A Visit To Indiana State Teachers College

I DEALLY located on the famous "Banks of the Wabash," Indiana State Teachers College at Terre Haute, Indiana is just

seventy miles southwest of Indianapolis.

The Indiana State Normal School was created on December 20, 1865, by an act of the General Assembly which provided for the founding of a teacher-training institution. This institution opened its doors for the first time, to twenty-three students on January 6, 1870. In 1929 it was renamed Indiana State Teachers College by legislative enactment.

Indiana State Teachers College occupies approximately a seventeen acre campus in the heart of Terre Haute, Indiana; a ten acre plot of ground at Allendale, where the College Lodge is located; and a thirty-seven acre physical education field on East Wabash Avenue, where a proposed field house and athletic

plant is to be erected.

There are many fine buildings on our compact campus, including the Fine Arts and Commerce Building; the two million dollar Student Union Building; the Administration and Health Center Building; the Communications and Mathematics Building; and the very new Education-Social Studies Building which was just opened at the beginning of the past quarter. The old Main Building, constructed in 1888 and long a land-mark on our campus, was razed to make way for the new campus improvement plan, along with the old Heating Plant and Stalker Hall. Our Communications and Mathematics Building is primarily a classroom building, but it also houses a modern and well-equipped radio studio and the popular Sycamore Playhouse, where the productions of the Sycamore Players group are presented. The new Education-Social Studies Building houses the College Bookstore and several observation rooms.

Our spacious and beautiful Student Union Building is the primary center of all college activities. A Student Union Board, whose members are selected, take an active part in the governing of this building. In the Union are a large auditorium, formal lounge, ballroom, cafeteria, the Grill and the Hub, and a swimming pool. Cabarets, which are very popular here,

are given quite often in the Union Building.

The college library, one of the largest of any teachers college in the United States, contains over one hundred sixty thousand volumes.

Indiana State Teachers College is a coeducational institution which annually serves more than three thousand different students, and it is one of the four teachers colleges in the nation that is approved by the Association of American Universities besides being fully accredited by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The college holds membership in the American Council on Education and the American Association of University Women.

While many students enter Indiana State Teachers College to prepare for the teaching profession, courses leading to admission to such professional colleges as medicine, law, dentistry, nursing, and engineering are offered. Degrees granted include the baccalaureate degrees, Master of Arts and Master of Science, and the Doctor of Education degree. The latter is accredited in collaboration with Ball State Teachers College and Indiana University.

Alumni are located in all the forty-eight states, Washington, D.C., Hawaii, Alaska, the Philippines, Canal Zone, South America, and England. Indiana State is proud of its many fine foreign students who have come here under the exchange plan.

Recently, Indiana State inaugurated a new president, Dr. Raleigh Holmstedt, who comes to us from Indiana University at Bloomington, Indiana. Dr. Ralph N. Tirey retired as president of the college after many years of service and guidance.

Beta Pi Chapter of Gamma Phi Beta was installed at Indiana State Teachers College on September 13, 1952, the fourth national sorority to come to this campus. Each sorority holds its meetings in the various rooms of the Student Union Building.

Although we are considered a "baby" chapter, we have already established several traditions for our chapter. They include the annual "Crescent Cotillion" Dinner-Dance, at which time the pledges are introduced; slumber parties in the homes of "town girls" and alumnæ; Clean-ups with our brother fraternity, Lambda Chi Alpha; Go-to-Church Sundays following initiations; Open Houses with each of the fraternities; Christmas Party; Patronesses Tea; Senior Picnic; and the Gamma Phi-Lambda Chi picnic in the Spring. Also, we annually take an active part in Campus Revue and Song Fest, the two main contest events. Other annual events on our campus are Co-ed Week-End, the Crystal Ball, Christmas Ball, Madrigal Dinner, Junior Prom and Rush Week-End. College traditions include the Book and Torch Ceremony which is held on each Founders Day; Memory Lane, a senior procession which was begun in 1952; Commencement on the lawn of the Union Building; Homecoming, which is held during the Fall quarter; and Honor Day, which is observed once a year in the Spring.

Honoraries at Indiana State include Blue Key, Pamarista, Theta Alpha Phi, Eta Sigma Phi, Pi Gamma Mu, Sigma Alpha

Women in a Democracy

Social Education -

A Suitable Objective For Higher Education

Social education—learning to be effective in human relationships—is one of the major concerns of the college woman today. She realizes the importance of developing into a contributing, competent member of the society in which she lives. At first glance this concern may seem a little more nebulous-not quite so clear cut or immediate-as her need in preparation for becoming a home maker or as the necessity of choosing and preparing for a suitable career. On closer scrutiny, however, it is readily apparent that the need for facility in human relationships is basic to home making and to success in a career.

The problems of social education were pointed up in an article in Fortune Magazine concerning Elton Mayo, of the School of Business of Harvard College, whose research in industry is widely acclaimed.* The central theme of the article is a proposal to management and labor of a social basis for industrial peace. It was shown that Mr. Mayo's devotion to sci-

led him to alter his entire axis of thought from the proposition that all social problems are essentially individual to the proposition that all individual problems are essentially social. It was pointed out that man is a social animal and that the material aspects of our civilization have changed through industrialism while man unfortunately has not. Like John Dewey and others, Mayo notes that step by step with our economic progress there has been a destruction of individual significance in living for

entific truth in industrial experiments

the majority of our citizens.

The issue the civilized world is facing now is a rapid industrial, mechanical and physico-chemical advance so rapid that it has been destructive of all the historic, personal and social relationships. While material efficiency has been increasing, the human capacity for working together has in the same period continually diminished. Our methods are pointed at efficiency, not at the maintenance of cooperation. We know how to devise efficient methods; we do not know how to insure spontaneity of cooperation. Mr. Mayo's research indicates the necessity for understanding and cooperation among individuals if we are to have industrial peace. That generalization would also hold in the matter of peace among nations and peoples.

If it is true that individual problems are essentially social, is not training in social education a suitable objective for higher education? What facilities do higher institutions have for such training? Are the higher institutions making the best possible use of the facilities they have for

this branch of training which seems to underlie all others? Are sororities and fraternities on the American campus making best use of their groups as laboratories through which effective human relationships can be fostered, developed and practiced? Are these groups making their contribution to social education felt in such a way as to have that service recognized by the college adminis-

If so, then it can be said that they qualify as one of the facilities for social education in the institutions of higher learning in

Detroit Alumnae Provide Books For The Bedridden

Many people in the hospital may have wondered about the book truck that is seen on the floors twice a week. This mobile library has been propelled through the halls by the volunteers from a national sorority, Gamma Phi Beta. The members of the

sorority started this type of service in 1936 in Harper Hospital at which time the work was part of the social service department. Through the years books were collected and magazines constantly added. When Harper Hospital's beautiful new library was opened, the whole project was transferred to the library department. Here the number of books greatly increased as books from the Harper library and also a collection from the Detroit Public Library were made available for distribution.

The books from the truck are circulated to bed-ridden patients on the floors of the hospital and requests are received in the library. The magazines are given away and so new ones are being added every week. All of the work is done under the supervision of Miss Marion Wells, Library Director. The members of Gamma Phi Beta have kept this service going throughout all these years and are ever hopeful of improving their service. New and specified books have been added to the recreational collection by the sorority.

For the past three years a Christmas tea has been given at the hospital at which time favors are made for the children's trays on Christmas Day. This tea was held this year on December 5. At this time Miss Marion Wells talked about the progress of

The favors made this year were Christmas trees of white tarlatan studded with stars mounted on a red candle, topped with a gold star.

The Nursery Guild— A Cooperative Venture Of All Los Angeles Alumnae

W E GAMMA PHI BETA alumnæ of Los Angeles had a problem. Los Angeles County alone has a populațion of five million, an area of more than 4,000 square miles. Even our two Universities, SC and UCLA, are separated as much by distance as by cross town rivalry. How could we work together?

The answer was—hands on our philanthropy. That sounds like a funny expression, but it means some project that we could work on together and see the tangible results, and that could be shared by our young actives from the day they donned a pledge pin.

The answer was the Nursery Guild for the Hospital of the Good Samaritan.

We are proud that we have had a group of volunteer workers staffing the Hospital's obstetric ward for more than three years, and we are more proud that these volunteers come from alumnæ groups all over the city.

Through the Orchid Ball we have given a \$1500 air lock which already has saved the lives of literally hundreds of premature infants. Then through their smaller benefits, individual alumnæ

groups have donated bottle sterilizing units, bottle warmers and even a doll and layette for the expectant mother class.

Because of our active support, the Women's Auxiliary at the Hospital has made the Nursery Guild one of their committees and many Gamma Phi Betas are on their Board. During January we accomplished the addressing, stamping and mailing of 5,000 Valentines. This is the Women's Auxiliary's annual solicitation for funds . . . a solicitation that brought them \$7000 last year.

Our aim is to help with all problems that confront the Hospital. We keep the bookmobile stocked and the Junior Alumnæ of Alpha Iota staff a gift cart two days a week. By March we will have a new project launched where two volunteers will come from each alumnæ group to send an ice cream cart through the wards daily.

Our pride is in keeping the vow we made the first day we wore our pin, "A Gamma Phi Beta's duty is service to the community."

"Alumnae Doll House Project Aids Needy Girls"

Thus ran the headline on a four-column feature in the Long Island Daily Press telling the story of the Nassau chapter of Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ who spent the summer and fall months building and furnishing an 8-room dollhouse. The house was auctioned off December 12 and proceeds will help send underprivileged children to summer camps.

The idea for the miniature house was conceived one hot, humid day last summer by Betty Milliken Brodie, and her enthusiasm was so boundless that she soon got her husband, Steve, and two other Gamma Phi husbands—Frost Roehsler and

Gene Luntey interested in building the elaborate house during weekends and at night. Norm Weidersum, another husband, who is an architect was also inveigeled and made a special set of blueprints. From then on, the 20 members of the alumnæ group and their husbands "were in business."

Striated plywood was ordered and hammers and saws became evident immediately, and the next project was to rummage through "rag bags" for scraps with which to furnish the interior of the house.

The theme for the Liliputian house was "Night Before Christmas," and the idea was emphasized in both exterior and interior de-

tails of the pint-size red house which was even complete with snow white trim. Since members of the Nassau chapter live all over Long Island—which is aptly named, as it's 120 miles long—the problem of getting together to work on furnishings was a paramount problem. However, a color scheme was coordinated and various girls were designated to be responsible for certain rooms of the house.

Pauline Draper Schnackel was in charge of the pine-panelled den which had a gay red and green plaid studio couch complete with little bolsters and hand braided rugs on the floor. Barbara Ash Clark took over the painstaking job of making slipcovers for petite upholstered sofas and chairs in the living room, and Virginia Hamilton Geiger spent hours decorating a minute Christmas tree with sequins and bugle beads. Marilyn Madichel Piccione who has three children of her own, was assigned to furnish the nursery which featured not only a white hand painted crib and dresser decorated with roses but also a playpen and bathinette.

For the bathroom, Jean Brewster Bishop made miniature terry towels and bathmats monogrammed with "his" and "hers" detailings, while Lee Donahue Weidersum furnished the master bedroom in an aqua and yellow motif. Dust ruffles for the beds were of yellow chintz with pale aqua corduroy coverlets.

The third bedroom—a teenager's room—was done by Margaret Kaye Engebrethson in shades of pink with pink and white dotted Swiss dust ruffles and pink chintz coverlets.

All the rooms were wallpapered in miniature designs which were secured from old wall paper books. Other features of the house included microscopic original water colors painted by Betty Brodie for hanging over the mantels in the living room and den, as well as a model washing machine and dryer in the utility room. And the dining room was furnished with a handmade round walnut table and six ladder-back chairs which Gene Luntey made for the girls out of tooth picks and finished with hand-reeded seats made of button cording.

Toothpicks also came in handy for use as curtain rods to hang crisp ruffled curtains in all the bedrooms, and all the beds boasted percale sheets and pillow-cases delicately hemmed and monogrammed. Accessories were "begged, borrowed or stolen" and frequently from children of alumnæ members, as many cereal box charms were incorporated into lamp bases or pieces of bric-a-brac, as well as tiny corks and parts of toys.

Effie Chase Page, our oldest member who has been a Gamma Phi Beta for over 60 years, contributed some tiny pieces of imported porcelain for our "better" pieces of bric-a-brac includ-

ing a miniature mouse who sat in the living room and further added to the Christmas motif of "Twas the night before Christmas."

And finally in November came the fruition of many months of hard and tedious work when the house was finished and ready to be exhibited. Everywhere enthusiasm was boundless, and merchants were most cooperative and willing to have the house shown in their display windows. Before the house was auctioned off December 12 by a store Santa Claus in the Levittown W. T. Grant store, the house had been on display in almost a dozen various locations and hundreds of chances had been sold. Harriet Pipkorn

The project helped draw the four-year old alumnæ group much closer together; we received valuable publicity in over a dozen Long Island cities; and most of all, underprivileged children will be sent to camps in summers to come as a result of the dollhouse.

We still aren't sure we are ready to tackle another dollhouse for next year—nor are we sure we can entice our husbands to help us build another one so soon—but by the time the article about the dollhouse comes out in a national magazine this spring and we get a check from them for publishing the story, we might change our minds.

THAT "certain" week rolled around and each girl sat in the meeting anxiously waiting for the pledge mistress to give her long list of assignments.

There was silence as she started to speak, and the room remained in a hushed calmness as she finished; then, realizing the significance of this present change in pledge week, everyone burst forth with surprised comments of relief. From that moment on, each pledge willingly accepted the "help week" duties because she had a new goal and was proud to be a part of this suggested project.

These Gamma Phis were to adopt new little sisters from certain needy families in Oxford for a period of one week. Our suite and the individual rooms were turned into drifts of material and colored thread. Hands were busily knitting woolen mittens and scarves; and the girls were dashing from place to place buying wash cloths and towels to embroider initials in bright colors on them. Others bought toothbrushes, combs, and many other small articles, personalizing them with monogrammed initials.

At the end of the week, a pledge show was given, in which each girl was to bring her handmade project. There were stacks of pastel kimonos, brilliant plaid stoles, head scarves, mittens, diapers, and handkerchieves—all to be given to these young children, ranging from ages of one to four.

All the pledges worked very hard, but the final project was still to be given. Six small girls were invited to the suite on a particular Saturday, for what we called a "permanent party." They were all treated like little queens; each girl had her hair cut or trimmed, washed, and was given a permanent. In between washings they had their nails fixed, and each tiny youngster heartily joined in playing the games and singing the songs that were planned for them. Afterwards, refreshments were served and gifts were handed out as they left—these consisted of hair ribbons and an individual personal vanity case of various articles.

We called it "help week," and the satisfaction we derived from doing these small favors for the needy, was immeasurable.

Fox, Expansion Chairman launched our debut at the University of Colorado in October 1953 when she supervised our first rush week with colonization members: Jackie Gaskill, Louise Warren, Betty Beil, Jewell Hoeme all from Alpha Phi; Mary Warren, Omega and Lynette Peister, Alpha Psi. Diane Vandagriff, Beta Omicron has assisted these members since entering the University last January.

Boulder alumnæ chapter members are: Mrs. Rey Grohne, President (Illinois); Mrs. John Lloyd Pflug (Colorado College) and Mrs. Charles Ungemach (Colorado A. and M.), both advisors to our Greek Letter and Pledge members; Mrs. William Beckley, membership chairman (Colorado College); Mrs. Howard Wells, Secretary (Nebraska); and Mrs. R. S. Sutherland, Treasurer (Colorado A. and M.). Months of preparation on the part of both Greek Letter and alumnæ members throughout the state culminated with the arrival of Grand Council representatives for the installation services. Mrs. Ralph E. Dippell, Jr., Grand President; Mrs. Stuart K. Fox, Chairman of Expansion; Miss Mary Jane Hipp, Secretary; Miss Peggy Mace, Traveling Secretary;

Province Director, Mrs. William Hinch and Province Alumnæ Secretary, Mrs. T. Matson Collier officiated at the installation of our 65th chapter.

Even before Colorado was admitted to the Union, the Territorial Legislature was wrestling with the problem of founding a state university. In 1874 it appropriated \$15,000 upon the condition that Boulder citizens subscribe the same amount. Captain David H. Nichols, Speaker of the House, made a midnight horseback ride from Denver to Boulder to find out whether or not Boulder residents would raise the necessary money. When he was assured that the citizens would do so, the site of the new college was determined.

The cornerstone of Old Main was laid in 1875, and when it was built in 1876, it contained the classrooms, the library, the

dormitory, and the president's house. In short, when Colorado was admitted to the Union, its state university had just one building. The first president was Joseph A. Sewell. There were two instructors and forty-four students. Miss Mary Rippon was the first woman teacher, coming to the University in spite of the fact that a friend warned her that the building was unsafe and would fall and crush students and faculty alike. The present outdoor theater in the Arts quadrangle was named after Miss Rippon. The class of 1888 bequeathed its colors to the school. They were the daisy colors, yellow and white, and were to be interpreted as silver and gold, the metals that first made Colorado famous. The next year, 1889, marked the organization of the first football team.

Expansion began in 1883 with the Medical School. From then growth was continuous. Building after building, college after college were added to make the cosmopolitan campus that today attracts students from all over the United States and foreign countries. Presidents Hale, Baker, Farrand, Norlin and Stearns followed President Sewell. All made contributions to that growth. Dr. Ward Darley assumed his duties in 1953. He is

head of a University that serves 8000 students in the Medical School now in Denver and on the Boulder Campus. Thousands more are enrolled in extension centers throughout the state.

With the opening of the Memorial Student Center and the Observatory in the fall of 1953, facilities are now available to students that were undreamed of when Captain Nichols made his midnight horseback ride to see if citizens of Boulder would contribute \$15.000.00 to make the university of Colorado a reality.

National Panhellenic membership at Colorado University includes: Alpha Chi Omega, Alpha Delta Pi, Alpha Phi, Chi Omega, Alpha Epsilon Phi, Alpha Omicron Pi, Delta Delta Delta, Delta Gamma, Kappa Alpha Theta, Kappa Delta, Kappa Kappa Gamma, Pi Beta Phi, Theta Upsilon, Zeta Tau Alpha and Sigma Delta Tau. These groups gave a warm welcome to Gamma Phi Beta, fifteenth sorority on the campus. Recognition of the capable guidance of Mrs. W. B. Pietenpole (Denver U.), Executive Secretary on campus places the University's Greek Letter Chapter standards high in National Panhellenic procedures and activities.





There is ample outdoor and garage parking space on the mainland, but time must be allowed to check the cars with attendant and unload the baggage before boarding the ferry! The trains go right out on the dock. They arrive in the morning and make connections. The fare for the Ferry trip including tax: Mackinac City to Mackinac Island (round trip) \$1.90; St. Ignace to Mackinac Island (round trip) \$1.50.



S PECIAL round-trip bargain coach fares from Chicago and Detroit to Mackinac Island will be available to Gamma Phis if we all travel together. The saving is sufficient to make it worthwhile and it will be more fun traveling with the crowd anyway!

We must have a group of 25 or more using coach service from each point (Chicago and Detroit) to secure this special rate. The tickets are not good in pullman which means sitting up all night each way but who goes to bed in a Gamma Phi car anyway!

This special round-trip coach rate is \$22.77 including a reserved seat each way, the 10 per cent federal tax and the round-trip ferry boat ticket. The regular round-trip coach fare including tax and reserved seat is \$30.47, a savings of \$7.70. The special party rate from Detroit is \$17.38. The regular fare from Detroit is \$24.44, or a savings of \$6.00.

Everyone will have a reserved seat in the special Gamma Phi Beta coaches each way and they will operate from Chicago without change at Detroit if we have a reasonable number. This is a special arrangement for Gamma Phi Betas. The special pullmans will operate through to Mackinaw City if we have sufficient numbers, too.

There is another savings which some of you may not have

thought about—federal tax on transportation is now only 10 per cent instead of 15 per cent so your first-class railroad and pullman fares will be less than the original quotation. Round-trip first-class fare good in pullman from Chicago is now \$41.25; from Detroit it is \$31.35 and a roomette \$7.70 including tax.

The Grand Hotel has given us some good news too! While we do have to check out of our rooms on July 7 right after breakfast, we can have luncheon in the Grand Hotel dining room if we wish, some rooms will be available to us and we can play on the Island all day if we wish taking the evening ferry to Mackinaw City.

During these years she was president of the Los Angeles alumnæ chapter, its delegate to convention at Mackinac in 1928 and also its delegate to Los Angeles City Panhellenic in which she served both as secretary and president. She rounded out her California Gamma Phi activities with a term as Province Secretary.

When the Nimkoffs moved to Pennsylvania, Frances was on the spot to get Alpha Upsilon chapter started off properly in 1932 at Penn State.

When her husband accepted the position as head of the department of Sociology at Florida State University in 1950, Beta Mu chapter had preceded Frances on this campus by only three months. She missed out on the installation this time, but has made up for it in moral support to the small alumnæ group and in assistance in innumerable ways to the new chapter.

It is for children from the ages of two and a half to seven. There are three pre-school classes with total enrollment not to exceed 75, a kindergarten, first and second grades, each limited to eighteen.

In addition to day pupils, KinderKraft offers dancing to pupils six and up. There is also a special class for women offering stretching and conditioning exercises. Approximately 75 pupils are enrolled under Miss Ula Sharon, internationally famous

dancer.

One of the unique qualities of the school is a Parent Education Plan which includes round table discussions, conferences, observations and lectures to help the parent understand the child. Many students, nurses, P.T.A. groups and teachers visit this school to observe it's techniques and procedures.

Mrs. Norman majored in music and education at the University of Kansas and Columbia University Teachers College. She has taught summer courses at Kansas State Teachers College and Kansas City Junior College. She also taught voice and piano and has been a soloist for some of the churches in Kansas City.

Mrs. Norman was editor of the Gamma Phi Beta Song Book and National Music Chairman in 1929 at which time she contributed many original songs and arrangements She was married in 1922, has a daughter, Mrs. Louis Dunklin of Ft. Smith, Arkansas, and two grandchildren.

Rho chapter, U. of Iowa is proud of its newest addition, Wieslawa Dolinsga, an 8 year old Polish girl whom we have "adopted." Wieslawa lives with her mother and younger brother in West Germany. Without the financial aid provided by Rho chapter it would have been impossible for the family to stay together.

Arrangements for the "adoption" were made through the Foster Parents' Plan for War Children. Under this plan, each child is treated as an individual with the foster parents receiving a picture and a case history. Correspondence between the foster parents and the child is encouraged, and we have been writing Wieslawa once a week.

We have sent dolls, clothes,

shoes and other things she would not otherwise have. In return, we received letters from her written in Polish and sketches and drawings by Wieslawa, which contained "thank you's".

We pledged to contribute \$15 monthly toward the support of the girl for one year.

The girl's father died in 1951 of tuberculosis. Since then the mother, who has aged beyond her 31 years, has struggled to keep

the family together.

Mrs. Dolinsga, the daughter of a Polish food merchant, and the two children now live in two small rooms in an old stone barracks with no running water, bare floors and little furniture. Their income is a public assistance grant. Wieslawa assists her mother at home, does needlework aptly and speaks Polish and German.

She is a second grader and enjoys reading, drawing and painting.

The study is carpeted in fluffy gold, and new furniture in green and gold blends with the wood panelling.

One entire wall of the downstairs powder room is a large mirror, and the ceiling shade and carpeting pick up colors in the gay, splashy wallpaper.

Three large dining tables seat the thirty girls living in the house and their guests. New chairs add greatly to the beauty of the room.

Second and third-floor baths have been completely tiled in pink for one and pale blue for the other.

The redecoration has been enjoyed by all the Alpha Zetas, and we would like to thank all who have made it possible.

Panhellenic House At Arizona State College At Tempe

"A LPHA HALL," one of the oldest buildings on the campus of Arizona State College at Tempe, has a long and colorful past. It has been, at various times, a men's dormitory, a women's dormitory, a condemned building, and last and most gloriously, a Panhellenic House.

Gamma Phi Beta was the first international sorority to be admitted to Arizona State College at Tempe campus. We were installed in December of 1949. In the next year these international groups took their places: Alpha Delta Pi, Sigma Sigma Sigma, Chi Omega, Kappa Delta, and Alpha Sigma Alpha.

During the next two years these groups were flourishing, despite no regular meeting place and no storage rooms. Those of you who were members of well-established chapters, with chapter houses, have no conception of what a handicap this can be. However, all the groups grew and prospered.

In the summer of 1952 the college generously decided to rent Alpha Hall to the Panhellenic Council for use as a Panhellenic House and made considerable improvements in the building. Each of the six sororities has its own chapter room on the first floor. They pay rent to the college which equals the revenue which would be received if these rooms were rented to students. Six girls of each sorority are allowed to live on the second floor. These are usually seniors or members of the executive council.

The housemother's suite is on the first floor. It is furnished, staffed and maintained by the college, as are the study rooms and sleeping quarters. Each sorority has decorated and furnished its own chapter room. Gamma Phi Beta's is cleverly arranged with green walls, blonde tables, beige carpeting, white draperies, brown couch, and green and coral occasional chairs.

There is a large basement which can and will be used jointly by the groups as a recreation room. The chapters, mother's clubs, and alumnæ groups are all busy raising funds to decorate and furnish it.

The sororities at Arizona State College feel that the cooperative plan has been very successful, and plans for a future Pan-

hellenic House which would house all Greek letter chapter members are being worked upon. Limited lot space, financing, and the number of commuting students from nearby Phoenix, make individual sorority houses highly improbable.

Spends Year Abroad As Exchange Teacher

"I was surprised and disappointed when I received my assignment to teach for one year in South Wales. Maybe that was because I couldn't locate Briton Ferry on the map."

Thus began a year as an American Exchange Teacher for Marian McGinn (Bowling Green) under the program carried on between the United States and England. But it was far from a disappointing year for Marian, as she had the wonderful opportunity to teach, travel and enjoy all that was offered by England and Europe last year.

It was the second voyage of the S.S. United States that took the group of 100 teachers from all over the United States to England for the school year 1952-53. Marian exchanged jobs with Margaret Stephens, the physical education teacher from Cwrt Sart Secondary School, Briton Ferry Neath, South Wales. She says her greatest difficulty was the language, for many times there would be blank looks on the children's faces. It was then that

she realized that she was talking fast and speaking the language the English call "American."

"I taught physical education, science, health and music. My headmaster at Cwrt Sart felt I could teach some American folk dances and songs to the children. The most treasured possessions that I left with them were two square dance records, pretty badly worn, but still useable."

Marian was much impressed with the kindness her students had toward her. As a guest in Wales, both the students and the people of the community did all they could to make her feel she belonged. It was very hard to realize that she was an alien, but like all foreigners, she had to register with the police and report to them whenever she left town. Because of the currency restrictions put upon the British people, they were unable to do

extensive traveling in foreign countries, so all of her Welsh friends lived through each of her trips throughout England and onto the continent.

A typical teaching day for Marian began at nine a.m. with a religious service. The morning sessions at school consisted of four class periods with a break in the middle of the morning when the children had recess and the teachers had a cup of tea. Lunch hour was from 12 to 1:30 and the afternoon also had four class periods and a "tea break" in the middle of the afternoon. School was dismissed at four p.m. There were no extracurricular activities as the schools are strictly academic.

Briton Ferry, Neath was an industrial town of 30,000 people on the southern coast of Wales. London was Marian's favorite city and was just a four hour train ride from Briton Ferry. She was a constant visitor to that fabulous city. She was honored by being one of the two exchange teachers to be

presented to the Duke of Edinburgh. She was among the crowd that watched the Queen ride through the London Streets in the Irish State Coach to open Parliament. A garden party was given by the Queen Mother Elizabeth for all the American Exchange Teachers. She watched a country pay its last respects to a beloved woman, Queen Mary, and also saw England celebrate and honor its new young queen, Elizabeth. Marian was one of the many seat holders to watch the Coronation procession.

"I feel the opportunities offered by the exchange program might help in solving many of the world's problems. I can now speak from experience. The exchange system helps us to give a true picture of America to foreign students, and of foreign teachers to give our children a true picture of their nations."

First Dividend for Beekman Tower Hotel

Mrs. Emily E. Hepburn, president of the board, Panhellenic House Association, Inc., has announced the first annual dividend paid to preferred stockholders since Beekman Tower Hotel was opened in 1928. Dividend paid \$3 per share, or 6% on \$50 par non-cumulative preferred stock.

The Beekman Tower Hotel, originally known as Panhellenic House, was built in 1928 by the National Panhellenic Sororities to provide a New York headquarters for sorority women and their friends. In 1934, at the height of the depression, it became necessary to open the hotel to the general public. Because of its location on New York's fashionable East Side Beekman Hill, the name was changed to Beekman Tower. However, one representative from each of the national Greek letter sororities holding stock in the hotel is a member of the board of directors.

At the recent board meeting, Mrs. Hepburn complimented the Beekman Tower's Managing Director, Miss Florence Keenan, for guiding the hotel through a major depression keeping both original ownership and the investment of original stockholders intact. Under Miss Keenan's direction, mortgage indebtedness has been reduced more than half; improvements and modernization have been made to capitalize on its nearness to United Nations headquarters; larger rooms and suites have been created, new income producing departments organized. Particular emphasis has been placed on smaller meetings, banquets and conventions.

Since Beekman Tower is the only major hotel in close proximity to the massive United Nations Building, it is the logical headquarters not only for foreign delegates but for many of the organizations and associations requiring frequent contacts with offices of the United Nations. During 1953, guests registered from every State in the Union, Alaska and Hawaii; most of the Provinces of Canada; from Bermuda; thirty-two countries of Europe; Iceland; Africa, Asia, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Okinawa, Indonesia, New Caledonia and Sumatra.

To meet the growing needs of the expanding East Side, United Nations section, Mrs. Hepburn said 1954 services and facilities will be further expanded by the hotel under a long term, continuing program.

Schedule Of Officers' Duties

Greek-Letter Chapters

PRESIDENT:

In odd years, send Central Office acknowledgement of bound CRESCENT as soon as it is received. Use postal card in volume.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

- By August 1, either send 7 rushing calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary or notify Central Office if Panhellenic has not released rushing dates.
- By September 15, send 7 college calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary.
- By September 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at fall council meeting; include business for consideration of convention in fall preceding convention.
- Immediately after pledging (immediately after opening of college if pledging is deferred), send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.
- By February 15, send list of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.
- Not later than March 25, send name and home address of new membership (rushing) chairman to Central Office.
- By March 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at spring council meeting.
- Immediately after appointment is made, send name and home address of CRESCENT correspondent to Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.
- As soon after April 1 as information is available, send 7 lists of new chapter officers to Central Office and 1 list each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary on standard blanks.
- By May 15, send to Central Office list of chapter members (undergraduate and alumnæ) who have passed away since preceding August 1.
- By July 1, send list of graduates (include members who have dropped out of college) with home addresses to Central Office and Province Director.

TREASURER:

- By March 1, due Central Office: second installment of International dues.
- Fiscal year begins August 1, ends July 31. All dues paid between those dates shall apply to the current fiscal year unless otherwise specified.

Comparative rating of NPC sororities on campus for preceding year due International Scholarship Chairman immediately after reported, if possible by November 1.

PLEDGE TRAINER:

- By May 15, send report for new edition of Pledge Manual to Central Office.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

- By October 1, for December issue, January 10 for March issue, February 20 for May issue, July 1 for September issue, glossies, features, honors due Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.
- By January 10, chapter letter due Mrs. Marek for March issue. Do not send chapter letter for other issues.
- Canadian chapters send feature stories to Mrs. R. B. Miller, 11029

MEMBERSHIP (RUSHING) CHAIRMAN:

Immediately after each formal rushing period, rushing reports due International Membership Chairman, Chairman of Provinces, and Province Director. Continue to report each subsequent pledge.

Order supplies (information and investigation blanks, file and acknowledgement cards, post rush reports) early each spring for following fall from Central Office. Specify quantity.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN:

By first of each month, publicity copy, with glossies, due International Public Relations Chairman.

HISTORIAN

By July 1, chapter history for preceding year due International Historian, Miss Nina Gresham.

Alumnae Chapters

- By September 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at fall council meeting.
