighbors and friends make people what they are. Our attitudes, ideas and beliefs are being molded through all working hours of the day. What goes on in the sorority house is going to have much more to do with the development of personality than what we talk about or what we point up as being good.

I feel that this is more than a cursory observation. It can be attested throughout history. Most of our great civilizations became great through cooperative efforts. Great cultural centers have been developed on desert waste lands where people were forced to cooperate. Centers of population became great because great minds in small communities were interacting with one another. We had a higher proportion of great minds in Colonial America than in any other period of American History. These people were faced with momentous problems and had no choice but to cooperate.

All of YOU KNOW OUR STANDARDS as they have been written, agreed upon and published. They are going to be just pencil and paper standards unless you try to live up to them, achieve them, make them a part of your daily lives.

We should recognize that our degree of acceptance of standards depends on the way we are influenced by others. In our sorority work we must help each other live up to our ideals. I shall help you and you shall help me. We work to improve each other.

More and more every day we appreciate the fact that people are motivated to strive for certain goals in life. We are a part of that with which we associate. Not only do our sisters, companions and friends determine our ideals but they determine what we shall think, what we shall feel, what we shall hear, and what we shall see. In other words we reach certain standards through cooperative development of individuals. Each individual counts in furthering the goals of sorority life.

More and more we should concentrate on upgrading individuals. In the words of Walt Whitman,

It is not the earth, it is not America who is so great,

It is I who am great or to be great, it is You up there, or any one,

It is to walk rapidly through civilizations, governments, theories,

Through poems, pageants, shows, to form individuals. Underneath, all individuals,

I swear nothing is good to me now that ignores individuals."

A three-story wing has been added to the northeast part of the house. It includes many welcome improvements: a large addition to the sophomore dormitory; an addition to the kitchen and a rearrangement of the old one to tie in with the new; an inside fire escape; two new study rooms; a new lounge more adequate in size and more conveniently located for the girls; a storage closet for formals; a closet for storing records; an enlarged guest bath; two closets and cabinet drawers for town girls; a lounge and bath for the cooks. A terrace-porch adjoining the new wing has also been added.

Built to comply with university regulations concerning minimum space requirements in the dormitories and to provide adequate kitchen area, the new wing is the result of extensive planning by the house corporation board which acted as the building committee. Mrs. J. Henry Cox (Eleanor Schlecht) served as chairman of this committee consisting of Mrs. Van C. Norman (Lois Fleming), Mrs. Homer Bash (Mary Spenser), Miss Lillian Johnston, Miss Jane Barry, Miss Marilyn Schueler, and Miss Leta Ann Ornellos.

Contracts were signed and work was begun in March 1952. The kitchen was usable soon after the opening of college in the fall of 1952 and the study rooms were first used in October. Landscaping of the back yard was done in the spring following,

and the fathers have built a barbecue pit which will be frequently used by the girls and their guests.

Omicron alumnæ have aided the modernization by supporting a \$5200 fund to help furnish the kitchen with modern equipment. The response has been gratifying as Omicrons from all over the nation have sent contributions and congratulations.

The chapter house dates back to 1927 and with the recent addition can accommodate fifty girls. The new wing is complete except for minor installations, and the chapter is proudly using the new facilities of its modernized and enlarged home.
