To Build a Better World

And how are things going on the college campuses? The mass media have given us a picture which often is a distorted view of the violence and revolutionary demands of a minute percentage of the students. But they make a loud noise, drowning out the reasonable voices of 95 percent of the students. Unfortunately many college administrators have capitulated to these minority demands. Out of fear? Ignorance? Hardly! The desire not to rock the boat? One wonders. But as long as administrations acquiesce or sit in silence while the campus explodes, or make unreasonable demands of the reasonable students, not only sororities and fraternities and other worthwhile student groups, but, even the university itself, is in grave danger.

The problems of today are not of the young or the old, but of everybody and the endless confrontations of student and adult create a wasteful polarization. Let us today seek a common ground and join our energies. Let us discuss together as women of intellect and with mutual tolerance and good will Gamma Phi Beta's role for the future.

Serious as the threats to fraternity are from outsiders, by far the greater danger can come from within. In situations where sorority women have themselves initiated changes through their Panhellenic which would alter our basic premises, we find members who have never become deeply involved with Gamma Phi Beta through serving the chapter as officers, and thus have not experienced the depth and meaning of membership, nor learned to appreciate its intrinsic values.

As to the outside pressures, we are sympathetic to the situations our collegiate members find themselves in today. These pressures are constant and the questioning of fraternity procedures, its policies and traditions, its very integrity, have been unrelenting. Collegians are being used as a sounding board for those who would destroy much that is synonomous with democratic, American life. And so the attacks take on a sinister and double meaning that cannot be ignored or shrugged off. How successfully we shall weather this time of change and confusion depends upon how united a Sorority we are and how clear our sights. Let us not find ourselves "running scared."

Let us be firm in our beliefs and maintain our rights. Let us become strong, articulate advocates of fraternities and stand up against those who would deny us those rights.

In this free society which is in imminent danger of becoming fragmented, as one segment is pitted against another, let us reflect upon the words of a college president. "The two most important words in our language [are] freedom and discipline. A decision which all of us have to make every day of our lives is to strike a proper balance between the two. Sometimes it is fashionable to think of discipline as a bad word and freedom as a good word. The opposite can be true. Discipline leads to good taste and good manners, to domestic tranquility and the advancement of civilization. Freedom, on the other hand, exercised absolutely, corrupts absolutely, leads to disorderly conduct and collapse of governments."

In a very real sense, your future as well as the future of Gamma Phi Beta will be as you will it. You have the power to smother freedom by abusing it. You have the power, if you have the will, to preserve that freedom by using it with discretion. A characteristic of a disciplined civilization is the will to create and construct, not the will to destroy. It is my prayer that Gamma Phi Beta sorority and each individual member will play a major role in creating and constructing a better world for tomorrow . . . that the destruction and revolution abroad in our world may be re-directed toward reasonable reform and building a responsible, disciplined society.

For nearly 100 years Gamma Phi Beta has brought strength and beauty into the lives of thousands of women. Let us, drawing on those fine past traditions, build for the future so that countless others still to come may enjoy that extra dimension of love, loyalty, labor and learning which is Gamma Phi Beta.

Convention '68

The vast majority of conventioneers who arrived at Gamma Phi Beta's fifty-third international Convention flew into Los Angeles' international airport. From the east they soared over the majestic, snow-capped Rockies, over the burnished earth colors of the Painted Desert, over the cavernous depths of the Grand Canyon. From the north, they looked down on the vast timberlines of the Northwest, stately Mount Hood, the flowing rapids of the Columbia River. Eventually, they all sighted-in on the blackened landscape of the Sierra Nevadas as they approached the mist-clad environs of Los Angeles.

The trip alone was an eloquent preface to six days of wonder and awe, of living and learning, of renewed vows of purpose and sisterhood.

From the Los Angeles air terminal, delegates and guests limousined to the Huntington-Sheraton in Pasadena. Suburban in setting and surrounded by acres of trees and flowers, this hotel offers guests an escape from city distractions and a California view from every window.

Built at a time when spaciousness was the order of the day, rooms are large and airy-and air-conditioned if the weather calls for it. A huge lobby and terrace areas add enjoyment for guests and visitors. There are tennis courts, a swimming pool, the spacious formal horseshoe gardens that boast many varieties of palms and cacti, grapefruit trees in full bloom and the fragrant magnolia. The dining and meeting rooms seem endless, each more decorous than the other.

The Crystal Terrace, where the Gamma Phi Betas breakfasted, overlooked the pool and the pool gardens. The Viennese Room, where they banqueted, was designed for dining in an elegant manner with its incomparable crystal chandeliers from old Vienna. The Georgian Room, stately and dignified, housed the formal business sessions. The Ship Room, with its nautical

No Room at the Inn?

International officers arrived at the Huntington earlier in the week, but most delegates and conventioneers came on Sunday, June 23. There were several mix-ups in room assignments, much to the consternation of Mary Kay Dorman Kabler (Kansas), Convention chairman, and her hardworking committee members. Some esteemed dignitaries were bedded down on sofas and roll-in cots. Sometimes there were three or four in twin-bed rooms. But, somehow everyone found a place to lay her head and spirits were high while staff members and the Convention committee struggled to straighten out the snafu.

On hand to greet the arrivals were Dorothy Haines Winans (UCLA), social chairman and her assistant, Patricia Grimwood Kratz (UCLA). And, they were much in evidence at every social function, sauntering through the crowds, being sure that everything was proceeding as planned.

Sunday afternoon, after most guests had registered, a pre-Convention tour for more than 100 eager collegians and alumnæ departed to see the sights of the Los Angeles area. Following brunch, tour-goers boarded the Gray Line buses, which departed at 30-minute intervals. Each had a Gamma Phi Beta hostess aboard and a driver-guide, who provided factual information and amusing anecdotes as the itinerary unfolded. Fitting toes into Mary Pickford's diminutive footprints at Grauman's Chinese Theater or dabbling them in the blue Pacific Ocean (a first for many) were just two of the delights.

Finally the tour stopped at Alpha Iota chapter house near the UCLA campus. Sightseers were guided through the Spanish-style home eventually adjourned to the colorful patios to enjoy punch, tea, sandwiches and cookies. Hostesses for the tour in-

cluded Mary Darling Jurgensen (Oregon), chairman; Jean Johnston Rogers (UCLA); assistant chairman; Beth Linthicum Jones (UCLA), Eleanor Whitmore Hyde (California); Margaret Whitemore Hurst (UCLA); and Dorothy Tennant Drum (UCLA). The decor carried out an orange and yellow color scheme and each table boasted three colorful arial balloons, their baskets filled with shasta daisies. Nearly 600 sisters sat with members of their original chapters and sang rousing choruses of "California, Here We Are," a cleverly adapted parody.

The committee in charge of this opening dinner was: Elizabeth Chambers Hugh (UCLA), chairman; Sarah Whitton Spiess (Oregon); Mary Frances Martin (Stanford) and Judi Conner (Beta Lambda).

Shortly after the dinner, members congregated in designated rooms to rally with others from their provinces. Light refreshments were served as collegians and alumnæ became acquainted, traded tales and plans for the week. Later everyone gathered on the pool patio for a songfest led by Jacqueline Doyle Sinks (UCLA), Convention song chairman. The more than 300 who joined in the chorus polished up familiar tunes and learned a few new ones to take back home.

An impromptu feature of the evening was a musical "thank you" from Jean Cline, director of college programs, and the three retiring field secretaries: Claire Danielson (Oklahoma State), Bonnie Allen (Oklahoma) and Marilyn Bachnik (Wisconsin State).

The Rap of the Gavel

Early Monday morning delegates, alternates and visitors, sleepy-eyed and groping (nearly everyone stayed up too late), wended their way to the Crystal Terrace for a quick, but hearty, breakfast before the opening schedule began at 8:45. The opening exercises were conducted by Grand President Ardis McBroom Marek (Northwestern) and the rap of the gavel sounded shortly before nine o'clock. The roll, called by Eleanor J. Sieg (Iowa), Executive Secretary-Treasurer, showed 86 Greek-letter delegates present, 74 alumnæ chapters with full votes and 13 with one-half votes, a total of 1661/2 votes.

Lovely, serene Barbara Hahn Rice (Denver) regional chairman, welcomed Gamma Phi Betas to the Golden State. Ann Miller, delegate from the University of Tennessee, read the convention rules and Aleene Carter Thieme (Kansas) made the report of the credentials committee.

After introducing the international officers and committee chairmen to the assembly, Mrs. Marek delivered the formal address of the Grand President, in which she stressed the importance of each member, alumna and collegian, assuming her duties to the Sorority and the community. After a coffee break on the patio quadrangle, international committee chairmen made their reports. Mary Eleanor Babbitt Bilby (Arizona), chairman of the awards committee, announced the names of those members who had been elected to the International Service Roll during the last two years and named three new members to be added to ehe International Honor Roll:

Aleene Carter Thieme, Edith Herrin Watt (Oregon) and Elizabeth Fee Arnold (Colorado State).

Cherie McElhinney Olsen (Iowa), president of the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation, spoke about the accomplishments and goals of the Foundation and Barbara Westover Sheldon (Washington), supervisor of camps, illustrated her report with a descriptive collection of colored slides of the two campsites. Janet Milligan Heaton (Denver) talked about chapter philanthropy programs; Mary Jane Hipp Misthos (Colorado College) explained the committments of the Endowment-Crescent Board. Elna Erickson Simons (Birmingham-Southern), Director of Expansion, told the gathering about the new chapters that had been colonized and installed during the biennium and hinted at the expansion possibilities in the near future. She awarded sterling silver baby cups to the five chapters installed during her tenure of office: Gamma Sigma at Western Michigan, Gamma Tau at St. Louis, Gamma Upsilon at Drake, Gamma Phi at Auburn and Gamma Chi at Southwest Texas. She presented a sterling silver teething ring to Gamma Psi, a newly-colonized chapter at Northern Iowa State University. Having admonished the recipients not to shed any tears at the presentation ceremony, Mrs. Simons broke the rules herself when Nancy Roper (Auburn), representing the six baby chapters, stepped to the microphone and presented the Director of Expansion with a gold charm bracelet, with one charm from each new group.

After a free lunch period, workshops began in the afternoon. Betty Heflin Egbert (Arizona), Director of Finance, led the sessions of the House Corporation Boards' areas of responsibility which discussed chapter house management and the role of the housemother. Alumnæ roundtables with Virginia Forsythe Vint (Missouri), Alumnæ Vice President, presiding, discussed the P's of alumnæ progress, while the alumnæ workshops, were led by Audrey Weldon Shafer (Missouri), Barbara Nicoll

Greek-letter workshops discussed scholarship with Helen Berg Kline (Oklahoma), international scholarship chairman; pledge education with Jean Cline (Idaho), director of college programs, and membership with Marjorie Speidel Lundin (Washington), international membership chairman.

"Through the Gates of Gamma Phi Beta"

At 8:30 in the evening 500 people, gowned in formal evening attire, entered the gracious Viennese Room to attend the banquet honoring the Four Founders and members of the past Grand Councils. The tables were centered with small wrought iron gates flanked by votive candles and fresh gardenias, to carry out the theme of the evening, "Through the Gates of Gamma Phi Beta."

Dr. Weldon Perry Shofstall, dean of students at Arizona State University, addressed the group on "Individualism and Collectivism and the Survival of Freedom." His talk, accentuated the importance of individual involvement in world affairs to assure the freedom of all. (See the text of Dr. Shofstall's talk on page 20.)

The program opened with the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by Dorothy Burrel Zeller and "The Canadian National Anthem" by Jacqueline Sinks. Eleanor Kelley Brandon (Illinois), toastmistress, proposed a toast to the Four Founders and the response was delivered by Katherine Summerville (San Jose State). Barbara Transue (San Jose State) gave the response to the Grand Council toast.

Following the dinner, a reception in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Shofstall was held on the pool patio. A long red carpet ran the length of the patio to lead guest through the receiving line to the elegantly appointed tea table, centered with a massive arrangement of pink carnations and sparkling with silver and crystal accessories.

Later in the evening Judith Crites Hann (Idaho), international housing chairman, showed slides of Gamma Phi Beta houses, lodges and suites.

Joan Dillon (Gamma Upsilon at Drake) delivered an inspiring devotional. Bette Heflin Egbert, in her report as Director of Finance, explained how Gamma Phi Beta funds were apportioned. To illustrate her talk, she undraped a large felt display which used skyrockets, in vivid colors, bursting onto a field of blue. Each flare indicated an expense item.

Beatrice Hill Wittenberg, National Panhellenic Conference Delegate, spoke to the group about current problems facing the sorority world, emphasizing the demands of university administrations and the measures Gamma Phi Beta proposed to meet those demands in an equitable manner.

The rest of the morning was devoted to the reports of international committee chairmen: Magazine Sales: Dorothy Stark Kenny (Syracuse); Centennial Committee: Gladys Hecker Myles (Washington-St. Louis); Mothers' Clubs: Audrey Weldon Shafer; Public Relations: Beth McCallon Wheeler (SMU); Historian: Orra Spencer Reid (Michigan) and Nominating Committee: Olive Gallatin Picard (Arizona).

Shortly after noon members and their distinguished guests (members of other National Panhellenic sororities) reentered the mirrored Viennese Room to honor the 27 member sororities of the National Panhellenic Conference. Greek columns entwined with fresh ivy centered the tables and marched down the length of the speaker's table. Golden goblets, engraved with the Greek letters Γ Φ B were presented to the guests of honor, who were introduced to the group by Mrs. Wittenberg.

Dean Cornelia Tomes, associate dean of students at San Jose State College, addressed the group with a provocative talk on the rewards and problems in education today. Of special interest to the Panhellenic groups was word of Dean Tomes' special project in establishing a "Collge Woman over 29 Program" at her college.

Those in charge of the luncheon were Betty Grimm Murray (Denver), chairman; Barbara Shipman Brode (Penn State), Louise Nellis Swift (Denver) and Barbara Dirk (Beta Alpha).

In the afternoon, roundtables and workshops resumed for alumnæ and Greek-letter members to continue the discussions begun on the previous day.

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





This is the way we believe it should be and this is the way we want to keep it.

To those who cry "undemocratic, discriminatory, selective," I reply that any organization of enduring value must have requirements and high standards for membership. At the risk of sounding sacreligious, I ask, did not Christ select his 12 disciples, and might not there have been others who were alienated because they were rejected? And the girl who was embittered because she did not receive a bid to the sorority of her choice, was she being unbiased, open-minded and democratic in not giving the others a chance? Is this not, in itself, a form of discrimination, selectivity and even snobishness? The purpose of a sorority is not to form cliques, but to help a girl get the most out of college. The fact that all do not fit into an intimate group does not condemn that group, but rather emphasizes the fact that the very existence of a company of congenial, like-minded persons is a strong unit for inspiration and service and should be nurtured and strengthened, not ridiculed and weakened.

It All Depends on You!

Sophisticated historians admit that the world is in a state of chaos, if not near anarchy. Arnold Townbee says we are in an unconventional Third World War—a war without genocide. Michael Padev, a foreign editor of considerable insight and prestige wrote: "... What is at stake is not the political career of French President Charles De Gaulle but the survival of a Western democratic regime against the onslaught of a frontal communist attack." Frank Meyer, editor of National Review wrote: "The prosecution of the war in Vietnam has been vitiated from the beginning by the internal decay of our attitude to world communism, by our refusal to face the reality of an enduring challenge to our existence and the existence of our civilization."

Almost every major University in America from West coast Berkeley to East coast Columbia has been challenged, in one way or another, to surrender the administration more or less completely to students. Neal Ascherson of the London Observer Service wrote last May, "This is revolution. What is happening in the Sorbonne and the Free University of Berlin, in France, West Germany, Italy and (embryonically) in Britain is not a mere generation conflict. Nor is it just a fight for university reform. It is total onslaught on modern industrial society." And, I might add, that the tactics are classically communist and the goal is completely nihilistic rather than utopian.

Students on the left have become more militant and social fraternities have become less relevant to the current scene. Greeks have "dropped out," which means that they have joined the student revolution. Being neutral today is to give aid and comfort to the enemy.

But, what is the connection between the survival of social fraternities and the student revolution or the Third World War? To answer that question, let me quote from the foreword of your book *Ideally Speaking*.

... In this changing world, it seemed necessary to add to the usual standards book a section dealing with the problems confronting all of us as we search for the meaning of life. This search for personal identity in today's world has become increasingly difficult, with challenges on every side. Our computerized society has all but stifled our very beings. Is escape, in any of its forms, the answer to man's search for his own identity? No. The answer is rather, to become involved with life and to understand oneself. The last section of this book reveals

our great personal involvement with people and with the world in which we live."

The future of fraternities and that of freedom in America are inseparably linked. If America turns to dictatorship, and dictatorship IS the inevitable consequence of anarchy, then Gamma Phi Beta, along with other social fraternities, will be no more. Complacency today means suicide tomorrow for social fraternities.

Individualism and Collectivism

The nature of this link between social sororities and the current student revolutions is obvious if you read "The Panhellenic Creed":

We, the undergraduate members of women's fraternities, stand for good scholarship, for guarding of good health, for maintenance of fine standards, and for serving, to the best of our ability, our college community. Cooperation for furthering fraternity life, in harmony with its best possibilities, is the ideal that shall guide our fraternity activities.

Sororities which accept such a creed as their only guide would fit comfortably in any fascist, socialist, communist or any other collectivist state. A collectivist society encourages groups which stand only for such ideals as "good scholarship, good health, fine standards, and for service to the college community." Collectivism means anonyminity, and anonyminity means death to fraternities. Individualism plus a commitment to the belief that "A man's reach must exceed his grasp, or what's a heaven for?" is the true concept of fraternity.

By contrast, with the Panhellenic Creed, social fraternities were founded in the spirit of the Judaic-Christian tradition. Recently, however, the spirit of the enlightenment and the French revolution hit the American campuses with a dull thud which has currently become the loud roar of a nihilistic student revolution.

The social Gospel has replaced the Christian Gospel in the hearts of many idealistic young men and women. Jaques Maritain wrote: "Having given up God, so as to be self-sufficient, man has lost track of his soul. He looks in vain for himself; he turns the universe upside down trying to find himself; he finds masks, and behind the masks, death." Instead of a brotherhood in Christ, we have today a brotherhood in violence.

By publishing *Ideally Speaking*, Gamma Phi Beta has taken a stand at the crossroads. For them, a choice is imminent.

But will the individual members accept the challenge of *Ideally Speaking?* Aren't many members horrified at the thought that a sorority provides an opportunity to learn, and not just an opportunity for students to enjoy themselves? Unless the answer to this question is a determined "No," *Ideally Speaking* has been written in vain and you are going to think my remarks are just not your "bag." But, if you want more than a social sorority, what must you do?

My response is that I agree with Oscar Wilde when he wrote: "Nothing of importance can be taught. It must be learned."

Is Man's Conscience His Only Guide?

According to a group of students, we are in an age where man's conscience is his only guide. They seem never to have learned that individual conscience does not spring into being full-blown; it is nurtured and bent by years of thought and experience, and by exposure to certain values. The next time someone pressures you to act according to an uneducated and immature conscience, just remember that, if guilty, Lee Harvey Oswald, James Earl Ray and Sirhan Bishara Sirhan felt they were obeying the dictates of their consciences.

However, and fortunately, we can read in *Ideally Speaking*, "The language of the character is behavior." Marshall McLuhan puts it: "The medium is the message."

If your conscience is to be your guide, if your ideals are to be translated into action, you must do more than listen to them presented by others. You much learn to acquire ideals for yourself. You must learn to educate your conscience. Learning how to acquire ideals to live by is a new experience and must become a necessary party of sorority life. You must learn to solve the personal problems of your life for yourself. No one else, no matter how filled with wisdom and compassion, can solve these problems for you.

So far as I have personally known, social fraternities, during the past fifty years, have contributed very little to educating the conscience of students. Consequently, a new kind of sorority activity must supplement the present program. This new kind of sorority experience must enable students to learn to achieve, for themselves, a precious personal autonomy and identity. But you must act. You must want to have more than a social sorority. Without the will, there is no way. With a desire, nothing is too difficult.

Superficial sisterhood must be replaced by real concern for each other, complete honesty and trust with each other plus love based upon faith in a personal God. These essentials do not exist today in the typical social sorority. They did exist in the sororities of some of your alumnæ.

If God Is Dead

A sorority alumna recently said to me, "My primary purpose in life is to try to know God's will for me and do it to the best of my ability." Can you imagine an attractive twenty-year-old university woman saying and believing that? Can you imagine the members of your local chapter saying and believing that? I hope you can. If God is dead, fraternities are irrelevant, impotent and illogical. If God is dead in your sorority, you might as well forget *Ideally Speaking*.

I have learned that students generally take much the same attitude toward religion that they have about education. They feel that neither religion nor education has any serious bearing upon the trials and tribulations of everyday life. Only the "creeps" think they go to class to learn anything important or useful. Only the "creeps" think Jesus Christ has anything important, useful or personal for the cool guy or gal. You will surely agree that the Christian life doesn't seem very "groovy" to many sorority women. And, if that is true, social fraternities must supplement their present programs or perish.

Young women seem to have two kinds of problems. One is the kind which a social sorority can and does help. The other kind is the problem of the meaning of life for the individual, the autonomy and identity, which only the individual can help us solve. The second is the problems only God can help us solve. And since most people place more faith in humans than in God, their important and most frequent "hang-ups" are with those problems that only God can help solve.

There are at least three different worlds on a college campus. There is the first world of those women who are members of a social sorority. Here, within the sorority, they get both the moral and social support one gets from others. Here they get confidence and pride. Here they get external standards. Here they get the help that independents envy.

Then there is the second world of the great mass of students who are facing life pretty much alone. Some of them try riots. Others join political groups. Many have hobby groups. But, the majority have a few superficial friends and nothing more. Life for most of these women is pretty empty. These students need a sorority badly. They also need the third world.

In this third world, there are the students who have been blessed with the knowledge of spiritual power and Christian love. They have found faith in a living God. There aren't many of these, so it seems. These students have the happiness many sorority women are frantically seeking. But, those in the third world need a sorority in order to attain maximum from their education. They need a sorority as badly as the sorority needs them.

In his book, *Human Destiny*, Nobel prize winner Lecomte Du Noüy writes: "It is certain that the pure Christian dogma can no more be absorbed by the majority today than the theory of relativity. But the crowd can dispense with the idea of relativity, whereas it cannot dispense with religion."

The American College-A Custodial Institution

In one of his newspaper columns, Sidney Harris stated our current situation clearly: "... The college in America has been a huge and expensive custodial institution, devoted to everything but the main purpose of education ... to develop an intellectual appetite and to lead the search for human values ... Colleges are run for sakes of departments, and research and

grants, and administrative ease, and publicity and fund raising, and keeping the children pure in body if not in mind . . . They are given all kinds of absurd diversions such as football and fraternities to camouflage the fact that they are actually being treated like babies. The students are painfully aware of this failure—but have been so badly educated that they have no values but violence to oppose it with."

Formerly, before our educational institutions ceased to educate, social fraternities met a real and important need. Fraternities used to be, in fact, laboratories for learning how to live. The content for living was obtained from the curriculum, the church and the home. Students came to college with an educated conscience. Today the fraternity has become a laboratory without content. A shell empty of values. Fraternities are, as Sidney Harris says, ". . . absurd diversions to camouflage the fact that they [students] are actually being treated as babies."

Absolutes and tradition are scorned. A vacuum has been created. A vacuum has never existed and never will exist permanently.

In order to fill the vacuum created largely by secular education, students have accepted five fatal delusions. Evidence that students embrace these delusions can be plainly seen on campuses all over America. Any student organization, sorority or otherwise, which desires to do anything constructive, on any campus, must recognize and seek to remove these delusions in the minds of their members before they can even hope to do anything worthwhile. These delusions are unsurmountable barriers to learning the truth as well as barriers to a change of the direction sororities are now traveling.

The Five Delusions

I. An Atheistic Society Can Be as Free as a Theistic One. (Atheism) Evidence for this delusion is the fact that many chapters of Gamma Phi Beta have one or more atheistic or agnostic members. In some cases, they are leaders. Better evidence is the fact that religion has been banned from the schools without serious objection. Likewise, many of us are no longer concerned if our public officials and legislators are atheists or agnostics. Communists are militant atheists. But, very few people fear a communist take-over of our government. It will be futile for your sorority to begin a program, "Ideally Speaking," if many members hold this delusion as truth.

II. The World Is Getting Better. (Progressivism) We proudly point to the growth in technology as proof of progress. But, this is a delusion. Anyone who doesn't subscribe to the cult of "progress" is voted down in elections and persona non grata in most elite social circles. We are living longer but we have more suicides. We have more comforts in life but mankind's practice is to make the next war as soon as a generation has grown up which is young enough not to be able to remember the unpleasantness of the last. All we seem to learn from history is that we don't seem to learn from history. Is this the road to progress? Forget your noble plans for renewal in the sorority if your members worship at the shrine of progressivism.

III. Utopia is Possible. (Utopianism) The appeal of communists and socialists, and most liberal politicians is the promise of "heaven-on-earth." For many people utopia is considered, not just a possibility, but a right. Utopia is the Lorelei in the American mainstream. As long as you dream of utopia you might as well forget Ideally Speaking. Utopianism is the great heresy of our times.

IV. Truth is Every-Changing. (Relativism) If you ask the average student, "What is right?," she will answer either that "it depends" or "whatever your conscience dictates." Scientific or historical truth about human relations and the good life are

rejected, ignored, or never sought by young people. They have been taught that such truth is irrelevant mythology . . . that God is dead! Only a short-sighted or stupid scientist would reject, ignore or fail to seek to know physical laws. But, it seems easy for us to reject, ignore or fail to seek to know spiritual laws. A major delusion of our times is our belief in "situational ethics" or the "new morality" instead of using as our guide the universal and eternal laws of our spiritual universe. "You shall know the truth and the truth will make you free" must become the rock upon which *Ideally Speaking* rests.

V. Noble Ends Justify Any Means. (Environmentalism) Criminality and even the murder of our leaders is a logical consequence of this belief. None of us wants poverty for anyone, so our government steals "from each according to ability" and gives "to each according to need" in building a Great Society. None of us wants war so we surrender to those who promise us Paradise. None of us likes guilt so we abolish all laws of decency. Those who are victims of this delusion operate on the false assumption that society makes the man rather than the fact that man has free will and creates his own society. To accept just any means for achieving noble ends is to disrespect and disregard the individual.

Summary and Conclusions

Our thesis is that Gamma Phi Beta must, "Ideally Speaking," become more than a social sorority.

The vacuum created by the failure of higher education must be filled. Educating the conscience must be the mission of the modern sorority.

The barrier of the five delusions must be removed. The logical result of the five delusions is nihilism or a brotherhood of violence—on campuses all over the world.

The supplemental program must be carried on by students themselves. Only when and if professors and their students renew their traditional search for truth can fraternities afford to be again nothing more than social organizations.

If this idea is accepted by Gamma Phi Beta, you will become a leader on every campus where there is a chapter. As individuals, you will have found meaning in your lives. Personal identity and autonomy will have become real for each of you. You will have progressed toward "personal involvement with people and with the world in which we live" as so clearly proposed in *Ideally Speaking*. Your sorority will have given you something of great and lasting value long after graduation. Gamma Phi Beta, as an organization, will become the result rather than the creator of individual ideals.

Have I been optomistic or pessimistic? It all depends on you! Without such leadership, the future seems dismal. With such leadership, all of us can again hope for and realize a survival in freedom.

The Student Senate at NDSU sent Mary to California last summer to a training session in Human Relations at Chico State College.

If we are to continue to be a great sorority, our generation must also work for Gamma Phi Beta. For all that I have received in the past four years from my sorority, I feel a responsibility to repay it in some way."

Ambassador, she helped present programs on higher education to high school student bodies across the state.

She writes, "Being a charter member of a Gamma Phi Beta chapter, I have experienced not only the great sense of accomplishment but also the many problems, both large and small, which occur as a matter of course within new chapters. And, too, this job will afford me a wonderful opportunity to talk to various experts in my chosen field and would give me an excellent background when I enter graduate school."

KSU Dedicates Judith E. Koonce Hall


Last May Kent State University officials and Gamma Phi Betas gathered to pay homage to an outstanding alumna, Judith E. Koonce, Kent State and Beta Zeta '57. A new 12-story women's dormitory, named in her honor, was dedicated and a portrait of Miss Koonce was presented to the University by the Cleveland alumnæ.

Judy lost her life ten years ago when she was leading a group of 4-H girls on a hike along the Little Miami river. One 11-year-old girl slipped and fell down a gorge into the river and Judy jumped 45 feet into the water in a futile attempt to rescue the drowning child. The Bronze Carnegie Hero Medal was awarded to her posthumously.

The new Kent State building is the first to be named by the University for one of its graduates.

Mary Caldwell (Kent State), president of the Cleveland-East Suburban alumnæ chapter, spoke to the 300 people gathered for the dedication ceremonies. Mary pledged Beta Zeta with Judy and was graduted with her. She gave a biographical vignette of the 23-year-old heroine before she presented the portrait to Dr. Robert I. White, president of the university. The painting, done in oil by Elizabeth Wheeler Olsen (Michigan), former Grand President of Gamma Phi Beta, will hang in the lobby of the dormitory.

The Judith E. Koonce Scholarship and its first recipient were announced at the dedication. The scholarship, to be awarded annually by the university, has been established with

money raised by the three Greater Cleveland alumnæ chapters of Gamma Phi Beta under the direction of Mary Caldwell. The fund will be administered by the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation.

At the dedication ceremonies, President White said, "to become a great center of learning a school must be rich in three vital areas and inter-related basic resources.



Lindsey Barbee Fellowship

Joy Benson, a member of Alpha Gamma Delta sorority at the University of British Columbia, is the 1968 recipient of the Leola Neal award for academic excellence. The award was presented in the spring by the president of Alpha Lambda chapter of Gamma Phi Beta.

The Leola Neal Award, administered by the Gamma Phi

Beta Foundation, rotates among the five Canadian chapters of campuses on which Gamma Phi Beta has chapters. The annual prize of \$100 is presented to the senior student who attained the highest scholastic average among Panhellenic women.

The award is named in honor of Dr. Leola Neal, dean of women at the University of Western Ontario and a Gamma Phi Beta, who has consistently promoted high scholarship among sorority women.

Kathryn Winchester Award

Carol Sands, a collegiate member of Tau chapter at Colorado State University, has been awarded the \$300 Kathryn Herbert Winchester award for continuing education.

This award, established at the 1966 convention by John F. Winchester in honor of his wife, is awarded annually to an undergraduate student who has completed at least two years of college work. The terms of the award stipulated that the first recipient be from an Arizona chapter, where the Winchesters now reside. The grant for 1966-67 was made to Sue Zarkos, Beta Kappa. The Winchesters requested the 1967-68 award be made in Colorado where Kathryn was a member of Theta chapter at Denver University.

Grants-in-Aid

Alice Weiber Fitzgerald, Grand President 1940-46

Alice Weiber Fitzgerald (Beta '16), Grand President of Gamma Phi Beta from 1940 through 1946, died of a heart ailment on March 23 in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin.

A life-long worker for Gamma Phi Beta, Mrs. Fitzgerald began her long record of accomplishments while an undergraduate student. After completing two years at Wellesley, she transfered to the University of Michigan where she became an active member of Beta chapter, Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. After receiving her B.A. and M.A. degrees, she married Dr. Robert E. Fitzgerald.

In 1932 she was named scholarship chairman of Gamma Phi Beta, where for three years she led the undergraduates to strive for scholarship as an individual cultural development rather than a dogged pursuit of statistical standings. From 1935 to 1938 Mrs. Fitzgerald was director of Province IV and served as

historian until 1939 when she became Chairman of Expansion and a member of Grand Council.

Elected Grand President at the 1940 convention in Washington, D.C., Mrs. Fitzgerald brought to her office a combination of serious, thoughtful direction well spiced with a keen sense of humor. Shortly after World War II was declared in 1941, all conventions were banned for the duration. When Mrs. Fitzgerald finally retired as Grand President six years later, the delegates at the 1946 Convention in Bretton Woods gave a standing ovation to Alice Weiber Fitzgerald, who led them proudly through the difficult war years with fortitude and efficiency.

Gamma Phi Beta extends its gratitude and sincere sympathy to all members of Mrs. Fitzgerald's family.

Footlights and Feathers

FOOTLIGHTS AND FEATHERS by Mary Orr and Reginald Denham (Pageant Press, 111 Fifth Ave., New York, N.Y. 10003). A trip around the world, a Broadway play, fabulous feathered friends and a two-author literary device make *Footlights and Feathers* a delightful travel book.

Mary Orr Denham (Syracuse '33) relates with glee the trials and tribulations in starring in the Broadway success Never Too Late in Australia and New Zealand. Her husband, Reginald, an avid ornithologist, traveled with her to have a closer look at the rarae aves of Down Under. They decided to make a complete trip around the world and include Hawaii, Hongkong, Bangkok, India, Cairo, Rome and London before returning to New York.

Rather than collaborating, the Denhams have written the book as two separate people—each commenting upon or supplementing the impressions of the other. The result is personal and intimate.

Mary, as a New York actress and the wife of a Broadway director and playwright, is well equipped to compare the theatres of Australia, New Zealand and America. The book is sparked with humorous insights into the life and problems of being a celebrity abroad: appearances on TV and radio shows, speeches to local ladies clubs and interviews with the none-too-cosmopolitan press. She lends her feminine touch to descriptions of the hotel accommodations (both the plush and the primitive), the difficulties of getting a mink coat through customs and the local foods.

Mr. Denham, in turn, gives superb and thoroughly knowledgeable descriptions of the countryside and wildlife. His love for nature takes him from formal botanical gardens to wild and remote parts of the land as he seeks an up-close view of rare, exotic and unusual birds. The passion of the bird watcher shines through his accounts.

Mary and Reginald Denham are two well-known personalities on the Broadway scene. Since their marriage they have collaborated in writing many plays produced in London and New York. As an actress, Mary has appeared in many plays, TV and radio productions. As a writer, she has published two successful novels and a great many short stories which have appeared in the leading women's magazines. Her novelette, published in Cosmopolitan Magazine under the title "Eve Harrington," was later made into the Oscar-winning movie "All About Eve," for which she received the Screen Writers' Guild Award.

Mr. Denham has directed successful New York plays: The Bad Seed, Dial "M" for Murder, The Two Mrs. Carrolls and Hostile Witness. He has contributed numerous articles to ornithological publications and has had many short stories and one book published.

Armchair travelers, theater buffs and nature lovers will delight in Footlights and Feathers.

Setting up a Science Project

SETTING UP A SCIENCE PROJECT by Ann Stepp (Prentice-Hall, Inc.). According to the junior high school teacher-author, a science project is not a construction or art project. It is not an enlarged model or drawing. It is not working up a plastic model from a hobby kit or building a model volcano. It is not the display of an impressive piece of scientific equipment, nor a copy of the solar system. It is not a report copied from an encyclopedia and a chart copied from a book.

Having explained in the foreward of her book the many things that a science project is NOT, Ann Stepp launches into a highly readable account of the positive aspects of her subject matter. The solving of a problem or the demonstration of a principle is the purpose of any science exhibit. The author cites several examples. But, she says, the market place has shown the importance of good packaging and she deals at length with proper and effective ways to display and demonstrate any given project. The cost of materials and safety measures are covered in the book.

Ann (Oklahoma) received her B.S. degree in education at Oklahoma University and her M.A. from Chapman College in Orange, California. She is chairman of the science teachers in Garden Grove, California, and is currently collaborating with *Encyclopedia Britannica* on a filmstrip series on science projects.

Lieutenant Colonel Lane Carlson, president of Alpha Delta chapter of Gamma Phi Beta at the University of Missouri in 1940-41, has been named one of the first six officers of the Women's Army Corps to be selected for promotion to colonel.

Almost simultaneously with the announcement of her promotion Lane received word that she was to be honored by the University of Missouri as one of its outstanding alumnæ who has made distinguished contributions to her generation. The honors convocation took place early in May in Columbia, Missouri, where Lane and other honored alumnæ were special guests at the climax of a year-long celebration of the Centennial of the admission of women to the university. In Columbia she was a guest at a luncheon given by Mrs. John Schwada, wife

of the chancellor of the University and Mrs. Warren Hearnes, wife of the governor of the state.

Lane, currently the information officer at Fort McClellan, Alabama, was selected last April by a board of general officers convened in Washington, D.C., to consider, for the first time in the history of the corps, WAC lieutenant colonels eligible for promotion.

Her promotion will come under the provisions of a law enacted late last year guaranteeing equal promotion and retirement opportunities to women in the armed services. A 25-year veteran of Army Service, Lane enlisted in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps in February 1943 at Ft. Des Moines, Iowa and was graduated from Officer Candidate School there in June.

Helen Schleman Retires as Dean of Women At Purdue University



Dean Schleman will devote more of her time to her pet project, Span Plan.

After 21 years as Purdue University's dean of women, Helen B. Schleman (Northwestern) shucked her administrative duties July 1 to concentrate on her favorite mission—keeping women from going to seed intellectually.

Under her new responsibility, she will work half-time as a special counselor in what she calls her Span Plan—planning education for the entire life span of women. This new duty will give her time to concentrate added emphasis on the job of counseling mature women who have returned to the university to resume their interrupted education, including wives of students.

"Our office has been the one agency on campus which is concerned particularly with interpreting women's new life patterns to women students and urging them to make individual, long-term plans," Dean Schleman said. "This is important, in light of their probable employment outside the home for many years of their lives—especially after age 35 or 36, when their children will probably all be in school."

Dean Schleman and her staff already have such a program going in cooperation with Mortar Board. Using donated funds, the program gives grants to students' wives to help them resume their educations through part-time study. Miss Schleman calls it one small aid in helping young wives avert educational obsolescence during their child-rearing years.

She also will work on a program, set up 16 years ago, to help freshman women adjust to university life through small group counseling conferences. Mortar Board members participate in these conferences.

When Miss Schleman became dean of women in 1947, Purdue had only 2,097 women students out of a Lafayette enrollment of 14,060. That figure dropped to 1,657 after postwar enrollments waned to a 1951 low mark, but the number since then has quadrupled to 6,825 this year, out of a main campus total enrollment of 23,370.

Her service to Purdue actually dates back to 1934, when she became Purdue's first women's residence hall director. In her 13 years in that job, she developed the program of using graduate and undergraduate students as hall counselors. She also developed and directed Purdue's training school for house mothers for fraternities, sororities and residence halls. One of the earliest and best known training schools for mature women, it was used as a pattern for similar schools set up later in the Midwest and in the Pacific Northwest.

A native Hoosier, Miss Schleman attended school in Valparaiso. She received a bachelor's degree in English literature from Northwestern University in 1924, a master's degree in hygiene and physical education from Wellesley College in 1926 and a master's degree in psychology and education from Purdue in 1934.

While teaching physical education at Ohio State University in 1926-32, Miss Schleman introduced group instruction in golf. Her textbook on *Group Golf Instruction* was published in 1934.

She spent four years during World War II in Washington in the Coast Guard Women's Reserve (SPARS), first as assistant director and later as director. She attained captain's rank and received a commendation from the Secretary of the Navy.

On the national level, Dean Schleman served on the education committee of President Kennedy's Commission on the Status of Women, and she was one of the women Mr. Kennedy invited to the White House to discuss civil rights. She is a member of President Johnson's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped. She served three years on the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services and received the Army's Distinguished Civilian Service Award.

Miss Schleman once served as a judge of the Miss America Pageant in Atlantic City. She had asked the advice of Purdue President Frederick L. Hovde on accepting the assignment and was told: "Do it. I've never been opposed to mixing beauty and brains."

With her predecessor, Miss Schleman published Your Best Foot Forward, a book on social usage for young people. It was based on their nationwide survey, in which hundreds of outstanding students, both men and women, were asked about accepted social practices on college campuses.

Miss Schleman has served as president, vice president and treasurer of the National Association of Women Deans and Counselors and as president of that group's Indiana association. At Purdue she has served as president and vice president of the University Club and is a member of the University Senate's Student Affairs Committee. Purdue's Mortar Board chapter named one of its four-year scholarships for undergraduates in her honor.

She is listed in Who's Who in America and Who's Who of American Women.

Miss Schleman's articles on women's education, student housing and extra classroom education have appeared in the Journal of the National Association of Women Deans and Counselors, National Mortar Board Quarterly and publications of the Intercollegiate Association of Women Students.

The Eyes of Texas Are Upon Nancy Tieken Hein

Nancy Tieken Hein (Texas '54) was named Texas Outstanding Young Clubwoman at the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Convention held in Austin last May. Bi-annually the TFWC names a member to this honor. Nancy won the Outstanding Clubwoman Award at the Alamo District Convention of the TFWC in March through her project of which she is chairman, "Clear Corners and Clean Curbs." She was entered in the contest by the San Antonio Women's Federation.

The "Clear Corners" project was in cooperation with the General Federation's Improvement Program in which club women survey the needs of their communities. The clubs choose projects in fields of education, conservation, beautifica-

tion, health or improving conditions for youth.

As President of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Bexar County Pharmaceutical Association, Nancy has been busy coordinating their 1968 state convention in San Antonio and Hemisfair. She served as vice chairman of the women's activities of the convention. Recently she was re-elected as a three-year state director of this organization; she has also served as vice president, treasurer, and historian of the local auxiliary.

Other services that Nancy performs are: corresponding secretary of Woman's Club of San Antonio, treasurer of the Carousel Round Table of the Woman's Club, and vice chairman of their constitution revision committee, a charter member of the Woman's Pavillion at Hemisfair, director of the Beautify San Antonio Association, San Antonio Womens Federation, San Antonio Musical Club, San Antonio Conservation Society, St. John's Lutheran Church—served as delegate to the Annual Convention of the Southern District of the American Lutheran Church in April 1968 held in New Orleans as well as April 1967 in Austin.



"Fashion History Repeats Itself," Says Florida Educator

The tent dress is really not so new. And neither are long dangling earrings or see-through blouses or the current style in sweaters.

Last summer Alberta Gary Jackson (Hollins '27) made a great many startling discoveries on a six-week art-history tour of Latin America. The only educator in Florida so honored, Alberta was sponsored on the tour by the art department of the University of Georgia and the National Endowment for Humanities.

In Mexico Alberta saw the wide tent-style dresses carved in stone and plaster on the sides of ancient monuments that dated back 2,500 years. The same type garment is still worn by old and young alike in both Mexico and Guatemala. "The country women have lived and dressed very much the same way for thousands of years and they don't seem to want to change," she said.

The long dangling earrings, made mostly of beads and seeds, have been in style for more than two millenniums—and they're still popular today.

A wine colored wool quezquemtl she bought in Mexico is very like the knitted see-through sweaters, a high fashion mode last fall. Indian women today and in 200 B.C. wore the capes for warmth.

On the tour the Jacksonville teacher visited eight sites of ancient peoples in Mexico and Guatemala and climbed several monuments at each site.

"People don't realize it, but some of those pyramids are as

large as those in Egypt," Alberta said. Some she climbed were as high as 210 feet and date back to about 535 B.C.

While Alberta brought back many souveniers and wider educational background, she said she also lost something climbing over and crawling through the stone monuments and pyramids.

"Ten pounds," she said, smiling proudly.
