



A VISIT TO XI CHAPTER AND THE UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO

N 1892 forty students enrolled as the first students of the University of Idaho in the partially completed wing of the Administration Building which stood proudly on top of a barren hill at Moscow.

Today the University of Idaho, with its beautiful stone and brick buildings rising among a veritable forest of trees, offers the finest in educational facilities to a student body of about 3,800. Currently a beautiful four story library is taking its place among the many other buildings spreading across the campus. The University offers a wide variety of curriculums but is particularly noted for its outstanding College of Forestry.


Gamma Phi Beta holds the honor of being the first sorority on the Idaho campus, Xi chapter chartered by thirteen women in 1910. Xi chapter has the distinction of at one time having a House average of A. In 1916 the present chapter house was erected, and has since been added to and renovated.

Through the years Xi chapter has honored many cherished traditions. One of the first functions of the year is the annual Peanut and Olive surprise fireside given by the members for the pledges. This event introduces pledges to the customs of Gamma Phi Beta. Soon after formal pledging the pledges take their sneak which usually consists of playing pranks on the members and then going out for a dinner and show.

Another important fireside is that held at Christmastime at which the Big and Little Sisters exchange gifts. The pledges work secretively and laboriously at making paddles for their Big Sisters which are presented with an appropriate poem.

The Seniors announce their superiority to the rest of the House by a surprise mock banquet. They act as cooks, hashers, hostesses, and decorators for the occasion. The pledges take great pleasure in tubbing the Seniors following the Senior Sneak. This tubbing usually takes place in the early morning and is supposedly a surprise to them. A breakfast given by the pledges follows.

The alumnæ honor all those with a 3.0 or above by holding

a banquet entitled the "Smarty Party." Soon after the House holds a Scholarship dinner at which a variety of food is served from hamburger to steak according to the different grades. The House of fifty-two girls achieved an average of 3.06 during this last year and the pledges received the campus scholarship trophy.

The majority of students live in either one of the twenty-four fraternity or sorority houses or in one of the many dormitories provided. As of late, two new women's dormitories, Ethel Steel Hall and Permeal French Hall, have been erected. Two new men's dormitories, Gault and Upham, have also recently been added.

The first big event of the year is the annual Homecoming weekend with its pep rally preceded by a serpentine of freshman women, fireworks, a parade, the game, and lastly, the dance.

Following close after, is the suspenseful football game entitled "The Battle of the Palouse" at which the two rivals, Washington State College and the University of Idaho clash on the gridiron. The spectators also join in this battle. The defeated walk the nine miles separating the two campuses.

The Nickel Hop sponsored by the Spurs is another important event of the fall. It is looked forward to by all of the students.

Christmas brings serenades, Sophomore Week, and the Holly Dance culminated by the selection and crowning of a Holly Queen.

All sorts of talent, some hidden, are brought out in the Blue Key Talent Show held in the late winter. Last year Gamma Phi Beta carried off top honors with their Siamese Dance entitled "Wimoweh."

The annual benefit drive, Campus Chest, is held in the spring at which living groups compete for the project accumulating the most money. Gamma Phi Beta, Phi Tau, and Willow Sweet won the trophy at last year's carnival.

Mothers are honored in the spring by a weekend composed of teas, dinners, honor awards, a Maypole dance, and the crowning of a Queen.

Xi chapter of Gamma Phi Beta is justly proud of its campus and its achievements.

IN MICHIGAN . . . Cornelia Steketee Hulst

Although it was a typical Michigan scorcher the day I called on Cornelia Steketee Hulst, the garden was as fresh and lovely as if there had been no lack of rain and Mrs. Hulst herself looked delightfully cool in her summer sheer, her white curly hair carefully correct in defiance of the thermometer. Her house sits far back from the road, screened by high shrubs, and as I walked down the drive and up the path to the house, past the enormous peonies, on by the yellow blossoms of the golden chain tree, stopping a moment by the pool, I remembered the day many summers ago when she was hostess to a Gamma Phi tea. It was another such scorcher, yet as on this day the house and garden were invitingly cool. Only then Dr. Hulst was alive, showing us pictures, talking in his quick, entertaining way on many subjects so that we lingered beyond a reasonable time. And now Mrs. Hulst was ninety-one.

I found Mrs. Hulst working on an article for the Athene, a Chicago magazine, to which she makes regular contributions. Since she was a girl she has always been interested in all things Greek, the legends and history, finding in Greek art, philosophy, history, and especially in its mythology, much of wisdom, mercy, justice. It is not strange, then, that her interest has resulted in several books: St. George of Cappadocia in Legend and History (1910), Balder's Death and Loke's Punishment (1918), Homer and the Prophets (1925), and her last one, Perseus and the Gorgon (1946).

She says that when her college education was cut short by a death in her family and she came back to Grand Rapids where she was born, she came under the influence of a teacher of Greek. That was the beginning of her interest. Then, through her own curiosity and persistence, she studied, searched, correlated, with her several books and articles the result.

It is a tribute to her that Grand Rapids recognized her abilities and had her for many years as head of the English department at Central High School. In 1914 the University of Michigan gave her an Honorary M.A. degree for her contributions to education. This spring the Michigan Education Association presented her a life membership in recognition of her being its first President and also its oldest living member.

In 1890 she married Dr. Henry Hulst. She tells an amusing story of how she met him one night at a discussion group. The host had told her beforehand that there would be a "nice young man" there he thought she would like. But, determined not to be drawn into any prearranged scheme, she ignored the "nice young man" and gave her attention to another who after

the meeting "walked her home." Looking at me over her glasses she smiled and said, "What do you think we talked about? Determinism and free will!" And that was Dr. Hulst.

In 1908 she went with him to Amsterdam where, for the first time, he demonstrated the use of X-ray in determining TB of the lungs. He pioneered in X-ray and became an authority on its use.

For years their home was the center of a discussion group where people met for friendly interchange of ideas and the always stimulating presence of their hosts.

It was a rewarding visit with Mrs. Hulst, a challenge to keep intellectual curiosity alive, an example of the triumph of the mind over the frailties of the body, and I came away forgetful of the day's heat, refreshed and inspired.

HONORED ACROSS NATION

IN MINNESOTA . . . Margaret Newton

Never was there a more sincere tribute of love and appreciation than that demonstrated on a local version of "This Is Your Life" for Miss Margaret Newton, retiring Moorhead, Minnesota school vocal music supervisor upon the conclusion of forty years of service in June.

Fargo-Moorhead Gamma Phi Betas took an unusual interest in this event because they had long been proud to claim Margaret Newton as a charter member. She had belonged to Sigma Theta of old Fargo College which moved en toto to North Dakota Agricultural College to become Alpha Omicron chapter in 1930.

In response to invitations sent out to all Miss Newton's former students and teaching associates thousands of letters were received, but even more impressive was the large number, probably fifty percent, of former students from New Jersey to Oregon and points between who participated in the program and attended the reception. A large percentage of these are now following musical professions. Those who are not indicated that their love and appreciation of music was planted by Miss Newton who was responsible for changing the status of music from an extracurricular activity in Moorhead to a place of importance along with the three Rs. During these

forty years she touched practically every family in this community and through these, an ever widening circle.

Mrs. H. S. Gillespie, mistress of ceremonies, skillfully wove together the events in Margaret Newton's public life, but introduction of individuals by name was scarcely necessary because the guest of honor recognized voices from the past even before their owners appeared in person. She "stole the show" with extemporaneous anecdotes concerning each as they performed, many with musical numbers from performances which they had appeared in many years ago. These musical expressions of tribute were supported by waves of affection from all those present. Said Ralph Hollands, father of Dolores, an Alpha Omicron active, "To come to Miss Newton's class was always a delight. She is one of God's chosen people."

Margaret Newton in her generous way indicated that if she inspired pupils they also inspired her. Instance after instance showed that spontaneously formed musical ensembles satisfied personal interests and public pleasure. A large part of Miss Newton's efforts went into the production of performances for enduring public benefit.

Bringing the program to a close was the presentation of gifts. Among these was a voice scholarship by the Moorhead Parent Teachers Association, Miss Newton to choose the recipient. From the Fargo-Moorhead alumnæ chapter of Gamma Phi Beta she received a rosebush for her garden. Final gifts were an oil portrait of Miss Newton which is now hung in Newton Hall, and a bouquet of red roses and green currency. Other substantial tokens bespoke the love and admiration of many friends made through song.

A reception following was held in the school gymnasium with decorations featuring a musical theme against a background of the score of "Sweethearts."

INDIA LOG

MARJORIE McClure Hotchner, graduated from Syracuse University in 1942, is the wife of Howard Hotchner, Radio Officer of the United States Information Service at New Delhi in India. For eighteen months she and her family have lived at the pulse-station in this provocative, ancient land, where current events effect not only its 414,000,000 inhabitants, but all of us under the same moon which shines on the Taj Mahal.

HE POETRY of India prevails in Marjorie's letter to useven lighting political reports. When Secretary of State John Foster Dulles arrived in New Delhi last March 9 for his talks with Mr. Nehru, Mr. Hotchner was there with tape recorder and reporters. How solemn it must have been to hear first-hand the talk at the Embassy, and to be along with Nehru, President Rajendra Prasad, Vice President Radhakrishnan on the visit to Gandhiji's Samadhi (spot of cremation) at Rajghat. Later, Mr. Hotchner, on President Rajendra Prasad's request, was personally conducted to the President's office where he playedback the two-hour long press conference recordings. The President, sitting cross-legged on a chaise, listened attentively, and Howard Hotchner noted with pleasure his apparent agreement with portions of Mr. Dulles' answers,

Almost as enchanting as being there ourselves, was Marjorie's account of her visits to Agra and Jaipur. Travelling by automobile with a supply of food, water and tea (since there are rarely any stop-over accommodations between one main city and the next) they reached Agra just in time for dinner. In Marjorie's own words: "-We arrived in Agra after dark and the moon was already up. We decided to go at once to see the Taj but when we arrived we were stopped by the local police and told we could not go in! It seems that the Shah of Iran and his Queen were there and the Taj would not be open to the public until ten o'clock. We returned to the Taj then. The big main doors were shut and we had to climb through a tiny door cut into the massive left side. Once again I beheld the Taj in the moonlight. Truly it seemed to float in the air. Again we went up into the Taj to see and examine the lovely carved screens and inlaid semi-precious stones. The next morning we were up bright and early and after a delicious breakfast at the Methodist Mission (where we spent the night) we went to the Red Fort. This remarkable place takes twenty-nine pages in a Guide Book! The Red Fort was built by Akbar, starting in the year 1565 A.D. and took eight years to build and employed over a thousand masons. Jahangir, Akbar's son, enlarged it and Shah Jahan added the white marble edifices which are among

the most beautiful in the Red Fort, but are definitely out of keeping, since the basic walls and buildings are of red sandstone quarried at Fatchpur Sikri. One of these buildings, the Palace of Akbar, consists of three courts made up of stately porticoes, galleries and turrets. In the old days, it was adorned with rich paintings, carving and gilding, and in places overlaid with panels of pure gold. There is a bath inside in a room with thousands of tiny mirrors. The guide lit a torch and it seemed as if the whole room was lined with diamonds. There were elaborate pools and an inside waterfall all designed to make the most glamorous baths in the world. We saw where the famous Peacock throne was. It is described as 'massive divan of solid gold, studded with glittering gems.' The Moti Jasjid or Pearl Mosque is, to my mind, the most beautiful building within the red walls. It is entirely of white marble and stands today as it was built in the time of Shah Jahan. It is 142 feet long and 56 feet wide. The floor is inlaid with lines of rich blue and pale yellow marble, the only touches of color in the building. There are 570 Masalan, or prayer-spaces for men. The remaining 90 were reserved for Begums or ladies of the court. It has 3 domes and triple rows of 7 arches which spring from great pillars of square design. Another tiny point of interest is the gem, less than an inch in diameter, inlaid in the doorway of the Jasmine Tower which imprisoned Shah Jahan. If you look sideways at this tiny mirror, you can see the whole of the Taj Mahal reflected from a mile or more in the distance.

"Then we went to another famous place, the Tomb of Itmad-ud-Daulah which lies on the left bank of the Jumna River. This gentleman was the grandfather of Mumtaz-i-Mahal, the lady for whom the Taj was built.

"Sunday morning we drove to Fatchpur Sikri and then to Jaipur, the Pink City. Jaipur is certainly one of the most beautiful cities in India, The streets are wide and clean and most of the buildings are of a curious blue-pink. Almost all the men wear turbans of various pastel hues and are so colorful! Jaipur was founded in 1728 and is a comparatively new city. Situated on a small plain surrounded by rugged hills atop which are old forts, Jaipur is protected by a crenallated wall, 20 feet high and nine feet thick. It has 7 gateways of wooden doors studded with iron spikes.

"Then on to the Hawa Mahal or Wind Palace. It is a multistoried building with curved roofs and cupolas in the shape of the back of a Hindu throne. Here the women in purdah used to look through tiny windows at parades in the streets below. It is the only building of its kind in India. Then on to the City Palace of the Maharajah of Jaipur. It is seven stories high and very elaborate. The ground floor has a large chamber with white walls decorated in lovely designs and colors, and there are beautiful crystal chandeliers. The next floor is decorated with floral designs and the next with mirrors. The beautiful top floor has a view all over the city and into the (Continued on page 18)

VIRGINIA BLACKWELL DOCKING, SIGMA '24

When the votes were tallied November 6, George and Virginia Docking had to start planning a move from their gracious colonial home in Lawrence to the governor's mansion in Topeka. George Docking became the first democratic governor of Kansas in twenty years.

It's a family of "Jayhawkers," with Virginia and the governor, their sons Dick and Bob and their daughters-in-law, Marcia and Meredith, all graduates of Kansas University.

"We're also a panhellenic family," says Dick, "Mother's a Gamma Phi Beta, Dad's a Delt, Bob and I are Betas and our wives are Chi Omegas."

While Virginia's first interest rests in her charming family, which includes three grandsons, and her lovely home, replete with prized heirlooms of china, dresden figures and a fascinating collection of old books and papers, she is far from a mere homebody. OTHER GAMMA PHI BETAS ON THE POLITICAL SCENE

FOR KEFAUVER . . .

Undoubtedly closer to the presidential campaign than any other Gamma Phi Beta was Martha Ragsdale Ragland (Vanderbilt '28) who served as vice chairman of the National Volunteer Organization at the Stevenson-Kefauver headquarters in Washington.

Martha did a tremendous job in 1948 organizing Tennessee women to help put Estes Kefauver in the Senate, and she is probably more responsible than anyone else for his being the vice-presidential nominee. When Senator John Kennedy of Massachusetts began to forge ahead in the exciting second ballot for the Democratic vice-presidential spot, it was Martha, many believe, who turned the tide for Kefauver. Seeking out the junior senator, Albert Gore, whom Tennessee and some other southern states were still supporting, she told him bluntly that Senator Kennedy was about to get the nomination unless he, Senator Gore, withdrew fast in favor of Kefauver. When she finished speaking to him, he strode to the Tennessee delegation, waved a banner for recognition and withdrew, which was the turning point in favor of Kefauver.

Martha, like many women, got into politics through the League of Women voters and has worked vigorously through the years in organizational and campaign activities. She served as National committeewoman from Tennessee in 1952. The wife of a Tennessee businessman, Martha is homemaker to him and their two children, Tommy, a senior at Vanderbilt and Sandra, a junior at Radcliffe.

WITH NIXON . . .

Close to the presidential campaign, but not involved politically was Phyllis Stockhausen (Illinois) who served as stewardess aboard the Nixon campaign special. Phyllis has been an American airlines stewardess for ten years, but found this chartered flight much harder than regular runs.

"One never knows when or whether meals will be served. The schedule is haphazard because of deadlines, rallies that run too long and the general improvising that is necessary," says Phyllis.

She found Vice-President Nixon and his wife, Pat, completely charming and "so undemanding."

"Mr. Nixon never even napped on the plane. He was always talking with his staff or writing speeches. I was amazed how hard everybody worked and how little sleep they required."

Her trip, says Phyllis, whetted her interest in politics, but "I certainly wouldn't want to run for anything!"

PROFESSOR J. LITA BANE RETIRES AFTER 44 YEARS IN FIELD OF HOME ECONOMICS

BIT OF CURIOSITY has taken Prof. J. Lita Bane a long waya journey of 44 years studying and teaching the science of what gives a house a heart-home economics.

When Miss Bane was graduated as valedictorian of her high school class in Pontiac, she wondered what this new thing, "domestic science," was, and upon entering the University of

Illinois, she decided to find out.

Since her graduation from the U. of I. in 1912, "domestic science" has moved Miss Bane around a good share of the United States from the state of Washington to Philadelphia and back again to the U. of I. Her experiences in the profession have been varied, and she has contributed to it in almost every phase, including teaching, adult education, writing and administration.

On September 1, Miss Bane retired from the University's home economics department. She was head of the department from 1936-48 and has been on disability leave since 1949.

When scientific principles of home management and child guidance first were added to the popular women's magazine fare of light fiction, fashions and recipes, Miss Bane became an associate editor of the Ladies' Home Journal and wrote homemaking features.

"I have always enjoyed a fast pace," Miss Bane said, "and magazine journalism with its speed and necessity of meeting deadlines was one of my many enjoyable experiences in home

In 1936, when Miss Bane came back to head the University's home economics department, it seemed to her that she "was returning to a monastic existence." In a sly comment on administrational proceedings she said that "what had been accomplished in an hour at the Journal took six in a committee

Despite what she termed the community's slower pace and isolation, Miss Bane says she still feels most at home in the

Middle West.

"I liked the tempo of the East, but it seemed extremely selfcentered. The West was an adventure, but a bit too undeveloped to suit me at the time. The Middle West I thought of as 'green and growing'-green, but not ashamed to be growing," she commented.

Younger members of the community and University students are acquainted with Miss Bane best, perhaps, because of her book, "The Life of Isabel Bevier," published early last year.

"I never truly felt that I should be the one to write that book," she maintained, "and I said 'No' several times to the committee that asked me to do it.'

Isabel Bevier was the first head of the U. of I. home economics department. Miss Bane studied with Miss Bevier, knew her well and was very fond of her.

Miss Bane wrote it, it was published, and the income from its quite successful sale has gone to Phi Upsilon Omicron, home economics honorary, which first began the biography as a professional project. She co-authored another book, "Introduction to Home Economics," which, in her words, "tells the freshman where she's going and the senior where she's been."

Miss Bane is a member of Gamma Phi Beta sorority, Omicron Nu and Phi Epsilon Omicron, home economics honoraries, Kappa Delta Pi, education honorary, and Phi Kappa Phi, all-university scholastic honorary. She earned her master's de-

gree from the University of Chicago and continued graduate work there and at Columbia University.

Besides the University of Wisconsin, she also taught home economics at Washington State College, Pullman, Washington, and has served as state leader of home economics extension in Illinois.

She was executive secretary of the American Home Economics Association for two years and was chairman of the home economics section of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges, chairman of the advisory committee of the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics and several other national organizations. She holds an honorary doctor of science degree from Kansas State College. DDD

It was about this time that I graduated from high school and in January I came through Rush at SMU and pledged Gamma Phi. This was in 1953.

The summer after I pledged I began working a paddle for my big sister. I had thought to cut out the shape of the paddle myself and finish it up with varnish and elbow grease. Then it came to me that if I was going to all that trouble I might as well tell my story as a rushee, pledge and soon-to-be-active. So the story goes, at the top of the paddle there is a minute reproduction of the crest of Gamma Phi. Next, a stick figure of a little Rushee, she looks baffled and her body is made of several different pledge pins-which she seems to be trying to choose between. Next, we see her after she has pledged and she is now the shape of a Gamma Phi pledge pin and is looking very cocky and happy. Finally we see her, still in the shape of a pledge pin, but in addition now wears a little active pin on her chest-she is beaming and looks very satisfied, Below these representations is an active pin with a pearled PHI, and a pledge pin on the other side. This is all carved out of one piece of Redwood and nothing is glued on.



After I presented this paddle to my big sister at Song & Paddle, the actives began to beseech her to donate it to the house. Evidently there had never been one just like it before. So to enable my big sister to retain the present I had made for her, the following summer found me beginning a Plaque, and it was finished last fall—I could have done it in less time, but doing

it in my spare time (which isn't much) and going to Europe in between didn't facilitate the rapid finishing of the plaque.

CAROL HARFORD—CAREER GIRL IN INDONESIA

roads in central and eastern Java, visiting villages settled in between banana trees and coconut palms, learning new customs, and helping Indonesia better to understand what the United States is really like, is all part of the United States Information Service in Surabaya, according to Carol Harford (UCLA '47) who has been the assistant director there since the middle of February 1956.

Long interested in international relations and because Carol was especially interested in the public relations aspect as an opportunity to continue in her chosen field and at the same time be a part of a constructive and timely purpose, she set out to learn about the United States Information Service. Through the valuable help of a friend in Washington, the information gleaned over the next year and

a half strengthened the original interest. In June 1955 Carol joined USIS, whose job as defined by President Eisenhower is: "To submit evidence to the peoples of other nations by means of communication techniques that the objectives and policies of the United States are in harmony with and will advance their legitimate aspirations for freedom, progress and peace." It has often been simply defined as "people to people diplomacy."

In Surabaya the staff of two Americans (director William E. Dietz ". . . an able, competent and enjoyable person" and assistant director) and 28 Indonesians are charged with the responsibility of implementing the basic aim of the Service in an area inhabited by close to 40,000,000 people, roughly half of the 80,000,000 people living on about 3000 islands, in central and eastern Java, Sulawesi (Celebes), Kalimantan Borneo), the Lesser Sunda Islands, the Moluccas and Indonesian Timor. In this area USIS strives to make the basic mission of the Service meaningful through information media—newspapers, radio, movies, publications—and through cultural avenues—a 12,000 volume library in the city of Surabaya, library extension services, English conversation groups and by aiding the exchange of persons program.

"The flight out here was like being a part of a travelogue come to life," Carol wrote, "with stops in Honolulu and dinner on the Pikaki Terrace of the swank new Princess Kaiulani Hotel; two and a half days in Manila visiting the Far East Reproduction Center where most of the printing for the USIS program in this area is done, and three far too short days in Hong Kong 'jewel of the orient.'" There Carol parted from traveling San Diego friend Muriel Tolle and went on to Singapore where she spent three months with USIS before proceeding to Indonesia. "Singapore is a combination of cul-

tures and well defined as the 'crossroads of the world.' But that's a chapter in itself, and an enjoyable as well as an interesting one."

Carol considers that Indonesia is the most "captivating of all" because "it's teaming with eagerness, it's fresh with 'Merdeka!', it's straining to hurdle the past 300 years and have today what other independent nations have been developing for centuries. Somehow the enthusiasm with which Indonesia is tackling its future is peculiar to this country. All this ambition, this desire for knowledge, this anxiety to achieve is developing in a number of ways and against the magnificent scenery of terraced rice fields which provide unending shades of green being watched over by graceful coconut palms and surrounded by blue-gray mountains which lend a gentle dignity to the land-

scape as the everlovin' white clouds of Java float happily overhead against a peacock blue sky. And all the while a new nation is growing, striving, combining old with new to create a country of strength, prosperity and stability. We see this all the time in our work with schools, organizations; in our contacts with government officials, and in talking with numerous Indonesians.

"Indonesia is so many things all rolled into one . . . it's Bali, isle of enchantment, a hundred hues, colorful yet disciplined culture, life of a century ago set down in the midst of a fast moving universe yet completely unaware of the world around it. It's an island of dance, of music, charming, casual, a true south sea island paradise . . . it's the chance to climb a volcano 6500 feet above sea level, stand on the rim and peer into the crater as it belches forth great gusts of sulphuric smoke, the whole experience renewing the viewer's admiration for nature's unlimited resources and powers.

"Indonesia is also sunsets and showers on shimmering waters as graceful prouws sail into the horizon . . . it's leaders having an opportunity to exert their ideas and using their best thinking to solve the difficult political, social and economic problems with which their country is faced, and its men and women rising to the challenge which is theirs."

Amazingly enough this fascinating world brought Carol in contact with a new, good Gamma Phi friend Mrs. Robert Bishton (née Jane Plitt, University of Maryland, March '45) wife of the American vice counsel in Surabaya. "In a consular community of 5 families and 3 single girls you can imagine our delighted surprise at discovering each other as a Gamma Phi."

THAT YOU MAY KNOW FLORENCE BAILEY CROUSE

HOSE of us who have felt the inspiration gained from knowing Florence Bailey Crouse feel impelled to share this experience with other members of Gamma Phi Beta. To Alpha chapter and Syracuse alumnæ Mrs. Crouse exemplifies the ideals of womanhood intellectually, socially and spiritually for which Gamma Phi Beta stands.

She was born and grew up in the country north of Syracuse, now the rapidly expanding community of North Syracuse, Her father drove her back and forth to the city to attend high school, and she says that she then rode on a horse car to the school located near the center of the city.

She entered Syracuse University with the class that graduated in 1899. In 1901 she married Huntington Beard Crouse, one of the founders of Crouse Hinds Company, manufacturers of

electrical equipment and signal lights.

While in college as an active member of Gamma Phi Beta she lived in the chapter house, and has mentioned some of the differences in campus life then and now. She remembered that at a rushing party the girls danced together, but one rushee decided not to join the sorority because she didn't believe in even girls dancing together. She spoke too of changes she supposes everyone recognizes, such as means of transportation. One could reach her destination by walking, about as fast as by riding in a horse car, so young people walked more. Young people today, she thinks, are different only in that they have adjusted themselves to modern ways and seem to be more interested in others.

She noted that following World War One young people went through a difficult period of readjustment, when they experienced freedom they had not yet learned to use wisely. She doesn't feel that way about young people of today, however. She admires them for their early intellectual and emotional maturity, and their ability in leadership and organiza-

Mrs. Crouse is one of those rare individuals, who can talk about anything but herself. Although she experienced the simpler life of the early twentieth century, she has kept pace with the more complex life of today. Outside of her home and family to which she has been devoted and loyal, we think of three areas of service in which she has been outstanding, Syracuse University, Gamma Phi Beta, and the local community.

In 1950 Syracuse University awarded her the George Arents Medal for excellence in devoted service to Alma Mater. This is awarded only to the most beloved alumni, who are outstanding in their individual fields of endeavor and service. Her citation mentioned that she graduated from the College of Liberal Arts in 1899. She is a member of the Eta Pi Upsilon honorary society Alumnæ Association. She was an early member of the Interfraternity Council, and a director of the Syracuse Alumni Association. She has served as Dean of the Women's Advisory Board, Vice President and Corresponding Secretary of the Alumni Association, National Vice Chairman of the Syracuse University Building and Development Fund, Honorary Chairman of the Women's Building Fund Campaign and member of the Policy Board of the Women's Building. Since 1940 she has been a trustee at large of the University and has been an active member of the Board, serving on various committees.

Her generosity of effort and devoted service has been augmented by substantial material gifts. Recently the large and beautiful Huntington B. Crouse residence was turned over to the University and is now used in its Chapel program.

Her Community service is dear to Mrs. Crouse's heart. She was an early board member of the Visiting Nurses Association. She recalled that a large cotillion was one of the early money raising events. There were parties too, for children and their parents, whom the nurses served. Mrs. Crouse has been a member of the board of Syracuse General Hospital, Harmony Circle, the board of Huntington Neighborhood Association and the Board of the Syracuse Corinthean Foundation. To Mrs. Crouse, being a board member means attending board meetings and working with industry and responsibility for the best interest of the organization. She says she has enjoyed her work on the board (of a certain organization) because frequent changes in membership have brought her in contact with many interesting people. Speakers at the meetings keep her informed of expanding community facilities and planning.

She has devoted much time and effort to the Huntington Neighborhood Association which was at first a club for working girls, and a living center for girls of various religious faiths who came to work in Syracuse. More recently this organization has pioneered in service to families and children, has maintained a Tot-Lot in summer, an out of city children's camp, and a group work project with older people in one of the

public housing centers.

To Gamma Phi Beta Mrs. Crouse has been and is, a loyal, generous and active member. The plot of ground, on which our chapter house stands, was a gift from Mr. and Mrs. Crouse. But she has endeared herself especially because of her gentleness, her modesty and her consuming interest in others. In spite of her activity in University and Community affairs, she has been a regular attendant at alumnæ meetings, has served as member and treasurer of the Corporation, and has been a personal friend to many alumnæ and active members of Gamma Phi Beta.

To Alpha she is in many ways a very special alumna, always endearing herself because of her graciousness and modesty; a great spirit; an inspiration to live truly, loyally and unselfishly.

DR. VIDA VOLKHARDT HONORED BY AAUW

Dr. Vida Redington Volkhardt, charter member of Eta chapter has added another honor to her glorious life. In her almost eighty years the list of her accomplishments grows ever longer and more interesting. The third AAUW International Study Grant named for Dr. Volkhardt was originated in 1945 as a means to aid in the further education of women from liberated countries. The study grants provide means to train them in the United States in order to help rebuild their nations and rekindle education as a basis for international accord. These funds are not necessarily used for advanced education (as are the National Fellowship Awards given to American women to study abroad). Economically speaking, the grants amount to over a million dollars.

It is no wonder that Dr. Volkhardt has been chosen for this honor. Her life reads like a compelling movie scenario. Dr. Volkhardt was born and went to school in Oakland, California. She lived near Dr. Aurelia Rhinehardt and knew her well. She attended the University of California where in her junior year she was the first woman to be president of a class at U.C.

Beth, with the able assistance of Jeanne, directs a staff of 25 graduate home economists located in four test kitchens throughout this country and Canada. But when Beth joined the company, she was the one and only "Martha Logan" working in one small test kitchen.

Activities of the Martha Logans include consumer meetings, radio and television appearances, letters, telephone inquiries, publications and labels, which help millions of women better to feed their families. Product research and testing recipe development, food photography and the preparation of recipe material for homemakers are other facets of the interesting work done by Swift's home economists, whose director and assistant both wear the crescent of Gamma Phi Beta.

She graduated with a B.S. in 1895. She went on to study medicine in a class where there were only three or four women. She received her M.D. in 1899. After a year's internship at Women's Hospital in Philadelphia she studied further at Johns Hopkins under such eminent medical men as Osler, Cushing and Halsted. In spite of ranking fourth in her class she found that the world was not yet ready to accept women in medicine. However she held the position of medical advisor at U.C. for one year. Soon after this she joined the Sierra Club and acted as its doctor. At one time the group scaled 13,000 foot Mt. Dana. Dr. Volkhardt also recalls with a twinkle a year spent in travel abroad which took her from Holland to Constantinople for only a thousand dollars!

In 1906 her father opened their home to care for victims of the great San Francisco earthquake. It was here that she met her late husband.

This accomplished and delightful Gamma Phi Beta has hobbies which range from quilting and gardening to Spike Jones on TV. Her enchanting gardens, they tell us, are enviable havens for a hundred and fifty varieties of fuschias and rare and beautiful African Iris.

CRESCENT AWARD WINNERS, SEATTLE

Gamma Phis have been leaders in Seattle's philanthropic, social and service organizations for more than fifty years. They've written books, painted pictures, have proved themselves leaders in the political world. But last year the alumnæ group decided that it was time they did something besides "point," to acknowledge the achievements of their Gamma Phi sisters.

So in 1955 a committe of three was appointed to select five Gamma Phi Betas of Seattle who during the preceding year had given outstanding community service, either locally or nationally. In 1955 the "Crescent Award" was given to this first five Gamma Phis for their outstanding accomplishments. Beatrice Gray Cook (Mrs. William) was selected because she is the author of "Til Fish Us Do Part," "More Fish to Fry," and "Truth is Stranger Than Fishin'" . . . all humorous accounts of her fishin' experiences in the Pacific Northwest. Helen Gorrill (Mrs. A. B.) was chosen because she is president of the Seattle Visiting Nurse Service, and Ruth Frye Osborne (Mrs. Albert) because she is president of the Seattle Music and Art Foundation. Emmy Hartman (Mrs. Harold) received her Crescent Award for her work as National President of the Campfire Girls. Janet Tourtellotte (Mrs. Neal) was selected because she is on the Republican National Committee and in 1955 was a member of an eight-woman mission sent by President Eisenhower to France and Italy to determine the advisability of bringing women leaders of those countries to the United States.

This year in May at the banquet honoring the 53rd anniversary of Lambda's founding, the "Crescent Awards" were given again, to three alumnæ. Virginia Gray Douglass (Mrs. A. W.) was chosen because she is all-city chairman of the Junior Orthopedic Guild Hospital Service. Seven years ago she started working with thirty teenage girls who gave goo hours of service to the Seattle Children's Orthopedic Hospital during their summer vacation and last year her group had increased to 195 girls donating 4,000 hours of their time. It is interesting to note that Virginia is the sister of Bea Cook, one of the first year's winners. Adelle Maxwell (Mrs. Willard) was honored for having been president of the Women's University Club for 1955-56. Janet Hartman Lawlor (Mrs. James) was selected because she has just been elected president of Seattle

PORTRAIT OF A PROPHECY— ANNDRE HOUSE, MILWAUKEE

When they named AnnDre Schlimgen "Artist of the Future" in 1948, the committee at the University of Wisconsin probably had no real concept of the scope of their prophecy. Many students are singled out for title-holding honors during their academic days, but few continue to develop those talents when they leave the ivy-covered halls.

Not so with AnnDre. She is still collecting honors as though they were flowers, and before long she will need another basket to hold them.

Music became part of her life when she was three; that's when she began to play the piano by ear. By the time she entered nursery school, she was singing a great deal more (and, it might be added, a great deal better) than children much older than she.

The daughter of a Gamma Phi Beta (Angela Sullivan Schlimgen, Wisconsin '18), AnnDre followed both parents' footsteps to the University of Wisconsin, where she majored in home economics and became a Gamma Phi herself. She was awarded a scholarship by the University Music Clinic for her outstanding ability as a pianist (she also plays the vibra-harp) and she started to sing in earnest. By the time she was graduated with honors in 1948, her beauty, charm and talents were becoming known beyond the confines of college life.

In 1950, AnnDre married Joseph P. House, Jr., a rising young Milwaukee patent attorney. They have two children—a boy, four, and a girl, two—who, of course, now have first claim on her time and attention. Finding extra hours for doing other things, however, is one of AnnDre's talents, too.

Last year, for example, she sang one of the lead roles in the Florentine Opera Company's production of "Hansel and Gretel"; she gave a concert (by invitation, incidentally) at the Milwaukee Art Institute; she starred in "The Bartered Bride," produced by the Waukesha (Wisconsin) Symphony Opera Guild; she was a winner of The Milwaukee Journal's Music Festival, in which several hundred women soloists competed.

Last year, for example, she sang one of the lead roles in the Florentine Opera Company's (Wisconsin), and loyal drives sponsored by M chapter.

Her most recent prair Nedda in "Pagliacci," Opera Company. "Not

AnnDre has also sung such roles as Micaela in "Carmen" and Susannah in "The Marriage of Figaro." Twice she was the semi-finalist at the five-state Regional Metropolitan Opera Auditions of the Air at Minneapolis. In addition to these time-consuming activities, she makes frequent television appearances, plays and sings for the Veterans' Hospital at Wood

(Wisconsin), and loyally lends her talents to fund-raising drives sponsored by Milwaukee's Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ chapter.

Her most recent praise-worthy effort was singing the role of Nedda in "Pagliacci," produced in April by the Florentine Opera Company. "Not only did she sing well," wrote one critic, "but she was confidently alive on the stage." That is a characteristic of AnnDre House. On stage and off, in public and in private, she has an enormous capacity for enjoying life.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY— MAUDE MCFIE BLOOM, ALBUQUERQUE

Fifty years a Gamma Phi Beta! That's what 1956 records for Maude McFie Bloom of Michigan U. chapter and the Albuquerque chapter.

Those fifty years have been packed with exciting, serviceable pioneering in the civic and cultural circles of New Mexico, and alumnæ members honored the record with a luncheon and recognition ceremony in Albuquerque in May.

Maude came to Las Cruces, in the New Mexico territory, in 1884. Her father, who

had been speaker of the house in Illinois, had decided to leave his law practice in Springfield and head for the unsettled territory where the settling of land grants and other thorny issues fairly shouted for legal attention.

Maude's Gamma Phi life began when she came up from the territory to the University of Michigan and was pledged at

Beta chapter in the fall of 1905, initiated the next spring.

After a year at Michigan, Maude went abroad with family friends and taught English in a school for girls near Paris.

Though her life is inextricably woven in with the growth of New Mexico and the continuing of her prominent father's many interests here, Maude has seen her share of the world.

That first trip abroad was the forerunner of three others and a life spent, paradoxically enough, in the struggling new western state or in cities and villages of Europe.

Her marriage to history student Lansing Bloom of Williams College and New Mexico A & M brought about the European trips when he became history professor at the University of New Mexico and conducted his research abroad and in old Mexico.

Since his death in 1946, Maude has kept her husband's works available and assists students and historians who come for reference.

A brand new activity for Maude this summer was the arrival of her first grandchild, at the home of son John who has accepted the chair of western history at Texas Western in El Paso. Her daughter, Carol, is employed at the state engineer's office in Santa Fe.

It's been an active, interesting, useful 50 years. Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ here and everywhere look forward to many more of the same for Maude McFie Bloom.

NATIONAL PANHELLENIC NEWS

Surveys can be interesting, revealing and challenging. Such is the survey of City Panhellenics based on biennial reports received this year. Though necessarily condensed, the following information can serve as a guidepost for Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ, whether you live in a big city where Panhellenic is a working reality, or in a small town where you might organize a Panhellenic even though there are no organized sorority alumnæ chapters. Just as an alumnæ chapter in your town can strengthen Gamma Phi Beta, so a Panhellenic group can strengthen the entire Fraternity system.

F THE 226 City Panhellenics to which we sent blanks for the biennial report only 152 returned them. (Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ participated in 119.) These reports show that 81,037 members are represented in these 152 groups. This seems like a large number until we realize that at the 1955 Conference the report showed that there were 815,696 members in the N.P.C. sororities. We hope this year to increase the number of City Panhellenics so that more than ten per cent of the sorority members are represented.

There are three main reasons for City Panhellenics, one being that they provide opportunities for increasing and renewing friendships. This privilege is especially welcomed by scattered alumnæ who are too few in number to have organized chapters of their respective sororities.

One sorority has suggested that each City Panhellenic add its name to the Welcome Wagon list. This would be a good way for sorority members to establish a Panhellenic contact in a new city.

The second reason is service and this topic has many phases. For one thing City Panhellenics offer a big service to sororities themselves through fraternity education and master files. In our survey we found that 128 groups have an annual program of fraternity education and 114 had master files. Every year one of the City Panhellenic bulletins presents new ideas on these topics.

Then there is service to the colleges. The report showed that 84 groups granted scholarships, a total in 1955-56 of \$36,991. Thirty-one groups have loan funds which total \$29,071. Awards in the form of trays, cups, money, etc., are given by 34 City Panhellenics.

Service to the community was reported by 92 chapters. These

interesting projects will be presented in the January bulletin.

Going back to our main reasons now we feel that City Panhellenics have wonderful opportunities to establish good public relations. Much can be accomplished when 800,000 college graduates work together. We have read a fine address, entitled "Attacks on the Fraternity World," given at a recent national sorority convention. Through publicity of its many civic and philanthropic activities, City Panhellenics can offer good counter attacks.

Some kind of publication is issued annually by 120 groups. Some of these are programs, others directories; some contain constitutions, officers' names, and committee chairmen's names.

To each alumnæ who is not in a City Panhellenic, we suggest that you do what you can in organizing one. Name of the City Panhellenics chairman may be obtained from your NPC delegate.

To each officer of a City Panhellenic we ask that you look for the September, January and April bulletins sent annually by this committee to each chapter on our roll. The bulletins are helpful because during the year each phase of City Panhellenic work is discussed. We know that the ideas presented are workable because they are taken from letters and reports sent by affiliated groups.

gardens at the back. The ceiling is covered with tiny mirrors. On the floor is a huge mattress covering the entire area. The guide told us that this is the room in which the family gathered once a week to worship money!

"Just outside Jaipur is Amber City and within its wall is Amber Palace. The path to this palace is fairly long and steep so elephants are provided. Atmosphere was intensified by two musicians, one playing drums and the other a stringed instrument as they walked beside the elephants. Since the palace is situated on a hill surrounded by other hills, there is a continuous breeze. They combined the breeze and a wall of water to cool the rooms inside. A door about 7 feet tall and 4 feet wide is silver, and has many beautiful panels. Each panel depicts a scene from Indian Mythology. A lovely carved screen (to hide the Moslem women in purdah) protects each of the windows.—"

But space and time each has its curfews so we must reluctantly end our Hotchner report and shall watch the mails eagerly for further adventures after their new assignment in January.

We counselors didn't feel capable of directing such activities at first, but I think we did well when actually handed the responsibility. The pre-camp training was essential. Mabel Pulliam carefully judged just how much help she should give us and how much she should let us rely on our own judgment. I think she is a fine director. From a counselor's point of view, camp was a wonderful experience. I met four wonderful Gamma Phis (aren't they all?) and I've never felt better physically in my life."

Jeanne Caldwell served at Indian Hills for the two weeks in June, then returned for the two weeks in July; she writes:

"It has been so wonderful to counsel at our camp, especially this second two weeks. Each week at camp is a new experience because no groups of campers are alike.

"This opportunity to be a counselor has certainly aided me in definitely trying to reach my goal of becoming a music teacher. After seeing the camp, I can now realize some of the things the camp needs which individual chapters could provide: bed sheets, brushes for sweeping, additions to the craft projects, T-shirts, etc."

Anne Olson (Nebraska), who counseled at Sechelt, writes: 'Words cannot express the enjoyment I had during my two weeks at Sechelt, counseling at our Gamma Phi camp.

"Those two weeks at camp helped me to realize all that Gamma Phi Beta means to me. Joanie Newton, one of the 14-year-old helpers, wrote to me last week and said 'You sure are lucky to be a Gamma Phi.' I know now how truthful this is.

"Since I'd never been in contact with underprivileged and neglected children, I learned much from them. Already I can see value in its relation with my child psychology and sociology courses.

"During the school year, I sometimes feel guilty of being so concerned with only my own personal needs. Even the studying one does is merely for his own benefit. It's really a marvelous feeling to bring happiness into young lives and aid in their grooming, talents, and general self-satisfaction."


