THE 51st INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

Gamma Phi Betas from across this country and Canada gathered in June at the French Lick-Sheraton Hotel to celebrate the sorority's 90th year and to make dynamic plans for the next decade.

Happy reunions of old friends and the joy of making new ones marked the arrival of delegates and visitors. Quickly registered and refreshed, everyone gathered for dinner, hostessed by the Champaign-Urbana alumnæ and University of Illinois. One of the many memorable luncheons and dinners which followed clever themes, this one featured "The Girl Behind the Gamma Phi Beta Pennant."

The first general session of convention that evening, June 22, graciously conducted by Beatrice Hill Wittenberg, Grand President, set the tone for the week's program. Each day brought important business to the floor . . . early morning classes in parliamentary procedure . . . informal buzz sessions . . . committee meetings . . . and rare, spare moments for visiting.

Enthusiastic applause greeted the newly elected members of Grand Council at the final session of business, and the convention closed with the traditional Carnation Banquet.

Message of the Grand President

At the opening session of Gamma Phi Beta's 51st International Convention, delegates heard Beatrice Hill Wittenberg, Grand President, deliver her biennial message. Its importance to all members of the sorority is such that excerpts from that message are herewith reported.

It is necessary now to mention the problem which has continued to plague us during the biennium—the continued attacks on fraternities and sororities. They have been unending, and there are few campuses which have not been touched by the poisonous tentacles of this octopus. Efforts have been made to maintain our identity as an international private, social, voluntary organization, and as such, to be able to select our members according to standards of our own choosing. But overwhelming pressures are being brought to

bear and the issues are reaching an impasse.

Let us pause for a moment and ask the question, "What is the Sorority and what does it stand for?" Many explanations of the college fraternity have been given and there have been many comments on its place on the campus and in our society. But I like the explanation given in the opening paragraph of the most recent edition of Baird's Manual in which the editor, John Robson, states: "The American college fraternity is an American institution and the chapter in the form in which it ideally exists on the college campus, is a miniature of the larger American democracy. . . . The good fraternity chapter follows the principles, traditions, and ideals on which America was established by her founding fathers, under God, with the good fraternity man and the good fraternity woman being cast in the pattern of the good citizen. It is an entity of freedom." These last six words encompass a significant meaning of fraternity-and establish a basis for the reason why we, your officers, are expressing our loyalty through the giving of our time, effort and interest for the preservation of the Sorority-"it is an entity of freedom," and it expresses that which we hold most dear-"OUR FREEDOM!"

Within the chapter walls are found those elements upon which our nation was founded. Here our collegiate members experience and learn one of the early tenets of a democracythat of submitting to the will of the majority. Here the chapter establishes a relationship akin to that of a family in a home, which John Robson describes as a place "where hearts are of each other sure." Here is found a ritual, the very heartbeat of the Sorority, and from which is received that something which sets it apart as a Sisterhood. Here is provided an altar, where under God, is established freedom of religion, and not freedom from religion. Here the members have been chosen "by mutual selection, based on congeniality and common purpose." And here the chapter learns it is but one segment of the whole under the jurisdiction of the international organization. Yes, the Sorority is a training ground in democratic living. "It is an entity of freedom."

FREEDOM IN JEOPARDY

But something has been happening to this freedom. Today the Sorority is being challenged and this freedom is in jeopardy. From the founding of Phi Beta Kappa in 1776 until the early 1940's, there had only been some ripples and some criticisms, but not planned opposition. But since 1946 there has been planned opposition, with the first direct attack being made on the Amherst campus and where the right of the fraternity's freedom of choice was challenged. From that

day until this, we have been steadily badgered and pressured to become something which we were never intended to be. We are an international friendship organization composed of two classifications of members-collegiates and alumnæ. Each has certain rights and privileges and the one cannot be divorced from the other, and if we attempt to do so, we are no longer an international organization. We must have a clear understanding of our basic rights as a private, social organization. "Our private associations are not properly a matter of legislation or government concern," was stated by the former President of the United States. And just recently a member of the clergy, Father McInerney of Chicago, who is a fraternity man, stated, "Fraternity is strictly a personal act of association. It is not a thing; not a commodity, not a service to the public, over which civil administration must exercise control to prevent injustice, deceit or crimes against the rights of the community or other persons. Fraternity of its nature is strictly and essentially personal."

These basic principles need to be understood in trying to find answers to the problems which confront us. The questions are asked, "What is our future? Do we have a future?" Yes, we are certain there are answers. We believe the pendulum will turn and that the rights of the individual to have freedom of choice in the selection of friends will be reaffirmed. But this will not be accomplished without a firm determi-

nation on our part to bring this to pass.

TIME FOR RE-DEDICATION

We need to defend and to preserve that which was given to us by our Founders ninety years ago. I wish that each one here could sometime go to our Alpha chapter in Syracuse. One cannot go there without having a deep sense of appreciation of the founding of our Sorority. The home itself is a beautiful one-traditional in manner, which is in keeping with the campus. Everything about it tells of the loving care of the devoted alumnæ. There is an all white chapter room where life-size portraits of the Four Founders are hung on the walls. These are done in beautiful pastels with indirect lighting over each one to enhance the beauty of these lovely women. There are shadow boxes on the walls which hold a collection of old badges, and copies of some of our original documents. A sweeping sense of gratitude surged through me as I realized more fully than ever before how important it is to keep the intent of our beloved Founders ever before us, and how important it is to remember our vows-to remember our objectives-to place first things first, such as our spiritual values-our love for each other-and our belief in God. We need to make our organization a true sisterhood-in which each member realizes what it means to belong to our international organization. We need to give love and loyalty freely and certainly to each member. We need to lay the ground work for these everlasting friendships. The Bible states "A faithful friend is a strong defense; and he that hath found him hath found a treasure." These are the treasures given us through the Sorority-and it is for us to seek and

Convention Diary

Monday, June 22

Gamma Phi Beta's 51st International Convention was called to order by Beatrice Hill Wittenberg, Grand President, at 8:00 p.m. Sally Gray Cass, Convention Regional Chairman, welcomed delegates and visitors to the first Indiana convention. Following the appointment of committees, International officers were introduced. Message of the Grand President (reprinted in part on the preceding page) was followed by a report of the Honor and Service Rolls Committee. Three names were added to the Honor Roll, after approval of the convention. They were: Olive Gallatin Picard of Tucson; Mary T. McCurley of Baltimore; Ruth Folwell Studley of Bethesda, Md.

Serving as hostesses for the buffet dinner preceding the first session were Omicron and Champaign-Urbana alumnæ chapters, with Dorothy Potter Swindell serving as toastmistress. The world famous Assembly Hall of the University of Illinois served as the leading decorative theme, with miniature replicas of the Hall centering each table. Pennants of the various sororities on the campus edged the centerpieces.

At 9:30, Greek letter members gathered for a songfest and coke party while alumnæ visited in the Hospitality Center.

Tuesday, June 23

Up early in the morning for the 8:00 A.M. Parliamentary Procedure class with Mrs. Glenn Suthers, delegates then met in Convention Hall for a Panel presentation on "Mounting Pressures." Participants were Louise Haydock Miller (San Jose), Edith Doughty Hindley (Sanford), and Ardis McBroom Marek (Northwestern). Buzz sessions followed for collegiates to discuss Scholarship, while the alumnæ discussed membership endorsements.

At luncheon honoring the Founders, Penelope Murdoch Simonson, former Grand President, and present Historian,

Guest speaker, Mr. Sherwood Blue, president of Theta Chi Fraternity Foundation, gave the keynote address, stressing the importance of individual freedom, and charging his listeners to protect that freedom. The Grand Council's reception for Mr. and Mrs. Blue was held in the Governor's suite following dinner.

Wednesday, June 24

Fresh, young voices of the choir lent beauty and dignity to the impressive Memorial Service as tribute was paid to those beloved sisters who have departed this life. Rho chapter of the University of Iowa presented the service, under the direction of Edith Herrin Watt, assisted by Karen Tucker (Memphis State) Ritual Song Chairman.

Sally Gray Cass served as reader, while candles were lighted for Memory, Love, and Influence by Frances Schrauger, Maryann Ruud, and Patricia Carlson, all of Rho chapter.

The Second General Session at 9:30 A.M. was devoted to revisions of the Constitution, By-laws, and Standing Rules.

It was Honors Day at convention and excitement ran high at the Royalty Luncheon when awards were announced. Hostesses were Gamma Gamma and Milwaukee and Fox River Valley alumnæ chapters, with Elise Bossort Bell as chairman and Joanne Kohlhagen as toastmistress. The scene was set with royal purple satin pillows, topped by gold crowns, on each table. A special "Queen Bea" crown was presented to Bea Wittenberg, which she wore during luncheon.

Our Rights Are Challenged . . . Our Decision Is Made

DEAR SISTERS IN GAMMA PHI BETA-

We live in this period of unequaled experimentation, conflict, and decision. We perform the experiments. We resolve the conflicts. We make the decisions. Our Sorority is exempt from none of these. Gamma Phi Beta delegates to the 51st International Convention made a decision to resolve one of the major conflicts the fraternity system has faced and to allow further experimentation in the future. Every Gamma Phi Beta will want to share and support this decision.

Let us begin, then, with the resolution that received a

unanimous affirmative vote.

"Whereas, Gamma Phi Beta has existed for ninety years as a private, voluntary social organization, embracing both collegiate and alumnæ members, working together in a closely-knit, family type relationship to develop the aims and goals of our Founders, and

"Whereas, Continuous and well organized pressures are being exerted to alter the fundamental structure of our membership selection procedures, enforce progressive stages of local autonomy, and thereby drive a wedge between our

alumnæ and Greek-letter members, therefore

"Resolved That we reaffirm the reciprocal relationship which we have always enjoyed between Greek-letter and alumnæ members with respect to membership selection and intermediately all device."

international solidarity."

You may wonder why the Convention was concerned with such a resolution. Or, perhaps, you have been involved with the threat to the sorority system and have decided the time has come to do something. To be concise, the fraternity system is being put under a great deal of pressure to sign "anti-discrimination" statements. These demands have come to Gamma Phi Beta in varied lengths and two contrasting types.

The first type requests clarification of our policy on membership selection. Since 1957, similar statements have been presented to some forty administrators which include the following: California, the University of California, the University of Southern California, the University of California at Los Angeles, California State College at Long Beach, San Diego State College, San Jose State College, the University of the Pacific; Colorado, the University of Colorado, Colorado State University, Denver University; IDAHO, the University of Idaho; Illinois, Bradley University, Lake Forest College; INDIANA, Indiana University; Iowa, Iowa State University, the State University of Iowa; Kansas, Kansas State University, the University of Wichita; MARYLAND, the University of Maryland; Massachusetts, Boston University; Michigan, the University of Michigan, Michigan State University; MINNESOTA, Moorhead State College; Missouri, the University of Missouri; NEVADA, the University of Nevada; New York, Syracuse University; Ohio, the Ohio State University, Bowling Green State University, Kent University, Miami University at Oxford, Ohio Wesleyan University; Oregon, the University of Oregon, Oregon State University; Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania State University; Texas, Midwestern University; Vermont, the University of Vermont; Washington, the University of Washington, Washington State University; Wisconsin, the University of Wisconsin; BRITISH COLUMBIA, the University of British Columbia.

Gamma Phi Beta has consistently answered such requests with the following statement:

"Gamma Phi Beta has no clauses in its international Constitution and Bylaws which place restrictions in the selection of members because of race, religion or national origin. Our chapters are free to choose their members from among the many who are endorsed."

The second demand is a direct challenge of our right to remain a private international organization. Here is a sample statement:

"I hereby certify that the student members of -

Chapter of Gamma Phi Beta are free to choose and accept new members without discrimination as to race, religion, or natural origin." (Italics have been added for emphasis.)

The distinction between our statement of clarification and this demand for policy revision is rather glaring, isn't it? These are the schools which have presented our chapters with statements of this type: the University of California, the University of California at Los Angeles, the University of Southern California, San Diego State College, California State College at Long Beach, San Jose State College, the University of Wisconsin, Pennsylvania State University. Although each has a different wording and a different time limit, the implications of these certificates are the same.

We have two options. We can allow our chapters to function as they have successfully for ninety years or we can sanction the formation of locally autonomous groups.

As you can see by the resolution passed at Convention, Gamma Phi Beta does not wish to sign such statements. Let us discuss three basic reasons which influenced the Gamma Phi Beta decision.

The first concerns a series of steps. Several years ago, a copy of a carefully plotted program appeared on a campus and was sent to Eileen Blain Rudolph, National Panhellenic Conference Delegate for Delta Delta Delta, and was later published for distribution. This program included the following:

"Step No. 1—Arouse cognizance of racial and religious discrimination of the campus among the student body, in housing, social organizations such as fraternities and sororities, faculty, campus organizations and athletics.

"This can best be accomplished working through the medium of the daily or weekly campus paper. Militant sympathetic leadership help in student government, student senate or council as representing the entire student body to the administration of the university or college.

"Assistance in background material, bibliographies, films, recordings can be obtained without charge from U. S. National Students (sic) Association, Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, National Committee on Fraternities and Sororities in Education, National Association (sic) the Advancement of the Colored People, Urban League, American Jewish Committee.

"Step No. 2—When recognition that discrimination exists in any area is established and is a topic of general discussion among the student body, a program can readily be developed for administration action.

- a) Campus organizations should agree to have no discriminatory clauses self-imposed on color, race or creed in addition to any selectivity restrictions of their own national organization.
- b) Petition the administration department governing student organizations to bar establishment of any new organizations on the campus which have any discriminatory membership requirements.
- c) Local groups should be required to notify their central organizations that they are not in sympathy with membership selectivity on the basis of race, color or creed,

and inspired to work within their national structure to have such clauses deleted.

d) Gentleman's agreement in the unwritten laws on membership qualifications must be abolished, but first express provisions must be eliminated following steps No. 1 and No. 2.

"Step No. 3—In natural sequence, work to have university administration set a deadline date for all organizations on campus to remove restrictions based on race, color or creed or lose recognition on the campus.

"Step No. 4—As a criteria (sic) to prove no unwritten laws governing membership, campus groups can prove their compliance by integrating members from minority groups without protest from their national organization.

"Step No. 5—Potential goal is complete integration or absorption by all social groups of all students who are desirous of affiliating with the various groups and organizations on campus."

The end result of this program would be one hundred percent pledging—or complete obliteration of the fraternity system as you and I know it. You can see that policy restricting certificates like the sample which was quoted would put a chapter to step three with steps four and five in the probable future.

It would be naive to think this couldn't happen. In the fall of 1963, Portland State University's six Panhellenic chapters were given the option of following step four or being suspended and thereby losing administrative recognition. Because all groups refused to follow step four, they were suspended and are no longer recognized on that campus.

Alpha Psi Chapter of Gamma Phi Beta faced a decision in 1961. Our chapter, and the other four NPC sororities at Lake Forest College, were given an ultimatum demanding local autonomy which all refused to accept.

The Convention acted to avoid this first reason—undue pressure for local autonomy. Through this Convention action, the privileges of reasons two and three will be preserved. These privileges include the recommendations system and our

We belong to an organization of well over 43,000 members. Each of us has an equal opportunity to endorse prospective members of our sorority. To maintain this privilege we have a

privilege of belonging to a private social organization.

recommendations system. You have to have identification to cash a check, references to get a summer job, a transcript to be accepted in graduate school. Gamma Phi Beta has the equally justifiable privilege to obtain such endorsement of character before selecting a new member. Our alumnæ endorsement form lists these six qualifications:

"Good character

Wholesome family background

Scholastic ability

Ability to assume financial responsibility of membership Contribution to prestige of Gamma Phi Beta with consideration of special talents

Attractive personality."

On what grounds could any administration or group question

these qualifications?

The third reason is most important of all. Gamma Phi Beta is a private, social organization. We are part of the unique social fraternity system of North America. For well over two hundred years this system has aided its members and made major contributions to the colleges of the United States and Canada. Obviously, we have no right to claim past laurels and achievements as reasons for existence. The fraternity system and Gamma Phi Beta must make continually important contributions to academics, to philanthropies, to ethical standards. As long as we continue to make these contributions it must remain just as obvious that no group or power has the right to challenge our existence. If our right to selection of members is challenged, the same statements can be issued to the Baptist Student Union in Abilene, Texas, or the D.A.R. in Quincy, Massachusetts, or the Lions Club in Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

These are three reasons for our Sorority's decision. As a private organization we are protecting our right to select our own members. Without this right, we would not have Gamma Phi Beta. At best, we would have college girl clubs—each with its own rules, its own shaky future. With this right, Gamma Phi Beta will continue her international advancement. The Convention has aided each of us to make a brave and wise decision—the only decision that will allow Gamma Phi Beta to progress.

Trojan Spirit Prevails At Southern Cal

Among America's academic giants, none is experiencing a more dramatic or dynamic period of emergence and development than the 84-year-old University of Southern California, oldest and largest independent, coeducational University in the West.

With impetus from its Master Plan, USC is moving swiftly forward under the direction of its seventh president, Dr. Norman Topping, who has called for "excellence with vigor and

without compromise."

New buildings, rising on USC's campus at a surprising rate, are only one facet of the new image, behind which surges a rededication to enriching academic goals in keeping with the University's distinguished history of contributions to American education.

USC's Master Plan has two principal objectives:

 Able and eager students, wise and dedicated professors, imaginative and stimulating courses of study.

· The facilities necessary to make this possible.

Giant steps already have been taken toward achieving these objectives. Emphasizing excellence, USC is constantly elevating already high enrollment standards with the result that of those freshmen entering in the fall of 1963, approximately 88 percent had B grades.

Seeking the truly gifted scholar, USC inaugurated its Trustee Scholar Program in 1963, bringing to its campus the vanguard of 40 students of outstanding capabilities and promise.

As quickly as feasible, USC expects to increase its fulltime faculty by as much as 50 percent, while adding junior faculty to reduce the number of part time instructors.

Among outstanding new faculty already attracted to the University in several disciplines are Maurice Pryce, as chairman of the Department of Physics; Myles Maxfield, Director of the Biophysics Program; Gerhard Tintner, Economics; John Laufer, in the School of Engineering, and Paul Weiss, School of Philosophy.

Jascha Heifetz, Gregor Piatigorsky and William Primrose joined the faculty of the School of Music two years ago to conduct master classes in USC's new Institute for Special

Musical Studies.

Under a far-reaching curriculum revision plan, the University is abolishing course credits in an academic streamlining which will be completely operative this fall for the College of Letters, Arts and Sciences and the Graduate School. This involves the institution of a four-course student program for each semester and the elimination of unduly specialized or fragmented courses from the curriculum.

In keeping up with the tradition and spirit of USC, Beta Alpha chapter of Gamma Phi Beta has also stepped up its programs of activities and educational growth. Chartered in September, 1938, Beta Alpha chapter was number fourteen of the nineteen sororities which have at one time or another

been a part of Southern California's campus.

This past year the Gamma Phis have played a part in all activities both on the row and on campus. Both the junior and senior heads of Women's Judicial Court were Gamma Phis as also was the president of USC's school of education. Beta Alpha members also participated in both of the scholastic, honorary organizations on campus and belong to such national groups as Spurs, Mortar Board, and Amazons, with officers on the Panhellenic Council.

A new tradition was started this year at the Beta Alpha Orchid Ball and that was the selection of the Gamma Phi Beta Man of the Year. The annual dance, held at the Wilshire Country Club, ended with the crowning of Tom Lile, selected from among eight contestants all of whom were chosen for their spirit, personality and interest not only in the Gamma Phis but also in USC.

The USC 1964 Song Fest held at the Hollywood Bowl also put the Gamma Phis out in front for we won first place in mixed division and captured the trophy with the theme,

"Songs from childhood."

Throughout the past 26 years Beta Alpha chapter has become an integral part of USC. Its membership has steadily been rising as well as its activities and scholarship. If ever the chance comes to visit our campus, the doors of Beta Alpha will always be open.

Policies of Membership Selection

Pressures in various forms are being exerted on collegiate chapters of all Greek-letter fraternities and sororities to make membership available to all who wish to become members of such organizations. Therefore, it behooves every Gamma Phi Beta to understand and to defend, if necessary, our policies regarding membership selection.

Although there was no restrictive clause in the first constitution of Gamma Phi Beta, nor is there one now, membership has always been by invitation, following unanimous election.

Our standards of membership are not based on race, religion, or nationality, but on social acceptability to the chapter and the sorority as a whole. Any girl of good character and adequate scholarship who is wanted by the chapter and the Gamma Phi Betas in her home community may be invited to membership.

Fraternal association implies a degree of social intimacy but one step removed from that of the family. Selectivity in connection with the admission of new members into the sorority is therefore to be desired. It is not to be expected that all girls admitted to any colleges will be desired as sisters by any one sorority. Further, optimum chapter size limits the number who can be invited. The chapter chooses from those who are interested in membership, those for whom its members feel the greatest attraction. The international sorority does not tell a chapter that it must accept certain girls, nor do we look with favor on pressure toward this end from any other source.

The closeness achieved by unanimous selection of members is responsible for the effectiveness of sorority membership in influencing the lives of its members. Anything done to destroy this close relationship of the members of a chapter would weaken the college sorority, and make it less effective as a force for good on the college campus.

Gamma Phi Beta over the 90 years of its existence has been a valued part of every college campus on which we have a chapter. We stand ready to serve the college in any way that lies within the scope of a voluntary organization.



Living Abundantly

Automation and technology are making it possible for those of us who are fortunate to live in America to increasingly reduce the time required for doing necessary work. Today's undergraduate will probably live to see a 25 hour week, with corresponding increase in free time.

Leisure is not hours free of work, or even weekends or months of vacation or years in retirement. Leisure is not a time concept. It is a state of being. Leisure is a state of being free of everyday necessity. Therefore, the activities of leisure are those one would engage in for their own sake, not as a means to an end.

Climbing a mountain for the sake of climbing it would be an activity of leisure. Writing poetry for the sake of writing it, composing a piece of music as an end in itself, improving the genetic qualities of gladioli in order to enhance their beauty, reading assiduously the works of Sören Kierkergaard that one might really be able to understand him and be uplifted by him, facing danger in attempts to photograph nests of the Bald Eagle for the sake of getting the pictures and for no other reason, spending tiring hours in art museums in search of the meaning behind the canvas, kneeling daily in prayer and contemplation merely to practice the presence of God—these are all activities of leisure which help the sensitive person to live abundantly.

To live abundantly is to live creatively. To live creatively is to live in freedom from necessity. To live in freedom is the mark of a cultured person who has cultivated the free mind, who has a deep dedication to truth, for whom the glory of human existence has in the dimensions of creative freedom.

This high dimension of freedom is not an accident. It comes only to those who prepare for it discovering wholesome "extra-curricular," non-profit producing, inherently valuable interest. Undergraduate days present tremendous opportunities for such discovery. For most of you, never again will such magnificent resources be available—libraries, concerts, art galleries, museums, natural resources and especially, mature men and women who have learned how to live abundantly in various ways.

Now is the time for each of you to lay the foundations for a life-long interest in some aspect of creative leisure that, as you grow older, you will also become more mature. One mark of maturity is the capacity to live "loosely," to live in freedom, to live for the sake of living, to live abundantly.
