



# THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA— AN OPEN DOOR TO LEARNING

EHIND each doorway on the University of California's Berkeley campus there is something new. It may be new experiences, new friends and associations or mysterious unknowns patiently and tediously made a part of man's knowledge by the scholar in his study or laboratory. The campus doorways lead to a fabulous treasure of wisdom . . . of things both old and new . . . the wealth of Solomon in an abundance more than ample for all who enter.

Three separate movements resulted in the establishment of the University, one originating in private initiative, one in State action and one in Federal action. These three forces began working toward one end, the establishment of the University of California. The College of California contributed its buildings and lands in Oakland and Berkeley; the Federal government made a gift of public lands; and the State gave property accumulated for this purpose together with new appropria-

tions. The Legislative Act creating the University of California was signed by Governor H. H. Haight on March 23, 1868... a date celebrated each year as "Charter Day." The new institution opened its doors in September 1869 at the College of California site in downtown Oakland and moved to Berkeley in 1873.

Among the world's institutions of higher education, the University of California is unique, for this campus is but one of eight campuses which comprise the statewide institution. The Berkeley campus is the oldest established unit of the University of California and, in enrollment and physical facilities, the largest. From any of several points on this 900 acre campus there is a panoramic view of San Francisco Bay, the city of San Francisco and the Golden Gate.

This picturesque site was selected by the trustees of the College of California some ten years before the University was chartered and was dedicated to higher education in ceremonies held on Founders' Rock on April 16, 1860. The first buildings were completed and classes started in 1873. The doorway to learning was opened wide, offering an abundant treasure to all who chose to enter.

Here on this historic and picturesque campus is the home of Eta chapter of Gamma Phi Beta founded on April 24, 1894. Eta chapter stands upon a wealth of experiences; its history is made vivid by the many women who have opened her door and given their love and their strength . . . women who have given of themselves so that today Eta stands high in the esteem of all.

Eta's history is filled with warm memories but her strength lies in the present. With a constant view to the future the active members strive to uphold their heritage by filling the present to the greatest of their ability.

This past year has been especially busy for Eta chapter. With our chapter at the center, we have branches out in all directions . . . scholarship, school activities, school spirit and most important, stronger and closer relationships with the faculty and with fellow students.

As scholarship was high on our list of importance, we placed it first. As a result, we came out first . . . the Gamma Phi Betas placed first on the University scholarship list. This is a place we're proud of and we hope to maintain.

College life isn't composed entirely of study. No, it is a rich experience composed of a multitude of activities ranging from school spirit to personal relationships. Football season plays an important role in college memories . . . the rallies, the parades and the games themselves. Here at Berkeley enthusiasm

reaches its peak when California faces Stanford at the big game; and the parade and rally preceding the game are equally exciting. The fraternities and sororities at Cal usually pair off and enter floats in the parade. Last year the Gamma Phis joined the Phi Kappa Taus and won the sweepstake award. This year we joined the Delta Kappa Epsilons and won the award for the most beautiful float in the parade, an exciting and memorable honor.

It is impossible to gain strength from an institution such as the University of California without giving some of your efforts and time and thought to it in return. With this in mind, the members of Eta participate actively and enthusiastically in many diverse school activities. Gamma Phis have edited the Blue and Gold, college yearbook, for the past three years. The most recent edition was managed by Mary Kelly who is also a Mortar Board member. The YWCA was led by Dorothy Thelan Clemens, also a Mortar Board member. The Women's Rally Committee was led by Leslie Bergland, another Mortar Board member. And Janice Hungerford, our fourth Mortar Board member, led Eta chapter as president and held many positions on campus.

Next year we are looking forward to further campus leadership. Margery McKenzie is president of the Panhellenic association, an honor held by each sorority every 22 years. Pat McGaffigan, was tapped as president of Mortar Board for the coming year. Pat, along with Margery McKenzie and Joan Brady, will continue the strong role played by Gamma Phis in the University of California Mortar Board society.

As mentioned before, one of our main concerns this past year was toward a stronger and closer relationship with faculty, fellow students and within the sorority itself. Looking back, we feel secure that we accomplished much toward this end. Our doors were open after each football game . . . the house was full of laughter and fun, thus strengthening our many friendships. In the spring we held a faculty dinner, when each member invited a faculty member for dinner. The fathers' dinner is an event we look forward to each year, when the dads from this state and other states join their daughters for dinner and an evening of entertainment. Other events which filled out the year were the Christmas Tea, and the spring fashion show, two events in which we participate, but which are made possible by our Mothers' club.

# RACHEL BULLEY TRUMP, RENOWNED ARTIST

A PORTRAITIST, a mother, and a housewife. These words aptly describe Rachel Bulley Trump, an outstanding Gamma Phi Beta. Mrs. Trump, who lives on the Main Line, has found time in the past 30 years to raise three children, paint over one thousand portraits, teach art, and act as hostess for many of the Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ meetings.

An amazing woman with a delightful personality, Mrs. Trump is well known among art circles. Although she has done many portraits, she prefers to paint children. This is not surprising for with her enthusiasm and love of life, she would certainly have no trouble in capturing the spirit of her young sitters. Mrs. Trump is a realistic artist. Her portraits look like the person they portray. As her daughter, Rachel Trump Owings, says, "She achieves the clear vibrancy of her portraits by painting light and color into the shadows. The perfection of highlights on the faces of her subjects is the result of years of study."

Mrs. Trump has her own special technique of vibrant color and light which is clearly evident in the many paintings she

has exhibited. She has shown her work at the Museum of Fine Arts at Syracuse University (where she graduated), the Woman's Club of Ardmore, the Woodmere Gallery, Chestnut Hill, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the Plastic Club of Philadelphia. She is past president of the latter and has twice won gold medals in exhibits there.

Mrs. Trump's children are by no means average, either. Her daughter, Rachel Trump Owings, is an artist in her own right, along with raising two children of her own. Mrs. Owings, among other things, specializes in portraits of dogs, does designs for needlepoint studios, and has done covers and illustrations for the children's magazine, *Jack and Jill*.

Mrs. Trump's son, Peter, is leading baritone with the Bremerhaven Opera in Germany. Peter was an industrial engineer in Philadelphia when he studied voice with Clarence Reinert and decided upon an operatic career.

Charles Edward, the youngest of the Trump children, is unmarried and lives at home. An avid sports car fan, he is secretary-treasurer of the Sports Car Club of Philadelphia. He spends most of his spare time working with sports cars.

Mrs. Trump's most recent painting is the wedding portrait of her new daughter-in-law, Marie Traficante. Upon examining this portrait carefully, one notices a butterfly painted in her bridal bouquet. This is just one of the personal touches added by the artist, Mrs. Trump, because Marie will sing in the opera, Madame Butterfly. Also, to commemorate her singing in this opera, her in-laws, Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Trump, have just recently sent her a sterling silver butterfly pin—set with family heirloom opals.

Mrs. Trump's sister, Mrs. Bulley Woods is an unusual person, too. She lives in "Dome House" which is located in Cavecreek, Arizona. This house was designed by two Frank Lloyd Wright students so that it would always keep its face to the sun.

We are proud of Mrs. Trump for her painting, for her teaching, and for her being a Gamma Phi Beta. But most of all we are proud of Mrs. Trump for putting her family first!

# CALIFORNIA ALUMNAE TO HONOR VIOLET KEITH FOR FIFTY YEARS OF SERVICE

VIOLET KEITH, a loyal and hardworking Gamma Phi Beta, will receive many honors from the Inter-City council of Province VII, North, on the golden anniversary of her initiation into Gamma Phi Beta 50 years ago this October.

As Violet Dungan, she was a member of Lambda chapter at the University of Washington, in Seattle. She held many offices

during her undergraduate years.

A delightfully friendly and vivacious person, Violet is married to George R. Keith, and lives on a large estate high in the foothills of Los Altos, California. Next to her home and husband, Gamma Phi Beta has been her primary interest for many years. Those of us who graduated from Eta chapter at Berkeley 20 years ago still look back with pleasure to the many good times we had swimming and picknicking in Violet's lovely gardens. At that time Violet was Province Director.

Gamma Phis in the Bay area are mighty proud of Violet Keith. She was one of the organizers of the San Francisco alumnæ chapter, a charter member, and also served as their

first president.

The Palo Alto alumnæ are also proud of Violet as she helped to organize that chapter in 1938, while she was Province Director. Los Altos is only a few miles from Palo Alto, and thus the alumnæ chapter formed near Stanford University has been Violet's home club.

She has been active in A.A.U.W. in Los Altos, and from

1945 through 1947 was treasurer of Los Altos Girl Scouts. During the last war Violet was production chairman of the Los Altos Red Cross.

As if that were not enough to keep her occupied, she became Chairman of Finance on Grand Council in 1936. She served in that capacity for four years, and endeared herself to Gamma Phis from other states as well as California.

In 1948 Violet was one of the primary organizers of the San Jose alumnæ chapter, and a charter member of that group. It was with the help of the San Jose alumnæ that she installed Beta Theta chapter on the campus at San Jose State. San Jose State College is the largest and highest ranking of all the State colleges in California, and Beta Theta chapter has been developing rapidly.

Violet became the Treasurer of the Corporation Board of Beta Theta and spent many hours working on the finances of the chapter. She was successful in purchasing two excellent pieces of property, and reducing the mortgage to the point where a new building can be erected. In April of this year she was forced to resign as Treasurer because of ill health.

Recently, the San Jose alumnæ presented Violet with a fountian pen and stand engraved with the Crest of Gamma Phi Beta and inscribed, "In appreciation of your many services."

# $\Gamma\Phi B$ addresses u.n. meeting

When 15,000 men and women of seven widely different religions joined in common prayer for the future of the United Nations in San Francisco in June, only one woman was among the speakers who addressed the gathering. She was Mrs. William Lister Rogers, president of the San Francisco Council of Churches and a member of Gamma Phi Beta.

The unique mass demonstration of faith came on the eve of the opening of the United Nations meeting, commemorating ten years of struggle by the U.N. to establish a basis for international peace.

Some 260 ministers of the seven faiths (Christian, Jewish, Moslem, Buddhist, Hindu, Confucian and Bahai) and a 1,500 voice choir led the massed congregation in prayer and singing.

John Foster Dulles spoke of the difficulties the UN has faced in its ten years of existence, but the recounted, too, how the moral power of the UN has become manifest. "It is a most encouraging fact," he said, "that all governments, even including those who deny the existence of moral law, feel it necessary to try to defend their conduct, if it is challenged, in terms of moral principles."

But the future, Dulles added, is filled with hope "if men and women of faith throughout the world develop and mobilize moral strength so that moral standards will increasingly pre-

vail in the United Nations."

Campbell, International Chairman of Standards and Literary Exercises, will be happy to know that she is recovering nicely from severe injuries sustained in a train wreck this past summer. An interesting sidelight is that Marion Schmidt de Escallon (Michigan '33), a close friend of Holly's, is doing a Spanish language translation of *Deborah Todd* for future publication in South America, where she resided for several years.

The book is intended for the general public for it shows "the humor and dignity of human nature in its more intimate and personal moments." Many of the poems have been used by individuals interested in interpretative reading; the variety of length, theme and mood of the poems provides excellent material for both class room and public platform use.

Lew Sarett, who urged Dotty to continue her writing, had this to say: "Some poignant, terribly real and beautiful—others show down to earth, honest humor; all touch the lives of most of us. Genuine poetry. By all means go on writing."

Dotty was an active member of Gamma Phi Beta chapter at Northwestern her junior and senior years, having transferred from Grinnell College. Her work as a student in the School of Speech was outstanding, and following several years of high school teaching, she returned to Northwestern as an instructor. She is a member of the speech honorary Zeta Phi Eta, which will co-sponsor a literary tea with Gamma Phi Beta to honor Dotty in October at the Gamma Phi Beta house at Northwestern.

Dotty is married to Clarence T. Simon, Ph.D., professor at Northwestern and they have two sons, Lee Will, 15 and John Turkle, 12.

# SO PROUDLY WE HAIL

(Released by the NPC Citizenship Committee)

Our Flag is a symbol. The Star Spangled Banner as it is known to Americans everywhere is the ensign of liberty and freedom. The Maryland Historical Society speaks of it as "The story of Key's anxious vigil during the night of September 13 and 14, 1814 but more than that it tells us how the poet felt when his country was in danger, when his friends were under fire and when the future was at stake. It is our country's solemn faith of trust and belief in the future."

Since that day countless peoples of other nations have come to America to enjoy the fruits of that freedom. Many of them have become citizens of our country. To do so they waited for time to pass. They studied and took examinations and finally after that period of waiting and working they took an oath to serve under our flag and to save our nation from all enemies. The privileges they have earned after five years have been ours since birth. Our citizenship is all too often taken for granted because we have neither waited through the "perilous night" of a bombardment for a sign of victory nor have we worked painfully and patiently to learn the rules of American citizenship.

At a recent induction of 150 men, women and children into American citizenship, Judge F. Dickinson Letts, Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Columbia said, "These are perilous times. Tension and confusion plague the people of the earth. Here in our land we are aware that we have enemies abroad and in our midst. They threaten our way of life. From without they strike at our structure of government and termite-like they bore from within. A conflict rages which pits our ideologies and belief in the existence of a Supreme Being and our pride in the dignity of man against a wicked horde that denies God. . . . Happenings, such as the

Norman Conquest, must have been combined with the intense yearning for freedom which impelled sturdy souls to embark for America. They came at the cost of great hardship and much sacrifice to escape from persecution. They became the founders of our free institutions. They wrote into our Constitution the human rights which Magna Charta and the Bill of Rights so well define. Through the years and by the experiences of mankind we have come to know and to prize life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness and to appreciate a government of the people, by the people, for the people."

He went on to say the spirit of freedom has come down to us through the ages. Freedom has never been given to any man. It must be won and can be preserved only by eternal vigilance. To preserve our freedom, our way of life, we must

keep America strong.

How freedom has been won and preserved in these United States has best been summed up in an editorial written by Harold Martin, a columist, who was present at the dedication of the Iwo Jima Monument in Washington, D.C., in the early part of this year. He wrote in part: ". . . The great bronze sculpture of the men raising the flag on the broken rocks of Iwo Jima is a battle cry . . . a trumpet song. It is a piece of sculpture which the genius of the sculptor has translated from a photograph into fluid bronze." In speaking of those who fought so gallantly in the battle of Mount Suribachi he wrote further: "they didn't know that they were giving America an unforgettable symbol for there, as on a thousand battlefields where Americans had fought, 'uncommon valor had become a common virtue," but in that one moment of proud achievement they told us what we are and what we must forever be if we would live as free men all our days. - 2. The second must be the willingness to make a comeback after failure-and try again and again.
- 3. The third must be the awareness of the effects our living has on our world around us-and our responsibilities both for ourselves and for those who follow us.
- 4. The fourth is the acceptance of the fact that we must take hold of the permanent things of life to help us along.
- 5. The fifth should be the enlarging of our ideas and ideals
- 6. The last attitude of mind is to try to create within ourselves a desire for service to others-for that is what life is all about.

What wonderful goals for us all to strive for.

At the Carnation Banquet, Mrs. Page was the guest speaker, and her topic was "How To Do It After College Days"-an inspiring message-for the active girls to look forward to, and for the alumnæ women to strive for-complete loyalty and service to Gamma Phi Beta, and the rewarding benefits from

Round Tables were held on Saturday afternoon with great success. The Greek-letter chapters discussed how to distribute time between studies, social life and activities, and it was agreed that with proper planning, a girl could participate in all phases of college life. Wonderful recommendations were made on rushing techniques, and many ideas were exchanged. Scholarship is to be improved in Province I by study tables, tutoring where needed, and an increased desire to have better grades. Several excellent mentor reports were read.

The alumnæ chapters suggested that business could be expedited by well-planned executive meetings before the regular chapter meeting; also that there should be a definite program for the meetings. It was urged that each alumnæ chapter prepare a directory for the year, and this should be eventually combined into a Province Directory. It is suggested that an article be published in THE CRESCENT showing the percentage breakdown of the alumnæ dues to National in order to increase alumnæ interest. We feel that there should be a more systematic way for a chapter to request and receive recommendations, and that the "Recommendation Questionnaire" be revised as it seems outmoded.

to whom Conference weekend was the culmination of weeks of planning and correspondence, were: Mrs. Robert Holland, Springfield, Ohio, Director of II East; Mrs. Hamilton E. MacArthur, Alumnæ Secretary, II East; Mrs. C. J. Olsen, Director, II West, and Mrs. William W. Heusner, Alumnæ Secretary, II West.

The business sessions, held at the MSU Union Building, opened with election of Anna Armstrong, London, Ont., as presiding chairman. Miss Mafalda Fenoglio, Terre Haute, acted as Secretary. Miss Mary Bromm, Port Huron, Mich., former traveling secretary, conducted a model ARC meeting, with Greek Letter and Alumnæ delegates acting as ARC committee members. The need for more informative recommendations, as well as prompt acknowledgement of them, was brought out in discussion.

The interrelation of intelligence and goodness was the theme of the Saturday luncheon address by Dean Thomas H. Hamilton of MSU's Basic College. "The man who does not think can do good only by chance," he pointed out. "It is clear that those men who are good are also intelligent."

Open discussion at the afternoon session produced a unani-

mous vote in favor of the National Plan for sponsoring Conventions, as well as full approval for regular chapter assessments to finance them. Although Province II had so recently "put on" the Mackinac Convention . . . or perhaps because the Province had found the experience very rewarding . . . the delegates were eager and willing to work together on projects for the next Convention.

Mrs. Ralph von Lehmden, Chicago, conducted a joint Greek Letter and Alumnæ Round-Table on Philanthropies with Mrs. Robert Spika, East Lansing; Miss Jean Oakes, Ann Arbor; Arlene Kuzak, Beta Zeta, and Charlene Herndon, Beta Delta, contributing facts and opinions. Mr. Lee Trumbull, member of the State Board for Retarded Children, told of his own problems as father of a retarded child, and of the need for acquainting parents and social organizations with the potentialities of the program. Delegates voted in favor of adopting the Retarded Children program in addition to Camps with the recommendation that, if possible, the two be integrated.

While alumnæ continued with round-table discussion of How to Have Interesting Meetings, Greek Letter delegates held a Model Chapter Meeting at the Beta Delta house with Mary Alice Hughes, Beta Pi, acting as President. Rosemary Sundberg advised the girls on fine points of ritual. Ardis Marek made suggestions for improving their Crescent copy, model reports were given by officers from various chapters.

The Saturday banquet was a festive affair with corsages, introduction of visiting dignitaries, songs and gay conversation. Mrs. Garvin's speech on How to Make Your Best Contribution was both inspiring and heart-warming.

Later that evening Beta Delta entertained Greek Letter guests with their favorite rush party, while alumnæ delegates met with their respective Alumnæ Secretaries for informal discussion of Province aims.

Nearly 200 delegates and guests from other sororities attended the Panhellenic Buffet Breakfast held at the chapter house Sunday morning. Miss Mabel Peterson, Assistant to the Dean of Students, MSU, addressed the gathering informally, speaking of the need to go back to our rituals for guidance in solving today's problems.

News of plans to establish a Gamma Phi Beta chapter at Indiana University in the Spring of 1957, which was announced during Conference, brought a vote from Province II West delegates at the final business session to establish a fund of \$500 to aid in development of the chapter. Mrs. Cherie Wallace of Ann Arbor was elected to represent Province II on the 1957 Nominating Committee, with Mrs. Hugh Atkins of Indianapolis as alternate.

Most of the delegates, reluctant to depart, returned to the chapter house after the close of the business session, for buffet dinner and to bid farewell to new friends and old. Members of the hostess committee were: Mrs. E. W. Pinckney, chairman; Mrs. Don O. Buell, reservations; Mrs. Clyde Campbell, Publicity; Mrs. Norman Reynolds, treasurer; Mrs. Robert Spika, transportation; Mrs. L. M. Decker, decorations; Mrs. M. S. Sharp, Alumnæ hospitality, and Miss Diane Seyler, Greek Letter hospitality. Grand Rapids alumnæ were joint hostesses.

### PROVINCE III

The fifteenth biennial conference of Province III was held at Lawrence, Kansas, April 29 through May 1. Hostess chapters were Sigma and Lawrence alumnæ. Conducting the Conference were Mrs. Charles W. Payne, Province Director, and Mrs. P. H. Hawes, Province Alumnæ Secretary. Special visitors were Mrs. Edwin A. Deupree, Chairman of Expansion and representative of Grand Council to the Conference, and Mrs. James Myles, International Magazine Chairman.

The Sigma House, with its new wing and remodeled structure, provided spacious and charming facilities for the Conference. Largely responsible for the success of the Conference were Joane Manney, chairman of arrangements, and Mrs. Wayne Atwood, president of the Lawrence Alumnæ Chapter. Suzanne Schwantes, who is president of Sigma Chapter, served as Conference chairman.

Registration began at the House at 4 o'clock Friday, when each guest was presented an original Conference program made by Mrs. James N. Thomasson of the Nashville Alumnæ, featuring the theme of HOW TO DO IT? on the cover of Carnation pink and brown combination. Following registration a beautiful al fresco supper was served, planned by the very capable housemother, Mrs. Ralph Park. Garlands of spring flowers were used to decorate the serving table and lawn enclosure. Especially enjoyable was the harmonious singing by the Sigma girls which made everyone feel relaxed and friendly.

The first business session of the Conference was opened Friday evening, when the hostess chapters extended greetings to the visitors, committees were appointed and Mrs. Deupree was officially introduced. A eulogy to Nina Gresham was read by Mrs. Roy Swindell and the Conference stood in silence in tribute to her memory.

At the Saturday session reports were heard from the Province Director, the Province Alumnæ Secretary, Mrs. Deupree of Grand Council, and Mrs. Myles, the International Magazine Chairman. It was especially interesting to hear from Mrs. Deupree first-hand the policies followed by our sorority in founding new chapters. Needless to say, all were jubilant over the news that we will enter Texas Tech and Indiana University in the near future. Joan Knight of the Alpha Delta Chapter will be going to Texas Tech next year to assist the new chapter. Mrs. Myles reported that Phi Chapter, which had sold \$770 worth of magazines, and St. Louis alumnæ chapter, which had sold \$1,850 worth, were first nationally. We are especially proud that both of these chapters are members of our province.

Elected as the Province representative to the International nominating committee is Mrs. James Gamble of St. Louis, and the alternate is Miss Allis Haren of Kansas City.

Our international philanthropy was discussed from the viewpoint of adopting a philanthropy in addition to the Camps, and the consideration of retarded children. It was felt generally that another philanthropy is needed and most delegates were in favor of retarded children's work. The general opinion was that we should not discontinue the Camps or neglect them, but that another philanthropy is needed to give

each chapter something to tie it together and to give additional local and national recognition. It was suggested that the field of retarded children be narrowed according to the IQ and not take children in the lowest 0-20 group. Another suggestion was that the exceptional or brilliant child might be helped instead of the retarded child.

The by-laws of our province were amended so that the duties of the province director and province alumnæ secretary are now in agreement with policies made by Grand Council. Also, the scale of dues was changed as recommended by the Chairman of Finance.

At noon the Kansan Room of the Memorial Union Building was the scene of a Panhellenic luncheon, "Carnation Capers." Guests included representatives of each sorority on the Kansas campus and the Lawrence City Panhellenic. Mrs. Paul Schofer, toastmistress, gave special recognition to Mrs. Wm. C. Hogin, Chi Omega Area Adviser and Dean of Women of Kansas City University, Mrs. J. H. Rustemeyer, Kappa Kappa Gamma Province vice-president, Mrs. Arthur Wolf, Kappa Alpha Theta Province president, Mrs. Frances Heller, Sigma Kappa Province president, Miss Martha Peterson, Dean of Women at the University of Kansas, spoke on "Using your Sorority Membership Wisely" and urged that college chapters, alumnæ, and the administration work together and promote congeniality. Mr. George Docking, a banker in Lawrence and the past Democratic candidate for Governor in Kansas, spoke on 'Thirty Years as a Gamma Phi Beta Husband," revealing many humorous happenings in the life of a husband of an active sorority woman.

Climaxing the Conference was the banquet held in the Jayhawk room of the Memorial Union Building on the campus. Jayne Calahan, Sigma pledge, was toastmistress. Mrs. Deupree spoke on "How to Brag." She said that Gamma Phi Beta has reason to be proud of its organization—its chapters, housing, financial standing, and membership—and urged each one to take personal pride in our sorority, to be loyal to the ideals, and to make an individual contribution to its welfare. Recommendations adopted were: To make a contribution from Province III funds to the Endowment Fund in memory of Nina Gresham, to establish a traveling trophy among pledge classes of Province III to be awarded annually on the basis of the year's scholastic attainment, and that the Province scholarship award be made to the chapter holding the highest

2. That students leaving Greek-letter chapters be informed of alumnæ activities before they leave school so that they will quickly become a part of an alumnæ group.

3. That an effort be made to include the husbands of alumnæ in the social activities of the alumnæ group at some time during the year.

4. That an article appear in The Crescent discussing the proper method of filling out recommendation blanks and give definite suggestions as to how the desired information may be secured.

5. That the Greek-letter chapters consider having a Gamma Phi Beta retreat before rush week.

6. That each college chapter analyze its membership. (For Chapter balance: by classes; for scholarship, leadership, art abilities, musical abilities; speech; Journalism; town and out-of-state girls; distribution over state; representation in each good high school in larger cities) before rush week to de-

termine specific chapter needs.

7. That the Gamma Phi Beta Panhellenic Delegate ask the Campus Panhellenic to consider setting a minimum grade average requirement of C as the scholastic eligibility requirement for prospective rushees.

8. That the Gamma Phi Beta Panhellenic Delegate recommend to Panhellenic that a scholastic award, or recognition, be given the individual freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior class having the highest scholarship on campus.

9. That the Greek-letter chapters consider the adoption of a scholarship orientation program for members and pledges.

Pat O'Brien extended to the Conference an invitation to meet with Beta Omicron in 1957.

This was very well done and thoroughly enjoyed by representatives from five Greek-letter chapters and five alumnæ chapters.

Following the first business session at 9:00 A.M. on Saturday

morning the two groups adjourned for the Greek-letter and alumnæ round tables. The Greek letter girls led by Beta Beta and Beta Mu discussed Officer's Retreats, Social Standards, Scholarship, Activities, Panhellenic and Magazine Sales. The findings from these discussions were: 1. All the chapter delegates decided that a retreat of old and new officers would be very profitable, 2. Raising the average of executive council and "big sister" tutoring within the house, 3. Formation of a Panhellenic Presidents' Council; also exchange dinners between sororities; have an outside speaker on grooming, speaker on marriage, know your Gamma Phi Betas, book and music reviews; 4. Cutting out "try-outs," etc. for activities from school newspaper and putting them on bulletin board; mothers take daughters to meetings; 5. Send out ahead of time for renewals. Letters to relatives were suggested to promote magazine sales. The alumnæ discussion was centered around the question of how alumnæ chapters could best serve the Greek-letter chapters and was led by Mrs. James Gosey of Baltimore. The topics discussed were financial, public relations, personal and education.

At 12:30 the round tables adjourned and the entire group assembled at 1:00 P.M. for the Panhellenic luncheon at the Chesapeake Room in College Park. There were two representatives from each Panhellenic group on campus and our guest speaker was Miss Virginia R. Kirkbride, Director of Activities for Women, George Washington University. Miss Kirkbride gave us a very delightful talk on Panhellenic Relationships on the Campus.

Round tables resumed again at 2:30 with the Greek-letter group discussing rushing led by Alpha Chi and Beta Beta. The findings from these were: 1. The importance of a more formal, orderly hash session was emphasized and, 2. The system of "odd-even" rotation; correlation of favors, refreshments, etc.; printing up booklets of the chapter to give to the rushees. The alumnæ group led by Miss Eleanor Seig of Washington discussed the question of how to have more interesting alumnæ meetings which included such topics as social aspect, how to promote membership and topics for meetings.

The individual round tables adjourned at 4:30 for a joint meeting to discuss the Philanthropy question. After Miss Grace Merrill, Chairman of International Philanthropy Board presented her report it was moved, seconded and passed that Province VIII recommend that Gamma Phi Beta select an additional International Philanthropy. Then Washington moved that Province VIII recommend that Gamma Phi Beta adopt work with Handicapped Children as an additional International Philanthropy. This motion was seconded and passed.

Mrs. Cicero F. Hogam, N.P.C. Delegate and Grand Council Delegate to Province VIII Conference, was the speaker at the Carnation Banquet at 7:00 P.M. on Saturday at the Chesapeake Room.

The closing session of the conference was called to order at 9:00 A.M. on Sunday. After two ballots the vote remained at tie for Mrs. Ruth Studley of Washington and Mrs. Gertrude Schellenberg of Richmond as our representative to the Nominating Committee for the 1956 Convention. At this writing Province VIII still has no official results to announce. The scholarship pitcher and efficiency tray, appropriately engraved, were both presented to Alpha Chi chapter for maintaining the highest scholastic average for the past two years and for their excellence in reports to Central Office and the Province Director, and for their promptness and efficiency.





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### SCHEDULE OF OFFICERS' DUTIES

### **GREEK-LETTER CHAPTERS**

#### PRESIDENT:

In odd years, send Central Office acknowledgement of bound CRESCENT as soon as it is received. Use postal card in volume.

#### CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By August 1, either send 7 rushing calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary or notify Central Office if Panhellenic has not released rushing dates.

By September 15, send 7 college calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary.

By September 25, send Grand President business for consideration at fall council meeting; include business for consideration of convention in fall preceding convention.

Immediately after pledging (immediately after opening of college if pledging is deferred), send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

By February 15, send list of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

By February 25, send Grand President business for consideration at spring council meeting.

Not later than March 25, send name and home address of new membership (rushing) chairman to Central Office.

Immediately after appointment is made, send name and home address of Crescent correspondent to Editor-in-chief and name and home address of Magazine Chairman to International Magazine Chairman.

As soon after April 1 as information is available, send 7 lists of new chapter officers to Central Office and 1 list each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary on standard blanks.

By May 15, send to Central Office list of chapter members (undergraduate and alumnæ) who have passed away since preceding August 1.

By July 1, send list of graduates (include members who have dropped out of college) with home addresses to Central Office and Province Director.

#### TREASURER:

Pre-initiation and final fees due in Central Office within two weeks following pledging and initiation.

By October 1, annual audit due Chairman of Finance. DO NOT SEND TO CENTRAL OFFICE.

By December 1, due Central Office: first installment of International dues and \$7.50 for bound CRESCENTS and subscriptions to Banta's Greek Exchange and Fraternity Month.

By March 1, due Central Office: second installment of International dues.

Fiscal year begins August 1, ends July 31. All dues paid between those dates shall apply to the current fiscal year unless otherwise specified.

#### SCHOLARSHIP CHAIRMAN:

Immediately after each grading period, send report on proper blanks to the International Scholarship Chairman.

#### PLEDGE TRAINER:

Immediately after pledging, order pledge manuals and song books from Central Office.

By May 15, send report for new edition of Pledge Manual to Central Office.

#### CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

By October 1, for December issue, January 10 for March issue, February 20 for May issue, July 1 for September issue, glossies, features, honors due Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.

By January 10, chapter letter due Mrs. Marek for March issue. Do not send chapter letter for other issues.

#### MEMBERSHIP (RUSHING) CHAIRMAN:

Immediately after each formal rushing period, rushing reports due International Membership Chairman, Chairman of Provinces, and Province Director. Continue to report each subsequent pledge. Order supplies (recommendation and investigation blanks, file and acknowledgement cards, post rush reports) early each spring for following fall from Central Office. Specify quantity.

#### PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN:

By first of each month, publicity copy, with glossies, due International Public Relations Chairman.

#### HISTORIAN:

By July 1, chapter history for preceding year due International

### **ALUMNAE CHAPTERS**

By September 25, send Grand President business for consideration at fall council meeting.

By October 1, alumnæ chapter letters for December Crescent, including vital statistics and glossies due Mrs. T. R. Naglestad, Rock

Rapids, Iowa. At the end of each chapter letter include name and telephone number of member in your chapter whom alumnæ new in the community may call.

By November 25, Founders' Day report due Central Office. Coin card drive payments are due in Central Office.

By January 1, send to Central Office Alumnæ Chapter Payment Report covering camp and alumnæ taxes, annual dues, and life subscription and life membership payments. These payments may be made any time during the fiscal year, August 1 through July 31; however, chapters are considered delinquent if partial payments are not paid by January 1.

By January 10, feature articles, glossies and newspaper clippings for March Crescent due Editor-in-chief, Mrs. Marek.

By February 20, alumnæ chapter letters for May Crescent, including glossies and vital statistics due Mrs. Naglestad.

By February 15, send 2 copies of the Alumnæ Chapter President's Report to the International Vice-President.

By February 15, send to International Vice-President recommendations for appointments of International officers and chairmen, such as State Membership Chairmen, Province Directors and Province Alumnæ Secretaries.

By February 25, send Grand President business for consideration at spring council meeting.

If complete list is not available by March 25, send name and address of member who will be responsible for rushing recommendations during the summer. By May 1, send to Central Office the chapter history for the preceding year written by the retiring President.

By May 15, send to Central Office list of members who have passed away since preceding August 1. Include married and maiden name and Greek-letter chapter.

By July 1, features and glossies for September CRESCENT due Editorin-chief, Mrs. Marek.

#### HOUSE CORPORATIONS:

By October 1, annual audit due Chairman of Finance.

#### SCHEDULE OF CRESCENT SUBSCRIPTIONS:
