GAMMA PHI BETAS RETURN TO MACKINAC FOR 46TH INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

An opportunity to look back over 27 years, since the last Mackinac convention, brought forth a serious appraisal of Gamma Phi Beta's progress. But it also afforded a humorous theme when conventioneers appeared at dinner in the Flapper styles of 1927.

As Gamma Phi Betas gathered from coast to coast and from Canada to Florida, exchanging ideas and planning for the future of the sorority, each member sensed the real responsibility which is hers in this day of anxiety, when rights and freedoms are being challenged. The Mackinac convention will long be remembered for the beauty of its setting, for the charm of its well planned social functions and mostly for the strengthening of the bond which joins each member as Gamma Phi Beta approaches its 80th anniversary.

LEOPLE like you and me are being stirred up out of our lethargy, out of our complacency, out of our superficiality. I pray God earnestly, fervently that He will give you His grace so that each one of you here will dare to stand for the best you know, intellectually, morally and spiritually."



RETIRING GRAND COUNCIL REPORTS TO 46TH CONVENTION



Lauded by the 46th convention for their contributions to the progress of Gamma Phi Beta, retiring members of Grand Council pose on the balcony of their suite at the Grand Hotel. Miss Hipp continues as an appointive member of Council and Mrs. Hogan was elected to serve as N.P.C. Delegate, but according to action of the convention, will serve as an ex officio member of the Council.

Bringing to a close her second term as Grand President of Gamma Phi Beta, Mrs. Ralph E. Dippell, Jr., reviewed the progress of the sorority during the past biennium. She served as installing officer for new chapters, Beta Pi at Indiana State and Beta Rho at the University of Colorado. The establishment of a Philanthropy board was accomplished during Mrs. Dippell's second term as Grand President. Among recommendations made in her report were the appointment of a permanent convention marshal and a review by the Recommendations Committee of the Endowment-Crescent Board By-laws and procedures.

Mrs. Hoyt F. Martin, Vice-President and Alumnæ Secretary reported a total of 132 alumnæ chapters, 15 of which were installed during the biennium.

Mrs. Darrell D. Wiles, Chairman of Finance presented the estimated budget for 1954-55. Her recommendations included an increased budget for Central Office, continuation of a reserve fund to insure greater alumnæ attendance at conventions and a major fund-raising drive for the Expansion Gift Fund and the Endowment Fund.

Mrs. George Hinkle, Chairman of Provinces, reported on the regional training schools for Province Directors. These were held in Oklahoma, Chicago, New York, Denver and Eugene. In addition, Mrs. Hinkle has revised the Alumna Adviser's Manual and held a special session for these advisers during convention.

Mrs. Stuart K. Fox, Chairman of Expansion, reported on the installation of Beta Rho chapter at the University of Colorado and presented a long range program for future expansion of Gamma Phi Beta.

Mrs. Cicero F. Hogan, National Panhellenic Conference Delegate, has served in this office since January 1, 1954, having been appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. George M. Simonson. Mrs. Hogan is a member of the NPC Executive Committee and serves as secretary.

Miss Mary Jane Hipp, Secretary-Treasurer, presented a complete financial report, as examined by Arthur Andersen and Company. Mailing of the new Gamma Phi Beta Song Book, reprints of the Pledge Manual and Handbook and revised manuals for Province officers and Alumna Advisers have been accomplished in Central Office, in addition to myriad other duties. Other publications include "Crescent News" a rushing aid edited by Mrs. Charles Byrne, Public Relations Chairman, and "Honors in Gamma Phi Beta" edited by Mrs. George Stoddard, Scholarship Chairman.

CONVENTION DIARY

July 1

Loaded to the gunwales with Gamma Phi Betas and their baggage, the Algomah II plied its way across the waters to deposit eager conventioneers on the dock at Mackinac Island. A carriage trip to the Grand Hotel, a short walk up the red carpeted stairs and a hearty welcome by the hostess chapters . . . this was it! The 46th International Convention was at last a reality! Without a moment of confusion, delegates were registered and whisked off to their lovely rooms, overlooking the surrounding waters, to rest and refresh themselves. Beta Gamma chapter entertained at a rousing mixer party titled "Opening Night" which featured a floor show and a clever matching of program profiles. Though it should have been "early to bed" for the next morning's opening session, little conversation groups dotted the lobby until the wee hours, renewing old friendships . . . cementing new ones.

July 2

Province meetings were held prior to the opening of the first general session, where a welcome was extended by Mrs. R. C. Hakanson, Official Hostess, and Mrs. Charles Andrews, Convention chairman. Mrs. Ralph E. Dippell, presiding, appointed the following committees: Findings, Mrs. Louis Lombardi, Glendale, chairman, Mrs. M. E. Gamble, Peoria, Sally Maye Noonan, McGill University, Barbara Cannon, Colorado College and Mrs. David Sanberg, Portland. Resolutions, Mrs. William Dehn, Seattle, chairman, Miss Alice Camerer, Detroit, Mrs. Charles Cooper, Baltimore, Pattie Goodall, Vanderbilt, Carol Goshaw, U. of Southern California. Following reports of the Grand President and NPC Delegate, the meeting was adjourned.

"A Day with McGuffey" was the luncheon theme, created by Alpha Nu and Springfield alumnæ chapters. Table decorations included replicas of McGuffey Readers and lollipops, while entertainment was a song and dance routine of the school days theme.

A short general session in the afternoon included reports of the International Historian and the Public Relations chairman. Delegates then attended Greek letter and alumnæ roundtables.

A formal reception for Grand Council and International Officers preceded the formal opening banquet. Detroit and Birmingham alumnæ chapters were hostesses for the beautifully appointed "Starlit Spray" banquet, while

July 3

Business of the third general session was highlighted by a report on Philanthropy. Gamma Phi Beta's Lindsey Barbee Fellowship award winner for the biennium is Miss Betty J. Cheyne. She is preparing for a Master of Science degree in Social Work at the New York School of Social Work. Mrs. Lester A. Malkerson presented her report as International Camp chairman and Miss Grace Merrill reported for the Philanthropy Board.

Saturday's luncheon had as hostesses Beta Pi and Indianapolis alumnæ chapters. Appropriately, luncheon menus were the official program for the Indianapolis Motor Speedway and table decorations were the signal flags used throughout the races to govern its progress. Dr. Salvatore DiMichael Executive Director of the National Association for Retarded Children, was the luncheon speaker. He spoke on the new look on mental retardation and cited areas where help is sorely needed as in community clinics, parent counseling, nursery school, occupational training, camps, etc.

Later, a joint round table of Greek letter and alumnæ delegates discussed membership selection.

Province Directors and Alumnæ Secretaries heaved audible sighs of relief when the scheduled pre-dinner reception for

these officers was canceled . . . (they had witnessed the previous evening's reception and were anything but envious of the officers who had stood nearly three hours greeting hundreds of Gamma Phi Betas). They were formally introduced from the speakers' table at the "Water Wonderland" dinner, which was hostessed by Beta Delta, Lansing-East Lansing and Grand Rapids chapters. Mobiles of modernistic fish centered each

table and guest favors were miniature fishing flies.

"Children Limited," a movie on retarded children was shown following dinner and at ten p.m. "Carnation Capers," a musical revue, was presented by Epsilon and Evanston-North Shore alumnæ chapters.

Awards from the Philanthropy Board went to Beta Alpha, Omicron, Eta, San Francisco, Tucson and Westchester chapters for the greatest number of man-hours given to community service.

Following a reading of the Scriptures, Mrs. Dippell brought the gavel down, closing this 46th convention.

Last event, and always the most spectacular, was the Carnation Banquet presented by Beta, Ann Arbor and Jackson alumnæ chapters. Miss Nina Gresham, International Historian, served as toastmistress and Miss Susanne Watt, talented young singer from Beta chapter, thrilled her audience with several vocal selections. There were 307 Gamma Phi Betas joining hands that night to sing "Fidelity" and to pledge anew their loyalty to their sisterhood.

"DARE TO STAND FOR THE BEST YOU KNOW!"

(Text of Dr. Clark Kuebler's challenging speech at Gamma Phi Beta's 46th convention)

Introducing Dr. Clark Kuebler

PRESIDENT DIPPELL: Madam Toastmistress, Guests and Sisters in Gamma Phi Beta: I think we can best describe the next speaker as an eminent educator, churchman, lecturer, and fraternity man. We know that he is an eminent educator for he is the president of Ripon College at Ripon, Wisconsin, We know he is an eminent churchman for he is a former president of the National Council of Churches. We will know by the end of the evening that he is an eminent lecturer, and he is an eminent fraternity man because I have always heard that he is a very good Sigma Chi. There is much more that I could tell you about Dr. Kuebler this evening but I shall not permit the same error that a previous person did who was introducing him one evening and who spoke for twenty-five minutes and Dr. Kuebler was left to speak for five.

It is really an honor and a pleasure, Dr. Kuebler, to introduce you to our Gamma Phi Beta Convention.

Dr. Kuebler.

Dr. Kuebler: Madam Toastmistress, Mrs. Dippell, Ladies—I think I might almost say "Sisters": I should like to say at the outset that I am genuinely glad to be here because I am one of the administrators in the country who happens to believe in fraternities and sororities. I think there is something to be gained from the experience of members in a good fraternity or sorority that can not be gained any other way. There are several things I want to say at the outset tonight which are important as a kind of backdrop against what we think about as we meet here.

In the first place, there is nobody in this audience tonight who can take for granted that her children and grandchildren will have the same kind of freedom we have. There is one thing we should be relearning and that is this, that history has proved conclusively, incontrovertibly that freedom is never free; it is always acquired at great cost, and it is not only acquired at great cost but it is kept at

great cost.

In the second place, there is nobody here in this room tonight who can take for granted we shall not be catapulted into World War III. I am reasonably certain we would win such a war, but I would also say to you that I have grave doubts that we could live in the peace that would come in its wake. It is difficult and costly to win a war, but it is infinitely more difficult and costly to win a peace, more subtle and less dramatic.

I want to say in the third instance this to you: We never will extirpate totalitarianism in the world only by the war process. You cannot kill ideas and ideals with bullets, A-bombs, H-bombs or any kind of bomb the mind of man will ever devise. To think so is naive. The only way to kill ideas and ideals is with bedlam, and that brings us face to face with one of the first responsibilities you have as you meet here, a national sorority made up of women who have had the privilege of higher education. All privileges carry with them concomitant responsibilities and that privilege is no exception. If we are to remain free and preserve freedom, if we are to keep our civilization, if we are to escape totalitarianism right here in our own country, then we who have had the privilege of higher education must certainly think of concomitant responsibilities seriously.

If you and I are to discharge this responsibility, then certainly our own educational experience has to be a continuing one. I know people who have got college degrees who have not had an idea since they got it. I know people with a Ph.D. who began to die and haven't had an idea since they got a Ph.D. There is only one way your education can be real and that is for you to continue your educational process until the day you die. And that means that you must keep on learning not only for your own edification but, to come back to what I am talking about, because you have a very great responsibility these days.

The line between civilization and barbarism is thin and if we would keep our inherited civilization and develop it further, you and I have a tremendous obligation because it is today threatened with extinction. Our American educational system has much to do today if it is going to measure up to the

responsibility which has been thrown at it. American education has certain unusual characteristics. In the first place it is being brought today within the reach of more and more people, and that is good and bad. It is of itself good, but sometimes as it is brought within the reach of more people standards go down and mediocrity is the result. I hope that you will fight for standards at every level. When I was in Athens last summer I went one night to a dinner. A young man said to me, "Dr. Kuebler, how would you define the United States?"

I said, "That is quite a question; let me think

about that."

He said, "I will anticipate your answer by saying that your country is a country that has majority

I said, "I cannot accept that without qualification"; and later I said, "The United States is a country that has majority rule tempered by justice.

What did I mean? I meant that majorities can be tyrannical, and they have been many times in history, and recently increasingly so. If the day ever comes when minorities do not have privileges-and when I talk about minorities I mean not only racial and religious minorities but minorities such as we represent-then we shall cease to be a democracy and we will have the conformity and the uniformity that are characteristic of a totalitarian society.

There was a day in this country when almost everybody took the so-called academic program. Perhaps that was wrong. Now the pendulum has swung in the exact opposite and in many places young people have no opportunity for academic education because the vocational and professional have eclipsed the academic. Don't misunderstand me, I am not talking against vocational and professional education, that would be stupid, but the problem in our country is not that we will fail to train people for vocations and professions, the very exigencies of life demand that; the danger is rather that we will fail to do more than that, to educate men and women to be human beings and free citizens.

One of the first characteristics of totalitarianism is to attack intellectual education. When I was a student in Germany, Hitler attacked the German universities. Did he attack the vocations and professions? No! He was glad for people to be trained to be dentists, accountants, bookkeepers, but he did not want people educated to the point where they could make adequate, considered judgments on the

problems of life.

One of the reasons why we are inclined sometimes not to take our intellectual education too seriously is that it takes time to get one; there are no shortcuts.

There are some things you can't get without time and one is a liberal education. All education implies maturation, and maturation implies the passage of time. That is one of the obstacles to academic education along with vocational and professional education, the fact that we are impatient. We think we are very practical and many people think so-called academic courses are impractical.

What looks to be practical turns out many times to be impractical. Behind all our technological advances is pure science and if the day ever comes when we stifle pure research we will not long have applied science. Any scientist knows that.

The great trouble today is that so many of us have a myopic educational experience and the result is that we are narrow and without any sense of perspective and if there ever was a day when free men and free women needed to have a sense of perspective it is now. How are you going to defend our civilization if you don't know its origins?

The other day at a dinner I quoted from Emperor Augustus to a man across the table. He said to me, "Didn't he live in the tenth century? He could not possibly have anything to say that could be relevant to our day." How absurd! That is isolationism of time, and there is isolationism of time just as there is isolationism of geography, Emperor Augustus was not the least bit stuffy and much of what he said back in the tenth century is relevant to the problems of today, and a lot of things being said by people at the moment are not worth listening to.

I hope that all of you will champion intellectual education, it needs championing today, and if it is truly to be developed then we must keep freedom of inquiry and freedom of expression. Without those two freedoms there will never be intellectual education and there are some movements in our own country that would stifle them. You have a responsibility.

If our freedoms are to remain and develop, if our civilization is to be kept intact, then we must think through once again what it is that we really value in

We have suffered from a blight in this country for about twenty-five years and the blight is what I like to call pseudoliberalism. Genuine liberalism is respect for other people's ideas when they differ from yours and willingness constantly to examine, to see if they are tenable, and if not, to change them; but it does not mean not having any ideas. It has been very fashionable not to have any convictions about values and excusing that absence of conviction by saying, 'Everything in the last analysis is only opinion.' don't know of any person of intellectual stature who believes that. I know a lot of half-educated people who do. What you believe to be just or unjust, what you believe to be good or bad in the last analysis is allimportant because it determines what kind of man or woman you are going to be, what kind of life you are going to live, what kind of contribution to society you are going to make. I would urge you as educated people to think about what you believe and examine and re-examine what you believe, and don't be afraid to stand up and witness to what you believe. Maybe you have to say publicly five years later that you were wrong. So what? Nobody is going to disrespect you for that, but you will operate in the meantime on the basis of what you do really value.

I am not suggesting to any person here that you become a bigot. The process of your formal education will keep you from that, but don't at the same time let it make you spineless. Our enemies in the world, people who would destroy our civilization are never vague, timid and apologetic, are they? But we who should be championing our precious inheritance of the ages are vague and apologetic. Is it any wonder in many cases that we are defeated? Now this isn't the first time we have been tested and it won't be the last time. The very essence of living is that kind of testing and I want to say this to you: one of the bleakest periods of history was the rule of Cromwell and his control over the Parliament of England. He was a totalitarian through and through. You won't find the word mentioned, but like all totalitarians he was interested in controlling men's thinking and believing. Cromwell's pet hate-because all dictators have more hates than they have love-was against the whole of religion and he took a kind of satanic satisfaction going to beautiful churches and smashing altars and breaking stained glass windows.

There was a little man in England who dared to defy Cromwell. His name was Sir Robert Shirley and he lived up in Leicestershire in the north of England. He took his own money and built a lovely church. When Cromwell found out what Sir Robert Shirley had done he was livid with rage. Dictators don't like to be crossed. He told his soldiers to arrest him, they dragged Sir Robert Shirley to London, put him in prison, and then put him to death. Did Cromwell win? No. Every dictator has within himself the seeds of his own destruction. So it was in this case. As I stood in front of that little church the last time I was there I looked at the inscription over the door and it seared itself into my consciousness. It is an epitaph to this little man and it says, "He dares, even when the worst comes, to stand for the best things." What better tribute could you pay another human being? What better tribute could anybody say of you some day when you die? What better thing can be said of Gamma Phi Beta or Sigma Chi or any other organization?

What I am saying to you tonight is this: I hope each one of you will dare to stand for the best you know, intellectually, morally and spiritually. I not discouraged. I am encouraged, because I think people like you and me are being stirred up out of our lethargy, out of our complacency, out of our superficiality, and that in itself is good. I pray God earnestly, fervently that He will give you His grace so that each one of you here will dare to stand for the best you know.

HE CITY of St. Louis is very proud of its reputation as an Art Center and of the many artists who have made that reputation. The St. Louis Art Museum is one of the finest in the country and the Art School of Washington University ranks with the best. Kenneth Hudson, Dean of the Art and Architecture Schools is the husband of Gwendolyn Mills, Alpha Eta '24.

The St. Louis alumnæ chapter feels more than proud that four of the leading St. Louis artists are members of Gamma Phi Beta. Each works in different media and style and one of our most enjoyable meetings was one in which they exhibited their work and told us something about it.

Margery Rosing Kirchner, University of Michigan '04 has done research in Botany at the Universities of Berlin, Copenhagen and Chicago and she was awarded membership in Sigma Xi for her research. She has studied painting at the Chicago Art Institute, St. Louis School of Fine Arts with Gustave Goetsch and Fred Conway. She works primarily in oils but does some pastel. She has done landscapes, flowers, still life and some portraits. One of her most successful portraits is of her husband, Dr. Walter C. G. Kirchner and another of the family christening robe has won a prize. She was awarded a \$250.00 prize by the Abbott Laboratories of Chicago for a picture submitted in a competition with 800 other entries. She has exhibited extensively in St. Louis, Chicago and in traveling exhibits in the East. Her "one man" shows in St. Louis and other Missouri cities have aroused a great deal of interest. She has been active in the St. Louis Artist Guild, American Artists' Professional League and the Twentieth Century Art Club of which she has served as Past President. Marjory does not confine her interest to art alone for she was one of the organizers of Phi Chapter on the Washington University campus, has long been active in the Alumnæ association. She has been Past President of the St. Louis College Club, A.A.U.W., and of the Women's Auxiliary of both the Missouri and St. Louis Medical Associations. Always interested in her Alma Mater, University of Michigan she has just returned to St. Louis after attending the 50th anniversary reunion of her graduating class.

Helen Reitz Cordell, Wisconsin '29 has only recently returned to St. Louis but her reputation in art circles was quickly established here. Helen works definitely in the modern field and is known as a semi-abstractionist working in oils, metals, prints and sculpting. She has done a great many landscapes as well as still life and portraits and has exhibited in New York, Woodstock, Cape Cod, Tulsa and St. Louis. She received her Masters at Columbia and has done some work toward her Doctorate. Presently, she is the Director of Art in the Brentwood Public Schools and during the summer she is teaching Art Education at the St. Louis School of Fine Arts, Washington University. Several months ago she appeared on TV and the St. Louis Post Dispatch carried a feature about her work in its rotogravure section. Last summer she spent in Europe visiting her young son who is stationed over there with the armed forces and in between times seeing the famous museums. Right now she is busy getting a new home ready for her son who is due home shortly.

A hobby of drawing stick figures during her leisure time has brought fame to Eugenia F. Hart, a graduate of Washington University in 1927. Some people she met reminded her of bugs, some bugs looked like people and flowers had some of the attributes of both. Her work with the stick figures was

enjoyed so much by her friends that they urged her to study art which she decided to do in 1938. She took private lessons from Esther Silber Reed and Tanasko Milorich in St. Louis and did summer work in painting and drawing at the Chicago Art Institute. From the beginning she has made great progress and has gone on to such achievements as a one man show in 1954 exhibiting 79 paintings and drawings.

Frances Klein, art critic of the St. Louis Globe Democrat says, "She reaches her greatest height and her widest appeal with her portrait heads, most in a soft and pliable medium such as pastel or charcoal. These are outstanding: 'The Mourner' has a powerful impact; 'Windblown,' 'Head in Pastel, 'Girl on a High Stool'—all are loosely done, with a

proper sense of form and sparkling with vitality."

Howard Derrickson of the Post Dispatch says, in writing about the latest show, "Miss Hart, who is private secretary to Stratford Lee Morton (Insurance Executive and civic leader) insists upon calling herself a hobbyist, though the Guild classifies her as a professional on the basis of her awards and participation in the museum's Missouri shows and out of town regional competitions. An iridescent oil with rich interplay of tones and textures is called 'Translation from an Oyster Shell.' Representational elements including a woman's figure, are imaginatively evolved here, as they are also in a series of pencil portraits. There is evidence of maturing skill and artistry in many realistic nude figure studies, heads in expressionist style and solidly painted still lifes in which the palette is growing lighter, brighter and surer in tonal relationships. The collection as a whole proclaims that here is one who enjoys the uncertainties and little adventures of the journey more than she does arrival at the destination itself. This attitude has a certain wistful charm and that charm carries over to almost every picture in it."

Alice Pearcy Ulbright, Washington University '39 is the youngest of our foursome. When Alice graduated from Washington she won final honors and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. Teaching English and other academic studies she found an aptitude for the teaching of art and to further that leaning she went to Columbia University and the Art Students League in New York. She returned to Washington University to get a Masters in Education and wrote her thesis on "Adjusting Creative Art to the Young Adolescent." In 1946 she married J. Harold Ulbright and retired from teaching. A daughter, Claudia arrived in '47 and Tommy came along in '49. While she was busy with her babies she also found time to paint as recreation and she became active in the Society of Independent Artists and last year served that society as its President. She is also a member of the St. Louis Artists Guild. Alice has exhibited with both these organizations and has been represented for the past three years in the popular "Missouri Show" at the St. Louis Art Museum. At the annual Christmas bazaar of Gamma Phi Beta Alice's paintings of clowns and animals have really sold like hot cakes and many are the Gamma Phi children who have been made happy with a gift of her gay water colors. We like what Howard Derrickson said about Alice's paintings in his art column in the St. Louis Post Dispatch:

"Mrs. Ulbright's paintings convey an impression of great activity and liveliness—a whirligig of color, gay and boisterous."

HAIL, HAIL TO MICHIGAN!

T IS CHARACTERISTIC of the University of Michigan that the beautifully modernistic School of Business Administration stands adjacent to the equally beautiful Gothic Law Quadrangle.

It is also characteristic that the Michigan campus is the recipient of two memorials—the Horace Rackham School of Graduate Study and the new \$7,300,000 Phoenix research project for peacetime study of atomic power, a living memorial to Michigan men and women in World War II.

At Michigan a major objective is to use traditional knowledge in the interests of progress.

Now in its 137th year, U. of M. is famous for many reasons. Its football stadium, home of the big ten Wolverines, is the largest in the world with a capacity of 98,000.

The University owns Willow Run Airport that serves Detroit and its large commercial interests.

Its professional schools—law, medicine, and dentistry, stand among the top in the country.

And on the undergraduate level, there is truth in the statement: a C is an honest grade at Michigan.

Further community and national services include research and medical care available at the University Hospital, numerous surveys and studies conducted to aid community sociological problems and the famous U. of M. "Telecourse" which brings the classroom to the living room via TV.

But to the University student, himself, Michigan is primarily an institution of learning—in more ways than one.

He has a variety of courses from which to choose. From Political Science to Architecture, from English to Electrical Engineering . . . the University program can satisfy his academic interests.

He shares this diversity of interests with a variety of per-

sonalities. In addition to his classmates from all over America, many foreign students attend classes and live with their midwestern American contemporaries on the Michigan Campus. Their adjustment is facilitated by the International Center, courses in language and culture, and sponsorship by student groups.

In lecture halls holding hundreds of students, a Michigan man has access to the audio-visual aids, guest lecturers, and excellent instruction that are familiar qualities of large universities.

Through the University system of having small recitation sections and numerous individual conference hours, he achieves the rapport with his instructor that is familiar in smaller institutions.

The 1953-54 Catalogue for the College of Literature, Science and the Arts pointed out another learning process the Michigan student develops. "As citizens they (the students) will participate in the political, social and cultural aspects of community, state, and nation."

Men's extra-curricular activity is centered in the Union Building while Women's government is organized in the Michigan League Building. Here one finds the offices of Interfraternity Council and Panhellenic Association, centers for affiliated students, and Inter-House Council and Assembly Association, their independent counterparts. Working individually to aid the groups they represent, all four organizations join forces frequently to back such campus projects as elections and orientation of new students.

Michigan, then, is a center for research and study, a proving ground for ideas and new methods. It is also an experiment in living that is international in scope within the confines of the campus community.

And holding these diverse characteristics together are the spirit and zest and humor indicative of collegiate living.

GAMMA PHI BETAS at the University of Maryland have been dreaming for years of—no, not of those big handsome football players—but of a new chapter house. This year their dreams came true. In January they packed their bags and moved into their new home along Fraternity Row in College Park.

How the fourteen-year-old Beta Beta chapter has been able to move into this lovely new \$90,000 house may be interesting to some of the other chapters who are striving toward the same goal. The University financed the initial \$90,000 building cost of the house through the sale of bonds. (Beta Beta is one of ten sorority and fraternity houses financed by the University in this manner.) Beta Beta leases the beautiful Georgian Colonial house from the University for \$4,500 a year. The best part of it all is that the girls living at the house pay no more for room and board at the brand new four-story house than they did at the old house.

To help with the big project of decorating and furnishing their new house, the House Board appointed Anita Curtis, Florence White, Eleanor Sieg and Margaret Seamans from the Washington alumnæ chapter to act as an Advisory Board.

Mrs. Camilla Moody Payne, decorator of the famous Blair House in Washington, was engaged, and members of the decorating committee working with her were Ernestine Walker, Katherine Lipscomb, Anita Curtis and Ruth Studley, alumna advisor.

Blue-green walls in the reception room set the color motif of the first floor in the new Beta Beta House. This color is repeated in the rosy beige chintz draperies of this spacious drawing room. The fifty-five foot room is carpeted with three Oriental rugs, and the three groups of sofas and chairs are done in gold, reds and blues. At the wall opposite the large fire-place are four fruitwood chairs in black satin brocade, a gift of Mrs. Charles P. McCormick of Baltimore. An adjoining alcove can be used as a guest room. Also on this floor are the housemother's suite, a TV room which doubles as a lounge for day students, bath, and a large library with round maple tables and captain's chairs.

The flamingo-colored dining room with its gay printed cafe curtains is on the lower level. On the same floor are the kitchen, chapter room, laundry-storage room and maid's quarters.

On the second and third floors are bedrooms for thirty-four girls decorated in light gray and furnished with new Hollywood beds, double dressers, bachelor chests and desks.

Pride is hardly the word to use in describing that radiant look a visitor receives from the girls at Beta Beta these days. And the look lingers on—even if the visitor doesn't happen to be a big, handsome football player!

FULBRIGHT SCHOLARS TO STUDY ABROAD

Coveted Fulbright scholarships to study abroad have been awarded to four Gamma Phi Betas. The scholarships cover traveling expenses within the United States and Europe, tuition, books and

living expenses.

Mary Lou Leach, Ohio State, has been awarded a Fulbright Scholarship for a year's study of French and Russian at Brussels University, Brussels, Belgium. The award begins on September 25 with a week's orientation in Brussels. Mary Lou is planning to leave in August with another Fulbright Scholar to spend some time in England and possibly do some travelling on bicycles.

Mary Lou majored in International Studies, specializing in Russian and the Soviet Area. Her tentative project for the Fulbright is study of contemporary French and Russian literature. MARSHALL SCHOLAR TO STUDY AT LONDON UNIVERSITY



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Schedule Of Officers' Duties

Greek-Letter Chapters

PRESIDENT:

In odd years, send Central Office acknowledgement of bound CRESCENT as soon as it is received. Use postal card in volume.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

- By August 1, either send 7 rushing calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary or notify Central Office if Panhellenic has not released rushing dates.
- By September 15, send 7 college calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary.
- By September 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at fall council meeting; include business for consideration of convention in fall preceding convention.
- Immediately after pledging (immediately after opening of college if pledging is deferred), send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.
- By February 15, send list of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.
- Not later than March 25, send name and home address of new membership (rushing) chairman to Central Office.
- By March 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at spring council meeting.
- Immediately after appointment is made, send name and home address of CRESCENT correspondent to Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.
- As soon after April 1 as information is available, send 7 lists of new chapter officers to Central Office and 1 list each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary on standard blanks.
- By May 15, send to Central Office list of chapter members (undergraduate and alumnæ) who have passed away since preceding August 1.
- By July 1, send list of graduates (include members who have dropped out of college) with home addresses to Central Office and Province Director.

TREASURER:

- Pre-initiation and final fees due in Central Office within two weeks following pledging and initiation. (See schedule of CRESCENT subscriptions below.)
- By October 1, annual audit due Chairman of Finance. DO NOT SEND TO CENTRAL OFFICE.
- By December 1, due Central Office: first installment of International dues and \$7.50 for bound CRESCENTS and subscriptions to Banta's Greek Exchange and Fraternity Month.
- By March 1, due Central Office: second installment of International dues.
- Fiscal year begins August 1, ends July 31. All dues paid between those dates shall apply to the current fiscal year unless otherwise specified.

SCHOLARSHIP CHAIRMAN:

Comparative rating of NPC sororities on campus for preceding year due International Scholarship Chairman immediately after reported, if possible by November 1.

PLEDGE TRAINER:

- Immediately after pledging, order pledge manuals and song books from Central Office.
- By May 15, send report for new edition of Pledge Manual to Central Office.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

- By October 1, for December issue, January 10 for March issue, February 20 for May issue, July 1 for September issue, glossies, features, honors due Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.
- By January 10, chapter letter due Mrs. Marek for March issue.

 Do not send chapter letter for other issues.
- Canadian chapters send feature stories to Mrs. R. B. Miller, 11029
 89th Ave., Edmonton, Alberta; other material to Mrs. Marek.

MEMBERSHIP (RUSHING) CHAIRMAN:

- Immediately after each formal rushing period, rushing reports due International Membership Chairman, Chairman of Provinces, and Province Director. Continue to report each subsequent pledge.
- Order supplies (information and investigation blanks, file and acknowledgement cards, post rush reports) early each spring for following fall from Central Office, Specify quantity.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN:

By first of each month, publicity copy, with glossies, due International Public Relations Chairman.

HISTORIAN:

By July 1, chapter history for preceding year due International Historian, Miss Nina Gresham.

Alumnae Chapters

- By September 25, send Grand President, Mrs. Dippell, business for consideration at fall council meeting.
- By October 1, alumnæ chapter letters for December Crescent, including vital statistics and glossies due Mrs. Walter E. Holman, 1960 S.W. 16th Ave., Portland, Oregon. At the end of each chapter letter include name and telephone number of member in your chapter whom alumnæ new in the community may call.
- By November 25, Founders' Day report due International Historian, Miss Nina Gresham. Coin card drive payments are due in Central Office.
- By January 1, send to Central Office Alumnæ Chapter Payment Report covering camp and alumnæ taxes, annual dues, and life subscription and life membership payments. These payments may be made any time during the fiscal year, August 1 through July 31; however, chapters are considered delinquent if partial payments are not paid by January 1.
