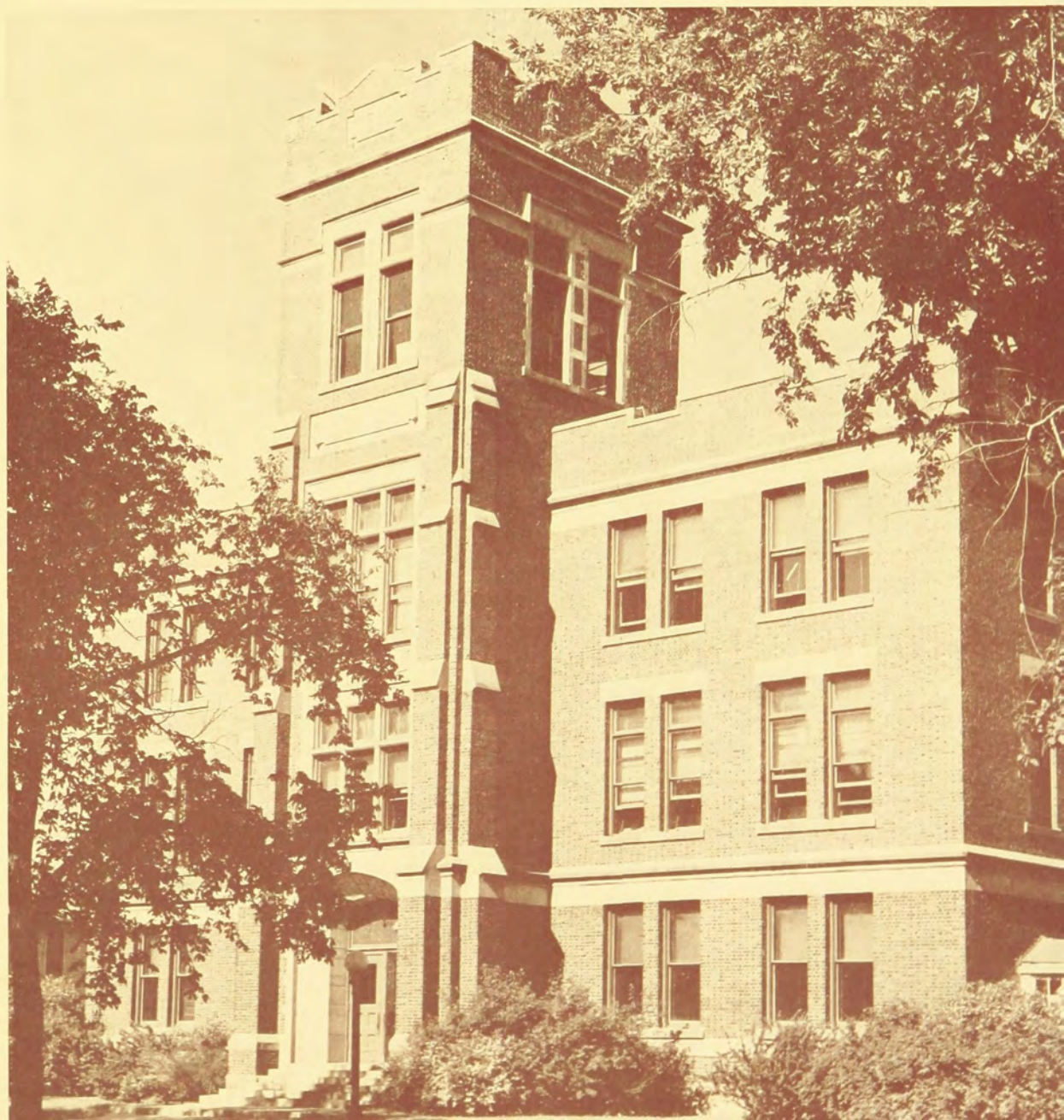

Schedule of Officers' Duties

Greek-Letter Chapters

PRESIDENT:

In odd years, send Central Office acknowledgement of bound CRESCENT as soon as it is received. Use postal card in volume.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By August 1, either send 6 rushing calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary or notify Central Office if Panhellenic has not released rushing dates.

By September 15, send 6 college calendars to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary.

By September 25, send Grand President business for consideration at fall council meeting, include business for consideration of convention in fall preceding convention.

Immediately after pledging (immediately after opening of college if pledging is deferred), send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

By February 15, send lists of chapter members and pledges (new and holdovers) to Central Office and Province Director on standard blanks.

Not later than March 25, mail name and home address of new membership (rushing) chairman to Central Office.

Immediately after appointment is made, send name and address of CRESCENT Correspondent to Editor-in-chief.

As soon after April 1 as information is available, send 6 lists of new chapter officers to Central Office and 1 list each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary, on standard blanks.

By March 25, send Grand President business for consideration at spring council meeting.

By May 15, send to Central Office list of chapter members (undergraduates and alumnæ) who have passed away since preceding August 1.

By July 1, send list of graduates (include members who have dropped out of college) with home addresses to Central Office and Province Director.

TREASURER:

Pre-initiation and final fees due in Central Office within two weeks following pledging and initiation. (See schedule of CRESCENT subscriptions below.)

First semester audit due Mrs. Howe before April 15.

Second semester audit due Mrs. Howe before October 1.
DO NOT SEND TO CENTRAL OFFICE.

Due Central Office by December 1: first installment of international dues and \$7.50 for bound CRESCENTS and subscriptions to *Banta's Greek Exchange* and *Fraternity Month*.
Due Central Office by March 1: second installment of International dues.

Fiscal year begins August 1, ends July 31. All dues paid between those dates cover the period between and cannot apply to the next fiscal year no matter how late they are paid.

SCHOLARSHIP CHAIRMAN:

Comparative rating of NPC sororities on campus for preceding year due Scholarship Chairman immediately after reported, if possible by Nov. 1.

PLEDGE TRAINER:

Immediately after pledging order pledge manuals (85¢ each) and song books (\$1.00 each) from Central Office. Enclose check.

By May 15, send report for new edition of Pledge Manual to Central Office.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

Honors, glossies, features for December issue due Mrs. Marek, October 1.

Chapter letters for February issue due Mrs. Marek December 1.

MEMBERSHIP (RUSHING) CHAIRMAN:

Rushing reports due Province Director and International Membership Chairman immediately after each formal rushing season. Continue to report each subsequent pledge.

Order supplies (recommendation and investigation blanks, file and acknowledgement cards, post rush reports) early each spring for following fall, from Central Office. Specify quantity.

PUBLICITY CHAIRMAN:

Publicity copy, with glossies, due Mrs. Thomas by first of each month.

HISTORIAN:

Chapter history for preceding year due Miss Gresham July 1.

Alumnae Chapters

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

By September 25, send Grand President business for consideration at fall council meeting.

By January 1 of a province conference year, send nominations for Province Director to Grand President.

As soon as elections have been held, send 6 lists of chapter officers to Central Office and 1 each to Province Director and Traveling Secretary, on standard blanks. If complete list is not available by March 25, send name and address of member who will be responsible for rushing recommendations during the summer. Send name and address of CRESCENT Correspondent to Mrs. Marek.

By May 15, send list of members who have passed away since preceding August 1 to Central Office. Include married and maiden name and Greek-letter chapter.

CRESCENT CORRESPONDENT:

Alumnæ chapter letters for December issue, including marriages, births and deaths due Mrs. Walter E. Holman, 1960 S.W. 16th Ave., Portland, Oregon, October 1.

Feature articles, glossies and newspaper clippings for February issue due Mrs. Marek December 1.

At the end of each chapter letter, include name and telephone number of member in your chapter whom alumnæ new to the community may call.

HOUSE BOARD TREASURER:

First semester audit due Mrs. Howe before April 15.

Second semester audit due Mrs. Howe before October 1.

TREASURER:

International dues and camp taxes cover the sorority fiscal year—August 1 through July 31. These are payable any time during the fiscal year. Chapters and individual members are considered delinquent, however, if dues and camp taxes are not paid by January 1.

CRESCENT subscriptions, to begin with following issue, must be sent to Central Office according to schedule below.

SCHEDULE FOR CRESCENT SUBSCRIPTIONS:

CRESCENT subscriptions (included in final initiation fee for recent initiates) must be received by mailing list deadline (shown below), if they are to begin with the next issue: August 15—September CRESCENT; November 1—December CRESCENT; January 15—February CRESCENT; April—May CRESCENT.

Subscriptions cannot be dated back since only enough copies are printed to accommodate mailing list at time of publication.

Gamma Phi Betas Attend 44th Convention In Glenwood Springs, Colorado

Where but in Colorado can you find these things?

Honest-to-goodness cowboys to meet your train and tote your luggage?
Smiling, western Gamma Phi Betas to welcome you and speed you through the registration process, though it was well after midnight when the special arrived?

A heavenly blue sky with cream-puff clouds served up every morning at eight?
Tall pines and majestic mountains that dwarf you physically, but inspire you to think big thoughts . . . to do great deeds?

Into such a setting came Gamma Phi Betas from every corner of this country and Canada to meet in the 44th convention at Glenwood Springs, Colorado.

ON FRIDAY evening, June 23, conventioners gathered in the beautiful Hotel Colorado lobby for a formal reception honoring Grand Council, Province Directors and honored guests. Gamma Phi Beta's 44th convention was officially opened! At the formal opening banquet, following the reception, Mrs. Loring C. Lennox of Colorado Springs served as toastmistress, setting the Western Mood with stories of the old west, and pointing up the banquet theme of "Pike's Peak or Bust."

Bringing his listeners to the more serious side of life was Professor John E. Lawson of Denver University's Political Science department. He spoke eloquently and forcefully of the duties and responsibilities of college women in Public Affairs . . . certainly a pertinent subject on the very eve of the Korean War!

Prof. Lawson outlined three problems facing us today: the danger of war in a world of conflicting ideologies, where peaceful diplomacy was in a state of collapse . . . "where the International Insult is now commonplace"; the financial

problem of deficit financing to support other countries as well as people in our own country; the decline of the importance of the individual.

He then suggested that ammunition to attack these problems could be obtained in college. First, a college should make a person think inductively, from the particular to the general . . . from the past to the present and the future. "A feeling or an emotion about these problems will not solve them," said Prof. Lawson.

Second, college should make people act as individuals and think for themselves, rather than going along with the mob. And last, college should make a woman humble and devout. "Humble, because of what she does not know. Education is a tool that gets sharper with use. Devout, because reason alone cannot handle the problems . . . it will take faith," Prof. Lawson said.

He concluded, "Education and religion should not be antagonistic, for reason unguided by faith is useless." D D D

Mrs. William A. Owen, Syracuse, Elected Grand President Of Gamma Phi Beta

AMID a great round of enthusiastic applause, Mrs. William A. Owen, Grand President elect, was introduced by Mrs. George M. Simonson at the Carnation Banquet. Mrs. Owen, in turn, presented the newly elected members of Grand Council. Gamma Phi Beta's new officers were nominated by a committee composed of one representative from each province, earlier in the convention, and were unanimously elected at the final convention session. Mrs. M. A. Newell, Denver alumna, served as chairman of the nominating committee. Mrs. Owen, a member of Alpha and Syracuse alumna chapters, comes to Gamma Phi Beta's highest office well qualified to serve as President. In 1946 she was chairman of the Bretton Woods convention and served as treasurer of the Syracuse alumna chapter for five years. She also served as president of the Syracuse chapter and treasurer of the Alpha House Corporation. On the international level she has been Gamma Phi Beta's NPC delegate and Chairman of Expansion for the past four years. Hers has been the guiding hand behind the highly successful expansion program of Gamma Phi Beta since 1946.

Mrs. D. W. LeMaster of Tulsa was elected to the office of Vice President. Serving as official hostess of this convention, Mrs. LeMaster has been director of Province V since 1948. She formerly served as membership chairman for Psi at Oklahoma chapter, president of the Psi Corporation Board and as president of the Tulsa alumna chapter. She succeeds Mrs. Richard Marvin.

Mrs. Stuart K. Fox, Epsilon and North Shore alumna was elected to the office of Chairman of Provinces, and will succeed Mrs. Ralph Dippell. She served as Chicago alumna president for five years and alumna House Treasurer of Epsilon for ten years. She was Director of Province II from 1938 to 1941 and served as membership chairman in Chicago and the Evanston-North Shore alumna groups. Since 1948 she has been Expansion Gift Fund chairman. Mrs. Fox has been a tower of strength to Epsilon chapter at Northwestern and served for many years as alumna advisor.

Mrs. F. Theodore Isaacson of Seattle will succeed Mrs. Owen as National Panhellenic Delegate. She has served as Seattle magazine chairman, alumna rushing chairman and delegate to the

Bretton Woods convention. At present she is director of Province VI.

Mrs. Howard G. Newman of Tulsa was named Chairman of Finance to succeed Mrs. Roger Howe. She has been a member of the Psi Corporation Board for the past three years and has recently been elected to another term as president. Her experience and efficiency in the handling of funds qualify her candidacy for Finance Chairman.

Mrs. John M. Curtis of Washington, D.C., will serve as Chairman of Expansion, a new Grand Council position created at this convention. Previously the NPC delegate was also in charge of expansion, but due to increased activity in both fields, it became too great a burden for one officer. Mrs. Curtis was the first International Chairman of Student Scholarships and served on the nominating committee at the St. Louis convention in 1948. She assisted in the founding of Beta Beta at Maryland U., and was the first treasurer of that chapter's House Board.

Confidence in the new Grand Council was expressed by Mrs. Simonson as she spoke of the bright future for Gamma Phi Beta under the capable leadership of Mrs. Owen and her officers. Retiring officers work closely with their successors, culminating their official years of service to Gamma Phi Beta at the Joint Council meeting to be held this fall.

Retiring Grand Council Officers Report To Convention

A BRIEF summary of Mrs. G. M. Simonson's report covering the past two years can hardly do justice to the tremendous amount of work she has done as Grand President of Gamma Phi Beta. Revisions of Ritual, recommended by the St. Louis convention are complete . . . the *Handbook*, source book of information, will be off the press by fall . . . a carefully worked out plan to develop alumnae strength has been presented to the membership . . . the addition of four new chapters and a fifth to be installed in September highlight the list of progressive action taken by Grand Council.

Mrs. Simonson has visited the colony at Vermont, and acted as installation officer for the new chapters at San Diego, Tempe, Pocatello and Tallahassee.

Mrs. Richard Marvin, Vice-President and Alumnae Secretary reported that charters had been granted to 12 alumnae chapters since 1948. Inaugurating the coin card idea for Founders Day celebrations, Mrs. Marvin said that over \$5,000 in contributions had been turned over to the Endowment Fund since November 1949.

Mrs. Ralph Dippell, Chairman of Provinces, reported the revision of the Province Directors' manual, and the re-establishment of Province Directors' schools for new directors. Three regional schools were conducted and included instruction in the use of the manual, policies and procedures. Mrs. Dippell reported that Province V had been united under one director to facilitate conducting of convention, and that with the addition of three new chapters in Province VII, it had been divided into Province VII North and VII South.

Mrs. William Owen, NPC Delegate and Chairman of Expansion served as Chairman of the NPC Extension Committee and presented a most complete survey of procedures for establishing new chapters to the Conference at their Skytop meeting in November, 1949. At that time she was appointed as Chairman of the NPC representatives of the Joint NPC-National Association

In the field of Gamma Phi Beta expansion, Mrs. Owen reported the installation of four new Greek letter chapters at Idaho State College, Arizona State College, San Diego State College and Florida State University. A fifth chapter, Beta Nu at the University of Vermont, will be installed September 15-17.

Mrs. Roger Howe, Chairman of Finance, presented the tentative budget for 1950-51, and reported on the Crescent Fund, Camp Fund, Housing Chapter financing, and the Expansion Gift Fund.

Miss Ruth Wood, Secretary-Treasurer, gave a brief résumé of the inner workings of Central Office, and presented in the Convention Program a complete financial report, as examined by Arthur Anderson and Company, for the year ending July 31, 1949. D D D

Day By Day At Convention

GAMMA PHI BETA's 44th Convention was called to order by the Grand President, Mrs. G. M. Simonson, at 9:30 A.M. Friday, June 23 in the Glenwood Room of the Hotel Colorado. Following the gracious welcomes extended the delegates from Mrs. D. W. LeMaster, Official Hostess and Mrs. J. B. Finks, Jr., Convention Chairman, committees were appointed and the report of the Grand President was read and accepted.

Philanthropy reports were made by Mrs. Charles Erickson of Detroit, Miss Cathryne Melton of San Antonio and Mrs. H. G. Newman of Tulsa. Miss Laura Frances Cottingham, International Camp Chairman, outlined the progress made in the past two years at the Denver and Vancouver camps.

Highlight of the morning's program was the announcement that the Lindsey Barbee \$1000 Fellowship had been awarded to Eleanor Gorham of the University of Minnesota. Mrs. Pat M. Smith of Chicago, representing the Endowment Crescent Board, made the announcement. Although not a member of the sorority, Miss Gorham was the candidate proposed by Gamma Phi Beta to the American Association of University Women who biennially choose the recipient of the fellowship on behalf of the sorority. Miss Gorham was chosen from a field of 13 candidates. She holds a bachelor of science degree from Wells College and has studied at the London School of Economics and the University of Pittsburgh. Miss Gorham has worked extensively in Boston social centers.

The Lindsey Barbee Fellowship which was enlarged from \$500 to \$1000 in 1927, has been awarded to a member of Gamma Phi Beta only once since its inception in 1915. It is granted to outstanding women in the field of social service work and study and is supported by voluntary contributions.

Following a general session for voting on Constitutional Amendments, the remainder of the afternoon was devoted to round table discussions. The Greek letter group, led by Mrs. Ralph E. Dippell, Jr., held a model chapter meeting and a model pledge meeting. Mrs. Richard Marvin led the alumnae round table discussion, which covered development of group interest, enlarging alumnae chapter membership and winning better relations in the community.

A formal reception honoring Grand Council, Province Directors and Honored Guests followed the afternoon meetings, and the day was climaxed with the formal opening banquet with Prof. John E. Lawson of the University of Denver as guest speaker.

Saturday's session brought a report of 56 official college chapter delegates and 43 official alumnae chapter delegates. Voting on By-Law amendments and a report of the Budget Committee by Mrs. Roger F. Howe was followed by a Round Table on Expansion with Mrs. William A. Owen as chairman. At luncheon,

delegates were seated at honor tables, with all the Phi Beta Kappas, Mortar Boards, Beta Gamma Sigmas and other honorary members gathered together.

Greek letter chapter round tables in the afternoon were again in charge of Mrs. Dippell and discussion centered around Standards. The alumnae chapter round table, with Mrs. Marvin as chairman, discussed the Alumnae Plan, Founders Day and Junior alumnae groups.

Square dancing was the feature of the evening's entertainment, and everybody agreed that Laura Frances Cottingham was champion in the do-see-do circles. Quieter souls repaired to the lobby for bridge and canasta.

Sunday, June 25 brought the report of the nominating committee and the presentation of the new Gamma Phi Beta *Handbook* by Mrs. Simonson. Authorized by the St. Louis convention in 1948, the *Handbook* was compiled by Mrs. DeWolf Alden of the Berkeley alumnae chapter, with the assistance of Mrs. Victor Horning, Los Angeles, Mrs. William Dehn, Seattle, Mrs. Simonson and the members of Grand Council. The handbook is a summary of all Gamma Phi Beta procedures and policies and will be available to all members of the sorority.

During her tenure as editor of THE CRESCENT, Miss Barbee also served as Grand President of Gamma Phi Beta from 1919 to 1924. She is the author of the *History of Gamma Phi Beta*, the pledge service and the Memorial Service.

As a tribute to this Honor Roll member, Gamma Phi Beta created the Lindsey Barbee Fellowship in 1915.

Third editor of THE CRESCENT was Airdrie Kincaid Pinkerton who served from 1938 to 1950, and was national chairman of editors at the Broadmoor N.P.C. meeting. Mrs. Pinkerton is a former chairman of publicity and was Toastmistress of this convention's Carnation Banquet.

Present editor, Ardis McBroom Marek was CRESCENT Associate Editor from 1946 to 1948, acting editor from 1948 to 1949, and was appointed Editor-in-Chief at the Fall 1949 meeting of Grand Council. She was associate editor of the *Crescent Moon* at the Bretton Woods convention and took an active part in editorial discussions at the National Panhellenic Conference at Skytop, Pennsylvania, in 1949. Exhibit Shows Sorority Lore And Legend

AN EXHIBITION of Gamma Phi Beta lore was arranged in the first floor lounge of the Hotel Colorado by Nina Gresham, Historian. The souvenirs of Gamma Phi Beta through the years mounted on display racks featured sorority life and personalities from 1874 through 1950.

There were authentic signatures of the Four Founders as well as contemporaries, and the first two bulletins issued by Central Office in 1930 made interesting reading. An article from the 1903 issue of *Woman's Home Companion* carried the story of the founding of the first six sororities, Pi Beta Phi, Kappa Alpha Theta, Kappa Kappa Gamma, Delta Delta Delta, Alpha Phi and Gamma Phi Beta.

Two pictures of former Grand Presidents were added recently to the historical collection: Mary Jane Wellington, Delta at Boston 1887 who was President in 1899 and Emma Fuller Lowd, Delta 1887, who was President in 1902.

Recent publicity pictures included the founding of Beta Eta chapter at Bradley and Beta Mu at Florida. There was also a story of the fire that destroyed Haven Hall in early June at the University of Michigan. Haven Hall was named for Chancellor Haven, father of Founder Frances E. Haven Moss.

A sad note was added with the story of the final banquet of Zeta chapter at Goucher College, Baltimore, held May 5, 1950. The theme of the banquet was "Zeta's 57 Years" and Mrs. Milard Tydings was guest of honor and principal speaker.

Several Gamma Phi Beta writers of distinction were featured in the display: Olive Ruehe, Omicron's poet; Grace S. Richmond, author of many cheerful stories of life in smaller cities; Maude Hart Loveless, author of historical romances and the well-loved Betsy Tracy stories for young readers; and Margaret Fishback, poet. One of Margaret's lilting poems struck a sentimental note with the mothers who left their small ones at home to attend convention:

LITTLE ANGEL

I love my infant more than breath
Or bread or drink, I'd suffer death
Or pain or illness, short or long,
To keep him flourishing and strong
But candor forces me to say
I eagerly await the day
When some poor kindergarten teacher
Will wrestle with the little creature.

The philanthropic project of Denver alumnae was shown in the exhibit. This group donates a minimum of 110 garments each year to the National Organization of Needlework Guild, but the past year 855 garments were donated through the efforts of the Mothers' Clubs of Colorado State and Colorado College, Denver U. college members and alumnae.

The display of this year's Scrapbook entries and Camp material completed the interesting exhibit. D D D

A Career The Endowment Fund Made Possible

GAMMA PHI BETAS in St. Louis have long been proud of Marjorie Ball, who holds the important position of occupational therapist at the Miriam Rehabilitation Hospital in suburban Webster Groves. Her smiling countenance and congenial disposition mark her as one living a life which is especially rewarding. Professional attainment in Marjorie's life has brought with it the gratitude and deep appreciation of thousands of patients who have come to her unfit for the tempo of our modern society and under her wise direction and encouragement have gone back to everyday living equipped to battle its problems with the rest of us.

Marjorie's program at the Rehabilitation Hospital is a varied one. Approximately forty ambulatory patients are accepted at the Home for periods varying from a few weeks to many months. Each has his own particular problem. Some patients are increasingly restless and anxious to return to normal activities; others wish to prolong the pleasant feeling of security received while ill. Each needs a guided, graduated activity program to prevent both over-activity and to avoid under-activity.

At Miriam Hospital Marjorie has a shop period scheduled to rebuild normal work habits and to provide time for special treatment while the patient is rested and can make maximum effort. Special treatments are scheduled by order of the referring physician and include exercise on the bicycle jigsaw for an injured ankle, knee, or hip joint or coordinating exercises on the loom or typewriter for partial paralysis of the hand or any special technique ordered.

General shop-work is planned to provide supervised activity that can be graded from little exertion to maximum effort. Equipment has been selected to provide correct posture, correct height of work, graded effort, and graded complexity. Choice of projects is made as diverse as possible: photo-tinting, wood-carving, jewelry, dress-making (the patients have even staged fashion shows!), textile stencilling, plastics and woodwork are available.

Marjorie believes that to bring a patient back to normalcy a well-rounded program must include social activity. This is provided through games, group projects such as puppet plays, parties, movies, and group singing. In the summer, selected groups of patients are taken each week to the Municipal Opera. In addition, there is a library which includes records as well as books, magazines and newspapers.

I was impressed with the enthusiasm her patients have for her when I visited Marjorie at the Hospital after our Gamma Phi Beta tea last February. Two young boys were in need of a ride into St. Louis and I offered to take them. Both had been at the hospital for some time but seemed so normal in every way that I was not aware of being in the company of "patients" at all. On the way home I mentioned Marjorie and immediately both boys began lauding her in such enthusiastic terms that at their destination they were still bubbling over with praise for her. This kind of enthusiasm which must be multiplied over and over in other rehabilitated patients surely makes Marjorie's profession a rewarding one.

Marjorie is very emphatic in giving credit to Gamma Phi Beta

for her career in occupational therapy. It all began in 1929 when she received her A.B. degree from Washington University. Those were depression days and it was necessary for her to borrow money from the Endowment Fund to go to the St. Louis School of Occupational Therapy from which she was graduated in 1933. Her first year as an occupational therapist was a rugged one, a combination of two half time jobs, one in the city at the St. Louis Occupational Therapy Workshop and the other in the county at the Miriam Rehabilitation Hospital, all of which meant a lot of time lost in transportation plus the difficulties that come with the first year in a profession. The next year found her doing a full time job for the St. Louis Occupational Therapy Workshop of Home Service. Marjorie worked hard and systematically repaid her debt to the Endowment Fund.

In 1938 Marjorie accepted the position of Director of Occupational Therapy at the Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas, Texas, where, of course, she was affiliated with the Dallas alumnae. Here she received a wealth of orthopedic experience. It was after the severe polio epidemic of 1938 and her patients included children at the hospital as well as outpatients. Marjorie set up a nursery school to give the children a break from their wards and interested them in as many normal activities as possible: music, puppets, record-playing, even coloring Easter eggs; besides, there were the physical exercises for affected muscles and other specialized treatments indicated for polio convalescents.

In 1941 Marjorie moved on to Indianapolis to become Assistant Director of Occupational Therapy at the Indianapolis City Hospital. Here patients were all adults, a 700 bed service, with outpatients as well as the ambulatory inpatients. Although fully occupied in her work Marjorie found time to help organize the alumnae chapter in Indianapolis.

In 1943 Marjorie entered the service of her country, serving at Bushnell General Hospital in Brigham City, Utah, which was one of the amputee centers and, of course, necessitated fundamental rehabilitation of such patients. In 1945 she became Chief Occupational Therapist at Wakeman Convalescent Hospital at Camp Atterbury, Indiana.

No wonder with all this diversified experience Miriam Hospital was delighted in February, 1946 to engage Marjorie in her present capacity.

Delphine Andrews Elected President Of Detroit's Junior Goodwill Industries

MRS. CHARLES C. ANDREWS (Delphine Johnston, Michigan '31) has recently been elected president of the Junior Group, Goodwill Industries of Detroit. This is the largest group of its kind in the United States whose purpose is to help the less fortunate and handicapped members of society. Delphine has served as treasurer, finance chairman, and first vice-president of this group before accepting the president's position.

During her years at Michigan Delphine was a leader in chapter affairs as well as on campus. She is an ever present and active member at all Detroit alumnae gatherings and has served in office as CRESCENT correspondent, corresponding secretary, president, and volunteer worker and leader in our Harper Hospital Patient's Free Library for eighteen years. Such devotion is greatly needed in busy Detroit!

Her other activities include treasurer and assistant treasurer of the 1948 and 1949 projects of the University of Michigan association; past president, treasurer and director of the chapter board of the junior group of Louisa St. Clair chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution; a member of the Michigan Society of Mayflower Descendants; secretary of the board of trustees of Miss Newman's School; a member of the board of trustees of Priscilla Inn, a business girls' residence; past president of Detroit Panhellenic; and a member of Detroit Historical Society, Art Museum Founders Society, Young Women's Christian Association, All Saints Episcopal Church, and American Women's Volunteer Service.

NDAC is primarily an agricultural college. Not to be overlooked are the excellent pharmacy, engineering, and architecture courses offered.

Perhaps the biggest addition to this prairie campus is a \$500,000 library completed this fall. Special louveral lighting aids student work in the library. The building has lounges, typing rooms, conference rooms, and many other modern features.

Aside from the academic life campus gaieties continue throughout the school

A spinster skip, military ball, interfraternity ball, charity ball, Homecoming, and Junior-Senior Prom are just a few of the big whirls. The Beaux Arts Ball, revived this year, was the best costume party of 1950. Members of Atlier Chat Noir transformed Festival Hall into a rocket ship with a time machine to transfer everyone into the 25th century.

You'd think with all the social life students wouldn't have time for the Gold Star Band, the Spectrum, *Bison* annual, and Little International, a stock judging contest. But applications greatly exceed the demand when enthusiastic collegians arrive at the AC.

A newly acousticed field house stages basketball games for not only the AC but also for state high school tourneys. Coach Chuck Benson inaugurated the "Wyoming Weave" this year which led the Bison to 12 wins out of 22 starts.

Now in its 60th year of service and education, North Dakota Agricultural College has developed into one of the leading colleges in the northwest. Founded just 15 years after the city of Fargo, which celebrated its diamond jubilee in 1950, the AC can boast one of the loveliest president's houses on any campus. President and Mrs. Fred S. Hultz moved into a huge brick abode labeled "home sweet home." Mrs. Hultz is happy that she can see the President's office from her kitchen window.

In previous descriptions North Dakota always has wide open spaces, rolling prairies, waving fields of wheat, cowboys, and a few Indians. True, she does; but most of all North Dakota has NDAC. D D D

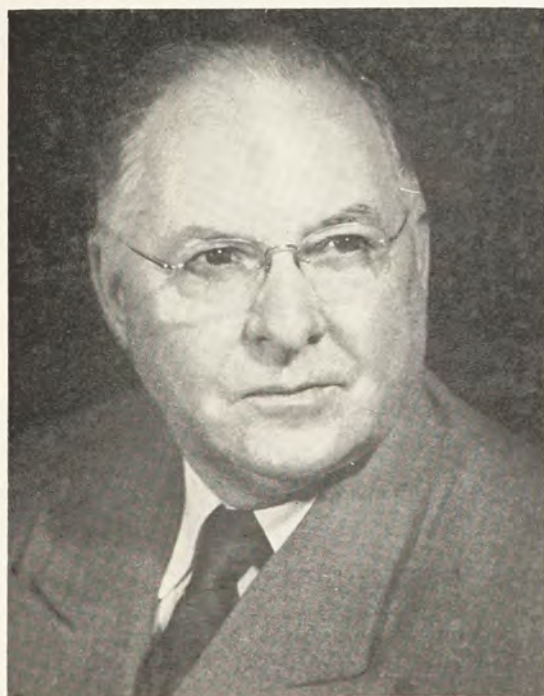
The following letter came with the medal:

Gamma Phi Beta To Celebrate 76th Birthday

ON NOVEMBER 11 this year, throughout the world we again celebrate Founders Day. Seventy-six years ago, four girls at Syracuse University organized a secret society called Gamma Phi Beta which for more than three quarters of a century has steadily grown in size, strength, service and prestige. While we don't have the details of early Founders Day celebrations, we know that in recent years, it has always been an occasion for parties and affairs wherever Gamma Phi Betas congregated.

Some alumnae chapters hold joint parties with the college girls from nearby Greek-letter chapters. These affairs may be elaborate teas or banquets, with alumnae serving as hostesses and the active girls planning the entertainment and program. Or they may be simple, informal desserts and bridges. Alumnae chapters everywhere, whether near enough or not to join with a Greek-letter group, invite all known Gamma Phi Betas in the area to join them for this occasion. Still others, who live too far from organized Gamma Phi Beta groups to participate in their Founders Day celebrations plan little, informal parties of their own.

Founders Day reports of the last two years have indicated that some of our chapters are planning less expensive functions so that their Founders Day celebration may be within the means of all alumnae and Greek-letter girls. As your Founders Day Chairman, I urge local chairmen this year to keep this in mind and to plan parties which, financially, encourage the younger

alumnae to attend . . . those living on a close budget and who possibly have the additional expense of baby sitters to consider. All chapters are anxious to have these girls as members, and it is extremely desirable that Founders Day celebrations be kept within their financial limits.

Many excellent ideas and suggestions were given by Delegates at convention. These included discussions on Special Awards presented by some alumnae chapters on Founders Day and the Alumnae Chapter Affiliation Service, used by some chapters to welcome new members. An especially interesting plan for Founders Day was presented by Mrs. McCombs, President of Berkeley alumnae chapter, who told of the "brunch" which Berkeley has had on Founders Day the last several years at Eta's chapter house from ten to noon on the Sunday closest to November 11. This makes it possible for the greatest number of active girls, working girls, young alumnae as well as older alumnae to attend. Alumnae from all other Bay Area chapters welcome this occasion to return to the Eta chapter house.

This year, plan an affair which will bring out a record attendance . . . an affair which will encourage and welcome the younger alumnae. Plan a specific program, too . . . a program which is in keeping with the traditions of Gamma Phi Beta. And whether it be a foursome, a dozen, or a party for two hundred—may this 76th birthday party for Gamma Phi Beta be the most successful party you've ever given! D D D

Farewell To Zeta

THIS year, 1950, marks the removal of all sororities from the Goucher College campus in Baltimore and the closing of Zeta chapter. We say farewell to Zeta chapter as such, but by no means farewell to all those who have entered the circle of Gamma Phi Beta through Zeta, for once a Gamma Phi Beta, always a Gamma Phi Beta. Indeed, Zeta chapter will live in memory as long as any Gamma Phi Beta lives.

The six Panhellenic sororities were removed from the Goucher campus as a result of a vote for removal by the Board of Trustees of Goucher College, who felt that since moving to the new campus at Towson, a country location, adequate dormitory and lounge facilities were provided and complete integration had been achieved. Thus they felt sororities were of no further use to the College. Efforts on the part of the sororities to prove their real worth and value to Goucher beyond superficial contributions were met with little or no recognition. Subsequently, the National Councils of the six NPC groups voted to withdraw their charters simultaneously at the close of the academic year, June, 1950. The last initiations were held and the last chapter meetings convened.

It is fitting at this time to review a little of Zeta's history and accomplishments as recounted for us by Lindsey Barbee in the Gamma Phi Beta History. Zeta is our sixth chapter and the third sorority to be established at the Woman's College of Baltimore, later Goucher College. Zeta would have celebrated its 58th birthday this November 24, for the chapter came into being on that date in 1893 with seven charter members.

The idea of Zeta chapter was really born at a wedding reception held in Syracuse by Mary Whitford of Alpha in honor of another Alpha Gamma Phi Beta. An usher at the wedding remarked that his sister and cousin had entered the Woman's College in Baltimore and would probably join another sorority since Gamma Phi Beta did not have a chapter there. Nellie Powell, the usher's cousin, tells the story in a letter: "We shall never forget those first letters from Syracuse inviting us to start a chapter here nor that first meeting of five of us. How stiff and formal we were; on the one hand how enthusiastic, on the other how doubtful of our ability to carry through such a great undertaking. We all had friends in Gamma Phi and were anxious to become members of that dear sorority, but the difficulties in our way often drove us almost to despair. After much discussion we decided to become Gamma Phi's babies and proudly shared our secret with two others whom we had chosen. On the evening of November 24, 1893, we submitted to the terrors of initiation and were warmly welcomed into the circle of Gamma Phi Beta. I am sure that we shall always find in our hearts a very tender feeling for Miss Budd and Miss Worster, Alpha, the first of our dear sisters to give us the kiss of welcome and the grip of friendship."

Zeta has contributed much to Gamma Phi Beta through the years. For a time THE CRESCENT was published under the auspices of the chapter with Anna Morris Dimmick as editor. Many national officers were given to the organization by Zeta. The first executive secretary was Miss Mary T. McCurley of Zeta. Frances Ide

Johnson, Alvahn Holmes and Helen Turnbull were directors of their provinces. Zeta was hostess for several of the early conventions and contributed in other ways too numerous to mention.

Not only has Zeta chapter contributed to Gamma Phi Beta, but its members have been prominent in many fields of endeavor—teaching, social service, letters. Jessie and Margaret Wilson, daughters of Woodrow Wilson, were members of Zeta while

students at Goucher; Margaret Fishback, poet and contributor to many popular magazines today; Edna Buhrer, prominent Nematologist, to mention only a few.

The record of Zeta chapter for this past year is typical of her record through the years. The chapter was first in scholarship among the NPC groups this past year, and won the Province Eight Efficiency Award at the 1949 Province Conference. Individually, the chapter members were prominent on the campus. One was president of her dormitory, another was

president of the sophomore class. Through the years Zeta has well represented Gamma Phi Beta at Goucher College in all phases of college life.

The Baltimore alumnae chapter has long been friend and guide to Zeta and this spring gave a final banquet for all members of Zeta chapter, Greek-letter and alumnae. Three of the charter members of the chapter were present as were Mrs. Millard Tydings of Beta Beta and Washington, and the Chairman of Provinces and Province Director as representatives of International Gamma Phi Beta.

We are proud of Zeta chapter. We are grateful to those Gamma Phi Betas who came to us as Zetas for their loyalty and service. Thus we say farewell, knowing that Zeta of Gamma Phi Beta, as well as our sister sororities at Goucher, contributed much to the growth and development of Goucher College. We can be proud of our record of achievement. D D D

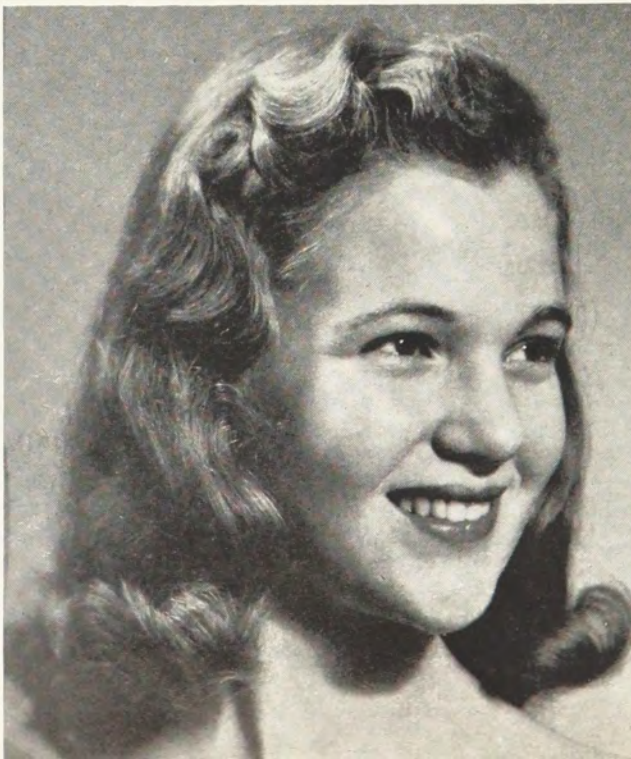

(ED. NOTE: Because this is the last official chapter letter from Zeta, we are pleased to print it in full so every Gamma Phi Beta may read in detail the final story of this chapter's contribution to life at Goucher College.)

Although the academic year of 1949-1950 was the last year for all sororities on the Goucher College campus, Zeta chapter of Gamma Phi Beta maintained the same enthusiastic spirit which had been theirs for so long. This last year's activities marked the peak of fifty-seven successful years of co-operation and companionship on the part of Zeta's members.

Still talking of the wonderful week they had spent at the shore during the summer, the Zetas launched the year with the redecoration of their apartment. In spite of their other campus activities, the girls managed to paint all the walls, scrub the woodwork and windows, and have the furniture clean in time for rushing. The weeks that followed were filled with plans for rushing and the rush parties themselves. The 1949 rushing season proved to be one of Zeta's most successful and the pledge banquet at the close of the season one of the year's most memorable occasions.

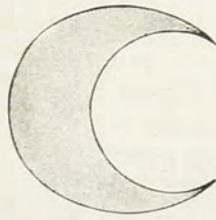
