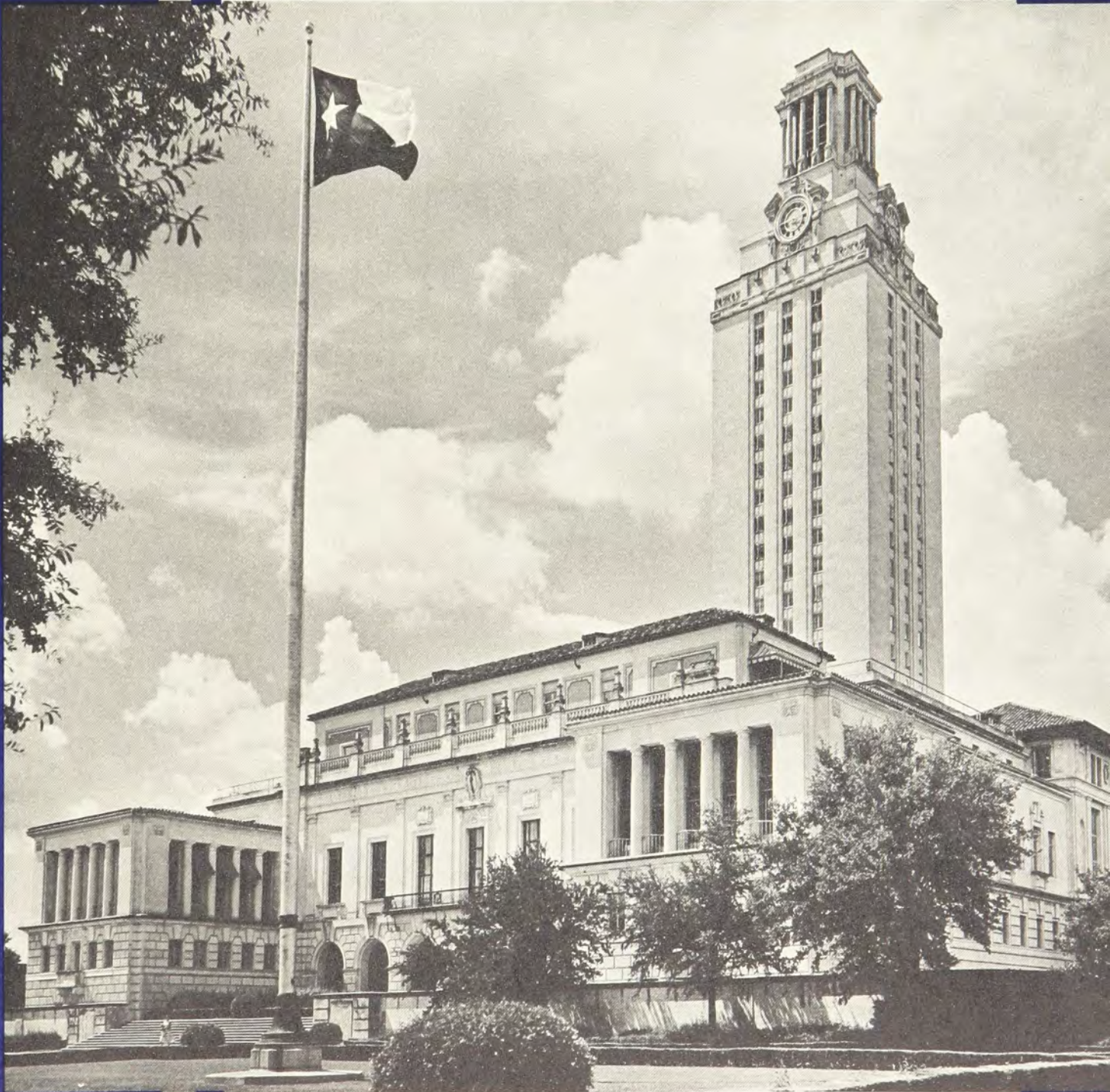

Sigma Nus at the University of Illinois teamed with Gamma Phi Betas to create this glamorous float which was named first prize winner in the Sheequeon parade.

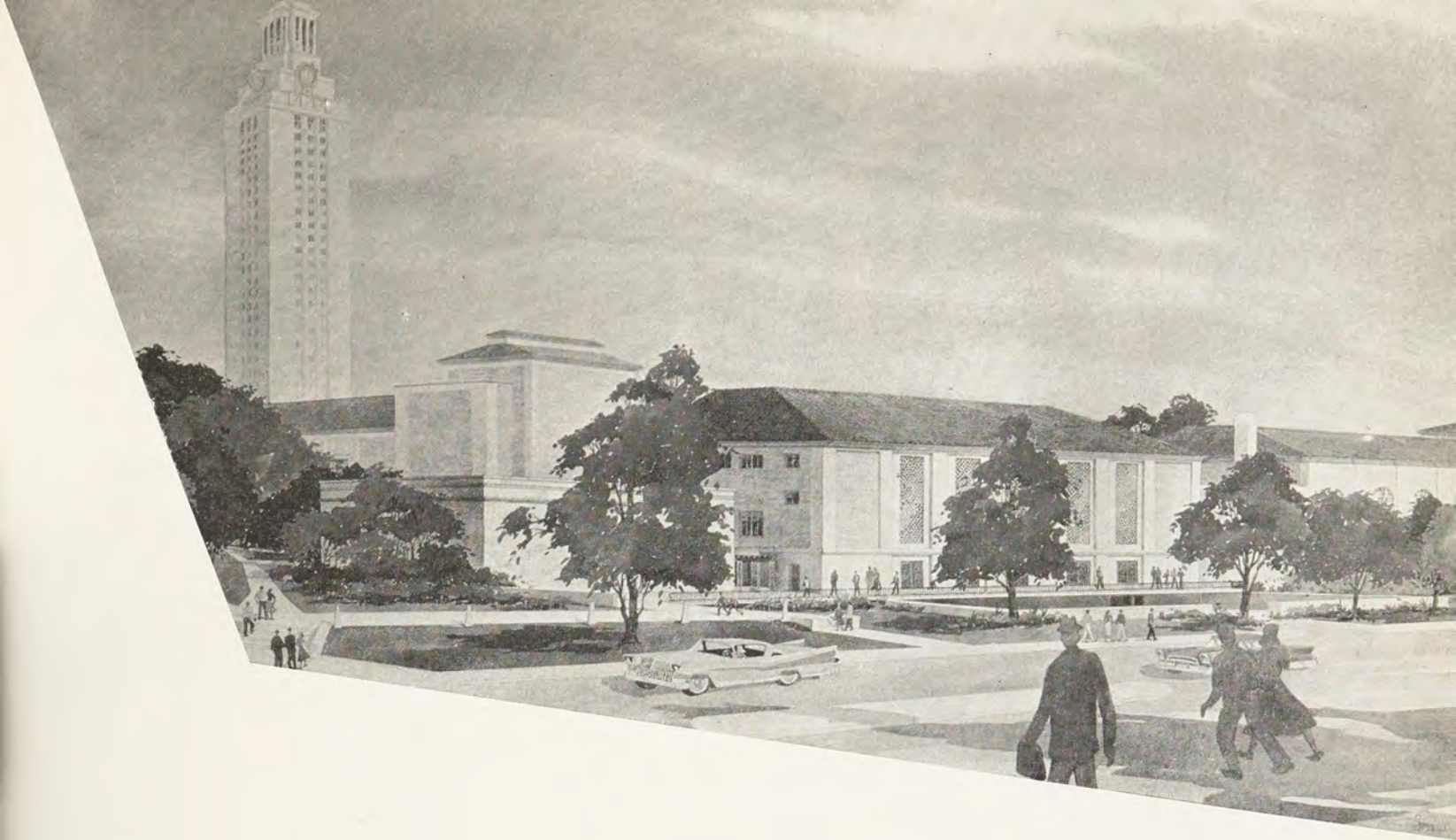

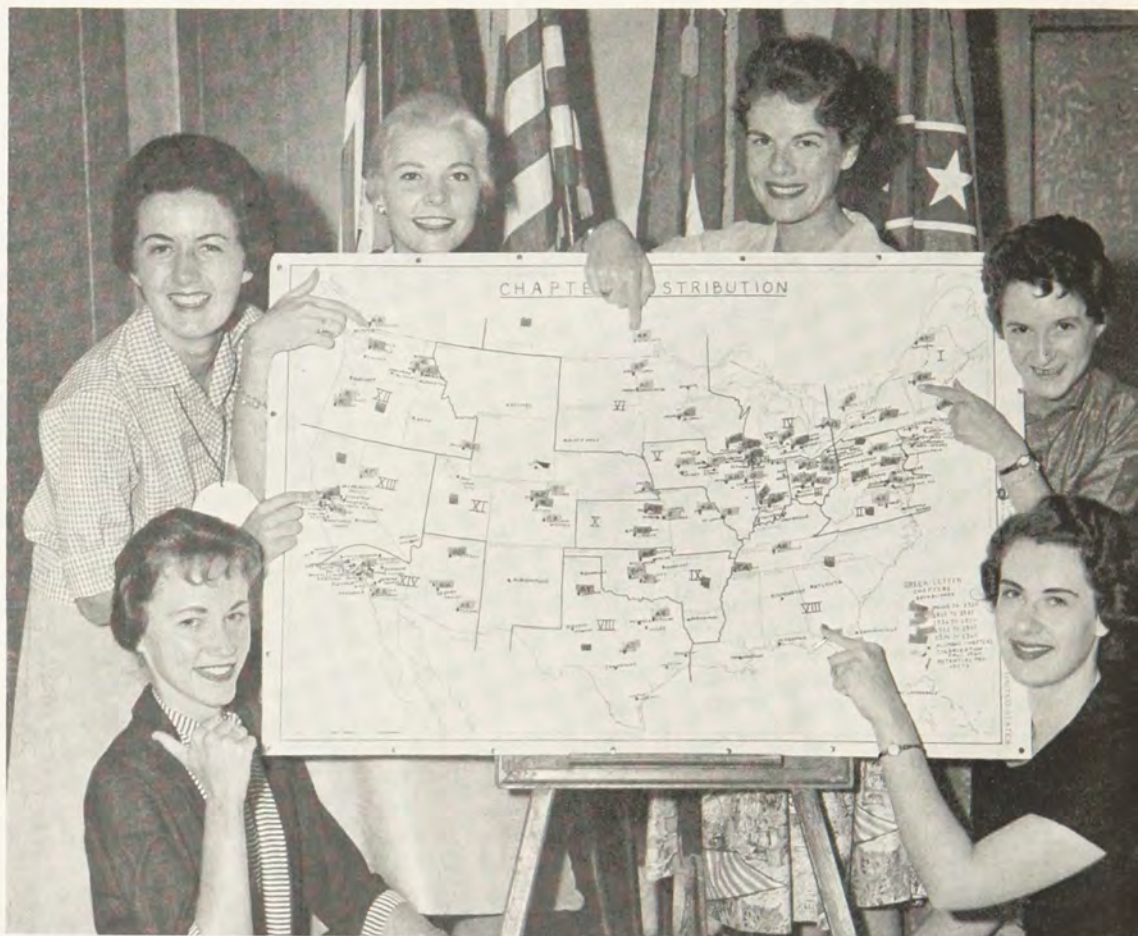

From the gracious Province hostesses to the newest hotel employee, everyone was intent on providing a warm and friendly welcome to the first convention ever held in the deep South. An aura of cordiality pervaded throughout the entire week, with business and social functions being conducted in smooth, unhurried fashion.

Parliamentary procedure classes were held each morning at 8:00 a.m., followed by general sessions, round tables, buzz sessions, and committee meetings.

Each cleverly planned luncheon and dinner, along with an excellent cuisine, made meal times an exciting event and a time for making new friends and visiting with old ones.

Day by Day at Convention

Monday, June 20

Arriving by bus at noon from New Orleans, Gamma Phi who had come by special train from Chicago filled the lobby of the Edgewater Gulf Hotel. Though the line looked long, delegates were quickly registered and whisked to their rooms for a shower and change before partaking of the delicious buffet luncheon.

Promptly at 2:00 p.m. the opening session of the 49th convention was called to order by Grand President Mrs. C. J. Olsen in the Garden Room, beautiful new convention hall of the Edgewater Gulf. The welcome to convention by Frances Lucas Nimkoff, Province VIII Alumnae Director, was followed by the introduction of officers and the message of the Grand President.

A formal reception at 5:00 p.m. found the Grand Council and honored guests receiving delegates and visitors to the convention. The opening banquet had as its theme, "By the Sea," and tables were beautifully decorated with driftwood, sea shells, and pink carnations. Hostesses were Fort Lauderdale, Miami and Jacksonville, Florida. Jean Ponsonby Traylor served as toastmistress and introduced Mr. Robert W. Tallman, keynote speaker, who came from California to present a clear picture of "What's Happening in California." His thought-provoking and challenging talk was well received by those who are geographically far removed from the west coast, but whose position as sorority members is threatened by recent developments in that area.

Province parties followed the dinner, where alumnae and collegiates had an opportunity to meet and chat with delegates and visitors from their own Provinces.

Tuesday, June 21

Morning round table discussions for Greek-letter delegates were led by Nan Gilkerson Blackwell on membership selection; Penelope Murdoch Simonson on our history; Ruth J. Wood on our Central Office. Alumnae met separately to discuss "Our Challenge in Rushing."

"Campus Originals" was the theme of luncheon, and 15 tables were arranged by various chapters depicting one of their rush parties. Following luncheon, a representative of each

Chapter round tables found the collegiates discussing standards, ritual, and scholarship, while alumnae met separately to review our challenges in support of Greek-letter chapters, in service to the community, and in membership growth.

"Ooh! That elegant southern fried chicken!" The buffet tables in the Magnolia Garden were piled high with chicken, ham, turkey, great bowls full of fresh shrimp, and all the other fixin's, as Gamma Phis were treated to the Edgewater's famous "Buffay Dinnah." Each guest donned a cotton picker's straw hat and red kerchief, souvenirs of this most sumptuous feast which was hosted by the Birmingham alumnae.

Evening fireside talks were given by Elizabeth Fee Arnold, Beatrice Hill Wittenberg, and Dorothy Stark Kenney, members of Grand Council.

Wednesday, June 22

"Pride in Progress" was the title of the second general session and reports were heard from Dorothy Stark Kenney, Director of Finance; Ruth J. Wood, Secretary-Treasurer; Mary

Following a report of the Resolutions Committee by Marguerite Streeter Hornung, chairman, an informal discussion of proposed revisions of Constitution, Bylaws and Standing Rules was held.

The Showboat luncheon, presented by Memphis State and Memphis alumnæ, was billed as the "New, wonderful River Revue . . . with singing, comedy, drama, dancing and refreshments!" Clever programs and three acts of Showboat Escapades by Memphis State collegiates gave delegates a refreshing break between sessions.

Reports of round tables and voting on revisions filled the afternoon general session. At five o'clock, Camp slides were shown by Alice Lehman, Camp Chairman.

Commemorating the invasion of Jose Gaspar and his pirate crew into Tampa harbor, Tampa Bay alumnæ presented the Gasparilla Banquet, with a clever skit, "Pirate Fantasy," by members of Alpha Mu chapter. A large treasure chest, bulging with jewels, adorned the head table, while each guest received a small treasure . . . handmade shell earrings. The Spanish menu left those of us who had chosen to study French in college waiting to see what we were to eat!

At 8:30 p.m. Beta Lambda chapter presented the model Pledge and Initiation service, under the direction of Mrs. Harvey K. Watt, International Chairman of Ritual, assisted by Mrs. Marius Lindloff. Bonnie Meacham of Vanderbilt University was the honor initiate who enjoyed the distinct privilege of receiving her badge from the Grand President, Mrs. C. J. Olsen.

Thursday, June 23

A solemn and beautiful Memorial Service was conducted in the morning by Mrs. Watt, with Sally Gray Cass as Reader. Alpha Theta chapter members Nancy Hunt, Gale Castleberry, and Peggy Campbell participated in the ritual.

The fourth general session included reports from the Endowment-Crescent Board, the Magazine chairman, the Special Committee on Gifts, and the Resolutions Committee. Ruby McMurtry Foster then gave the report of the Nominating Committee.

A gay "Kentucky Derby" luncheon was staged by Louisville alumnæ, with Jeanne Clark as toastmistress. Table decorations were horse statues with the traditional horseshoe of flowers,

Friday, June 24

Reports of the Philanthropy Board, the Camp Chairman and the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation comprised the fifth general session, with a final report of the Resolutions Committee.

At the Honors luncheon, planned by Alpha Theta and Nashville alumnae, Louise McMurtry Payne served as toastmistress. Members of honorary societies were recognized and the following awards were made: Chancellor E. O. Haven Scholarship awards to Omicron, 1st quartile in 28, and to Alpha Kappa, 1st in seven. Honorable mention went to Beta Omicron, Alpha Mu, Theta and Alpha Iota.

Scrapbook awards to Beta Nu, first; Beta Psi, second; Gamma Beta pledge class, third; Alpha Epsilon, fourth.

Chapter Newsletter awards to Toledo, first; Dallas, second; San Diego, third.

Magazine awards to St. Louis alumnae and Alpha Theta for largest dollar production; to Beverly Hills-Westwood alumnae and Beta Omega for largest dollar increase; to Chicago alumnae and Gamma Beta for greatest subscription production.

Alumnae chapter awards to Pittsburgh for a 500 per cent increase in membership; to Minneapolis-St. Paul for largest membership.

Chapter Efficiency award, given for the first time, to Beta Phi.

Standards awards, given for the first time, to Gamma Beta, Alpha Delta, and Alpha Upsilon.

At the sixth and final meeting, the Honor Roll Committee reported two additions to the Honor Roll, Lois McBride Dehn and Elsie Frisbie Norman.

Seven Gamma Phi Betas were named for the Service Roll: Helen Douglas Brazil, Eleanor Garm Hemminger, Eleanor Luse, Helen Hoffman Pence, Gwen Boulden Riggs, Marjorie Koppe, and Elsie Frisbie Norman. Reports of the Credential and Courtesy Resolutions Committees were followed by the election of officers with a unanimous vote for the slate presented by the Nominating Committee. Reading of the Scriptures by Mrs. C. J. Olsen brought to a close the business sessions of the 49th convention.

Rush Party Idea Exchange

From Northwestern University

The Bowery party at Epsilon chapter is staged in the recreation room, with the only light coming from candles in bottles placed on the TV tables which have red and white checked tablecloths. Tables are placed around stage area where a variety show is staged, complete with a home talent combo. During intermission black cows are served in beer mugs, borrowed from the fraternities. The refreshments are prepared at a bar, presided over by a German bar maid. Name tags are beer mugs made of brown construction paper with cotton used as foam.

Oriental Theme at William and Mary

Teahouse of the Crescent Moon is a theme used by many chapters, each with variations. Alpha Chi chapter decorates the house in an Oriental manner, with rice paper prints and other Japanese designs on the walls, while the ceilings are covered with cherry blossoms made of bits of tissue pasted on dried twigs. Rushees are seated at low tables on Oriental cushions and served refreshments of tea and fortune cookies by the Gamma Phis who are dressed in kimonos. Name tags are oriental faces made of red and yellow paste paper with yarn pigtailed. Favors are Japanese lanterns, figurines, or laundry bags shaped like the name tags.

An interpretive dance with background music from "Madam Butterfly" and a narration make this one of the more impressive occasions during rush. In addition to the interior decorations, the front lawn is strung with lighted lanterns and a large pagoda is built over the gateway. On the front porch is a fountain and wishing pool, along with a bamboo fountain and a four foot gold Buddha.

Penthouse Party at Indiana University

Beta Pi chapter entertains at a Penthouse party, complete with band, mood dancers, a chorus, and a torch singer. As the rushees enter, the hostess welcomes them and introduces the mood dancers, one dressed as a boy and the other as a Paris woman. The chorus, dressed in cocktail dresses, sings "Lullaby of Broadway" and the torch singer does the finale, dressed in a tight sheath, opera hose, dangling rhinestone earrings, long black gloves and ostrich feather fan. (On the back of her fan are the words to her song, just in case!)

Refreshments are mock cocktails, served in regular cocktail glasses and prepared from colored gingerale, with olives, cherries, or orange slices added. Name tags are Martini glasses made of construction paper, sprinkled with glitter, with a glittered toothpick attached. Names are printed in white or gold ink.

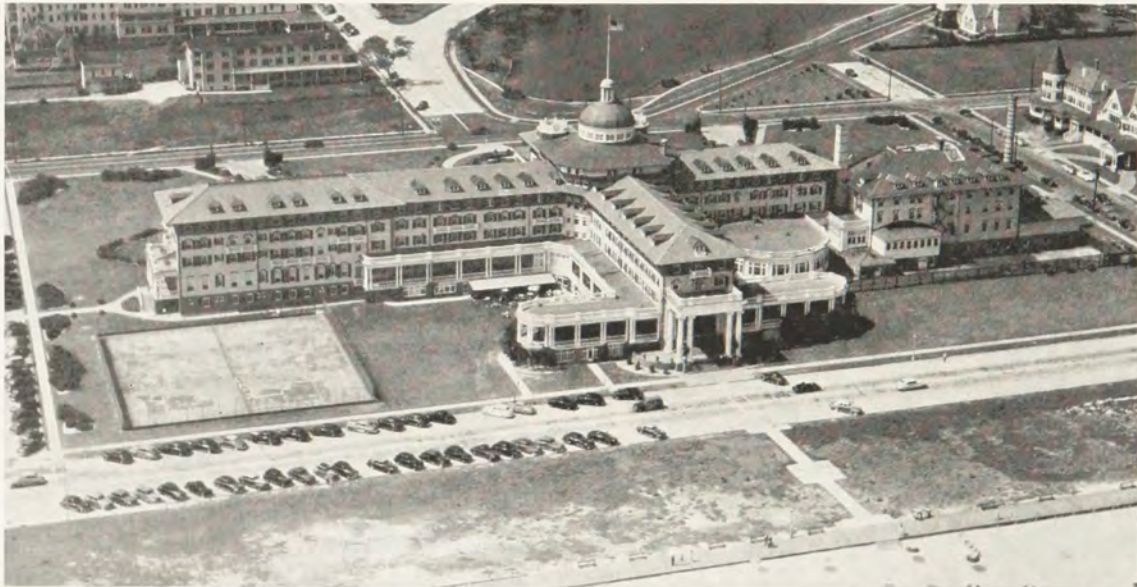

Fiftieth Convention will meet here in 1962



GAMMA PHI BETAS are still talking about . . . the fear-some pirates they met at a Gasparilla party . . . the gaiety of Mardi Gras . . . and all the other exciting activities that marked our 1960 convention at the Edgewater Gulf Hotel. TV's College Bowl . . . Tough—Tense—Terrific!

RUTH ROACH, author of this article is a member of Lambda chapter at the University of Washington. Taking only three years to finish a four year bachelor's curriculum in history, Ruth attained a 3.993 grade point on the 4.0 scale. This fall she is beginning graduate work in Renaissance history at the University of California under a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship. Ruth's undergraduate career was one of outstanding service to Washington. She was secretary of her sophomore class at the University, president of Sigma Epsilon Sigma, underclasswomen's scholastic honorary, and a member of Mortar Board, Totem Club, Phi Beta Kappa, and Delta Phi Alpha. Although it is apparent that her collegiate career has been studded with honors, one of Ruth's most exciting experiences came last spring when she was selected as the only girl member of the team which Washington sent to General Electric's "College Bowl" television program.

At the outset of this spring quarter, seven other students of the University of Washington and I received notice to appear at the campus' Drama-T.V. building Thursday evening, March 31 for a mock-up session of the G.E. College Bowl. This was the first of a number of similar exciting but rather nerve-racking quizzes testing fast recall. On the basis of that evening's performance, a panel of judges selected Patrick Gleason, an English major, Peter Roosen-Runge and Bill Faris, both majoring in mathematics, and myself, a history major, to represent the University on the April 17 telecasting of General Electric's quiz show—*College Bowl*. Professor Moore of the music department and his wife were elected to accompany us as coaches and chaperones.

Since the studio would be closed on April 17 due to its being Easter Sunday, our show was taped Monday, April 11, a week early. We had plane reservations to depart from Seattle-Tacoma Airport at 8 a.m. Friday, April 8. That left us barely more than a week before departure to cram into our heads some information from those areas in which we were particularly weak.

In New York City, we roomed at the Biltmore. We played tourist all Saturday—rode the bus along Central Park, descended the sloping ramp of the Guggenheim Museum, and feasted our eyes on the Museum of Modern Art's dazzling array of Picassos, Monets, Dalis, Braques. Saturday evening, we had choice seats for "Thurber's Carnival."

Sunday at the CBS studio we had our first introduction to "dry runs" and "take it from the tops." We could afford to be at relative ease as we watched the practice sessions of N.Y.U. against Colgate. By the outcome of Sunday's actual show, we knew we could be pitting our wits against the four boys from Colgate on the following day. That evening we went out on the town with three of the Colgate contestants, all extremely congenial, entertaining chaps.

Monday we rose late. Some of us had difficulty breakfasting. We took a taxi to the studio. The afternoon was devoted to grueling, tension-provoking dry runs. Allen Ludden, quiz master, and his assistant Don Morrow, shot "toss up" and bonus questions at us for approximately three hours. I never would have thought that I could be so terrified by anything so neutral as a buzzer. Every time, my hand trembled as it reached to press down the formidable little button; and every time the buzzer clanged, I jumped in fright. Eventually the conditioned response was established—listen to the question, concentrate hard, press the buzzer fast if you have the answer, wait to be recognized, and then shout out the answer in clear audible tones. We were slaughtered rather unmercifully during the practice runs and when it came time for the actual taping, we were fairly well intimidated. The approximately twenty minutes of actual playing time passed rapidly. The tension relieved, we were amazed we had done as well as we had, the final score being Colgate 225 and U. of W. 150. We congratulated our opponents, said our good-byes to the studio personnel and our farewells to New York.

On the plane trip home, we gradually awoke to the fact that our TV days were over and the neglected studies lay waiting. During the four short days, we four contestants, some of us before total strangers, had established a close relationship. We all agreed we were indeed grateful to General Electric for a three-day fling in New York and the excitement of being on College Bowl.

Honors These Accomplished Gamma Phi Betas

Home Economist

"Who's Who of American Women" lists our Lora Stone (Mrs. Walter Graul) as a young woman of exceeding accomplishments. Since 1941 when she served as Alpha Eta (Ohio Wesleyan) chapter president, her Dietetics major has served to advance her in many outstanding directions.

Following graduation she did internship in Dietetics at Barnes Hospital in St. Louis. In the fall of 1942, she married Walter P.

Graul who was then a medical intern (and is now an orthopedic surgeon). During her husband's internship she worked as a dietitian at Lutheran Hospital in St. Louis. When he went into the armed forces Lora returned to her studies. She earned her MS degree in foods and nutrition and a minor in journalism at Iowa State College (now Iowa State University) at Ames.

After the war Lora and her husband moved to New York City. There she began work in the Public Affairs Department of the National Broadcasting Company where she did research for a radio show called "Home is What You Make It." It was an exciting job which included work with the script writer and producer. Along with this work Lora also found time to teach nutrition classes for the Red Cross and to teach cooking to boys and girls in an East Side Settlement House. Besides all this there were free-lance writing assignments to keep her busy.

The next move was to Philadelphia where for a time Lora was Home Economics director for an advertising agency and then within three years became associate editor of *Country Gentleman*, a Curtis Publishing Company Magazine which has since been sold to *Farm Journal*. In 1951 the Grauls moved to St. Louis where Dr. Graul began practice and Lora was soon at work part time as the only woman field editor for *Country Gentleman*, and part time as a consultant in home economics in the St. Louis area. When *Country Gentleman* was sold, Lora became field editor for *Farm Journal*, and her consulting services have expanded to the point where she employs assistants.

Her vast talents and numerous first-hand experiences have of course led Lora into the fields of food photography and TV Commercials. The photography ranges from simple black and white reproductions to color photography for point-of-purchase material: food packages, advertisements, menu covers and other exciting media. This work also entails a considerable amount of product-development; recipe testing and developing, food publicity and package directions and recipe booklets.

Lora does not do the actual photography but instead arranges the artistic assortments we see everyday in all the advertising spheres. Among her accounts are 7-Up, Anheuser Busch, Funsten, Golden Dipt, Ralston Purina, and Pet Milk. Some of her clients are regular retainers. Others come for individual pieces of work. The newest and most exciting account, according to Lora, is the National Peach Council. We are proud to introduce you to Lora Stone, Gamma Phi Beta supreme.

DR. ELEANOR LUSE
Professor of Speech

When one considers the enormity of the figures of female population in relation to the actual hand-size count of the names in Who's Who Among American Women, Gamma Phi Beta can rise very proudly indeed.

It is repeatedly a thrill for me to introduce to you out there these outstanding American Women. I feel over and over that there will not come again into my mail a biography quite comparable to those stories already told but, of course, I am wrong. Such a newcomer to my attention is the story of Dr. Eleanor Luse; lovely, accomplished, achieving professor of speech at the University of Vermont.

Dr. Luse took over as president of the Speech Association of the Eastern States on April 8, 1960 at the 51st annual meeting of the group in New York City. She has served as first vice president of the association for the past year, and was responsible for the development of a major portion of this year's convention program. The association with nearly 3,000 members in 13 states and the District of Columbia, is the oldest speech association in the United States.

Miss Luse, who holds the B.S., M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from Northwestern University, joined the UVM faculty in 1947. She founded the University speech clinic, and for the past three years has been engaged in research under grants from the U.S. Public Health Service and the Vermont Cancer Society, investigating cancer of the larynx. Her thrilling work in this field teaches speech-abilities to patients who have undergone laryngectomies and are able to master their difficulty to the unbelievable point where disability is almost undetectable. In some cases even singing is not improbable.

Dr. Luse has served on a number of University Senate Committees, including the adult education committee, the student advisory committee, and the museum committee, and has also been a member of the College of Arts and Sciences curriculum and studies committees. She is also a past president of the University Club.

Active in speech work on local, regional and national levels, Dr. Luse is a member of the Vermont Speech and Hearing

"Anything you can do, I can do too," might have been the slogan behind Susie Kolasa's efforts during the past four years. On June 5 she proved her point by stepping up with her husband when both received law degrees from Duquesne University in Pittsburgh.

Susanne Hubbell Kolasa (Ohio Wesleyan '56) hadn't planned to study law when she majored in political science as an undergraduate. Then she met Dr. Blair J. Kolasa, associate professor of psychology at Duquesne. They decided that they wanted to be together not only at home as man and wife but also at school as law degree candidates. And so they began a four year study stint which ended in twin LL.B.'s.

The only woman graduate of the law school in the 1960 class, Susie proved her ability and popularity by being elected secretary of the senior class.

"Even our little girl fit herself nicely into our plans," Susie explained. "She was born two weeks after finals were over last summer."

Neither of the Kolosas plans to practice law immediately. Dr. Kolasa will continue with his teaching. Susie finds that the care of their year-old daughter and their Mt. Washington home overlooking Pittsburgh's Golden Triangle is enough to keep her busy at present.

"When I do go into practice it will be something I can do at home—probably property law or wills and taxes."

An active member of the Pittsburgh alumnae group, Susie has found her participation in group functions somewhat difficult because she has never learned to drive.

"Isn't that ridiculous?" she exclaimed. "Here I am with an LL.B., and I can't even pass a driver's test. As soon as we take

the bar exams I'm going to round out my education by going to driver's school."

When asked if she had any advice for undergraduates considering law school, Susie thought a minute. Then, recalling her past four years as one of a handful of women among a schoolful of men, she suggested, "Well, going to law school is a wonderful way to meet a husband!"

Just call me "Ensign"



Receiving a Naval commission at Wisconsin is not an unusual thing—for a boy. But Gamma chapter's Gay Rost broke years of tradition in the Wisconsin Advanced Naval Corps when she became the very first woman at Wisconsin eligible to bear the title "Ensign."

Awarded her commission at the June graduation exercises, Gay marched proudly beside her male cohorts and repeated the oath right along with the rest of them.

Now a Navy nurse, Gay spent her school days wisely. Besides her military training, she was a member of Alpha Tau Delta, a nursing sorority, and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi, national honorary.

LAST YEAR when Florence McKay Nichol won a Freedom's Foundation Award as one of the country's outstanding teachers, refugees from Cuba's Batista were flooding her classes for the foreign-born. This year when she was chosen as Florida's Teacher-Of-The-Year, the refugees were fleeing from Castro. It makes no difference to Florence. Her aim is to love each one of her students and teach him to love the United States. Recognition of her success has come from varied sources, ranging from Mayor Robert King High of Miami who attended one of her parties for her students, to representatives from the Cuban Consulate.

Possibly no one has expressed her dedication to her children as well as has her pastor who writes "The Statue of Liberty stands a beacon of hope and freedom in the New York harbor. Twelve hundred miles to the south in the City of Miami, there is another beacon of freedom and liberty held high by a teacher at Citrus Grove Junior High School. . . . Her greatest contribution has been her demonstration to the entire faculty and student body of her school of the love that Americans must have for those 'huddled masses yearning to breathe free'."

One of her students expressed it this way. "When you must live in a strange land where you don't know the language, the customs, or the people, it is wonderful to find you already have a friend. Mrs. Nichol is our friend and that is why we call her 'Tia' or 'aunt'." Her nickname is so well-known that it even made the headlines in the following feature story reprinted from the Miami Daily News and written by Connie Gee.

"Tia" Nichol Is "A Plus" Teacher

"'Tia' won an Oscar! . . . 'Tia' won an Oscar!"

"Tia" is sandy-haired, beloved Mrs. John G. (Florence) Nichol, teacher at Citrus Grove Junior High School. She is Florida's choice of outstanding teacher for the year and the entire school is in an uproar because of it, from Principal James B. Gwin on down to the youngest pupil.

The "Oscar" was presented to Mrs. Nichol at the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs Convention "Honor Bright Awards" luncheon by Mrs. Karl K. King, Tampa, chairman. The Federation contest was promoted by the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Nichol now becomes a candidate for the National "Oscar for Teachers Award" to be presented by GFWC at the national convention in Washington.

The unanimous choice of Mrs. Nichol was made by the judges because of her work as an educator, her contributions to the citizenship of the foreign-born, her success in cutting down illiteracy, and her great contribution to Inter-American understanding. She is a winner of a Freedom's Foundation Award.

Mrs. Nichol is what her principal calls "a dedicated teacher." Although she has no children of her own, she has an affinity for other people's children that has made her popular throughout her years of teaching at Citrus Grove Junior High.

That's why the Latin American children honored her with the familiar name of "Tia" which in Spanish means "aunt."

This Outstanding Teacher of Florida has two regular first-year Spanish classes. Her pupils have occasional suppers for which Spanish recipes are used, with help of Latin American parents.

The Teacher also conducts a day in class when Spanish children may speak only English and one when English-speaking children may speak only Spanish.

Mrs. Nichol is a member of the school staff, also an advisor in guidance-counseling for non-English-speaking children, of whom there are many at Citrus Grove. She visits them at their homes to do this.

She encourages parents to join and become active in the PTA. She and the school PTA sponsored a successful reunion of non-English-speaking parents that drew out 87 fathers and mothers, including a member of the Consular Corps.

"She's on Cloud Nine," said Mr. Gwin, prior to departure for the Awards luncheon with Mrs. Nichol, who was wearing an orchid given her by the school paper, "The Grovelite."

Mrs. Nichol and her husband (Nick) live at 1310 Ferdinand Street, Coral Gables. They travel in Latin America frequently and study Spanish culture.

Mrs. Nichol is a member of a distinguished teaching family. Her father, Glenn McKay, taught on the faculty of Miami Edison High School for many years. Mrs. Nichol's teaching career has extended over 30 years, most of which has been at Citrus Grove.

First Lady of the Tournament of Roses

New Years day is always a big day for everyone the world over, but it is particularly important to people in Pasadena, California because of the internationally famous Tournament of Roses. While over eighty million viewed the 1960 parade on Television and an additional one and a half million lined the streets of Pasadena, the day held additional interest to Gamma Phi Betas, as the First Lady of the Tournament of Roses was Thuel Ross Dorn, whose husband, Raymond A. Dorn, was the president of the 71st Tournament. Thuel and Ray rode in an open car which was covered with 5,000 red roses. They were accompanied by their daughter, Andrea, a junior at Westridge School in Pasadena, and driven by their son, Gary, a junior at Stanford University. President Dorn wore the traditional white suit, white hat and red tie, associated with the Tournament officials. Mrs. Dorn wore a lovely white jersey suit, white flannel coat and a white fur felt hat.

The Pasadena Tournament of Roses is a big undertaking, requiring a whole year of preparation with about 40,000 man hours of work, all of which are donated. There are many preliminary preparations during the year, leading up to the choosing of the Queen and her court, the Parade which is made up of sixty floats decorated in real flowers, twenty bands and about 200 horses with millions worth of saddles and trappings, and last but not least, the famous Rose Bowl football game.

One does not become President of the Tournament of Roses without many previous years of work. Mr. Dorn's record has been one of service during the twenty three years that he has been a member, first in committee work, eventually becoming a member of the ten-man Executive Board and then the top position. He was the first Native son to head the Tournament Association. Even as a boy in elementary school he helped with the decoration of floats, and marched in the parade.

Mrs. Dorn, though born in Wyoming, has been in California long enough to be considered a native daughter. She was raised in Long Beach and attended University of California at Los Angeles, where she was a member of Alpha Iota chapter of Gamma Phi Beta. Through the years by her husband's side,

There is no Women's Auxiliary of the Tournament Association, but many of the wives do their share of helping, led by the President's wife, who plays a very important and necessary part. She attends most all functions, as well as having to arrange and hostess many large and small affairs, even to purchasing and wrapping gifts for the members of the two participating football teams.

The Dorn's year started with a good will trip as representatives of the Tournament Association to many cities across the United States, that enter floats and bands in the New Years Day parade. All Year the President and his wife attended many local and surrounding cities' civic affairs. Late in November the first major affair was the selection of the Queen of the Tournament of Roses and her Court. From then through New Years Day, Thuel's calendar was a full one, what with breakfasts, dinners and luncheons and teas, receptions and cocktail parties, to say nothing of the Royal Ball and Coronation Ball, and the Christmas parties for the football teams.

Thuel enjoyed her year as First Lady and has many wonderful memories but there were two highlights for her. First was the gift by P. K. Wrigley and other members of the family of the fabulous Wrigley Mansion to the City of Pasadena and the Tournament of Roses. The house will become the permanent home of the Tournament Association. It was used for much of the entertaining and the largest reception the Tournament has ever given was held at the Wrigley home for Vice President Richard Nixon, who was Grand Marshal of the 1960 Parade.

The second highlight for Thuel was meeting and getting to know Vice-President Richard Nixon and his wife and daughters. Thuel hosted a luncheon for Mrs. Nixon the day before New Years and Ray and Thuel had the whole Nixon family as their personal guests on New Years Eve.

The year ended for the Dorns with a beautiful January 1, 1960, the usual wonderful parade and an outstanding football game between the University of Washington and the University of Wisconsin, with a well earned win for the West.

"It is a pleasure to write to you about Janet Tinker, to whom the \$250 Gamma Phi Beta scholarship has meant so much.

"Tink is from Belgrade Lakes, Maine and is a junior in the Medical Technology Curriculum. She has worked in the college dining room, libraries, or as a lab assistant whenever her class schedule and academic load has permitted, to help finance her college expenses.

"Meanwhile, she has been a consistently contributing citizen in various campus groups and has served in many capacities with the Women's Recreation Association and Women's Student Government.

"We consider Janet Tinker to be one of our finest women citizens and believe the trustees of Gamma Phi Beta Foundation, Inc., can feel assured she is a very worthy recipient of their award. We of the University are most grateful to the Foundation for granting this scholarship to a University of Vermont student."

Discovery of Oil on the Campus Sparked Growth of the University of Texas

The University of Texas was formally opened on September 15, 1883, although a bill for the state university had been introduced as early as 1838. In 1923 the discovery of oil at a wildcat location on University property added to the school's funds and sparked its eventual growth and expansion. Approximately 16,000 students now study at the University. There are eighteen sororities and thirty-one fraternities on the University of Texas campus.

Within the past twenty-five years more than thirty permanent buildings have been added to the main campus. Today more than \$58,000,000 worth of buildings have been either completed or authorized for construction, and the University of Texas System has become the fourth largest in the nation. One of the new buildings now under construction is the Texas Union, which offers guidance and information to students through the medium of various extracurricular activities. Included in the building will be a cafeteria, bowling alley, craft shop, art gallery, and browsing library. Plans for construction include a new art building, drama building, and engineering buildings.

Alpha Zeta chapter was founded on May 9, 1922, after a social club of young women had petitioned Gamma Phi Beta for a charter. Members of Psi chapter from Oklahoma acted as installing officers for the fourteen initiates.

Along about the first of April each year, the University knocks the dust off its western clothes, digs out its Stetson hat, and wades into the biggest activity of the year—Round-Up. The Texas Relays, bringing top track stars from all over the country, kick off the big week which features barbecues, a rodeo put on by the Charros Club in their own arena, dances of all types but mainly with a western flavor, Honors Day, and many other activities, climaxed by the Revue and Ball, where the Blue-bonnet Belle finalists are presented and the new Sweet-heart of the University is crowned.

The University Tower is the most widely recognized symbol of the University of Texas. The Tower is bathed in the lights of the school colors, orange and white, following a football victory or other outstanding athletic achievement, graduation, and holidays. The Tower is completely orange after winning a football game against Texas A & M, traditionally held on Thanksgiving Day. Preceding this event a contest is held for

the best Aggie Sign or house decoration and awards given at the huge pregame bonfire.

Twice each year the campus becomes a battleground where political hopefuls joust for Student assembly posts, spots on the Student Court, and top offices in the Student Association. At all hours, Gamma Phi Betas may be seen painting campaign signs at the house, memorizing speeches, or passing out campaign hand-bills. The greatest award for our efforts this year was the election of Carol Prouty as editor of *The Cactus*, the yearbook of the University of Texas.

Originally begun for the purpose of binding the students closer together through group singing, Sing Song has evolved into a song contest between sororities and fraternities each December. After many hours of practice and rehearsals, Gamma Phi Beta was awarded the second place trophy for 1959.

In the style of the carney barker, U. T. students call in customers to the Varsity Carnival shows given by sorority and fraternity members each spring. The carnival is sponsored by Interfraternity Council and Panhellenic and features side shows and concessions operated by various Greek groups. The work begins well before the actual event, as the groups strive for a dazzling publicity campaign that will draw attention to their booths. Gamma Phi Beta ran away with the coveted first place award for Best Publicity. As the shows are presented they are judged for audience appeal, originality, and quality of performance. For this Gamma Phi Beta won the third place trophy.

A new tradition at Texas is the Junior Fellow program started two years ago by Dr. Harry Ranson, President of the University. Twenty-five freshman men and women are selected each spring at Honors Day to receive special study and advisement privileges for the remainder of their college days. Out of the nineteen women students selected during the past two years, four have been members of Gamma Phi Beta: Sally Rundquist, Robbie Walters, Ann Hargrove, and Nancy Thrift.

Our new house, completed two years ago, achieved early fame as a fitting background for numerous pictures of beauties and belles and was featured in the Fraternity Month as well as the March, 1959 *CRESCENT*. It stands as a symbol of the strength and friendship of Alpha Zeta.

Xi Chapter looks ba

From points as far distant as Washington, D.C. and as far west as Pasadena, Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ of Xi chapter returned to Moscow to celebrate its golden anniversary on March 25, 26, and 27. Xi chapter was the first sorority on the University of Idaho campus, and has grown with the University and been allied with its growth and traditions. Even the names of its halls (Forney, Hays, Chrisman, Lewis) are Gamma Phi Beta names, and Xi chapter made another milestone during the course of the "Golden Days" celebration, by presenting the University with a complete silver service, a gift of Xi alumnæ.

The celebration began with a "Fireside" at the new chapter house, one room of which was given over to pictures and scrapbooks covering the fifty year period. As old friends greeted old friends, the excitement became more and more contagious, until a happy glow surrounded the whole gathering. Informal recollections of old times, by the six fifty-year members present, and others from the early years, recalled the early days when Alpha Delta Pi (the local sorority) had as its unswerving ambition the hope of becoming a chapter of Gamma Phi Beta. Some of the old minutes were read by Maude Bonham Long, of Moscow, and this brought forth other recollections, with many humorous incidents such as the famous Kappa Sig "house party" where all of the early Gamma Phis spent the night at the Kappa Sig house because of the flood washing out a bridge. Linda Rae Hardie, of Santa Barbara, remembered how unpopular she was when her father, who was county physician, had to quarantine the whole (Xi chapter) house because of scarlet fever. Ruth Broman Ellington, of Pullman, remembered the first house (she was president) and the fact that she paid for her board with wood for the stoves brought from her father's woodlot in Troy.

Highlighting the Saturday luncheon, which included townspeople and guests of the chapter, was the presentation of Xi alumnæ's gift to the University, a fifteen piece silver service including a large punch bowl, candelabra, trays, and accessory serving pieces. In presenting the gift, Maude Bonham Long, of Moscow said:

Fifty years ago this spring, during the first week in February, Xi Chapter of Gamma Phi Beta was installed as the first national sorority on the University of Idaho Campus.

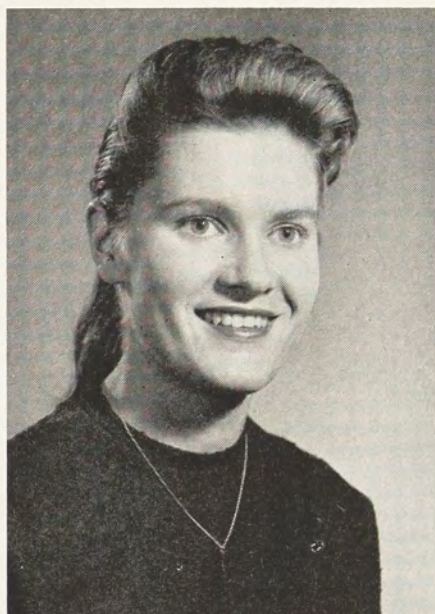
