



The Convention Story

A Report of Gamma Phi Beta's 48th International Convention, Victoria, B.C., June 22-28, 1958

A TOMIC POWER may give every man on this earth a decent living. But there is still the need for gracious living. We must have imagination, knowledge, and moral and spiritual power to control the age in which we live!"

Thus were Gamma Phi Betas in convention assembled, challenged by Dr. R. Franklin Thompson, President of the College of Puget Sound in Tacoma. Dr. Thompson, in his address at the Opening banquet of the 48th convention, called upon educated women to grow bigger in understanding as the world grows smaller in this jet age.

Convention business filled each day, starting with a Parliamentary Procedure class each morning at 8:15, general sessions at 9:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M., with round tables, buzz sessions, and committee meetings squeezed into precious little spare time.

Cleverly planned luncheons and dinners gave delegates and guests an opportunity to visit a bit with old friends and find new ones. Unusual entertainment which was warmly received by stateside visitors to Victoria included bagpipe music and Highland dancers who performed at the Opening Banquet, sponsored by the Vancouver and Alpha Lambda chapters.

As convention week sped on, delegates were filling note-books with reports of Gamma Phi Beta's progress as summarized by the officers who served during the past biennium. At the Honors luncheon on Friday a standing ovation was given Lambda and Beta Omicron chapters which had received Chancellor E. O. Haven awards at three consecutive conventions for excellence in scholarship. Sally Hawkes of Lambda (U. of Washington) and Carol Hayward of Beta Omicron (Oklahoma City U.) went forward to receive their beautiful silver loving cups and the congratulations of the International Chairman of Scholarship, Miss Mary T. McGurley. Theta chapter at Denver University and Alpha Upsilon at Penn State were recipients of the Chancellor Haven Scholarship citation for the past biennium.

For their creative achievements and devoted service, three Gamma Phi Betas received the sorority's highest honor as their names were placed on the Honor Roll:

A chapter efficiency award, created by Grand Council, was announced and will be presented at the 1960 convention to that chapter judged to be the most efficient on the basis of reports to Central Office, reports to International Officers, Chapter Achievement and General Attitudes.

Day by Day in Victoria

Monday, June 23

N SPITE of a strike on the Ferry boat lines, Gamma Phis from the special train arrived safely in Victoria, thanks to the Vancouver and Seattle alumnæ who aided Central Office in arranging transportation to the Island. Registration over, the 48 special train travelers headed for the showers and then to the informal dinner sponsored by Chi, Salem and Corvallis chapters. Hardboard place mats at each place, stenciled with the Gamma Phi Beta coat of arms, were favors for the guests to take home, along with the menu printed on hardboard and a map of Oregon rolled as a scroll.

The Floral Fantasy Mixer, arranged by Nu and Eugene chapters followed dinner. Soft drinks were served in crested glasses which the guests could keep as souvenirs.

Tuesday, June 24

Judy Koonce Drowns In Rescue Attempt

Friends and sisters of Judy Koonce (Kent State '57) were shocked to learn of her untimely death July 17, as she made a gallant but unsuccessful attempt to save the life of an 11-year-old 4H camper.

Judy had been serving as a conservation instructor in Camp Clifton, Ohio operated by the 4H. The camper, Kyrleen Ruhl, lost her footing as the group hiked along the edge of the Clifton gorge of the Little Miami River. Judy ordered the other children in the group to go to the nearby main road, then ran to a lower point on the gorge and jumped 45 feet into the swift current to rescue the child. Two campers reported they heard splashing and shouts, and briefly saw two figures in the water.

A native of Cleveland, Judy had been an instructor in 4H camps for the past four years. She taught art and science in Eastmoor Junior High School at Columbus during the past year. She was to return to Kent State this fall to work for her master of arts degree.

Judy is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Koonce, and a brother, James Jr. to whom sincere sympathy is offered by her sisters in Gamma Phi Beta.

On Campus at Oregon State College

REGON State College is located in the heart of the Willamette Valley at Corvallis. The campus proper and adjoining farm lands total 4,000 acres. In addition, 24,000 acres of agricultural lands and 13,300 acres of forest lands in the State are used for research purposes.

In 1856, Corvallis established a community academy which, two years later, was incorporated as Corvallis college. During the first ten years after its incorporation, the college was maintained by the Methodist Church South. On October 27, 1868, Oregon began its support of public higher education when it designated Corvallis college "the agricultural college of the State of Oregon." On that date Oregon began making appropriations to its first state institution. In taking this action, the Oregon legislature accepted the provisions of the First Morrill Act which provided grants of land to be used by the states for the sole purpose of establishing publicly controlled colleges.

Even before the First Morrill Act, Oregon had made an attempt to establish a state university. In 1851 before statehood, the legislature of Oregon Territory designated Corvallis (then called Marysville) as the site of a new territorial university. Arrangements were made and building materials were assembled at the selected site. Before the construction began however, the legislature of 1855 changed the location of the university to Jacksonville and ordered the building materials

From 1868 to 1885 the Methodist Church South continued to support Corvallis college, receiving some appropriations for its maintenance from the state. In 1885, Oregon assumed complete control of the institution.

The curriculum of Corvallis college was typical of the liberal arts colleges of the day. It provided a classical course leading to the bachelor of arts degree and a scientific course leading to the bachelor of science degree. Under the impetus of the land-grant act, the college curriculum began to expand. In



1869 agriculture was added. It was conducted largely in the department of chemistry. Four professorships were established during the 1880's: commerce, household economy, agriculture, and engineering. These grew into departments and in 1908 were established as OSC's first four professional schools.

Today Oregon State consists of the Graduate School, the Lower Division (Liberal Arts and Sciences), the School of Science, the Division of Physical Education, the departments of Defense Education, and the professional schools of Agriculture, Business and Technology, Education, Engineering, Forestry, Home Economics, and Pharmacy.

Oregon State enrolls students from all states in the Union and from 35 foreign countries. Its 70,000 alumni are located in all parts of the country and of the world.

About Chi Chapter . . .

Gamma Phi Beta was the fifth sorority on the Oregon State College campus when Chi chapter was established on April 26, 1918. Earlier, in 1915, Beta Tau Beta with eleven charter members was organized in the women's dormitory for the purpose of petitioning Gamma Phi Beta. In 1917, the Student Affairs Committee granted permission to Beta Tau Beta to be called a local sorority and also gave permission for the group to move into their own home.

Then in 1918, after a visit from a national officer, a petition was sent to Gamma Phi Beta; finally in April of the same year, the charter was granted and Chi chapter was installed by Nu chapter in the Phi Delta Theta house.

Twenty-five girls made up the charter group and nine alumnæ of Beta Tau Beta were also initiated.

In 1920 Chi chapter purchased an old home for a chapter house. The present chapter house, completed in 1938, is built on the same ground.

Vivian Fox, first member of Chi chapter; May duBois, the head of home economics education at Oregon State; Judy Patterson, past president of Chi corporation; and Dorothy Schaefer Turner, a contributor to Oregon State College include some distinguished alumnæ of Chi chapter.

Corvallis Alumna Receives Honorary Doctorate

The Corvallis alumnæ chapter was very pleased and proud when one of its members received an honorary Doctorate. Mrs. Beth Bailey McLean (Iowa State '21) was awarded the honorary Doctor of Science degree at the Founders' Day Convocation at Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa. Dr. James Hilton, president of Iowa State College, presented the award to Mrs. McLean and 10 other outstanding members of their respective fields. This ceremony marked the 100th anniversary of the founding of Iowa State College.

Mrs. McLean, now teaching home economics courses at Oregon State College, is former Director of Home Economics for Swift and Company. As head "Martha Logan" for Swift, Mrs. McLean played an important role in relaying the needs of the consumer to her company for over

Mrs. McLean is also well known as the author of several books, including "Meal Planning and Table Service," "Modern Homemaker's Cook Book," "Martha Logan's Meat Cook Book," "The Complete Meat Cook Book," and "The Young Woman in Business."

Commemorating

The Prometheus of Jan Zach

N COMMEMORATION of the fiftieth anniversary of its founding at the University of Oregon, Nu chapter of Gamma Phi Beta sorority has presented to the university campus a contemporary sculpture of Prometheus, the Greek hero who stole fire from Zeus to give it to man.

Mrs. Leila Stafford, a charter member of Nu chapter presented the sculpture to President O. Meredith Wilson at a dedication ceremony that was held at the site on the northeast corner of the Museum of Art during Commencement Week, June 1958.

The gift was made possible by the generous donations from alumnæ and active members of Nu chapter as well as the hard work and planning of the Eugene alumnæ chapter.

The eight and a half foot sculpture, made of cast iron, brass and compound stone was created by Jan Zach, resident sculptor at the university. "My definition of Prometheus is an affirmation . . . he is the symbol of energy . . . a symbol of life

... because fire for man is the most important element in his life," Zach has said. In the sculpture, he portrays fire as a vital source leaping heavenward.

Zach, a native of Czechoslovakia, was trained at the Prague Academy of Fine Arts. In 1943 he held his first large exhibition in Brazil at the Museum of Fine Arts in Rio de Janeiro. He designed settings for the Ballet Valse Triste in São Paulo, and founded the Museum of Modern Art in Resende. In 1951 he went to Canada where he taught painting at Banff and began his own school in Victoria. In January 1958 he became the resident sculptor at the University of Oregon.

"Zach could not have done otherwise than he has with this theme" said Wallace S. Baldinger, director of the university's Museum of Art. "He sees fire as transfiguring mankind in a colossal struggle to control it. He sees it promising a richer and nobler existence if only that struggle succeeds, but bringing total destruction if that struggle fails."

DACOWITS Claims Three Gamma Phi Betas

Of the 45 women serving on the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services (DACOWITS for short!), three are prominent members of Gamma Phi Beta.

Janet Powell Tourtellotte of Seattle is chairman of the Organizations Sub-Committee; Dean Helen B. Schleman of Purdue University is chairman of the Professional Education Sub-Committee; Col. Harriet S. Lee is Chief of Army Medical Specialists Corps. Col. Lee has recently been honored by an appointment as member of the Committee of Prosthetics Education and Information of the Prosthetics Research Board, National Academy of Sciences, National Research Council.

Purposes of the DACOWITS, who are appointed by the Secretary of Defense, include: (1) to advise the Department of Defense on policies relating to Women in the Services, (2) to recommend measures to bring about a more effective utilization of the capacities of Women in the Services, (3) to recommend standards of the training, housing, health, recreation and general welfare of Women in the Services.

New Books by Gamma Phi Beta Authors

ONCE upon a time there were two little girls who tired of reading about the fabulous adventures of fictional children. To their mother they complained "Why doesn't anyone write stories about children like us; children who never do anything but have whooping cough shots and play at the Country Club?" Thus a new facet was added to an already sparkling personality. The little girls were Jean and Caroline Leinhauser and their mother was Ruth Daggett Leinhauser (U. of Iowa '25), newspaper woman, story teller and collector of dolls and antiques.

Since that day Ruth Daggett Leinhauser has written and sold 14 stories to Child Life and Jack and Jill, and has had published three books for children. Mrs. Leinhauser's primary interest in the field of writing is newspaper work; her first children's stories were written for the amusement of herself and her daughters with no thought of publication. Then a New York friend borrowed one of the manuscripts to read to her husband and gave it to a literary agent. Mrs. Leinhauser knew nothing of the plot until the agent wrote that the story had been sold. Her first book, "Patricia's Secret" (published by John C. Winston Co. in September, 1956), is the story of the daughter of an Air Force officer; it was chosen by the Union of English Speaking People to be sent abroad. Her second book, "A Holiday with Eric" (published by Ives Washburn, Inc. in April, 1957), is about two American sisters, Pam and Diane, and their young English cousin, Eric, who spend a summer with their grandmother in a small midwestern town. The book is dedicated to Mrs. Leinhauser's husband, Peter, and to her mother, Mrs. Wallace R. Daggett, who died in December of 1957. The third book, "Aunt Sharon's Wedding Day" will be published by Ives Washburn, Inc., this fall.

Mrs. Leinhauser was born in Ottumwa, Iowa, and has lived all but the first year of her life in the same house. That house, an impressive 11 rooms filled with antiques and a doll collection which dates back several generations, has provided background for more than one of her stories.

Mrs. Leinhauser was a member of Rho chapter of Gamma Phi Beta at the University of Iowa, and of Theta Sigma Phi, journalism sorority. She is a member of the Iowa Press Women's Association and is Ottumwa Correspondent for the Des Moines Register & Tribune. Her two daughters, Jean and Caroline, are grown and are themselves interested in writing: Jean is a journalism graduate of the University of Iowa and has done newspaper and magazine work, and Caroline has had some of her poetry published.

Of her stories Mrs. Leinhauser says, "Children love to laugh,

and they love to read about children like themselves with tempers and temperaments; so I try to make my book children just as much like real children as I possibly can, complete with faults as well as virtues. I don't try to educate children by means of the things I write, but I never write down to themby which I mean that I use a pretty adult vocabulary in the knowledge that children like words and like to add new ones to their own vocabularies.

"It's impossible for me to think of myself as a writer, and I don't take writing very seriously—just keep it as something with which to have fun. For the rest, it's hunting antiques and gardening; and the days and years are never long enough to permit me to do all the things I want to do."

Holly Wilson's Sixth Book To be Published this Month

The Hundred Steps by Holly Wilson is scheduled for publication by Julian Messner, Inc., New York, in September, 1958. It is the story of Marcy McKay, whose family have their roots in the Great Lakes region. Her father, a Lake Captain, comes from a long line of lake people, and they live on the shore of Lake Superior close to the water. Marcy is always comparing her way of life with the way of life of her high school friends who live in the Upper Town. The story revolves around Marcy's conflict against her own environment and her efforts to achieve a place for herself that is right for her.

The author, Holly Wilson, Beta, University of Michigan, was born in Duluth, Minnesota, and grew up in Northern Michigan on the shores of Lake Superior, where she played as a child and watched the great, red iron-ore boats sail in and out of Marquette harbor. She has lived in Minnesota, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Kansas, and now resides in Clifton Springs, New York, not far from Lake Ontario. Her husband, Frederic W. Retiring International Grand President, Grand Council



President's Page

The 1958 convention culminated my two terms as Grand President, and gave the opportunity for review of accomplishment during that period. It has been the chief aim of Grand Council to strengthen Gamma Phi Beta in four areas:

- (1) Correlation of manuals. A general revision of the Constitution, Bylaws and Standing Rules was followed by a general revision of the President's Book. Three manuals were revised: Alumnæ Advisory Committee Manual, Alumnæ Recommendations Committee Manual, Province Director's Manual. Two new manuals have been written: Traveling Secretary's Manual and Province Alumnæ Director's Manual. The Supervisor's Manual is being rewritten and enlarged in scope to become an Expansion Manual. Work has begun on a revision of the Pledge Manual. Because the writing and revising of manuals could no longer be handled by the Secretary-Treasurer, a Publications Chairman was appointed, whose duties include coordination and supervision of all publications of the sorority except The Crescent, keeping them up-to-date with changes in Constitution and Grand Council policies.
- (2) Supervision of chapters. Schools for Province Collegiate Directors have been strengthened, and similar schools for Province Alumnæ Directors have been instigated, thus providing for more effective supervision of chapters.
- (3) Expansion. The addition of eight Greek-letter chapters in four years brings our total to 66. Invitations to colonize this fall at West Virginia University and Gettysburg College have been accepted.
- (4) Central Office. The needs for personnel and salary increases presented at convention led to quick passage of the proposed increase in dues. This additional income will enable the Grand Council to take positive steps to increase the efficiency of the office.

Upon this basis of accomplishment the newly elected Grand Council will build. That the new Grand President is our beloved Betty Olsen, who has served three years on Grand Council, promises stability. Betty's record of devotion to the sorority leaves no doubt that she will set a standard for service that should lead the sorority to new heights of accomplishment.

It has been a joy for me to serve Gamma Phi Beta as Grand President. Now, as delegate to National Panhellenic Conference, my pleasure in supporting Betty Olsen as our new Grand President will be second only to the joy of continuing service to the sorority.

A Charter, the Crescent and the Golden Triangle

NA SMALL apartment in Pittsburgh one evening in 1936 a young bride and her husband sat at their kitchen table. Each had a cup of coffee, a pen, and a stack of postcards, and stretching between them was a fairly long list of names—the names and addresses of Gamma Phi Betas in the Pittsburgh area. The young woman was Peggy Jones Powers (Northwestern '33), and the cards she and husband were writing were invitations to the first meeting of Pittsburgh Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ.

This same alumnæ group was re-activated on April 26, 1958 after a long period of dormancy. The original charter (slightly used-looking and with a few smudges) was presented to the group on this occasion of their second official chartering, and some of the original members (not smudged at all) were on hand to accept it

When Peggy Powers called the first meeting, ten women responded and met together in her apartment. Peggy was elected president, and the group continued to function and become more active. On January 20, 1940, a charter from the national Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ organization was presented to the group.

Violet McElphatrick Frame (Wisconsin '33) and Frances Haller McConihay

(Ohio Wesleyan '38) were both active members during this period.

World War II saw a virtual disbanding of the active group. Members moved from the city as their husbands were transferred or joined the armed forces. Finally Frances McConihay was the only one left. Then she and her husband were transferred from Pittsburgh to Columbus, Ohio. Packed in the drawer of a lovely old desk was the Pittsburgh charter—and off it went to Columbus too. Pittsburgh Gamma Phis went off the map!

Frances finds Gamma Phis wherever she may be, and it didn't take her long to become a vital part of Columbus Gamma Phi activities. Shortly after the new chapter house at Ohio State was completed in January, 1956, Carol Ann Vlcheck—Gamma Phi travelling secretary—stopped in Columbus on a visit. She and Frances struck up a conversation, and talk soon turned to Pittsburgh.

"You know, the strangest thing has happened," Carol remarked. "No one

can find the Pittsburgh Alumnæ charter."

"Well, they just haven't been looking in the right place," Frances countered. "I have it home in my desk drawer."

And with this, the well-travelled charter was transferred

again-this time to the Central Office in Chicago.

Meanwhile, back in Pittsburgh the Gamma Phi spirit was beginning to take hold again. Some of the charter members had moved back to the industrial capital; new sisters had become Pittsburgh area residents. In the spring of 1955—thanks to the postcard writing of Betty Jean King Carbeau (Arizona

'49), Jean Kerth Hawks (Wisconsin '49), and Lillian Larson Schultz (Ohio Wesleyan and Michigan '47)—a group of Gamma Phis assembled at the Pittsburgh Athletic Association.

During the summer Grand President Elizabeth Fee Arnold stopped in Pittsburgh and spoke to the group, and by fall there were enough interested members to celebrate Founders' Day with a dessert meeting.

Thus the second charter alumnæ group was formed. Because of the crazy-quilt geography of the Pittsburgh area, two groups meet separately—one in the South Hills, one in the North. But they are joined together in one strong-again alumnæ organization.

The smudged charter holds a great deal of meaning for Pittsburgh Gamma Phis ("We tried to clean it up with art gum," Mrs. E. L. Hildebrand, national secretary-treasurer and former Pittsburgher wrote when she mailed the charter). A new certificate just would not have symbolized the comeback quality of Gamma Phi alumnæ.

The renaissance of Pittsburgh has become an example for the nation—a new city of aluminum, glass, and steel is rising from the near-slums of a smoke-blackened metropolis. In this setting Pittsburgh Gamma Phis hope to set an example for other areas where alumnæ have been inactive—a bright crescent is shining again over a new Pittsburgh.
