

A Visit to the University of Manitoba

The University of Manitoba was founded in 1877. It began as an Agricultural College on the grounds in Fort Garry with other colleges in the downtown area of Winnipeg. As the years went by the various faculties began appearing on the Fort Garry site which now include the University of Manitoba, St. John's College, and St. Paul's College. The University and the affiliated colleges offer a high standing in scholastic learning as well as a quite varied sports and social programme.

Gamma Phi Beta was the first sorority on the campus when Alpha Kappa chapter was installed in 1925. There are now eight international sororities and many fraternities, both international and local. Since the membership of all eight sororities is restricted to about thirty the independents far outnumber the Greeks on our campus. Fraternities however, not being under the surveillance of a Panhellenic organization or the university, have no limit to their size, and maintain houses off the campus. Plans for a Panhellenic house, in which each sorority would have an apartment, seem to have been once more buried by the problem of finances.

One of our chapter traditions is the annual Grandmother's Luncheon. Each new pledge is the guest of an alumna or "grandmother" at a luncheon. It proves to be a very interesting few hours for both the pledges and the alumnæ as they get to know each other and hear about the "good old days." Sorority camp, another tradition, which is an annual weekend escape after final exams, saw thirteen members play bridge and charades until at least five in the morning. Usually this weekend sends us home sunburnt, however, the weather would not co-operate and we went home lily white and awfully tired.

Alpha Kappa can be proud of all her members who have helped to win the scholarship cup for the third year. This is a competition between sororities for the highest sorority average. This year we only won by a tenth of a point so we will have to pull our socks up if we expect to make it tradition. The night of the Panhellenic Dinner and Sorority Song Fest proved to be a big one for Alpha Kappa. Jocelyn McDonald won the athletic award for Gamma Phi Beta with Joy McDiarmid, another member, surrendering it to her. This year we also managed to tie for second place in the song fest so there were many happy Gamma Phis after the evening. This year Lynn Walters was president of Wakonda (women's organization on

Although we may be small in the size of our chapter we seem to make up for it in spirit. We know that this year we will again fill our quota of pledges who will help maintain the spirit of Alpha Kappa chapter of Gamma Phi Beta.

She Wears Many Hats!

Recording of an original production by Barbara Murchie Carter (Northwestern) was featured at the state convention of the Auxiliary to the Illinois Medical Society. Barb, who is the wife of Dr. Thomas W. Carter of Moline, Ill., wrote the narrative and lyrics and is the accompanist for the "Styles in Stereo" recording, a style show parody. The program was given in January at a dinner-dance of the Rock Island County Medical Society and Auxiliary. This program and a program from Joliet were chosen as the best of auxiliary programs given this year in Illinois.

On May 18 Barb spoke before the Auxiliary convention at the Hotel Sherman, Chicago, giving this humorous autobiog-

raphy of her married life.

"It's wonderful to return to Chicago—Tom and I know Chicago well, for we courted on her 'El' platforms. At the Loyola stop, beneath the street light one night, he held my left hand tenderly and exclaimed, 'What veins! I'd love to start I.V.'s on you!' Six months later we were married leaving the North Shore for our honeymoon apartment, just off of Lake Shore Drive—12 blocks due west, beside Gook County Hospital. We knew what class distinction was. There we were in our apartment; all of our neighbors lived in swell housing projects and were on A.D.C. I cried when I learned that A.D.C. didn't mean Aid for Doctor's Children.

"Tom is a surgical genius. In his last three months as chief surgical resident at Cook County Hospital, he passed both his written and his oral examinations for Board Certification, becoming one of the youngest men ever certified by the American Board of Surgery. Impossible?—almost! Our two little girls passed notes to Daddy under his study door; our Ludwig (dachsund) barked in cathedral whispers.

"To the old question, 'Do you like being married to a doctor?' there is the old answer, 'I like the doctor!' The neighbors would ask, 'Do you like being—are you—married?' Such financial growth! We began with \$15 a month and zoomed to \$100

a month (\$8 deducted for the hospital retirement fund). It all went to the A&P Store—look what it did for Huntington Hartford!

Happiness, then, is found in your point of view. For instance, we run the American Medical Association. They don't recognize it, but the world knows. A-M-A—a Ma; and that's as happy a Mother's Day thought as I can give you."

At the convention she met several of the state and national auxiliary officers, some of whom are going to Moline on January 13, 1962 for her new original musical, "Key Club." At that time a song Barb wrote years ago, which Northwestern members will remember as "Interim," (until lyrics came) will be introduced. She has now written lyrics, the title "Orlando."

On March 14, 1961, Barb was installed as president of the Tri-City alumnæ chapter by Mrs. George F. Lull, Alumnæ

Director of Province V.

On November 9, Mrs. Lull will be the guest of honor and speaker at the Tri-City Alumnæ dinner. The program will be "Styles in Stereo." The following day Dr. Lull will be an A.M.E.F. Auctioneer at the "Bizarre Bazaar" Barb has planned for the Medical Auxiliary. Dr. Lull, the President-Elect of the Illinois State Medical Society is a retired Army major-general, a former secretary of the A.M.A., and the head of the American Medical Education Fund for years. Studying Abroad

So you want to study abroad? What to do? Go to see the Fulbright foreign exchange scholarship faculty chairman on your campus; he will have advice and literature for you.

Then, decide on a project that you can study better at some foreign university than at home; select the country where you want to study, this will depend upon the foreign language which you must understand, read and speak fluently; and know something of the foreign educational system because it is different from the American. Also, add an unselfish interest in other peoples and a genuine desire to develop mutual understanding with friends and colleagues in your host country. As an American abroad you need to have training for international responsibility, by acquiring a wide and farreaching knowledge of the history, politics, religion, culture as well as the language of your country. Wherever you go, it will not be like home, so you must always remember: "I am the guest here." If you can give an affirmative answer to all these ideas, your project "Studying Aboard" will be a success.

What requirements will you need to meet? Again, language, a B.A. degree, since most scholarships are awarded at the graduate level only; high scholarship and maturity to meet

whatever situations arise. If you wish to go as an undergraduate, there are the well-known junior year abroad programs and excellent summer study opportunities offered especially for American students by foreign universities. This summer, 20,000 American students participated in this program.

During the year 1959-1960, more than 30,000 American students engaged in academic travels abroad; of these, 1490 students and 117 specialists studied in 47 countries. The majority of the scholarship grantees study in Europe and the United Kingdom, although increasing interest is being manifest for study and research in Asia, Africa, the Middle East and the Latin American countries. There are also scholarships available which are offered to Americans by foreign governments, universities and private donors.

The Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York 21, is the administrative agency for most exchange of persons programs. There are regional offices in Chicago, Denver, Washington, D.C., San Francisco and Houston where Alice Reynolds Pratt of Psi chapter is director. The 1961 HANDBOOK ON INTERNATIONAL STUDY: FOR U. S. INSIDE NSA

Do most American students favor a unilateral disarmament program for the United States? Do they condemn former President Truman and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover for suggesting that the sit-in movement was communist-inspired? Are they all united against the loyalty oath and disclaimer affidavit provision in the National Defense Education Act? Do they support Japanese students who rioted against President Eisenhower because of "social and economic pressures" in Japan?

According to the National Student Association, a confederation of more than 300 college student governments, claiming to represent "over a million" students, this is exactly what U.S. students believe, for their resolutions, adopted at national congresses every year, are touted as being the expression of a national student viewpoint.

But there are probably not a million students who have even heard of NSA, and the number of individuals who can correctly identify it at all is most likely in the thousands.

Not Very Close

NSA officials will occasionally admit that their organization is not as close to American students as it pretends to be, but such admissions are generally accompanied by the qualification that students active in NSA reflect student opinion nationally and comprise the "real vanguard of the 'student movement' in the United States."

According to NSA thinking, the American student, sharing his persecution with young scholars in other countries, is regarded as a member of an "international student movement." As such, NSA participants are urged to consider issues, not on the basis of American interests, but in the light of their usefulness to "the cause." As a result, every resolution adopted by the unwitting delegates is colored in some way with this theory.

But how can students, traditionally rebellious, and always idealistic, be so regimented by other students? Pamphlets, "working papers," and background literature provided by the NSA staff for congress delegates leave little to the imagination as to how the powers that be within NSA feel about any given subject. Add a few left-wing speakers and professorial authorities and you have an undiluted dose of liberalism most unprepared students would find easy to assimilate.

In pretending to be presenting "both sides of the story" on the question of the House Un-American Activities Committee and the film "Operation Abolition," an NSA letter sent around the country wound up by demanding abolition of the committee. A background paper on international affairs treated the Algerian question as having only one valid viewpoint and it was certainly not the French viewpoint.

Careful Selection

But NSA does not trust leftward-slanted pamphlets, working papers, liberal speakers, and careful indoctrination to do the job. The congress workshops which produce the controversial resolutions are the meat of the organization—and workshop leaders are carefully selected by NSA officials.

At the congress last August, a subcommittee chairman, designated by NSA, voted illegally in his own committee to

prevent the defeat of a motion favoring the abolition of HUAC and was backed up by the NSA parliamentarian. In the full committee, two persons produced as "research personnel" included a professor who was an avowed enemy of the committee, and a student who took part in the San Francisco riots. When a member of the full committee pointed out that both parties were hostile to HUAC, and therefore should not be presented as "impartial," he was called out of order by the chairman, and condemned as "impolite." (Perhaps "impolitic" was the word the chairman meant to use.)

In the case of NSA's campaign for the "right of student government officials to take positions on issues of national scope," NSA devotees at the University of California found themselves torn between opposing loyalties. For the president of the university, Clark Kerr, had issued a directive forbidding such statements by student leaders at the Berkeley campus. What did NSA do?—censured him of course, over the opposition of the University of California delegates, who had the greatest admiration and respect for the president of their university.

At last summer's congress, NSA sponsored a panel discussion on the sit-in movement, held at the University of Minnesota's largest auditorium, with all delegates attending. Panel members included a left-wing professor who helped organize the sit-ins in North Carolina, several student participants, a lawyer representing the viewpoint of a liberal lawyers guild, and various NSA officials. There was not one representative of the opposing viewpoint, nor any reference to the possible violation of the right of property. The whole ordeal lasted about two hours, and most delegates, squirming in their seats, were relieved to hear the announcement that NSA had organized a songfest immediately afterwards.

There is a vast amount of NSA activity which could bear investigation. One is the manner in which the annual million dollar budget is determined and expended. Another is why the National Executive Committee, "the power elite" is allowed to operate without any checks and balances. Some study should be made of the "thirty-ish" professional students frequently found in top positions in the organization, and of the salaries they receive.

Unfortunately, when legitimate objections and constructive criticism have been offered in the past, they have been dismissed by NSA with circumlocutory filibusters, whitewashes, and blanket denials. It appears now that no satisfactory replacement of the present bureaucracy of NSA will be possible until students themselves remake the organization which purports to represent them.

President's Page

THE MONTH of September means many things to many people. For the collegiates it means the beginning of a new school term; for the fraternity world, the enrollment of a new class of members—the pledges; and for Gamma Phi Beta the offering of sorority membership to approximately 2000 young women who have been selected from all sections of the country.

It is timely then, for Gamma Phi Betas everywhere to consider the importance of this pledging season, and to determine the responsibility for implanting within these young women an understanding of what it means to belong to a friendship organization such as ours.

To the collegiate members falls the responsibility of creating an immediate atmosphere of loving acceptance through a sense of belonging; and to the alumnæ advisers, the responsibility of placing in the hands of collegiate officers, a well planned pledge training program, designed to explain the basic aims and fundamental principles on which we were founded.

In the beginning this training will emphasize what membership really entails. First of all, it is not just a local membership, but an international one; not just a temporary affiliation, but a privilege which will be enjoyed for a life-time. Since we have chapters in all sections of the United States and Canada we are inter-related—inter-related because of our membership selection policies which are based on qualities of congeniality, compatibility, and common backgrounds. That by maintaining these membership standards, local memberships may be an acceptable and congenial part of the international organization every place. And that to deviate from these policies and procedures will defeat the purposes, benefits, and

privileges which are now enjoyed by approximately 38,000 members, including 252 alumnæ and collegiate chapters.

Following an understanding of these membership fundamentals, the training program should include an explanation of our basic aims. It is important to know that as a private, social group, we are organized for the purpose of joining friends together for the furtherance of certain ideals and aims, and for the advancement of a higher spiritual, mental, and social culture. In pursuit of these aims, we stress the importance of attaining and maintaining high scholastic averages; of developing leadership potential; of being a contributing citizen to campus and community; of learning how to enjoy group living with an emphasis on cultural interests and social graces; of establishing high moral standards of conduct; and of incorporating into our lives the tenets offered in our ritual.

And finally, our newest members must have an understanding of the spiritual benefits which are received through the bonds of membership and friendship. Through the cultivation of loyalty and love these qualities become the embodiment of that something which we call the spirit of Gamma Phi Beta. They must know that we are not as much concerned about the problems of outer space as we are with those of inner space—that space between their ears, and that area immediately surrounding their hearts. For each new member, the very most we can wish for them is that they, too, may become imbued with that innate something which we know to be attached to the heart and carried through the spirit of every dedicated Gamma Phi Beta.

PROVINCE CONFERENCES—1961

GAMMA PHI BETAS from coast to coast accepted the challenge of "SHOOT FOR THE MOON" when they met at eleven Province Conferences held during late March, April, and May.

All of the Conferences began on Friday evenings with gay, informal meetings. Rushing songs and skits, original, amusing and lovely, presented by collegiate members provided delightful entertainment. Led by vivacious and able song leaders, many songs were sung, old and new, so that even the most sedate alumna was tapping her foot and joining in. In some places, this evening, or part of it, was used to run film or tape about the great threat to the Greek world today by Communist infiltration and pressures.

Our Conference theme was developed by means of four general headings or stages of power necessary for the successful orbiting of our rocket. The satisfaction and happiness which comes from collegiate and alumnæ members working in harmony to promote the strength and prestige of Gamma Phi Beta was again demonstrated as we discussed the launching and power stages of our rocket. We all realized again that through smooth and clear cooperation and communication from the newest pledges on through to the oldest alumnæ are to be found our strengths, our means of carrying out the precepts of our Founders, of fulfilling our vows, and of making more secure each member's pride and happiness in Gamma Phi Beta.

At Saturday morning business sessions, the even numbered Provinces elected members and alternates for the International Nominating Committee. Those which had previously adopted Province Scholarship plans reported on progress and accomplishments. Three additional provinces amended bylaws or passed resolutions which will implement scholarship plans within the next year while two others appointed committees to study such possible plans and to report on them not later than the 1963 Conferences. In keeping with the original proposal, each plan and contemplated plan is suited to the province in which it is to function and no two are alike, but all demonstrate that Gamma Phi Betas are actively participating in the promotion of high standards of scholarship.

Small discussion groups to discuss the rocket stages followed the business sessions. Starting with "Basic Research and Best Pledges," the Greek-letter groups discussed methods and mechanics of rushing, while alumnæ groups were able to exchange helpful ideas on ways to secure adequate recommendations—the very necessary basic research. This is the "launching pad" for our success and all reports emphasize the necessity for close communication between alumnæ and collegiate members. Various proposals were made for changes in the grading system for rushees and a variety of worthwhile suggestions were made for the handling of legacies during rushing. A very careful analysis of all conference reports shows an overwhelming approval and endorsement of our existing system of alumnæ recommendations for prospective pledges.

Another stage of rocket power was "Best Scholarship." In all groups there was particular emphasis on the need for improved scholarship and the maintenance of high standards of scholarship. If we want scholarship, we must pledge it. The attitude of each chapter toward scholarship is the underlying factor for success or lack of success. Building the right attitude must start with the alumnæ and their recommendations of girls who have demonstrated during secondary schooling the ability and determination to pursue successful college careers. Proper counselling at the time of registration so that no girl tries to carry more than she can handle, frequent checks on grades and various forms of awards for scholastic achievement were all discussed. The stress on scholarship and particularly on the important part alumnæ must play if the desirable standards are maintained was one of the outstanding benefits of the 1961 conferences.

"Best Standards and Best Citizenship" were additional stages of the moon rocket's progress. Many fine and thought provoking ideas emerged from these discussion groups, some of which were joint sessions of collegiate and alumnæ delegates and guests.

Why have we chosen to be sorority women? What are our responsibilities as members? One Conference group compared membership in a Greek-letter chapter to a priceless opportunity to live in a well equipped laboratory for the study of human relations, a warm, congenial atmosphere in which to study, test, compare and thus to prepare for future roles in society. Individual responsibility and pride as a sorority member must be instilled during the pledge period. Suggested ways to accomplish this were by selection of top-notch pledge trainers, the cooperation of alumnæ, talks by devoted and illustrious alumnæ to pledges and the overall atmosphere of each chapter, a spirit which must show the pledges, by example, that the initiated members respect and maintain high standards.

The less formal manners and forms of dress of today were not condemned but warnings were given that they are too often accompanied by carelessness in conduct which can create wrong impressions of the standards and ethics of sorority women. Each member must assume the responsibility for maintaining the ideals of our Founders as she reaps the rewards of membership. Alumnæ were reminded that they also stray at times from what is considered wise conduct and suggestions were made for including reminders of Gamma Phi Beta standards in newsletters and for having at least one annual alumnæ meeting with a standards program. Outstanding girls in all localities will be more interested in knowing Gamma Phi Betas on their campuses if they admire and respect Gamma Phi Beta alumnæ in their home communities.

There were new friends made and there were happy renewals of old friendships. There was fun and there were serious times and many problems to be worked on and solved. There were gratifying accomplishments and perhaps some disappointments that time was too short for greater accomplishments. However, each member who attended a conference felt amply rewarded, encouraged and stimulated by the discussions, thrilled by memorable Carnation banquets, and most of all thankful and proud that she is a Gamma Phi Beta.



"Fork in the Road" Strikes a Blow for Freedom

Four women who care, co-workers at the Fred Sanders Co. in Detroit, got to discussing the Communist menace one day last summer. One of the group was Miss Gretchen Saam (U. of Iowa '36) who is personnel director for Sanders. Out of this session came the conclusion that Communism is a bum rap for the people, but that very little is really known about it.

These four set out to research the subject, and from that research has come a little book with big information called "Fork in the Road." Among other things, it says:

"When we start pinning labels on ourselves, most of us say we are workers because we receive salaries and wages. But, once we start buying property, stock and life insurance, we become part owners of American industry and we are part of the group to which the Communists refer as 'dirty capitalists.'"

"The Communists believe that Communism will not be

safe anywhere until it controls the world, and they say there will be no peace until Communism is triumphant and unopposed."

"The Hungarians tried to co-exist and found that this was much like putting a man into a cage with a lion. After the lion ate the man, the two then co-existed peacefully ever afterward."

"What is happening that so many people have no sense of duty to their country and feel no obligation or responsibility to protect it? One reason may be the way military life is degraded, ridiculed and otherwise disparaged in our movies, novels, magazine stories, even comic books. . . ."

There is much more to be gleaned from this straightforward document prepared by four women who are proud and loyal patriots. At one time it was considered corny to be patriotic. Today your very survival may depend on your patriotism.

PLEDGE DIRECTOR:

Prior to pledging, order Pledge Manuals from Central Office. Immediately after pledging, order song books from Central Office. By March 15, send Pledge Manual revisions to International Chairman of Publications.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

By October 1, for December issue; January 1, for March issue; February 20, for May issue; June 15, for September issue; glossies, features, honors due Editor, Mrs. Marek.

By January 1, chapter letter due Mrs. Marek for March issue. Do not send chapter letter for other issues.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN:

HISTORIAN:

Mail typed annual history to International Historian with one carbon to Province Collegiate Director before close of college year.
