Schedule of Officers' Duties

Greek-Letter Chapters

PRESIDENT:

In odd years, send Central Office acknowledgement of bound CRESCENT as soon as it is received. Use postal card in volume.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By August 1, either send 6 rushing calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary or notify Central Office if Panhellenic has not released rushing dates.

By September 15, send 6 college calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary.

By October 1, send Grand President business for consideration at fall council meeting, include business for consideration of convention in fall preceding convention.

Immediately after pledging (immediately after opening of college if pledging is deferred), send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

By February 15, send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

Not later than March 25, mail name and home address of new rushing chairman to Central Office.

Immediately after appointment is made, send name and address of CRESCENT Correspondent to Editor-in-chief.

As soon after April 1 as information is available, send 6 lists of new chapter officers to Central Office and 1 list each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary, on standard blanks.

By May 1, send Grand President business for consideration at spring council meeting.

By May 15, send to Central Office list of chapter members (undergraduates and alumnæ) who have passed away since preceding August 1.

By July 1, send list of graduates (include members who have dropped out of college) with home addresses to Central Office and Province Director.

TREASURER:

Pre-initiation and final fees due in Central Office within two weeks following pledging and initiation. (See schedule of CRESCENT subscriptions below.)

First semester audit due Mrs. Howe before April 15.

Second semester audit due Mrs. Howe before October 1. DO NOT SEND TO CENTRAL OFFICE.

Alumnae

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By October 1, send Grand President business for consideration at fall Council meeting.

By January 1 of a province conference year, send nominations for Province Director to Grand President.

As soon as elections have been held, send 6 lists of chapter officers to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary, on standard blanks. If complete list is not available by March 25, send name and address of member who will be responsible for rushing recommendations during the summer. Send name and address of CRESCENT Correspondent to Mrs. Pinkerton and Mrs. Marek.

By May 15, send list of members who have passed away since preceding August 1 to Central Office. Include married and maiden name and Greek-letter chapter.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

Alumnæ chapter letters for September issue and marriages, births, deaths, feature stories and glossies due Mrs. Marek July 15.

Alumnæ chapter letters for February issue, and marriages, births, deaths and features and glossies due Mrs. Marek Dec. 15.

Feature articles, newspaper clippings, pictures about alumnæ may be sent to Mrs. Marek between deadlines.

Due Central Office by December 1: first installment of international dues and \$6.50 for bound CRESCENTS and subscriptions to Banta's Greek Exchange and Fraternity Month.

Due Central Office by March 1: second installment of International dues.

Fiscal year begins August 1, ends July 31. All dues paid between those dates cover the period between and cannot apply to the next fiscal year no matter how late they are paid.

SCHOLARSHIP CHAIRMAN:

Comparative rating of NPC sororities on campus for preceding year due Mrs. Ord immediately after reported, if possible by Nov. 1.

PLEDGE TRAINER:

Immediately after pledging order pledge manuals (50¢ each) and song books (\$1.00 each) from Central Office. Enclose check.

By May 15, send report for new edition of Pledge Manual to Central Office.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

Pledge lists, glossies, chapter letters for December issue due Mrs. Pinkerton Oct. 1.

Chapter letters, glossies, features for May issue due Mrs. Pinkerton, March 1.

List of members elected to honoraries during past year, glossies and features due Mrs. Pinkerton at close of school year.

RUSHING CHAIRMAN:

Rushing reports due Province Director and International Membership Chairman immediately after each formal rushing season. Continue to report each subsequent pledge.

Order supplies (recommendation and investigation blanks, file and acknowledgement cards, post rush reports) early each spring for following fall, from Central Office. Specify quantity.

PUBLICITY CHAIRMAN:

Publicity copy, with glossies, due Mrs. Thomas by first of each month.

HISTORIAN:

Chapter history for preceding year due Miss Gresham July 1.

Chapters

At the end of each chapter letter, include name and telephone number of member in your chapter whom alumnæ new to the community may call.

HOUSE BOARD TREASURER:

First semester audit due Mrs. Howe before April 15. Second semester audit due Mrs. Howe before October 1.

TREASURER:

International dues and camp taxes cover the sorority fiscal year—August 1 through July 31. Both become due August 1 but may be paid at any time during the fiscal year. The chapter is considered delinquent, however, if dues and camp taxes of its members are not paid by January 1.

CRESCENT subscriptions, to begin with following issue, must be sent to Central Office according to schedule below.

SCHEDULE FOR CRESCENT SUBSCRIPTIONS:

CRESCENT subscriptions (included in final initiation fee for recent initiates) must be received by mailing list deadlines (shown below), if they are to begin with the next issue: August 15—September CRESCENT; November 1—December CRESCENT; January 15—February CRESCENT; April 1—May CRESCENT.

"Old Missouri, Fair Missouri-"

University of Missouri '47

In the heart of Missouri among the rolling hills that have inspired so many writers and artists, stands the oldest state university west of the Mississippi, Missouri University, founded in 1839. Its campus matches the state it represents in its annual change from the deep lasting snows of winter to the lush greenness of summer. All of Missouri, but especially, Columbia, is known for its frequent and extreme changes of weather. As Mark Twain once said of Missouri, "If you don't like the weather, wait a minute."

But while students bewail the rain, snow, or heat, they cannot help feeling pride in the stately dignity of their school. The campus is divided into two parts, red campus and white campus. Red campus derived its name from the red brick buildings which surround a green expanse known as Francis Quadrangle. In the center of the quadrangle are six ivy-covered columns (see cover), the only remains of the old Administration Building which burned in 1892. The new administration building, Jesse Hall, faces the columns and the entrance to the campus. Jesse and the other buildings on each side of the quadrangle compose the older section of the university.

A block to the east of red campus lie the newer stone buildings comprising white campus. The entrance to this section is distinguished by Memorial Tower which is dedicated to the Missouri alumni who gave their lives in World War I.

Recently a third "campus" has been added to the university. The increase in enrollment after the war necessitated a section devoted to barracks and trailer camps. Since this was a patriotic cause, this section is called blue campus to complete the patriotic color scheme, red, white, and blue.

One division of the university, the school of Mines and Metallurgy, is located at Rolla, Missouri,

Probably the best known school of the University of Missouri is the School of Journalism. It is the oldest school devoted to education for journalism in the world, having begun instruction leading to a degree in the fall of 1908. All news, editorial, feature, and advertising work on *The Columbia Missourian*, a daily newspaper, is done by students in journalism, under the supervision of faculty members, all of whom have newspaper experience. Radio journalism is facilitated through the use of Station KFRU which uses, to a large extent, student talent.

The School of Education has its own practical training field, too, in the University Laboratory School which includes child training from kindergarten through high school. All laboratory school instructors are faculty members of the School of Education and university students who "practice-teach" are under the supervision of the faculty.

The University Farms are used for investigation and practice in methods by the College of Agriculture. These farms include over two thousand acres of land as well as extensive livestock equipment.

Although the new student population causes some difficulty and crowding, it has its advantages in the boom in the social calendar.

Men's Panhellenic Council sponsors the Panhellenic Ball, usually held in the spring. Missouri's twenty-one fraternities choose the annual Panhellenic queen who is crowned at this event.

A special Panhellenic Day is sponsored by Women's Panhellenic Association. The fourteen sororities meet together to discuss problems and procedures of Greek organizations. A plaque is given for the highest scholarship rating among the sororities and a cup to the highest ranking pledge.

Missouri Workshop, the students' dramatic organization presents several plays during the year as well as sponsoring an annual one-act play contest for student writers. Workshop is one of the biggest activities on the Missouri campus and each year helps to discover and develop a surprisingly great amount of dramatic talent among the students.

Savitar, the Missouri yearbook, presents annually the Savitar Frolics, a group of skits written and presented by various organized houses on campus. Here the college humor appears in lavish mock-operas and classroom scenes. The annual J-school show is another humorous highlight in university entertainment. Written and presented by the Journalism School talent, it is usually a musical pertaining to school life. The J-show closes the period of "Journalism Week."

These are only a few of the activities within the schools that crowd the social calendar at M.U. Many of the activities had to be suspended during the war, but this last year they have reappeared bigger and better than ever.

Missouri University is old in history and tradition, rich in educational opportunity and strong in the loyalty of its many students and alumni who are convinced that there is no other school quite like it. Quite appropriately the school song begins, "Old Missouri, Fair Missouri. . . ."

New Charter at Kent State

The realization of a dream of long standing was attained on June 4, 1947 when 46 members of Theta Sigma Tau, local sorority at Kent State University, Kent, Ohio, were pledged to Gamma Phi Beta. The national organization heartily welcomes its newest sister group as its "surprise chapter" since the pledging ceremony was executed with utmost speed close on the heels of the opening of the campus to National Panhellenic groups during the final week of the school year. The new chapter is being sponsored by the near-by Akron alumnæ chapter, composed of approximately 30 members, which has had an evergrowing interest in Kent State University as a field for expansion in northern Ohio.

The campus of Kent State of over 100 acres is located in an enterprising town of 10,000, and is situated on a sloping wooded hillside with its gray stone buildings in semicircular arrangement. Founded as a normal school in 1911 by appropriation of the Ohio state legislature, the first session was held in the fall of 1913. It later expanded its curriculum, and was chartered as a University in 1935. The impetus for higher education in the post-war years has brought a vast increase in enrollment; the number of students in 1946-47 being over 4,800.

Closely associated with the growth of the university has been the expansion of the sorority latterly known as Theta Sigma Tau. In 1926, a year noted for its large new crop of fraternal organizations at Kent State, Epsilon Theta was established as a local group. At this time, there was only one other Greek letter society for women on the campus. The organization was promptly installed as Eta chapter of Theta Sigma Upsilon, a member of the Association of Educational Sororities, to which it remained loyal for 20 years. As Kent was a normal school during this period, the six A.E.S. sororities on campus served a vital purpose.

Theta Sigma Upsilon flourished as a respected member of both college circles and in the national organization since its members have always been outstanding in scholarship and in college activities. In 1937, it was judged the most progressive chapter in the national organization. It maintains a house for living quarters for about 25 members.

When Kent State became a university in 1935 and its educational standing improved so that eventually it would be accepted as a field for N.P.C. sororities, many felt that this expansion would spell the doom of the A.E.S. groups. Many of the latter groups dropped their charters and went local again as a prelude to becoming N.P.C. groups. However, Theta Sigma Upsilon maintained its educational charter until 1946, preferring a national affiliation along with three other groups on the campus, during these years of transition. Last year, the interest of N.P.C. sororities in Kent State rose to a high pitch, spurred on by the encouragement of the Dean of Women, Dr. Hyatt.

Eta chapter dropped its national affiliation to become Theta Sigma Tau in January, 1947. As the group became local once more, its future was promising as it had pledged the greatest number of girls for that rush season. The members were eager to expand their organization as an N.P.C. sorority. The crowning point in their history occurred June 4th, when 45 members along with their faculty advisor, Miss Eleanor Mellert, Cleveland, of the Department of Physical Education, became pledges of Gamma Phi Beta.

The sponsoring alumnæ chapter of Akron was materially aided by Gamma Phi Beta national officers: Miss Evelyn Gooding, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. Lester Bernhard, Director of Province II (E); Mrs. Harold Stevens, Ravenna, Ohio, Inspector of the Field. Bea Knapp McDowell (Alpha Eta), president of the Akron alumnæ, laid the foundation and brought the entire project to a successful culmination with the able assistance of her local officers as follows: Louise Stevenson (Tau), vice-president and pledge trainer; Mary Ann Allison Burnham (Alpha Eta), recording secretary; Jean Sigmond Harper (Omega), corresponding secretary; Margaret Quaife McBeath (Omega), treasurer; Mary K. Friedley and Janet Meyers (Alpha Eta), rush chairmen; Ann Ramsdell Bridgwater (Alpha Zeta), Panhellenic representative; Mary Jane Krumroy Carl (Alpha Eta), chairman of Ways and Means; and Polly Waters Johnson (Alpha Eta), publicity chairman.

The pledging ceremony, conducted by Bea McDowell, was held at the home of Ann Bridgwater, Silver Lake. Following the traditional spread, the new pledges proudly returned to the campus wearing their shiny pledge pins over brown and mode ribbons. Over 75 guests attended the tea honoring the pledges, which was held on June 14th at the Akron home of Mrs. A. W. Knapp, Bea McDowell's mother. Pledge training is now in progress to prepare the group for its installation as Beta Zeta chapter of Gamma Phi Beta, an event scheduled for early fall.

Omicron of Gamma Phi Beta established a record on the University of Illinois campus this year. Nine of our girls were initiated into Torch, Junior women's activity honorary. Never before in the history of our campus has any one sorority had the honor of having nine girls initiated into Torch in one year. The nine girls were: Dorothy Jean Ehrhardt, Lee Gardner, Mary Hull, Jeannette Jefferson, Blythe McCradie, Millicent Simonds, Phyllis Skiles, Mary Lou Walling and Edith Wells.

Campships Bring Two-fold Returns

As the letters pour in telling of the little girls who have gone to camps in the United States and Canada through the efforts of Gamma Phi Beta chapters, it is good reading and a good feeling to know that as a result of our Camp Tax so many children have been happier and healthier this summer. But when requests came for over twice as much money as was available, it was difficult to have to cut the allotments. If every Gamma Phi Beta could see the children as they start to camp, their faces shining with anticipation, or watch them in our own camps in Colorado, British Columbia or in your own local, thrilled with the fun of new experiences and new friends, we would all resolve to see that our International Philanthropic Fund is augmented so as to assure a more adequate support for Gamma Phi Beta camps and campships in the coming years.

It is encouraging, however, to learn how much many of our chapters do for the campship child beyond requesting an amount of money. The clothing for camp, birthdays and Christmas are remembered. It is discouraging to read the case histories of so many children who appear so happy in a snapshot. New York alumnæ, for instance, use their campship money to pay for medical examinations for 300 children. Without this assistance,

the children could not attend camp.

From Une G. MacMillan, New York City alumnæ camp chairman, comes this interesting note: "To say that the check was welcomed would be putting it mildly. Any help in our summer program and its cost is greatly appreciated. . . . We do not have any good camp activity pictures, but this is the way Anthony looked after he came back after two weeks in the country. I wish you could have seen him with the small shoe box with holes punched in the top. He kept putting his finger down in the box with a sort of blissful expression. When we asked what he was doing he said, "I'm letting my frog lick my finger." Then there is Rosalie who comes from a family of seven children living in a four-room apartment. She spent two weeks at a private home and came back telling us about the family that "had a whole house and went upstairs to go to bed at night."

From across the country, Margaret Howard Wiggins, Upsilon and San Diego sends this report, typical of many letters arriving daily: "We have chosen as our protege an eleven year old Girl Scout, Carole, one of three children whose father is in a tuberculosis hospital and Carole could not possibly have the trip to camp without our aid. She is an alert, bright looking child and most appreciative. The San Diego alumnæ, with the aid of friends, have provided her with the two necessary "Greenies," (The camp uniform), bathing suit, flannel shirt, Girl Scout uniform, jacket, and many other items of wearing apparel and equipment, to make her stay happier and more comfortable. We have also provided her with one of the toilet kits like those which we furnished for the Gamma Phi Beta camp in Denver. Every Girl Scout's dream is to spend a summer at camp, hiking, swimming, singing around campfires, learning new crafts, with her best friends and other girls her own age. We feel sure that Carole will have much fun in realizing that dream, and we alumnæ are happier for the privilege of sending her.'

Frances Conrad Young, of Los Angeles, writes most help-fully: "The Los Angeles alumnæ chapters had lots of fun raising the money to supplement national's contribution for campships. The Los Angeles senior alumnæ's benefit attracted 175 guests to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Victor C. Hornung for a ham

dinner with games of chance to swell the coffers. June 24th, the Third Annual Kiddie Party was held by the Los Angeles Jr. Alumnæ at Westlake School for Girls and all the Gamma Phi Betas and their friends took their children to enjoy the puppet show and home-made cakes and ice cream. We added \$80.00 to the camp fund from this party. The same evening the Pasadena alumnæ and their friends crowded the Playhouse for a benefit performance. They added \$55.00 to the fund. These benefits were supported by the Santa Monica, Valley, Glendale, Pasadena, and Los Angeles alumnæ groups. The Santa Monica alumnæ also gave two campships for the Girl Scouts. Thus we ended with \$260.00 which will provide altogether thirteen campships for underprivileged children to University Camp for ten days. We, as Gamma Phis, had a grand time raising the money and our only hope is that we'll even do a better job next year and send twice as many children to camp."

It is most difficult to choose excerpts from so many interesting letters. Alpha Delta sent a child to camp from their active chapter treasury. Only those who work with these campships and with the children know the real meaning of the joy derived

from Gamma Phi Beta campships.

New Pledge Manual!

A NEW Pledge Manual is ready for our pledges. It is the result of the request of delegates from many of the college chapters at the 1946 Convention for a shorter and more readable manual, and we hope that it will fulfill their hopes. Grand Council authorized the revision of the manual last April, and when Mrs. Simonson, International Grand President returned home from the council meeting, outlined the work immediately.

The fine manual originally compiled in 1931 by Gladys O'Connor Borland and constantly revised by Charlotte Robertson White, our Secretary-Treasurer until this year, was used as the basis for our work. Gathering ideas from everyone, from the members of Grand Council through the membership to pledges themselves, three of us did the job in Berkeley. Mrs. Simonson worked tirelessly, planning, suggesting and even writing some of the most important material; Kathleen Sage who was pledge trainer at Alpha Epsilon at the University of Arizona last year came from Tucson to make her drawings, bubbling with ideas for the content of the manual as well. Your chairman reorganized, condensed and typed the material used so the manuscript was in Evelyn Gooding's hands in June and we could have the benefit of Airdrie Pinkerton's experience and her judgment on the revision, before she returned to California from her trip to Cleveland for the National Red Cross Convention.

Evelyn Gooding revised the section on the chapters, and the final appearance of the Manual is due largely to her good taste.

This new Pledge Manual is much shorter than the previous one. Factual information has been tabulated wherever possible, and dated material eliminated. A number of "work" pages have been included in order that necessary information which varies with individual chapters may be incorporated by the pledges themselves. The section on the chapters has been revised, and the lesson plan retained but the number of lessons reduced. But the thing most likely to endear this new manual to the pledges is Kathleen Sage's little "Pledge" who is to be found on many pages.

G AMMA PHI BETA has been fortunate this year because our Province Conferences have been revived. Two days seems a short time to catch up on news from other chapters, exchange ideas, listen to outside speakers, and make new friends, doesn't it? Yet the conferences were so well planned around the theme of our service goals that the delegates could not help feeling that a great deal of constructive work was accomplished.

The "message from Grand Council," a traditional feature of the opening program, might well be repeated here for those who were unable to attend a conference. Meetings such as these conferences are valuable to the delegates, but they are even more valuable to Grand Council. The recorded exchange of ideas by all the delegates and the free discussions in which the visiting council members participate enable us to know the needs of our chapters and the constructive work being done by our members far better than isolated written reports can ever do. This present council has two main objectives: to maintain all our chapters at top strength and to place new chapters wisely in strategic locations.

In achieving the first objective, at least one of our council problems is similar to that of the chapters. This is the organization of the work done so that officers following may continue with the least possible delay and interruption. Grand Council is recording methods and procedures so that nothing is left to chance. For example, an expansion manual has been completed for the use of the Expansion Chairman, Province Directors, and alumnæ.

The importance of proper written records cannot be overemphasized, and your Council recommends that the traditions and special procedures of each chapter shall be recorded so that continuity results. A successful chapter is one in which routine is orderly and done with the minimum effort. Another type of valuable record pertaining to local history is the development of the work of our various corporation boards which have built Gamma Phi Beta houses. This may sound as dry as a bookkeeper's ledger, but it is probably quite the opposite. The selection of the site, the planning of the house, the building, the difficulties in moving, housing and rushing simultaneously combine to make a story rich in drama and comedy, interesting to all the future members of that chapter. All those alumnæ who gave time and effort to make the house a reality should be known to the younger members. Unfortunately this is not always the case, because the records often tell so little.

The great interest in the recently found first Alpha minutes and their historical significance point up the fact that recordings which may seem unimportant at the time all fall into place and make a pattern important in the future. We need only adapt, not change, the principles of that earlier period. The old virtues and ideals are as valuable today as then.

The National Association of Deans of Women's meeting, reported on another page of this issue, stressed the importance of good standards in the college home, interest in cultural fields,

and the need to set up more programs to enrich life. A questionnaire was sent to all students in one college, asking them to name those things in which they wanted increased skill. Their selection put first the desire for techniques of getting along with people and the ability to deal with different types of personalities.

This part of education can be accomplished in our chapters, and it is our duty to see that we do accomplish it. We must recognize and develop the latent ability of each member. We must spend less time in defense of our philosophy and more time in developing the method of functioning. We must practice every day the loyalty we profess—loyalty to our family of chapters, to our family within the group, and to the fraternity idea. Gamma Phi Beta is an integral part of the democratic process because it permits every member to serve through participation. It affords abundant opportunity for the practice of democracy through learning and then practicing the techniques of leadership. Our conferences were a demonstration of these techniques, and your officers are proud to have been a part of them.

A recent addition to the home economics faculty of the University of Tennessee at Knoxville is Dorothea Ruth, Alpha Upsilon '36, who will instruct in foods. Miss Ruth was awarded her Master of Science degree in home economics February 1, 1947, at the mid-year commencement of The Pennsylvania State College, and began her new duties March 15. While completing her graduate study, Miss Ruth was initiated into Omicron Nu, national home economics honorary. She has also been named the first president of the newly organized Penn State Home Economics alumnæ association. Secretary-treasurer for this organization is another Alpha Upsilon Gamma Phi Beta, Marie Prather, '35, who is the country home economics supervisor for Potter County, Pennsylvania. They certainly did! And from the only recently discovered minutes of the early meetings of Gamma Phi Beta here is a verbatim extract showing how these loyal girls celebrated Founders Day.

"Nov. 11th (1875) The Celebration of the Organization of the Gamma Phi Beta Society took place. All the members of the Alpha Chapter were present except Miss Noble.

"The Presbutata's address was short and sweet and was followed by the History for the year by Miss Haven. Miss Curtis then, having changed tasks with Miss Foster, gave us an excellent reading. Miss Foster's Essay on Secret Societies was received with favor and then Miss Bingham delivered an interesting recitation.

"All then joined in singing the Society song composed for

the occasion by Miss Helen M. Dodge.

"In the evening, all repaired to the residence of Miss Addi Curtis, who had issued many invitations to friends far and near to join in celebrating Gamma Phi Beta's Birthday.

"One of the most interesting features of the entertainment was a beautiful monogram of the letters Γ Φ B, suspended by the Society colors above a mantel, and on either side the dates 1874-1875. This was the gift of the Misses Yates.

"In the wee small hours the guests scattered all averring

that a happy day had been passed."

Notice that "all the members . . . were present except Miss Noble." Let's hope that this year, on our seventy-third anniversary we may do as well. Let's all do our individual parts to make this year's Founders Day celebrations the best, the best attended, the happiest of our entire history. And when we leave our own individual parties, may we, too, go "all averring that a happy day had been passed."

From the Deans of Women Convention

The first annual convention of the National Association of Deans of Women since 1942, was held in Columbus, Ohio, March 28-31, 1947, under the able leadership of the general chairman, Mrs. Christine Y. Conaway, Dean of Women of Ohio State University. Mrs. George M. Simonson, International Grand President, and Mrs. William A. Owen, NPC Delegate, attended as Associate Members to represent Gamma Phi Beta. Several other NPC groups were represented by national officers. We attended these meetings for the purpose of developing a better understanding of how we may best correlate our work with what is being done in the educational field.

The general theme of the convention "DEVELOPING THE HUMAN RESOURCES OF DEMOCRACY" was capably developed by leaders chosen from the member Deans who proved themselves to be intensely interesting speakers. A few of these

can be listed:

"Deans of Women Face the Future"; Miss M. Eunice Hilton, Dean of Women, Syracuse University, presented the problems confronting deans of women, with the resulting challenges to the deans. "Women's Housing" was discussed by Miss Helen B. Schleman, who has been appointed Dean of Women at Purdue University; she introduced a panel composed of Dean Moreland, University of Southern California, Dean Wilson, Indiana University, and Dean Pickel of Columbia University. The open discussion was led by Dean Carter, University of Idaho. (Miss Schleman is a Gamma Phi Beta, Northwestern '24).

Counseling in its various phases was a major topic. Mrs. Dorothy V. N. Brooks, Dean of Women, Denison University spoke on "Counseling Corps Patterns"; Miss Eleanor R. Collins, Assistant Dean of Women, Ohio State University, discussed "Our Responsibility for 'Independents,'" and described the organization of their independent women into twenty small groups, based on group interests, into the independent council named Pleiades, each individual group named for a star. Mrs. J. Alan Wickham, Dean of Women, University of Oregon, discussed Academic Counseling. Miss Alice Crocker Lloyd, Dean of Women, University of Michigan, called attention to the difference between academic and personal counseling and in her talk, "Guidance through Personal Integrity" said, "Character will always mean standards, integrity, courage, fairness, selfcontrol, a willingness to play the game of life with some rules. If education does not produce character or standards, what right has it to demand the support of the public? And many of the disciplines have to be learned outside the classroom. Education is insight and understanding attained by a study of history and science, philosophy and art, to be sure, but also attained outside the classroom in a complex relationship with other people. Modern science and technology have changed conditions of social life so tremendously in the past fifty years that we need more insight than ever before." Her sincere expression of great responsibility is indicated when she says, "The question of social values in this day and age is one of our great concerns. When honesty is at a premium throughout the world in an age that talks glibly of black markets, of political opportunism, of ends that presumably justify any means of attainment; when all too few take time for even the

most rudimentary courtesies, and manners are disappearing from the earth; when drinking is one of the major social issues among both young and old, and in America the money spent for liquor is double the amount we are willing to spend on schools; when courtship is a violent, emotional, unrestrained affair, which is unblushingly carried on in public, and stability in marriage is at a new low; when some of the basic freedoms are construed on an individual level to mean freedom from restraint of all kinds and social responsibility is only dimly realized, the educational world in all its phases has new responsibilities and a dean of women an intensified mission to perform."

Margaret S. Morriss, Dean of Women, Pembroke College, Brown University, used the topic, "What are Our Common Values?" which is quoted in part: "What do I want my students to get out of their education? . . . Certainly there are some specific values that we hope they will find, a few permanent assets, given to them or reinforced for them in some measure by their college education. . . . What are some of these values? As I list the ones that seem to me most important, you will realize immediately that they are just what you already know and are trying hard to get on your own campuses.

"First, and least important perhaps, but worth having for all that, is good taste. . . . Good taste is one of those values not moral in itself, but the ability to reject the cheap and shoddy in possessions, dress, reading, radio, and the like, the whole gamut of daily behavior leads to habits of politeness, honesty, consideration for others, which are part of the good living which we crave for our students.

"The Second value I want to stress is on the intellectual side—understanding, the intangible, slow-growing result of the amassing of knowledge, the analysis of facts, the discrimination of judgments, which comes from the intellectual processes of education. . . . I think the process of education itself serves to widen knowledge, to illuminate life and its purpose, to emphasize permanent value of understanding. As I grow older, I find that I am less and less concerned with current controversies in education—the liberal against the vocational, the progressive against the conservative, or, student-centered against that which is subject-centered. It seems to me that the problems of education are to open doors, to gain a thousand new contacts, to understand. And that can be taught in almost any kind of curriculum or school. I crave understanding for my students.

"The third great value I would wish to emphasize is the old-fashioned concept that the end of living is service, and that education is to develop the capacity to serve. Nothing is truer than that a permanent and enduring value is the idea that 'it is more blessed to give than to receive.'

"The most distressful thing I see in the world at large and among many modern students—bred perhaps because the deep insecurity of depression and war are the only things these students have known—is the desire to get—a job, a house, a husband, happiness, things that will give, they fancy, the security they want so much. Many of them seem to have this attitude—


Mrs. George Young Director, Province IV

'that the world owes them a living,' that the government owes them an education, that they must do less work for higher wages. In the old days, preachers in college chapels urged us to serve, 'Much has been given to you, much will be required.' Perhaps because a college education was then more difficult to achieve than it is now, we really did think of ourselves as privileged, getting ready to pay back all that had been given to us. It seems to me that this is not now generally true, but still the idea of service is one of the permanent values of the kind of education we would like to have even in this modern world. It is only as educated people realize that it is they who must be responsible for the welfare of their generation that this very chaotic and despairing world can ultimately go ahead.

"It seems to me that this idea of service is all tied up with democracy, with the American way of life, with freedom. We cannot have democracy or freedom without an educated people who want to serve their generation. We all know that freedom does not mean liberty to do as one pleases, but that it means to try to give everyone a fair chance in life. It is impossible to attain unless we are willing to give of ourselves and our full capacities and are eager to help secure the chance for the other fellow.

"The question of community service is tied up in this whole problem of the way in which we train our young women to look at life. Who is going to take the place of the present generation of the men and women who permeate the life of our community with their ideas of service? I wonder sometimes what is going to happen. Our generation has not been so good, but our places cannot be taken by young men and women who are out for what they can get.

"The great motive force back of the value of service is

religion, emphasis on the life of the spirit, and on the moral virtues of integrity, honesty, unselfishness. It seems to me finally that somehow or other we must continue to give to our students the dynamic which makes the machine operate, the belief in a power higher than themselves, and the willingness to put themselves in accord with that power as they leave us to work out their lives for themselves. That is religion, and the formal teaching of religion in school and college does not seem to get very far these days. I cannot explain how all these things should be done, but I am profoundly convinced that the whole value of belief in God and belief in the worth of human life are the ultimate ends of education now as they always have been. How can we teach all these things? Example, slow growth, line upon line, precept upon precept, it is more difficult than ever with the crowding of our modern ways, but modern education, too, is a failure if in the new world the old values cannot be taught. passed on to the generation for whose education you and I are responsible."

The National Association of Deans of Women, at their annual meeting held in March, adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, Much discredit has been brought upon universities and colleges by the sensational distortion of the college scene by both newspapers and magazines, be it resolved that the National Association of Deans of Women go on record as opposing such publicity and that individual deans of women use their influence to establish and maintain standards of good taste in all publicity relating to activities of women students!"

The National Conference on College Fraternities and Societies heartily commended the Deans of Women for this action,
