Schedule of Officers' Duties

Greek-Letter Chapters

PRESIDENT:

In odd years, send Central Office acknowledgement of bound CRESCENT as soon as it is received. Use postal card in volume.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By August 1, either send 6 rushing calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary or notify Central Office if Panhellenic has not released rushing dates.

By September 15, send 6 college calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary.

By September 25, send Grand President business for consideration at fall council meeting, include business for consideration of convention in fall preceding convention.

Immediately after pledging (immediately after opening of college if pledging is deferred), send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

By February 15, send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

Not later than March 25, mail name and home address of new membership (rushing) chairman to Central Office.

Immediately after appointment is made, send name and address of Crescent Correspondent to Editor-in-chief.

As soon after April 1 as information is available, send 6 lists of new chapter officers to Central Office and 1 list each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary, on standard blanks.

By March 25, send Grand President business for consideration at spring council meeting.

By May 15, send to Central Office list of chapter members (undergraduates and alumnæ) who have passed away since preceding August 1.

By July 1, send list of graduates (include members who have dropped out of college) with home addresses to Central Office and Province Director.

TREASURER:

Pre-initiation and final fees due in Central Office within two weeks following pledging and initiation. (See schedule of CRESCENT subscriptions below.)

First semester audit due Mrs. Howe before April 15.

Second semester audit due Mrs. Howe before October 1.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By September 25, send Grand President business for consideration at fall council meeting.

By January 1 of a province conference year, send nominations for Province Director to Grand President.

As soon as elections have been held, send 6 lists of chapter officers to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary, on standard blanks. If complete list is not available by March 25, send name and address of member who will be responsible for rushing recommendations during the summer. Send name and address of CRESCENT Correspondent to Mrs. Marek.

By May 15, send list of members who have passed away since preceding August 1 to Central Office. Include married and maiden name and Greek-letter chapter.

DO NOT SEND TO CENTRAL OFFICE.



On Campus At Bowling Green

Bowling Green, with its many activities and harmonious fraternity relationships, can credit much of its success to Dr. Frank J. Prout, president of the University. Dr. Prout worked hard and long for the nationalization of sororities and fraternities on campus and has always promoted the fraternity system, building it into a very worthwhile and integral part of the University's social and scholastic life.

A LTHOUGH only a little over 35 years old, Bowling Green State University has grown from a one-building Normal School with 304 students to a University boasting 50 permanent buildings, numerous temporary buildings, and approximately 4,200 students.

Administrative divisions now include the Graduate School and three undergraduate colleges—Education, Liberal Arts, and Business Administration.

Until the last war, enrollment averaged 1,500 students but the post-war boom has swelled its ranks to its present size and brought about an extensive expansion program. Within the last few years, the University has added a new Fine Arts building, Speech building, Central Heating Plant, Chemistry Laboratory Unit of the proposed Science building, Chapel, and a Cerebral Palsy Dormitory.

A system of carillonic bells was installed in 1948 in memory of the 69 former Bowling Green students who died in service.

Buildings under construction now include an addition to the Library and a new sorority house. Among future plans is the proposed \$750,000 Student Union.

Three thousand students live on campus, many of them in the 15 cottage-type dormitories which have been built since the war to house fraternities and sororities and the two independent groups.

Last year, the University purchased B. H. Urschel Hall and

the Lilian Tressel Urschel Home to be used as a dormitory and as a guest house for visitors to the campus. Included with the purchase was Urschel Pond where students may swim in warm weather.

There are 14 national fraternities and 9 national sororities on Bowling Green's campus. All the sororities and most of the fraternities are housed in dormitories built and furnished by the University. The Greek groups decorate their own lounge and chapter rooms as they wish. Beta Gamma was one of the first sororities to move into its house and we have just completed redecorating our lounge and dining room for the coming year.

Although a comparatively young school, B.G.S.U. has its share of traditions, and students cherish memories of Homecoming with its Queen and trophy for house decorations, the all-campus Christmas caroling, the Anniversary Prom in the spring, May Day with the crowning of the May Queen, and warm weather trips to Urschel Pond for swimming and sunbathing between final exams.

Other events of the year are Sigma Chi Derby Day (Beta Gamma has won the Derby Day trophy for the last two years), Alpha Tau Omega's Sadie Hawkins Week (when the girl pays), Kappa Sigma's Chariot Race (which Beta Gamma won last year), and of course the A.W.S. Christmas Formal.

Student activity fees permit unusual democracy in special events of interest to the student body. It gives them a free copy of the University yearbook, a free subscription to the student semi-weekly newspaper, and free admission to each home athletic event and each number on the Artists Series, which has brought to the campus such figures as Lauritz Melchior, the Marine Band, Cornelia Otis Skinner, Margaret Truman, and Martha Graham, among others.

The University entertains many conventions, conferences, institutes, and clinics through the year. The Cleveland Browns, professional football team, train on the campus during the summer.

Football, basketball, baseball and track catch the interest of many students, especially when the basketball teams, which have

Other children from the home watch enviously as they await their gifts from Santa. been rated among the top in the nation, head for Madison Square Garden and the National Invitational Tournament as they have done for several years. Five of Basketball Coach Harold Anderson's eight Bowling Green teams have participated in this tournament. Only one other coach has had such a record.

For those who can sing, it's Treble Clef and A Cappella Choir, which take annual tours each year. There's also the Concert Band and the Marching Band, Dance Club and Dramatics. Each year the summer theater, the Huron Playhouse, is established at Huron on Lake Erie for those interested in drama and playwriting. There's a club or honor society in almost every field.

On the more serious side are studies, of course. Bowling Green is noted for its College of Education. One of Bee Gee's best-known faculty members was Dr. Edwin Lincoln Moseley, professor emeritus of biology at the time of his death at the age of 83, two years ago. He was nationally known for his long-range weather forecasts based on his study of tree rings. His \$80,000 estate was willed to the University for scholarships.

The Cerebral Palsy Center, co-sponsored by the University and the Ohio Society for Crippled Children, was established on the campus two years ago. Students majoring in Speech and Hearing therapy work with the 12 children housed in the new

dormitory.

The Gamma Phi Betas have a busy year with their all-campus Crescent Mood dance in the fall, the annual Christmas party for the orphans in collaboration with the SAE's, and our formal dance in the spring.

Other chapter activities include the rush parties in March, when we entertain prospective pledges with our western ranch party, our backwards party, and the final formal Crescent Room party. Each year the pledge class gives the actives a party sometime before initiation. Last year a "Ghost Party" was held at the chapter house. In the spring, graduating seniors are honored at a senior Farewell Picnic.

Not to be forgotten are our all-campus serenade and the May Sing in the spring, when Beta Gamma gives a loving cup to the winner.

Beta Gamma completed a successful season last year by winning nine trophies, including the coveted all-sorority scholarship cup for the second semester in a row and being the first to win the pledge scholarship award. Beauty contests were not neglected, with Ginny Clayton reigning as Sweetheart of SAE, Pat Workman as Sophomore Silhouette, and Marian Callaway as attendant to Miss Bee Gee.

Miss Sinclair was selected by an Indianapolis, Indiana, committee of nationally prominent photographers and artists. She received an all-expense-paid trip to the "Windy City" as the guest of Lambda Chi Alpha. She was selected from among the girls nominated by the 137 chapters of Lambda Chi Alpha located on campuses throughout the nation.

On Saturday afternoon, September 2, Miss Sinclair appeared on the Chicago television show "Crushable Jones" over WGN-TV. The show took place at the Chicago World's Fairgrounds television station. Appearing with Miss Sinclair was the chorus of the University of Illinois chapter of Lambda Chi Alpha.

Miss Sinclair arrived in Chicago on Friday afternoon, September 1. She was met at the airport by Miss Ruth J. Wood, Secretary-Treasurer of Gamma Phi Beta sorority and several members of the Chicago Hospitality Committee of Lambda Chi Alpha.

Miss Sinclair, a sophomore at the University of California,

Berkeley, was nominated by Mu Chapter of Lambda Chi Alpha at that campus. During the past school year she was chosen Queen of Mu Chapter's annual Daffodil Festival from a group of some thirty contestants representing the women's groups on the campus.

As charming as she is lovely, Miss Sinclair claims the Hawaiian Islands as her birthplace, although at present she lives in Palo Alto, California. Besides this, Louise was a charter member of Delta and wrote the first history of Gamma Phi Beta. She was also the founder of Boston alumnæ chapter and its first secretary. Augusta was Delta's first initiate.

During all these years they have all been active members of

Boston chapter until the passing of Louise in March, 1922, and of Anna in May, 1948. It would be quite impossible to tell of all the lovely things that these sisters have done and are still doing for Delta and Boston; the many times they have opened their lovely home to us for initiation parties and reunions; always among the first to give generously to any project; always ready to give abundantly of their time and counsel. It is no wonder that Delta and Boston regard them as something very special, and consider no affair complete unless graced by their presence.

Miss Carrie Morgan Carries On

WITH 86 years of full living under her belt and a high sense of humor, Miss Carrie Morgan continues to serve her community, her college and her sorority, Gamma Phi Beta. This, in spite of a fractured hip incurred last winter which has kept her bedridden much of the time since.

Miss Morgan recently made the headlines of the Appleton, Wisconsin *Post-Crescent* when she presented to the Lawrence College Theatre a tremendous wardrobe of period costumes from her treasure-trove attic.

Many of the costumes in the collection were bought to wear to Gamma Phi Beta conventions. (Miss Morgan has served as International Grand President, was a founder of Gamma chapter at the University of Wisconsin and is listed on the Honor Roll for the expansion program instituted during her presidency.) Miss Morgan recalls exactly which clothes she wore to which convention. "That tan chiffon with the cut steel beads I wore to the St. Louis convention in 1922." she says. A pair of black toothpick shoes carried her, somewhat painfully, to a Denver meeting and a gold lace cobweb of a blouse was part of an ensemble which dazzled the sisterhood at the Syracuse, New York, meeting.

A fine striped silk dress with elegant nut brown velvet panels was Miss Morgan's own high school graduation dress . . . though 70 years old, the material is still soft and lustrous. Miss Morgan's waist at the time couldn't have been any bigger than a hitching post, and the theatre girls will have to do some squeezing to get into the garments.

Many of the costumes bear Paris and London labels . . . a reminder of Miss Morgan's year on the continent. "In 1905 the city bought my home and built the high school on it (now the Morgan School), so I took the year off and went abroad," she says.

A half dozen white petticoats were included in the wardrobe presented to the theatre. "Why," says Miss Morgan, "I remember the time when I outfitted the whole operetta chorus at the high school in white petticoats... 16 in all."

A pink opera cape of fleecy material was first worn by Miss Morgan to the initial artist series program ever heard in Appleton in the winter of 1890. "I haven't missed an artist series since then, but I guess I'll have to stay in this year. Hope the weather is nice in March so I can see at least one program."

Miss Morgan states that the real cream of her wardrobe was sent to Milwaukee for the state centennial and is now in the historical society collection.

Looking over Miss Morgan's collection, it is not hard to tell which are her colors . . . soft greens, violets, pinks and blues.

"When I would visit the schools, I tried to wear attractive colors. Children hate dull looking visitors and teachers. Kindergarten teachers especially should wear something bright, for colors are so attractive to little children." So speaks Miss Carrie Morgan who, after a 31 year career as Superintendent of the Appleton schools, really ought to know!

We Love Our Work!

A merican Red Cross recreation workers all love their work and are thrilled at the chance to work in a setting that gives such wonderful opportunities to travel. At present the American Red Cross is maintaining a program of recreation and social service in the U. S. Army hospitals located in Occupied

Europe.

At the 97th General Hospital in Frankfurt, Germany, I am one of six recreation workers all of whom were trained at American University under the ARC program of Service in Military Hospitals. Our job is to see that the patients in the hospital are provided with recreation suitable to the limitations of their illnesses. We have a building and a quonset hut in which to carry out a program for the patients who are able to get off their wards, but the wards are visited regularly and the patients there are given crafts, books, games, quiz programs, musical entertainment, and parties. It is hoped that the long hours a soldier spends so far from home are thus broken by enjoyable things to do.

Frankfurt is a railway center of Europe. It's just overnight to Paris by train and under two hours to London by plane. One of the amazing things about Europe is the short distance between major points. Consequently, in a year's time one can see all the countries which are open to travel. Besides the many interests that travel in other countries stimulates, there are countless things to do and see right in Germany. You find your-

self taking up new hobbies, such as studying German, learning to ski at Garmisch, and spending endless hours window shopping, gazing at fascinating lace figurines, cuckoo clocks, carved figures, and other oldworld specialties.

You shop for lace in Brussels, silver and glassware in Denmark, clothes in Paris and Vienna, china in Berlin, leather in Florence, and for everything in Venice. You take thrilling cable car rides to the top of the Alps in Garmisch to look over four countries. You ride the gondolas in Venice and bump into Orson Welles. You attend Mrs. Mesta's open house for Occupation personnel in Luxembourg.

Working daytimes and several evenings a week while making every day and week-end off count to advantage, we have no idle moments, but we do feel that our time here is most rewarding.

New York Alumnae Aid Girls' Service League

Last winter the New York alumnæ chapter extended its social service program to help the Girls' Service League of this City. This is a private, non-sectarian agency which works with emotionally disturbed adolescents of average intelligence. The League staff is made up of a part-time psychiatrist, psychologist

and four full-time psychiatric social workers and their director. The organization is housed in two remodeled brown stone houses on East 18th and 19th Streets with a connecting garden.

Girls are referred by other agencies, parents, schools and the courts and are first admitted to the study home. Here they are given physical, psychiatric and psychological tests and a plan is made to meet the individual girl's problems. She enters the study home where her adjustment to other girls and the staff is observed and when she has improved sufficiently, is transferred to Preston House. Improvement may be a matter of several weeks or many months. (The Study Home houses 12 girls; Preston House 30.)

The League's budget is a large one but care is expensive and they always need money! In the spring, we elected to provide as many campships as possible because this experience is such a fruitful one. Our bridge party provided for three campships. Grace Merrill, one of our most loyal and industrious members, on her own initiative, secured nine. We are now reading over the reports of our 12 girls and it is extremely satisfying to learn the extent to which their lives have been enriched by camp.

This fall we have several plans afoot and pending approval by the chapter, we hope to redecorate two dormitory rooms housing 4 girls each at Preston House. Our Social Service Program helps us to know our community needs and best of all, we get to know each other better.

Eight years ago, Mrs. Fitzgerald, who is known professionally as Elvera Baker, turned her vitality and enthusiasm into a new field in which she has found a great deal of success. Her Educational Counseling Service is the Chicago office for many fine co-educational and women's colleges. This busy place is full of young people seeking her advice on where to go to school. Her sincere interest in all their problems has made for her an enviable record in the counseling field.

Grand Council must have recognized this genuine interest in young people when they asked her to serve in this new capacity. I hope I may be forgiven for being a bit prejudiced in my feeling that they made an excellent choice. You see, the new director of Province II (W) happens to be my mother!

M ISS DOROTHY M. MORGAN who received the Master of Business Administration degree from the School of Business, University of Chicago recently is the first Canadian woman to be awarded the degree from that university in Hospital Administration.

A native of London, Ontario, Miss Morgan received her education in the London schools and McGill University, obtaining her B.A. degree from the University of Western On-

tario. Following that, she was employed as private secretary to Mr. J. W. Plewes, Inspector of Income Tax, London District.

At the outbreak of war in 1939, Miss Morgan entered training as a nurse at Victoria Hospital Training School for Nurses, London, graduating in 1942. In 1943, after receiving the B.Sc.N. degree from the University of Western Ontario in Hospital and Nursing Administration, she was appointed Assistant Superintendent of Nurses at the Kingston General Hospital, where she remained until the fall of 1947, when she left for Chicago to study Hospital Administration under Dr. A. C. Bachmeyer.

During 1948-49, Miss Morgan served as Administrative Resident at St. Barnabas Hospital, Minneapolis, being the last student to work as such under the late Miss Nellie Gorgas, former

Director of that Hospital.

Besides her academic interests, Miss Morgan has been active in a number of organizations, professional and otherwise, having been a charter member of Alpha Omega chapter of Gamma Phi Beta at the University of Western Ontario, and also a past president of District No. 7, the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario, and a member of the Ontario Board of that organization. She also acted as consultant when the Ontario program for Nursing Assistants was being set up.

How affectionate and starved for love they are! The last two weeks we had a girl from the State Home who was a head taller than I, and acted exactly like a boy. She continually rough-housed with the other little girls, sometimes hurting them. Any reprimands were met with tears and anger on her part. Yet every night Mary had to be tucked into bed and kissed good-night.

Then there was Irma. Irma was slow mentally but had an unending love for music. She could sing any song from the hit parade with perfect rhythm. Miserable Irma, tortured by thoughts that the rest of the girls didn't like her, terrified for fear she couldn't come back next year. In what kind of a world will Irma live? Will she remember her two weeks at Gamma Phi Beta Camp? I think so. It is probably the first time she has had a great deal of personal attention.

The sisters "Pat" and "Mike"—who said they hated camp and wanted their new stepfather-to-be, a policeman, to come after them. They were so afraid they were missing things at home. Superior and haughty to the bone, yet when the last day of camp came they both realized that they had had a good time and were going to miss their newly-acquired friends.

Sunja, the tall, blond Swedish girl, silent until asking for a third glass of milk, turned out to be one of the practical jokers.

Do you know a better way for a college girl to get practical knowledge of children? How I thank my stars I was a Gamma Phi Beta and had the privilege, because it's one of the greatest privileges and opportunities for Gamma Phi Betas everywhere, to go to camp as counselor. We have a 500 foot water frontage facing the sunny south, over the Gulf of Georgia. The beach is the counselors' delight as it is composed of fine pebbles and stones and nary a barnacle to scratch thirty pairs of small feet.

Located about twenty feet back from the beach is the main camp house which contains two bedrooms, kitchen, living room, front porch and bathroom. The carpenters have built the porch into the living room, giving us a large glassed in area for mealtimes and rainy day recreation. The kitchen and bath have new cupboards and storage spaces, new red linoleum on the floor and drain boards, and a brand new sink. The Vancouver Mothers Club raised over \$300.00 at a bridge and fashion show and presented us with a shiny white enamel oil range.

The Phi Kappa Phi fraternity at U. B. C. volunteered a "paint" week-end and spent it at Sechelt . . . the result, a spanking white kitchen and bathroom and a coat of paint on the cabin's entire siding.

About the main building are four guest cottages with whitewashed siding and red window trim. There the children sleep and keep their new found treasures (stones, shells and pine cones).

Another building shelters a small non-tip row boat in fine condition. This the counselors use for patrolling the water front.

Each day one of the Victorian Order of Nurses passes the camp, thus medical advice is close at hand. Dr. McCall in Sechelt has been wonderful to us, offering his services gratis in case of emergency, and also testing our well water. By the way, our camp has one of the finest wells in the community.

If only each and every chapter could see the precious children

that are given holidays each year through your generosity! These youngsters are so very appreciative, not so much in a way that says "Thank you"—period, but in a way that really warms the hearts of those working with them. Sometimes the children show their thanks unconsciously in ways that tend to make you even more determined to help them.

There's not a doubt but that these youngsters benefit immensely from regular meals, clean and healthy living, learning the blessing and goodnight songs, cleaning their own rooms, helping in a clean kitchen and getting lots of outdoor play.

The home-like atmosphere and unregimented routine at our camp are part of the reason these youngsters get a real holiday. You will all be very proud, as we are, to know that our Gamma Phi Beta Camp is highly rated by the Vancouver Social Agencies.

For each child at camp there is a case history on file with the Camp Director. These histories describe the child, his environment, his problems if any, and as you can imagine, are most helpful in dealing with each youngster as an individual. (They are of course confidential.)

We try to have one counselor for every five children if possible. This depends on volunteers. The camp Director is then free to plan picnics, cook-outs, fishing parties, firesides, guessing games, etc. She also is in charge of maintenance, and smooth running of the camp in general.

It seems impossible to believe that we have our very own Gamma Phi Beta camp at last! The setting is beyond compare, flat play areas, an ideal beach, an ample supply of shade trees, and trails for walks in the woods.

The people of Sechelt have been most kind and seem to feel, as we do, that our Gamma Phi Beta camp is a very worth-while project. We are grateful for their interest and help. As our camp grows bigger and better each year, we and the people of Sechelt may be proud of one of the finest fresh air camps on the Pacific Coast.

Alpha Omicron And Eta Win Scholarship Awards

Since the custom of giving a scholarship award was revived, at least temporarily, at the 1948 Convention, many chapters with high standing must have been disappointed that records were not sufficiently complete to present the award at Glenwood Springs in June. However, I believe that all chapters and alumnæ must have been impressed with the lists, posted at that time, of girls who had achieved recognition on each campus. Other girls have been recognized since that time. It is very gratifying to find more than thirty Phi Beta Kappas and Phi Kappa Phis in Gamma Phi Beta, more than forty girls elected to Mortar Board, and many, many others elected to honorary societies in special fields or to special local honorary groups. The list of those graduating with particular distinction is very impressive, as is the number of girls chosen as particularly outstanding either in their class or in their field of study.

All of this was achieved by groups where honorary societies are established. Many chapters have no such opportunities, and indeed many of the chapters cannot really be eligible for Grand Council's award as the manner of judging is now set up.

It is with distinct pleasure that we award this year duplicate silver trays, suitably engarved, to Alpha Omicron for excellence in scholarship and to Eta for spectacular improvement in scholarship. We highly commend with Honorable Mention Omicron for continued and outstanding scholarship over the past four years. We commend also those chapters which have maintained high scholarship or have demonstrated significant improvement. We are not unmindful of the achievements of other groups whether eligible for comparison or not, nor are we unaware of the great contributions these girls will make as citizens of the world.

We are, in fact, again faced with this whole problem of grades, awards and honors. Grades are one measure only of college achievement where some yardstick is necessary for establishing a basis for judging success, particularly since graduate fellowships may later be awarded. Few colleges feel at this time that they can gamble on the poor student, no matter how excellent her personality.

However, in the final analysis the responsibility for achievement rests squarely on each girl's shoulders. If she has devoted herself sincerely to this process of learning and developing, she will soon find herself reaping the visible rewards in the shape of high grades and the intangible rewards which at present perhaps only she herself recognizes in her search for truth among the knowledge and wisdom of the past. Later on the impact of her success will be felt by all who come within her circle.

The International Campship Fund

To SUPPLEMENT the work done in the Vancouver and Denver camps, Gamma Phi Beta established the International Campship Fund. Alumnæ chapters may apply to the Fund for campships to send underprivileged girls from their area to local camps. In this manner, Gamma Phi Beta's aid to the underprivileged is spread throughout this country, Canada and Hawaii.

Through benefits and charity affairs, additional money is raised by the alumnæ and Greek letter chapters to increase the amount available for campships. Where does your chapter stand? How many girls did you send to camp?

Following are three of the many reports filed with Miss Cottingham.

Peoria alumnæ chapter was pleased again this year to be able to supplement their allotment from the Gamma Phi Beta International Campship Fund thus enabling three handicapped children to go to the Neighborhood House, Camp Quinn, near Peoria.

We selected three girls who have been hospitalized for several years, whose parents could in no way afford such extras as summer camp. The children are all confined to wheel chairs but have no difficulty in enjoying camp life due to the specially prepared equipment built for their use at this camp. Ramps have been set up so that they may get around the grounds and buildings with ease. Nurses from the Peoria Hospital give their time so that the children receive regular treatments while at camp.

We Gamma Phi Betas of Peoria feel that this is an especially worthwhile camp and are planning to show movies of Camp Quinn and to start a fund of our own for campships for these children.

Plans are being formulated for an established Girl Scout Camp near Springfield. Perhaps in another year we may have the pleasure of sending girls to this camp. We of Alpha Nu do thank you for your generous allotment to us and for permitting us to play such a direct part in helping needy children.

Reprinted from the *Scroll* of Phi Delta Theta this advice applies to fraternity undergraduates everywhere. Substitute the name of our Sorority and consider YOUR responsibility.—Editor.

A LIMITED number of young men in each of a hundred and ten American and Canadian colleges and universities have been entrusted with charters of Phi Delta Theta. Such a charter is a priceless heritage. Its value and the responsibility which its possession entails are not to be regarded lightly.

In many instances those charters were obtained by the predecessors of those now in the chapters at a considerable cost of time and effort. They were handed down to those who are now charged with their guardianship in entire confidence that the principles of fraternal affection, sound learning, and upright conduct would be an inspiration to lives of greater accomplishment, culture, and usefulness.

The task of transmitting those charters, unscarred and unblemished to future generations of Phis is a responsibility which every present member of the active chapters assumed when he signed the Bond. There is nothing implied in the guardianship of that charter that could interfere in any way with a wholesome participation in all recognized college activities.

But for the individual or the chapter to indulge in deliberate or thoughtless violations of the recognized rules of conduct is an act of treason to those who made possible your membership in Phi Delta Theta. For your four years in college that charter is yours to guard as you would your sacred honor.

Do not fear that Phi Delta Theta or the fraternity system is going to follow the dodo bird into oblivion. Adjustments in method and perhaps in some of the relationships which the chapter bears to the college may be necessary to conform to the changes in social thought and values which will inevitably take place in a world which is constantly striving for human betterment. But so long as men continue to feel the need of human companionship, and so long as the members of this Fraternity, as individuals and as chapter groups, conduct themselves in conformity to the teachings of the immortal Bond, so long will Phi Delta Theta endure.
