Thoughtfulness and a concern for our fellow man are necessary qualities for leadership. Sharing the joys and sorrows of your sisters in Gamma Phi Beta prepares you for this life's experience with others. We are all individuals with many gifts to share. If we were all molded from the same pattern, it would be a dull world. By our very differences, we can grow in understanding. Each of us has something vital to contribute. Welcome these contributions and grow in stature.

Lastly, a leader must have enthusiasm. This is of utmost importance. Without enthusiasm, one develops a negativism which is almost destructive. The easiest attitude to assume is one which says, "I just know it won't work," or "It's going to take so much effort, why don't we do something easier!" It takes real courage sometimes to be really enthusiastic. It's surprising, however, how stimulating it is to be exposed to an enthusiastic person. One is caught up in a desire to accomplish goals that might seem insurmountable, at first, but these goals appear close at hand when enthusiasm is the order of the day.

As chapters of Gamma Phi Beta-face this college year with enthusiasm. You will surprise yourselves with your own accomplishments. Set high standards, tackle them with intelligence and understanding. You will not fail!

There's lebensraum at our . . .

NEW

Central Office opened its doors for business at its new location, 630 Green Bay Road, Kenilworth, Illinois, on April 19, 1965. The multi-roomed office space has been remodeled and redecorated to fulfill the dream of Executive Secretary-Treasurer Eleanor J. Sieg for *lebensraum*—room to do the work required to make the wheels of business run smoothly for an ever-growing, constantly expanding sorority.

From 1000 square feet of floor space in the Monadnock Building in Chicago, Central Office now occupies 2500 square feet on the ground floor of a two-story building in the suburbs. Situated a short distance from many of the alumnæ who can contribute volunteer service during peak mailing periods, the new quarters provide the additional space needed for growth and is near hotels for the convenience of officers in town on business.

In making the move to the North Shore of Chicago, Gamma Phi Beta becomes the ninth Greek letter group to locate in the area of Northwestern University, long known as a cultural center which continues to attract to its lake shore site many national educational and professional groups. Preceding Gamma Phi Beta in the area are Alpha Phi, Kappa Alpha Theta, Sigma Delta Tau, Zeta Tau Alpha, Acacia, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Sigma Chi and Triangle.

This is the third move for Central Office since its establishment in September 1929 in the Pittsfield Building with Charlotte Robertson White as its first secretary-treasurer. The first relocation was made in January 1942 when the office moved to the Civic opera Building; the second came in April 1951 to the West Jackson address. Miss Seig joined Central Office as manager and secretary-treasurer in 1961.

From three crowded rooms of average size, Central Office in its new locale now occupies six plus oversized rooms. An unexpected bonus in the suite is a modern kitchen complete with cabinets, refrigerator, sink, exhaust fan and electric stove which was installed in time for the tea kettle to sing a welcoming tune to the six new members of Miss Seig's staff. Between the kitchen and reception area there is a walk-in, fireproof steel vault where sorority records and items of historical significance are stored. Two delightfully feminine powder rooms feature built-in vanities.

In visiting the new offices in the pleasant court building, one's first glimpse through the courtyard entrance reveals the quaint Gamma Phi Beta sign swinging from its wrought iron standard. (See back cover.) Through the brown doorway one enters the reception area with its inviting coral colored upholstered chairs, contemporary bookshelves, coffee table and paintings. The carpeting is beige and the windows are hung

with biege and coral printed cafe curtains below and fruitwood stained shutters above. An interesting feature of the reception area is the round plate-like wall plaque commemorating the 75th anniversary of the sorority's founding chapter at Syracuse University. Silver historical trophies from some of Gamma Phi Beta's earliest chapters brighten the room's shelves. Copies of THE CRESCENT and books by Gamma Phi Beta authors entertain guests during any waiting periods.

Beyond the counter formed by the Greek letter and alumnæ chapter files are three desks staffed by those in charge of the many membership details. Along the south wall are tub files containing cross-card records of the 40,000 members who wear the crescent badge. The ell at the rear of the room houses the mailing department, additional files and a copy machine.

A large area to the left of the front door has been converted into an addressograph room where membership lists requested by chapters are compiled in strip list form. Files to house the metal addressing plates, large racks containing packages of THE CRESCENT, Greek letter and alumnæ chapter forms, office supplies, ritual material and myriad other sorority supplies are kept in this room. One of the three desks boasts a new mimeograph which reproduces the bulletins sent to international, alumnæ and Greek letter officers.

From the front door one can look through the reception room to an attractive enclosure at the rear-The Conference Room-where officers may hold meetings when in town and where the Endowment-Crescent Board will often conduct its affairs. An exquisitely hand-carved and hand-decorated Gamma Phi Beta crest is permanently mounted on one wall. This crest, a duplicate of one which hangs in Epsilon chapter house at Northwestern, is a gift of welcome to Central Office from Epsilon and the Evanston-North Shore alumnæ chapter. Flanking the crest on the long mode-colored wall are copies of water color portraits of the sorority's Four Founders-the portraits set in deep shadow-box frames and matted on rosy-red print fabric. On an adjacent wall hangs a shadow box containing antique jeweled Gamma Phi Beta badges mounted on black velvet. All are gifts from members or the families of deceased members.

In another room of the suite Miss Sieg's secretary shares an office with the publications secretary, Nathalia Holland, who processes the bulletins issued through Central Office and who prepares the Directory pages and the In Memoriam notices appearing in THE CRESCENT. The bookkeeper has her desk, files and accounting equipment in another office. Here the financial records of the sorority are kept, all international fees and contributions are received and posted and monthly disThis lovely hand-carved and decorated crest is a gift of Epsilon and Evanston North Shore alumnæ chapters. bursements for operating expenses are made.

The last office, but by far the most important, is the "Inner Office"-the private sanctuary of the secretary-treasurer who directs all the activities of Central Office with a patience and calm which might well be copied by many male executives operating the nation's large corporations. In spite of an entirely new staff-all female-who have bombarded her with a constant barrage of questions, she has maintained her cheerful, quiet manner and conducted the business affairs of Gamma Phi Beta in such a way that there has been no link missing in the transferring of ideas between the national officers and the Greek letter and alumnæ chapters. Truly a major feat! Her office is carpeted in a rosy-red wool tweed, the warm tones of which are picked up in the window hangings. An antique brass lavabo filled with deep pink carnations decorates the wall behind the desk. The furniture of the room is of the same all-steel contemporary design that is used throughout the other Central Office areas. Easy chairs, a low table and bookcase add to the atmosphere of beauty in Miss Sieg's worktime home.

Miss Sieg obtained the help of a Chicago commercial decorator, Miss Virginia Hawley, in transforming the offices into the international headquarters which Gamma Phi Beta will occupy for the next five years. Using Gamma Phi Beta colors of mode and brown, coupled with the variety of pink shades found in the carnation itself, the resulting color effect of all the rooms is both quiet in tone and at the same time cheerful. Modern color blending has lifted the simple mode and brown of our Founders into a rainbow of new hues named on the decorator's charts root brown, foam, amberglint, brass, pineapple, silver sage and harvest. These are the tones used on the walls. Upholstering throughout carries the new jonquil yellow and rosy-red tones. Gamma Phi Beta individuality is given to the offices through the use of original water color paintings by Mrs. Charles M. Moss, one of its founders-Frances E. Haven. The pictures have been reframed and hung in both the reception area and the executive office.

Members of the Greek letter fraternities on the Northwestern campus, as well as University officials and local civic leaders, will be invited to view Central Office's new home at an Open House tea on November 7 during the time Grand Council will be in session. The Endowment-Crescent Board members will serve as hostesses. A special invitation is extended to Gamma Phi Betas everywhere to visit their international office in Kenilworth whenever they are in the Chicago area. Northwestern Railroad service is available from Chicago to the Kenilworth station just one block from the office, and there is bus service from downtown Evanston.

Happy Marriages

With freedom of choice in marriage partners, a new goal in marriage relationships has come into being—individual happiness. It's a very difficult thing to describe; it means different things to each of us.

The emphasis now is on psychological and personality factors, on companionship and equality between husband and wife. Women have greater freedom in our democratic American family than one finds anwhere else in the world. Marriage partners choose one another and are intensely dependent upon each other, since satisfying relationships and understanding between the partners is the expected result if the marriage is to be happy. But freedom of choice calls for responsibility to choose wisely and to try to make your marriage a success. Thus, it takes more love and understanding to make a success of marriage today because we expect more of marriage.

The degree of happiness in marriage depends upon the ratio between what one expects and what one experiences. Happy marriages don't "just happen"; you have to work for the success of your marriage.

Off to the Right Start

What are some guide lines one can follow to try to achieve happiness in marriage?

1. Be sensitive to your husband's or wife's feelings and moods. Consider his or her needs before your own. Hopefully each of the marital partners is able to function capably most of the time, but each should be able to be dependent upon the other for emotional support in times of stress.

2. Don't criticize or nag unduly lest self-respect be diminished and your happiness together be in jeopardy.

Instead of criticism, express your ideas as suggestions. Each of us resents criticism because in our childhood it was associated with hostility. Nagging, too, merely causes a reaction of irritation and never achieves the desired goal.

3. Don't be afraid your husband no longer loves you when he flares up occasionally and releases tension in sharp words when the cause lies elsewhere. A bad day at the office often explodes at home—a safer place to "let off steam."

4. Try to nurture a sense of humor. Remember the bright or funny things that occur during your day away from each other and enjoy them together.

5. Look for reasons behind your behavior and try to understand the motivations of your husband.

Remember that each of you brought to your marriage from your early childhood different backgrounds, different personalities, beliefs, familiar ways of doing things that have become a part of you. You could not, therefore, expect to agree about everything. Adjustments will be necessary, not 50/50 by each of you, but a willingness to go *more* than half way. Flexibility and the ability to adjust are among the most important factors in achieving a good marriage.

6. Talk to your husband about the many things that happen or in which you are interested, big or small, deep or light, and listen with attentive and sympathetic interest, thus keeping alive the essential habit of communication between you. Happiness in marriage is enhanced by sharing ideas and ideals.

7. Don't try to impose your will on your mate nor deny interests other than your own. As you learn to give and give in at times and to discuss decisions before they are made, you enhance the health of your marriage.

8. Keep the dignity of your marriage inviolate. Never demean its sacredness in public or private. Not only does it hurt the feelings of the marriage partner, but it is embarrassing to the friends who are exposed to your personal disputes.

9. Pray together in your place of worship, for love is blessed in the aura of Godliness.

10. Uphold truth in your marriage. Never practice deceit, whatever its motives. Respect for each other is as vital as love to assure life-long happiness together.

When Things Go Wrong

But sometimes even marriages that start out well develop problems. When couples marry, they are in love, they believe their marriage will bring them only happiness; they meet each other's emotional needs. They feel happy and comfortable together. There is a *balance* in their interpersonal relationships.

When they start having marital problems something has happened to that balance; to their relationship. This might have been affected by internal or external pressures. Usually, each individual prefers to think he isn't responsible; that it must have been something outside of himself that caused the rift. Conseling often helps individuals *become aware* of their personal involvements, the first step toward solving their problems.

Here are some danger signals.

First, lack of communication. Married couples must be able to talk things over even when they don't agree. Each of us needs someone to whom she can express not only love but hostility. Indifference is possible when you're not in love—but not when love exists.

Others talk at each other, not to each other. Those of you who have heard Leonard Bernstein's opera, "Trouble in Ta-

hiti," remember what he calls the "screaming silence." In the opera, there is a Greek chorus which explains what each of the marriage partners means to say. Unfortunately, in life there is no such chorus, and misunderstandings, not discussed and settled, can mushroom into serious problems.

Lack of communication between the husband and wife sometimes brings about over-involvement with their children; or they may become too involved with social life, filling time with meaningless activities. Some couples seem unable to enjoy being together, such as Mr. and Mrs. Jerold.

Mrs. Jerold, the mother of two young children felt very depressed. Her husband came home tired, was disinterested in going out and generally was glued to the TV set. He was the silent, self-sufficient type. "It wasn't at all like it had been when we were in college; he just seemed to live for the time we could be together then," said the wife, who came for counseling help. The husband came, also, because he wanted to save their marriage.

This wife was helped to accept herself as a more mature figure. The man was helped to recognize that a woman who spends her days with young children needs the stimulus of adult companionship and more emotional support than he was giving. He faced up to the problems involved in fatherhood.

Another signal is found when a wife has vague feelings that she is not needed. This woman feels that all of her husband's time and interest is centered in his business, and that he has no need of her.

The Struggle for Power

The third signal is that of a power struggle. The person wants to be in control so that he can have his or her dependent needs met, but he or she still wants to be boss. There is increased disagreement as to details of homemaking, of management of money, of the children, or of management of their leisure time. For example, there are the Ardens.

Mrs. Arden, who had been married for 21/2 years, came for counseling to evaluate her marriage. She described her husband as selfish, overly critical and negativistic. She commented that in recent months they argued about everything, so much so that at times even they could see the humor in the situation.

She has worked since her marriage, and her husband was now established in his work to the point that they could plan to have a family. However, she felt very insecure about having a child when their relationship was so unstable. Mr. and Mrs. Arden had similar economic, religious, and cultural backgrounds. But she felt that her husband's family spent too much time in their home and exerted too much influence on their lives.

Mrs. Arden had a very close relationship with her own parents and her husband was concerned about their relationship, too. He considered his wife immature and felt not only that she was critical of his family but that she could not recognize the extent to which she was involved with her parents.

Actually, Mr. and Mrs. Arden's complaints about each other were quite similar. These young people were so involved with their respective families that they could not use their energy to work out their own relationships. They were behaving like rivalrous siblings. Each wanted to be the favorite child. When they were able to look at what they were doing rather than focus on what the other person had done, they had taken the first step toward a more mature and satisfying relationship.

Resentment and Boredom

The fourth signal shows when there is increased resentment on the part of the wife regarding her husband's work or on the part of the husband regarding management of the home.

The last signal of danger ahead that I shall mention is that of feeling let down with experiences, when reality doesn't meet one's expectations and the person is bored most of the time.

Mrs. Perken sought counseling advice when the possibility of divorce threatened her marriage of 20 years.

She felt inadequate, used and abused by her family. She had felt this way during her early adolescence, when her mother died suddenly and she was left to assume much of the family responsibility. She resented the indulgence her young brothers and sisters received from their father.

Although it came slowly, Mrs. Perken was able to recognize that she did have a close, satisfactory relationship to her father and her interviews provided a source of dependency and acceptance. As she gained confidence, she was able to express some of her wishes and feelings directly. Much to her surprise, her husband responded with greater interest and consideration.

Your Capacity to Love

The most important factor in achieving a happy marriage would seem to be the degree of emotional maturity of the marital partners. Dr. William Menninger has said that the most important factor in personal happiness and effectiveness is the ability to get along well with other people. It depends upon whether you can love more than you hate.

What is your capacity to love? The love I mean is that which the Greeks called *agape*. That love means considering the wishes, the desires, the goals of your husband (or wife) before your own, rejoicing in his or her accomplishments, sharing his trials as well as his triumphs.

Today more than ever before American youths need the examples of successful marriages which educated men and women can give them. We who believe in family life as the basic relationship in our culture must by our example illustrate its value. We echo the words of the poet, William Cowper:

> "What is there in the vale of life Half so delightful as a wife, When friendship, love, and peace combine To stamp the marriage-bond divine?"

Fantasy, Fact and the Future

The first fantasy that we hear frequently is that the college woman of today is different and she does not need a sorority. She is different in that she is better educated, more sophisticated, and more affluent; but this does not necessarily lead to the conclusion that she does not need a sorority. The fact is that the great human need for companionship, for sharing friendship, and for having a sense of belonging is as basic today as when sororities were founded. Young women need the warm and affectionate understanding which sororities can provide. They need a point of reference from which to evaluate their desires and achievements, and to help in setting their standards and values. They need the encouragement and inspiration that a true sisterhood supplies.

Our Greek Assembly recently heard a report on a survey of college women who had been out of school for from five to 30 years. Two questions were asked: As you think over your college education, in what ways do you feel it is of value in your life today? And, in the light of your later experiences, what kinds of improvements or changes would you now suggest? There were replies from 30,000 women and they revealed that college helped them in their social relationships and attitudes, that they had made lasting friendships, and that college had given them a feeling of responsibility for good government and the feeling of obligation to participate. Many felt that college should offer more formal training in these areas. Do you recognize in the replies to the two questions the very reasons given for the founding of Gamma Phi Beta?

Another fantasy that I hear is that with the rapid residence hall building programs on university campuses, chapter houses are no longer needed and they cannot successfully compete with university housing. The fact is that university administrators welcome the additional housing space you provide for students. We are indeed most grateful to sororities on our campus for the three hundred additional housing spaces provided in the last ten years. Also, most universities are building large complexes, and even though the personnel staffs work diligently, somehow we have not been able to reach the results obtained by the intimacy and ties of a small group.

Have you heard that sororities are on their way out? It is interesting to me that sorority women contribute greatly to this fantasy. Fraternity growth has been phenomenal the past ten years, but if I didn't read the literature I would not be aware of it, for fraternity people are so busy talking about "problem campuses." True, there are problems, but voluntary associations are a part of the American tradition. There were approximately 20,000 conventions of voluntary associations in the United States during the last two years. These associations are protected by the Civil Rights Bill. Yet, as alumnæ we sometimes placed the collegians in a position of wanting to apologize for being a Greek, as though it were un-American. If I were pushed to make a prediction, I would say that fraternities will continue to grow and make a significant contribution to universities because of the evaluation forced upon them. This soul-searching may be uncomfortable at times, but I agree with David Boroff, Assistant Professor of English at New York University, in his statement: "The healthiest campus situation is not one in which fraternities do not exist but rather

one in which they are vigorously challenged by a sturdy and vital independent group. As a besieged minority, fraternities can be a wholesome force on campus; in full command of the campus, fraternities are dangerous and ultimately stultifying."

A fourth fantasy is that university administrations do not appreciate the contributions of sororities and fraternities. I appreciate the hours of free service given by alumnæ, the leadership training provided for women students, and the contribution sororities make in setting ethical and moral standards on campus. Particularly do I appreciate the climate you create which motivates young women to complete their bachelor degrees. In a study of the 1960 freshman women attending Oklahoma State University, 34% completed their degrees here. Over fifty percent of these women were affiliated with sororities, and yet less than one-third of undergraduate women are sorority members. This helps prove your worth, but as a Dean of Women I cannot stand on my soapbox and urge every girl to pledge. All I can do is to make the information available for your use.

A fantasy that adults create for youth is that tensions are a new ingredient in their way of life. Having read a normal amount of history, and having lived through two World Wars, a depression, and the Korean conflict, and now having to experience the Vietnam engagement and the population explosion, I conclude that there have always been tensions to bear. If somehow we adults could only accept this tension-bearing or constant change in our stride as a fact of life and teach the young that it will always be with them. If we could only remember and accept that personal growth only comes from meeting and solving the tensions or problems of the day. The necessity for meeting the problems of the day is the very reason for encouraging each one of us to be the very best person possible so that one may influence in a constructive manner changes occurring in society.

In the "Future" of my topic, may I urge you to create a dynamic image of the Greek World in higher education. It is essential that all Panhellenic members work together to tell the Greek story and to recognize the strength of sororities and continue to build upon them to improve. Someone has said that the differences between individuals working and a group pulling together is the difference between a jumble of stones and a good, stout, stone wall. Promote Panhellenic so that it is a good, stout, stone wall!

To the collegians, may I say that with the emphasis on Panhellenic rush that each chapter must provide the kind of sorority which rushees will want to pledge. Girls do not willingly choose to belong to a mediocre chapter. You must have the courage to promote quality living in your chapter.

To the alumnæ, particularly those serving as advisers, may you continue to give dynamic leadership. Someone has said that you have the greatest opportunity to make *idealism* and *standards* and *qualities* live in the lives of young women. You have a heritage which is priceless and great. The only way we can make this heritage real is to make it live, and give those eternal qualities which stand with us today and in all the years to come a real place in our lives.

University of Tennessee

Twenty-eight pledges at the University of Tennessee exchanged their brown triangle pins for bejeweled badges of the sorority when they officially became known as Gamma Xi, the 79th greek-letter chapter of Gamma Phi Beta. Under the direction of Mrs. Donald L. Cass, International Rituals chairman, the initiation and installation ceremonies were held at the First Presbyterian church in Knoxville on May 15.

At the Carnation Banquet on Saturday evening, Mrs. Graeme Reid, International Grand President, presented the charter for the new group to chapter president, Janet Brown. And, Gamma Phi Beta joined the ranks of Panhellenic houses on the Tennessee campus.


The University of Tennessee traces its origin back to the days when George Washington was President of the United States, back to the days even before Tennessee became a state. In 1794, two years before statehood was achieved, the Legislature of the Federal Territory which later became Tennessee granted a charter to Blount College, the earliest predecessor of the University at Knoxville.

With its founding as Blount College, the University is listed as one of the older institutions of higher education in the nation. It was strictly nonsectarian in character, which was unique among institutions of higher education in that day. The institution has remained nondenominational to the present time and is said to be the oldest such institution west of the Appalachian Divide. Blount College for a few years admitted women as students, thus becoming the first coeducational col-

lege in the United States. The institution later restricted enrollment to men only before reverting to its present coeducational status.

Since its establishment, the University has grown into an institution consisting of 18 different colleges and schools, and it has become state-wide in its physical location as well as its services: The Medical Units, were moved to Memphis in 1911; the Martin Branch was opened in 1927; the School of Social Work at Nashville became part of the University in 1951; Agricultural Experiment Stations and the University's Extension division have opened centers throughout the state.

Traditions play an important part in the life of a university student by recalling the history and heritage of the past, and by setting examples for future achievements. The Volunteer Symbol, spirit of the State and the University, is ever present during the student's campus life. This traditional symbol admonishes would-be leaders to hold their "Torch" high, shadowing themselves to give light to others.

It is this symbolic "Torch" which first gives the new student a glimpse of one of the many traditions at the University. All freshmen are given a "Torch of Preparation" in brief but impressive Torch Night ceremonies during Freshman Week each year. This traditional symbol is retained by the University student, and is relinquished only when he takes up the "Torch of Service" at the annual Aloha Oe Ceremony marking his graduation.

Encouraging members of Gamma Phi Beta's newest chapter to continue to "hold high the torch of learning," many national officers journeyed to Knoxville to attend the festivities. Besides Mrs. Reid, those on hand for the weekend events were: Mrs. John G. Trussell, director of expansion; Mrs. Robert Smith, assistant to the collegiate vice president; Miss Karen Tucker, traveling secretary, and Mrs. Harry W. Collison, collegiate director of Province VIII. Two alumnæ from Birmingham, six from Nashville and many from the Knoxville area arrived for the Pink Carnation Banquet at the City Club.

Tables bedecked with pink carnations, candles, place cards and programs set a gracious background for the charter presentation and the many awards given to the members. A surprise gift to the chapter from Mrs. Reid was a Gamma Phi Beta badge set with turquoise stones. The badge originally belonged to Clara Reed of Alpha chapter at Syracuse University and was first worn in 1895. During that era members of Gamma Phi Beta were permitted to wear only plain badges, bearing no jewels, until after graduation. When Miss Reed was graduated in 1895 her father presented this pin to her and it has been handed down through the family since that time. After receiving the pin, Gamma Xi chapter girls voted that it should be worn by the president of the group and Karen Tucker pinned the badge on Janet Brown.

Other gifts to the new chapter included a large silver tray from Grand Council and an engraved silver cigaret box from Beta Epsilon chapter at Miami University.

Awards made during the banquet were: Diane Pfeiler-best pledge; Susan Taylor-highest scholarship; Sue Sparkman-outstanding service; Janet Brown-excellence in leadership; and Judy Taylor-best remaining pledge.

The winner's name will be engraved on a plaque which will remain in the possession of the chapter, and she will receive a personal gift chosen by the Province Alumnæ Director and the Province Collegiate Director.

Orchids to Retirement

When Irene and her husband moved to Fort Lauderdale, Florida nine years ago, they discovered a whole new world of gardening-the kind of tropical flora that the most-fertile mind of a northern gardener could never imagine. In a very short time, orchids became their first love. Mr. Van Alstyne, who nine years ago 'couldn't tell a weed from a pansy', has become the president of the very active Men's Garden Club of Fort Lauderdale-a club of over 150 active members. Irene is not only an officer and trustee of the Fort Lauderdale Orchid Society and a member of the American Orchid Society and the South Florida Orchid Society, but also writes (and edited for three years) the monthly Newsletter of the Fort Lauderdale group. She has contributed many articles to Orchidist Bulletins and Society papers. She recalls that her two years spent as a reporter for the Daily Illini, have served her well. Recently too, with the help of color slides, she has travelled all over the state of Florida, and some of the nearby islands, giving orchid travelogues and orchid lectures.

Some of the 70 different genera and 1200 plants which the Van Alstynes grow in three slat houses and all around their patio, posts and flower beds and borders have come as personally discovered specimens from their "orchid hunts". Florida, she tells us, has 100 wild orchid varieties which grow in the Everglades and Big Cypress Swamp. They embark on "orchid safaris"—wading knee-deep in mucky swamps. Since an encounter with an occasional cotton-mouth moccasin or an alligator is not uncommon, they never go without an experienced woodsman. Also the utter wilderness is possible to become lost in.

The Van Alstynes soon learned that almost all the West Indian Islands and Central and South America abounded in vast varieties of wild orchids, and began taking "orchid vacations." They not only added to their already impressive collection, but became acquainted with a great number of interesting people who shared their interest. Through their journeys and article, they now have a world-wide span of "pen pals". So far these trips have taken them to Mexico, the Island of Cozumel, Guatemala, Honduras, Panama, Colombia, Trinidad, Tobago, Barbados, Grenada, pre-Castro Cuba, and some of the Bahamas. One of their most "fun" trips recently was to Medellin and Bogota, Colombia. Medellin is Fort Lauderdale's "sister

city". Irene invited some of their orchid growers to the annual Fort Lauderdale orchid show a year ago and they arrived bringing a gorgeous collection of cut orchids. When they returned home, these growers founded the Colombian Orchid Society and when the Van Alstynes visited there recently, they were understandably treated as "founding royalty"! In the future, they plan to extend their journeys to Hawaii and the Orient.

Not only have the Van Alstynes taken a number of Silver Trophies and Blue ribbons in the orchid societies, but also they continue in their other gardening interests as well. Irene recently won the Silver Sweepstakes Trophy, two other Silvers and several Blue ribbons in the annual Garden Club Flower Show. Their slat houses also grow ferns, begonias, spathyphyllums, aroids, anthuriums, violets and other lovely more-common garden species. In the outside beds and borders there are ginger, Bird of Paradise, Heliconias, crotons, poinsettias, caladiums and many varieties of palms, and flowering trees.

The interesting and attractive pots for the orchids are molded by Irene—the world of ceramics opening to her from the world of orchids.

Irene attended the University of Illinois in 1925, 1926 and won campus honors while there. She has two married daughters (one a Gamma Phi Beta at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio) and six handsome young grandchildren.

We are very proud of this lovely, active Gamma Phi Beta and hope that she sometimes wears her beautiful sorority pin beside her orchid corsage.

Doctor Hope Housel 1904-1965

Dr. Hope Housel (Beta Omicron '25), Oklahoma City University professor and former harpist with the Oklahoma City Symphony, died on May 11, 1965.

Born in Columbus, Ohio, Dr. Housel was educated in leading European musical conservatories and received MA and PhD degrees from the University of Minnesota. In later years she did graduate work at Columbia University and the University of Guadalajara, Mexico.

After studying the harp in Europe she played with German orchestras for several years and returned to the United States in 1933 after witnessing Adolph Hitler's burning of the books. In 1958 she returned to Austria as a Fulbright Fellow and taught English in the same high school that had enrolled Hitler and Adolph Eichmann in earlier years.

A professor of German and Spanish, Dr. Housel had been chairman of the University department of modern languages and retired from the symphony orchestra in 1958 after more than 20 years service.

She was honored many times in Oklahoma City. The most recent honor, early last May, was bestowed upon her by the American Association of University Women when they established a fellowship in her name.

A member of the Methodist church, Dr. Housel was also active in the Pilot club, Sigma Alpha Iota, Gamma Phi Beta, PEO, Cardinal Key, AAUW and the Urban League. She is listed in Who's Who in American Women.





- By January 1, chapter letter due Mrs. Haverfield for March issue. Do not send chapter letter for other issues.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN:

- Immediately after each formal rushing period, rushing reports due International Membership Chairman, State Membership Chairman, Collegiate Vice President and Province Collegiate Director on Forms #G1-275a and #G1-275b. Report on Form #G1-275c is due the International Membership Chairman. Continue to report each subsequent pledge.
- Order supplies (recommendation and investigation blanks, file and acknowledgment cards, post rush reports) early each spring for following fall from Central Office. Specify quantity and form number.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN:

Send list of chapter and individual honors and activities to the International Public Relations Chairman with carbon copy to Province Collegiate Director four times yearly—by October 1, December 15, February 15 and May 15. Include publicity clippings for International Scrapbook.

HISTORIAN:

Mail typed annual history to International Historian with one carbon to Province Collegiate Director before close of college year.

- By January 1, feature articles, glossies and newspaper clippings for March CRESCENT due Editor, Mrs. Haverfield.
- By January 1, send to Central Office Alumnæ Chapter Payment Report, Form #A-225a, covering philanthropy, alumnæ, and convention entertainment taxes, and life subscription payments. These payments may be made any time during the fiscal year, August 1 through July 31; however, chapters are considered delinquent if partial payments are not paid by January 1.
- By February 20, alumnæ chapter letters for May CRESCENT, including glossics, due Alumnæ Editor, Mrs. Frederick Figge.
- By February 25, send Grand President business for consideration at spring council meeting.
- By March 15, send 1 copy each of the Alumnæ Chapter President's Report and membership list or directory to the Alumnæ Vice President and 1 copy each to Province Alumnæ Director.
- Not later than March 15, send name and address of members responsible for rushing recommendations during the summer to Central Office.
