

## Lady Lobbyists Work With

### Marjorie Davis Engeldinger

Just let somebody say, "That bill won't pass; it hasn't got a chance," and sparks fly from the eyes of soft-voiced Marjorie Davis Engeldinger, Iowa State, '36. She's living proof that one dedicated, knowledgeable Gamma Phi Beta can make a big difference in how the citizens of her native Iowa are governed.

As state legislative chairman for the Iowa League of Women Voters (her official title is second vice president), Marjorie leads the efforts of her organization's 2500 members to get things done at the Iowa statehouse every day of the week while the legislature is in session. She knows and is known by most of the 124 representatives and 62 senators in the General Assembly, which this year begins meeting annually because of a constitutional amendment of which Marjorie was a champion. Four other constitutional amendments became law last fall, after two years of hard work by a state-wide citizens' committee, headed by her.

The definition of a lobbyist, in dictionary terms, is "one who influences the vote of a lawmaker." Marjorie and her nine fellow League lobbyists, each of whom devotes at least one full day a week to the job, like to think they are much more than that. For instance, many hours of research in the law library at the capitol precede their taking a position on a bill. Bi-weekly meetings at Marjorie's home assess where they are at that moment and what they will concentrate upon in the two weeks ahead.

They know how to plug loop-holes in a bill which, if al-

lowed to become law, might not really be good legislation. After 12 years of active League work, Marjorie is attuned to the difference a "may" or a "shall" can make when allowed to become part of the Iowa Code.

What preparation does she have for this important work? Educationally very little, since she majored in home economics at Iowa State and spent the early years of her marriage to *Better Homes & Gardens* executive, Harvey Engeldinger, rearing son "Ding" and daughter, Mary, now a Gamma Phi Beta at the University of Denver.

But a keen mind, coupled with a consuming interest in political issues, brought her to membership in the League, and from there it was *cela va sans dire* to her present position. And, unlike the world of partisan politics, there is no "off season" to the League's work. They offer a constant service to voters, whether it be demonstrating voting machines at supermarkets, publishing informational studies on timely issues, speaking to school classes about government or conducting voter registration drives. Marjorie and her sister League members are constantly at work promoting political responsibility and participation by citizens in their government.

What's her advice to other Gamma Phi Betas? The same she gives to all women: be interested, get informed (joining the League is a good first step), read everything on both sides of an issue before you allow yourself the luxury of forming an opinion, and then *get to work!*

# Iowa Legislature

While Marjorie Engeldinger represents the League of Women Voters, another Gamma Phi Beta can be seen prowling the marble corridors of the Iowa state capital building, lobbying for the interests of the American Association of University Women. She is Janet Drescher Lyon (Missouri '50), alumnae assistant editor of *THE CRESCENT*.

Janet spent two days each week last year at the legislature, attending education committee meetings in both the House and Senate and doing much the same thing. Marge Engeldinger does—talking with representatives and urging them to support measures favored by the AAUW.

Janet's special responsibility has been education bills. Among the things she, and the AAUW, supported, and which were passed into Iowa law, were tuition grants to needy students attending private colleges in Iowa; bonding as a source of capital improvement revenue at the state universities; and increased financial support to Iowa's 16 community college-technical schools.

## More Good Government



### Nancy Palm of Texas

The political pie seems to slice nicely with a firm but feminine touch. "It's a matter of persuasion rather than dictation," said the first woman to pull out a plum and become a political party chairman in Harris County, Texas.

Nancy Dale Palm (Vanderbilt '42) was elected chairman of the Harris County Republican Executive Committee July, 1968 and until the elections in November, she spent her days (and many of her nights) coordinating the work of the five districts in the county. Previously she had been elected Presidential Elector from the Seventh District.

"Harris County is a swing county in a swing state," commented the vivacious Gamma Phi Beta. "It has one-eighth of the voters of the state of Texas, and as the state's largest county, it is a crucial one in an election year."

Although she considers her position as leader of a political party unusual, the petite auburn-haired housewife cited her seven years of experience as public relations secretary and legislative consultant to the Harris County Medical Society as a marvelous testing ground for working with groups of men.

"I think you could say politics is hereditary as well as environmental," Nancy said softly with vowels that smacked of magnolia blossoms. Born in Nashville, Tennessee, the fifth of six daughters, she continued, "All of my family has been interested in politics. I was a Dale of Tennessee, and there is even a governor in our family history."

"Mother reared six girls on a school teacher's salary," she related, "and she had a daughter at Vanderbilt from 1929 until 1946."

Nancy worked her way through Vanderbilt University in the news release office and graduated in 1942 with a major in English literature and minors in both political science and history. In addition to a high academic record, she held many elective positions, including charter membership and secretary of Mortar Board during her senior year.

She was married to Dr. William M. Palm shortly after graduation in 1942 and in 1946 they moved to Houston where they still reside.

A member of St. Phillip's Presbyterian church, she served as the first woman chairman of the Christian Community Action program of the church. She has taught junior and senior high Sunday school students for eight years and has served as a Bible leader for the women of the church.

Her other civic duties have included many aspects of community life. She was vice president of the Houston chapter of the American Association of University Women and was acting president when the Association accepted its first Negro member. She was a charter member and organizer of the Houston Civic Music Association and has served as a volunteer for the Houston Museum of Fine Arts.

Having a husband who is a physician is the only reason Nancy feels that she is able to combine politics successfully with her role as housewife. The Palms frequently share political thoughts over a very late dinner. D D D

### Cynthia Barone of Massachusetts

What are college women doing 36 years after graduation? Cynthia Laraway Barone, a Massachusetts Gamma Phi Beta, is devoting many hours to politics, the good government kind.

While a senior at Boston University she was president of Delta chapter and commuted from Winchester where she was born and still lives. She is married to Dr. William D. Barone, a physician, and their two children are Debbie, recent college graduate, and Greg, a college freshman.

A warm-hearted nature has given Cynthia a sincere love of town, state and national politics. She is a long-standing member of the Republican Town Committee, serving as vice-chairman for four years. In April 1969 she ran a successful campaign for membership in the Republican State Committee, representing three towns: Winchester, Arlington and Medford. As a child she had ample time to observe political statures in government from her father, Jonas A. Laraway, a Winchester town meeting member for many years, selectman and chairman of selectmen.

Cynthia's husband was involved with the public relations for Senator Edward W. Brooke when he became Massachusetts attorney general. She accompanied Dr. Barone to political dinners which she thought very boring at first. But, gradually, she became acquainted and learned to enjoy the meetings and the interesting people. Dr. Barone was very concerned with national affairs and knew that his wife's talents lay beyond community club activities. She had written reams of publicity for church, youth and women's organizations before it became known that she was a journalism major. For President Eisenhower's second campaign in 1957, Cynthia wrote the lyrics, set to music by her husband, to a rally song, "Ike Is a Wonderful Man." The Boston Pops played the Barone's song and it was used at rallies in the Washington area. Their combined talents also produced a book about a model young American, *Navy's Joe Bellino*, football-star whom they love and admire and one of the Winchester babies delivered by Dr. Barone.

Cynthia wishes that more women would make politics one of their interests. For herself, she sees an advantage in keeping her interests in this one important area, although she is still involved in church and civic affairs. Non-partisan New England town government was her original concern, but expansion to the state level became a necessary adjunct in our inter-related society.

As she planed home from President Nixon's inauguration, the excitement of so splendid a drama was dimmed as she reflected on the Republican brain-drain from Massachusetts to Washington. She knows that more politically-minded public servants are needed on all levels of government and Cynthia lends her integrity to better town and state government as she attends countless meetings and dinners, helps with public relations for deserving candidates, prepares mailings and spends hours on organizational details.

She's not going anywhere; she's here, among the people she has dedicated herself to represent.

## Betty McCaskill Stresses Partisan Politics

There is a political adage, used by a famous Missourian, "If you can't stand the heat, stay out of the kitchen."

Betty Anne Ward McCaskill (Missouri '50) firmly believes in the women spending plenty of time in both kitchens, the one at home and the one in partisan politics.

"It may sound out of tune in this age of the New Politics and the Enlightened Independent to advocate partisan politics, but it isn't," she affirms. "The best and only enduring way to a greater Democracy is an Enlightened Democratic Party and an Enlightened Republican Party, which will mean many more citizens participating than in the past. A New Party will become an Old Party as surely as young voters become old voters, often frustrated and disillusioned. New direction by young and old in existing parties may well be the only answer to this country's ills."

She is proud of her support of her party's candidates, Senator Stuart W. Symington, the senior Senator from Missouri, and Governor Warren E. Hearnes, the only Missouri Governor to serve two consecutive terms. "Bill and I started working for Senator Symington in a hot primary in 1952, and for Governor Hearnes in a hot primary in 1964, in fact, in '64 I was Boone County Women's Chairman for both Sen. Symington and Gov. Hearnes. And I am just as proud of all the candidates we supported who didn't win. If members of a party are not actively selective within their own ranks, the party will and should fail."

Betty Anne received her degree in political science at the same time her husband, Bill, received his in business and public administration at the University of Missouri, and President Harry Truman gave the Commencement address. They are the parents of four children, Anne, who will enter SMU in

the fall as a freshman, Claire, 16, Lisa, 12, and Will, 7. Bill is presently the Superintendent of Insurance in Missouri.

A vivacious, blonde homemaker with a ready smile and quick wit, she is the third ward Democratic Committeewoman in Columbia, Missouri. She was Secretary of the Democratic State Platform Committee last year, is a past PTA president(s), "my Past President's pin looks like a marksman's medal," a Girl Scout leader, a member of the United Methodist Church Board, a past president of her King's Daughters Circle, runner-up to the Distinguished Citizen Award by the Columbia Real Estate Board, and was appointed to the first Statutory Commission on the Status of Women by Governor Hearnes. She is also a past president of the National Alumnae Board of William Woods College.

She, and the Chairman of the Commission on the Status of Women represented Missouri in Washington in May at the Labor Department sponsored National Conference of Commissions on the Status of Women. Among their many activities, they had coffee at the White House with Mrs. Nixon.

"I borrowed a hat to wear from a good Republican friend," she laughed.

As a member of the Missouri Commission on the Status of Women, Betty talks freely about the work of the committees. They are investigating several areas of particular interest and concern to women: equal opportunity and equal pay in employment, up-dating of abortion laws, consumer affairs, credit procedures, to name a few.

Betty is particularly interested in equal pay for women, because, she insists, women themselves will not agitate for this right. "A woman is more inclined to think of her image as a woman than as a career employe in any field." D D D

# That Fabulous Invalid

Actress, author Mary Orr critiques the American theater today.



No matter what the highbrows or academics may say, the core of the American Theater is to be found in New York City. The "fabulous invalid" is, at the present time, in a state of flux. She always has been ailing; she probably always will be, unless she expires completely—a happening that many people predict is just around the corner.

Whatever else may be said, one can pronounce without equivocation that the theatre is shrinking, and shrinking rapidly. There are fewer theaters every year, fewer new plays, fewer authors and fewer backers. A night at the theater may soon be similar to a night at the opera.

At the moment, musical shows dominate the Broadway scene. However, if you examine them with a writer's eye, you will find that they are almost without exception, unoriginal. All the big smash hits are based on old plays or novels. Take four recent hits. *Mame* was founded on a successful straight play and novel; *Hello Dolly* was taken from a play by Thornton Wilder; *Fiddler on the Roof* was concocted from a series of famous short stories; and the most recent success *Zorba* was based on a famous film. The newest vehicle for Angela Lansbury, *Dear World*, has been made from a well-known straight play hit, *The Mad Woman of Chailot*.

Next season a new musical will be produced on Broadway. At this writing it is entitled *Make Believe* and is adapted from a story of my own called *The Wisdom of Eve*, originally published in *Cosmopolitan* magazine. This story became famous on the screen as *All About Eve*. This fall on the stage Lauren Bacall is expected to play the Bette Davis part. So instead of deploring this trend to rework old material, I should be somewhat gratified.

One cannot but ask oneself "Where are the creative librettists?" Even the music is derivative. You know every new tune before you hear it.

As to the writers of legitimate straight plays, where are they? You can name those who are getting their plays produced with five fingers: Neil Simon, Pinter, Albee, Stoppard, Ustinov, Tennessee Williams and William Inge and a host of others don't seem to bother to write anymore and when they do, the critics blast them off the stage. Arthur Miller, with "The Price," has been the only recent exception and that work was criticized for being "a well-made play."

The reason is not far to seek in the legitimate theater. It's an economic one. It now, thanks to the theater being union-ridden, takes more than \$125,000 to produce a one-set play with four or five characters. Where are the producers who can afford to put up so much money? Where can they find backers who can afford to gamble such large sums on such a speculative business?

The harsh fact is that the ordinary run-of-the-mill dramatists that used to fill the theaters with well-made, amusing or thrilling plays—plays that though they may not have been works of genius, were at least see-able—have become so discouraged from having no outlet for their works that they don't waste their time writing any more.

Any serious playwright who regards the spoken word as a means of communication between actor and audience cannot

ignore the rash of so-called "with it" plays presented at off-Broadway theaters. But 90 percent of the work in that arena depends for its effects on the use of "audience participation" where the audience is supposed to supply dialogue that the author has been unable to write; or on the shock value of four-letter words, nude males, unclad and frequently unattractive females and simulated oral sex combined with a lot of frenzied movement that dishonors the word choreography. All this frenetic, meaningless motion is supposed to be counterpoint to life as it is lived today. The perpetrators of these orgiastic mass gyrations even say that they are the new Shakespeares; they are "holding up the mirror to nature"; nature as it is today.

Unfortunately they have blotted out the one thing that is the most important ingredient of Theater, be it good or bad. I refer to the Spoken Word. For my sins, I have been to several of these way-out, modern plays off Broadway. Some of the dialogue has been mildly brilliant or illuminating. But I have discovered this afterwards, when I have bought a copy of the play and read it. I have yet to see an off-Broadway show where I have heard more than 10 percent of the words or lyrics. No, that is not quite true. I went to see *Hair* after it was transferred from off-Broadway to Broadway. I heard 11 percent.

From whence did this total disregard for the spoken word spring? I have thought and thought and have finally come to the conclusion that some of the blame must be laid at the feet of Agnes De Mille. By sheer genius she demonstrated, in that classic musical *Oklahoma*, that the story could be made to move forward without words by 20 minutes of inspired choreography.

Subsequently, she has had her many imitators and finally all this wordlessness culminated in Jerry Robbins staging practically the whole story of "Romeo and Juliet" by means of choreography. Now the no-talent vendors of theatrical offal have been taken over off-Broadway where noise drowns out words, dirt smothers beauty and a lack of plot engenders boredom.

The altar of Agnes De Mille is strewn with wreaths of unspoken words. One sighs for the days of red-nosed comedians and hour-glass figured chorus girls with modest G-strings.

Of course, as it is with most of the arts, there are phases, fashions or crazes. They have come and gone throughout the history of the theater. This new trend, the dirty word, dirty hair, dirty drawers predilection, is but another fad. I predict that in five years time, all this *merde* (to use a word every French actor says before a first night), all this unpleasant excreta that is now being evacuated by our "with it" writers, will have been flushed down the Toilet of Time.     » » »

# Our Man Friday Retires

A tribute to Harold Josef Bachmann

The end of last June marked the end of an era for *THE CRESCENT* of Gamma Phi Beta and its long association with Harold Josef Bachmann, account executive with the George Banta Printing Company.

On June 17 eight executives of the Banta Company and two representatives of the National Panhellenic Editors' Conference met for dinner to honor Harold on the eve of his retirement. The Editors' were represented by Frances "Speed" Baker, for 43 years the editor of the Sigma Kappa *Triangle* and Frances Stephenson, former editor of the *Anchora* of Delta Gamma.

The highlight of the festive evening was the presentation of a gift from all of Harold's sorority editors, whose magazines he has directed. A beautifully wrapped box revealed 15 silver punch cups, each engraved with the Greek letters of one of "his sororities." Later a draped tea cart was rolled in with the rest of the Editor's gift: a silver punch bowl, tray and ladle. Speed Baker reports that he was "thoroughly pleased and sentimentally touched."

He was also presented with a bound booklet of testimonial letters from his editors and former editors, each paying tribute to a man who has served them well.

In 1910 Gamma Phi Beta, under the editorship of Lindsey Barbee, began printing *THE CRESCENT* at the George Banta Company in Menasha, Wisconsin. In 1926, Harold Bachmann, a recent graduate of Lawrence College, joined the Banta staff and in 1927 became account executive on *THE CRESCENT*. During those 42 years he has worked with and become a good personal friend of four *CRESCENT* editors.

What does an account executive for a printing plant do? The answer to that is—almost everything. Four times a year he received the manuscript for *THE CRESCENT*, some 500 pieces of typewritten and edited copy. Add to these the pictures, headline sheets, cutline sheets, and there is *THE CRESCENT* in its first form. From there on, most of it was up to Harold.

He went through each page of manuscript, and in his own words he "must know the magazine inside and out, which means he must know the likes and preferences of the editor, and not a little about the sorority."

As an account executive he directed the magazine through all phases of production, from the receipt of new copy to the mailing and billing of the final product. This included issuing the specifications for materials, directing the magazine through the different stages, scheduling the work ahead, from one stage of production to another. Only when the last shining new issue of *THE CRESCENT* had left the mailing room was his job on that issue complete.

Harold did all these things efficiently and thoughtfully—and added another ingredient, his personal attention and love.

What does an account executive do when he's not on the job? For Harold, the scope was unlimited. His most-loved hob-

bies (and he has many) are horses, entertaining, cheffing (you can't call the dishes Harold turns out mere "cooking"); genealogy and his two huge Boxer dogs, Jack and Jill. He lives, with his dogs, in a comfortable ranch house just a block from Lake Winnebago. New visitors to his home always chuckle at the brass door knocker, appropriately engraved "*Chez When*." The book and curio shelves that flank the fireplace, from floor to ceiling, are filled with mementos of his travels, family and friends. He proudly displays a brass candelabrum that had been a gift to him from Airdrie Pinkerton, former *CRESCENT* editor.

While his home is a great source of pleasure to Harold, he doesn't seem to spend much time there. During the last few years he has served as president of the Menasha Library board; president of the Menasha Historical society, which he was instrumental in founding; and president of the Menasha Rotary club. He has been president of the local Saddle and Bridle club and the Wisconsin Pleasure Horse association.

He was president of his chapter of Phi Gamma Delta while in college and has served as president of the alumni association and on the Board of Chapter Advisors. For three years he was chairman of the national Permanent Committee on Magazine.

Harold served two terms on the board of directors of the Animal Welfare League and worked almost two years as a special weekly visitor to a spastic child, a service of the Easter Seal Association. For four years he was a volunteer at the Hospital for the Criminally Insane and at the County Mental Hospital.

During World War II, Harold was with the 93rd Armored Field Artillery at Fort Sill, Oklahoma and since that time has been in the local and state work of the American Legion.

On the lighter side, Harold has avoided such plebian pastimes as golf, bowling and marriage, all of which, he laughingly claims, do not exercise the intellect. He loves good poetry, reads omnivorously, and brings highly creditable music from his grand piano.

For the past two years he has been working on his family's genealogy and plans to write not only the factual details of his ancestry, but also a history of the times in which his ancestors lived. He will finish part of his work with his third visit to the Continent next spring.

Because we know how much Harold is looking forward to his retirement years ("there are so many things I want to do"), we wish him happiness, peace and many exciting challenges as he pursues his many hobbies. We will miss his cheery voice on the telephone, his soft, gentle humor, and the unexpected new recipe for *boeuf Bourguignon*.

## Growth Brings New Province

On August 1, Gamma Phi Beta added Province XV to its roster. The following changes in Province membership were made: Province V (formerly Iowa and Illinois) now includes Illinois and Wisconsin; Province VI (formerly Manitoba, North and South Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin) remains the same except that Wisconsin has been dropped; Province XI (formerly Nebraska, Wyoming and Colorado) now includes only Wyoming and Colorado. The new Province XV includes chapters in Iowa and Nebraska. The need for these changes came about with the installation of a new chapter, Gamma Psi at the University of Northern Iowa, and two new chapters in Wisconsin: Gamma Omega at the University of Wisconsin—Platteville and Delta Alpha at the University of Wisconsin—River Falls. Experience has shown that seven chapters in each province is the most efficient number in conducting the business of the province.

## New York City Alumnæ Present

# The New Look at Beta Nu

Yes, you *can* trust anyone over 30!

The Beta Nus will vouch for that statement, and the New York City alumnæ will agree and so will you as you learn of our mutual project, one which clearly indicates how cooperation between collegiate and alumnæ members can result in a beautiful finished project. This is a project especially dear to my heart, being a member of both groups.

The Beta Nu house at the University of Vermont was built originally by a shipping merchant. The exterior is sheathed with white aluminum siding, the driveway and parking lot are of asphalt, and some attention has been given to landscaping, so at first glance one is captivated by the serene appearance of the sorority house.

Until recently the interior left much to be desired, for it had been furnished over the past 10 years in a haphazard style. This is no longer the case now, because of the hard work and planning of both alumnæ and actives. Special recognition goes to Suzanne LaCroix (Vermont '54) and her sister Jackie in New York City, and Betsy Isham (Vermont '59) in Burlington for making innumerable decisions and arrangements. A preliminary report prepared in the spring of 1968 specifying redecorating necessities was done by Susan Kennedy Sismondo (Michigan '61) and Shirley Zafirau (Bowling Green '60) and served as an excellent guide.

The idea for this recent project first came to the New York City alumnæ from Kay Key Ryland (William and Mary '59), then president, who had attended the Province Conference in 1967 hosted by Beta Nu. Her description of the furnishings (and lack thereof) made us determined to offer our help in changing the decor from unattractive to charming. We enlisted the aid and advice of the Beta Nu house corporation board who received the suggestion with enthusiasm.

The first floor consists of an entrance hallway, a formal living room, formal dining room, library/tv room (informal living room) kitchen, pantry, and an apartment for the head resident. On the second floor are four triple bedrooms, one single room and two baths entered from a large hallway, as well as three single rooms and bath which had formerly been servants quarters. On the third floor, once a ballroom, are four double rooms and bath. A list of priorities for the total project stated that immediate attention should be paid to the first floor.

Picture if you can a beautiful room painted turquoise, furnished with two loveseats and a few lamps, tables and chairs. This was the formal living room as I first saw it in 1959. Improvements made during my undergraduate years included new carpeting for both living rooms, a new long couch, floor lamps, and a gold easy chair with hassock. The Burlington alumnæ were responsible for refurbishing the first floor hallway with a charming figured wallpaper, and also put in new carpeting from the front door up to the second floor.

Unfortunately, there are no pictures available to show "before," but the "after" shots will indicate the amount of work done, especially in the formal living room. It now is comfortable and fully furnished, in contrast to its once barren look.

Turning to the financial aspect—a few years ago Grand Council paid an architect's fee for a report on what was needed for the exterior. A loan of \$8800 was made to the Beta Nu House Board by the New York City alumnæ chapter to cover the cost of asphaltting, aluminum siding, and some landscaping. Over the past year \$4000 has been given by the New York alumnæ as an interest-free loan to be repaid in installments, and another \$3000 was made available by Grand Council. The New York alumnæ were fortunate in receiving a sum of money a few years ago when the Beekman Tower Hotel was sold by the New York City Panhellenic. Each sorority alumnæ group in the city realized the cash value of the amount of stock owned at the time of the transaction. Since there are no undergraduate chapters in the New York metropolitan area, it was agreed that we would "adopt" Beta Nu and assist in the very necessary redecorating.

Now that the first floor is completed the action can move up one flight, where some work has already been done for the hallway. The project has had a snowball effect, generating enthusiasm among the girls, and we understand that the bedrooms have been decorated in a more unique fashion.

We all look forward to the eventual completion of the interior, but as with all good ideas it takes more financial help. There seems to be no doubt, however, that it will be finished in the near future.

## Are There ANTIQUES In Your Attic?

Have you been up to your attic lately? Have you poured through those old scrapbooks, peered deeply into the chapter closet, unlocked old trunks? If you haven't, you should.

Gamma Phi Betas all across the United States and Canada are beginning to assemble valuable old documents, pictures, minute books, newspaper clippings and old badges. All of these will be an important part of the Centennial year of Gamma Phi Beta in 1974. In order to have a more complete history of the Sorority, in order to expand the Sorority archives, we need the help and enthusiasm of every chapter, every chapter member and every alumna.

With the hope that their work will inspire other chapters to delve deeply into their old records, THE CRESCENT has asked our two oldest chapters, Alpha at Syracuse University and Beta at the University of Michigan, to report on their findings to date.

### Ancient Anecdotes from Alpha

This spring Alpha chapter and the Syracuse alumnae began the momentous and highly enjoyable task of compiling a 100-year history of Alpha chapter. This history will be presented at the Centennial celebration of the Sorority in 1974. And, these comments following are but a few of the interesting facts and findings—and exciting bits of the heritage of Alpha—that will be available to the membership in four years.

Early minutes of Gamma Phi Beta show today's coeds what serious-minded women their predecessors were. There was no card playing, no dancing connected with 19th century sorority life. These activities were forbidden by Syracuse University rules. At every business meeting there was a program in which all members participated. The agenda included a "select reading," a "news report," an essay and discussions on literature, science and art.

First year meetings were held in the girls' homes. In the second year the study of Professor J. J. Brown, a patron, was used. When membership increased, rooms were secured in the Hendricks Building, corner of E. Fayette and Bank streets. In 1892 the girls rented their first chapter home at 714 University avenue. Three more rented homes followed and in 1911 the alumnae planned to build a house at 113 Euclid avenue. In 1938, alumnae built the present house.

Gamma Phi Beta was started in the fall of 1874 when Syracuse University was four years old, had one building, a faculty of 10 and a student body of 200. Founders were Helen M. Dodge, Frances E. Haven, E. Adeline Curtis and Mary A. Bingham. The name, Gamma Phi Beta, was suggested by

Frances' father, Dr. Erastus Otis Haven, then chancellor of the university.

The following article appeared in the Syracuse paper on November 10, 1877:

#### *Gamma Phi Beta*

*The anniversary banquet of this society was held at the residence of one of its members on the afternoon and evening of Friday, the ninth of November. The occasion was one of the rarest enjoyment and long to be remembered by each member of the Sisterhood. The exercises were of a high literary and musical character, the interest reaching its climax upon the rendering of the "Gamma Phi Beta Waltz" composed for the day by an eminent master, after which an elaborate menu was served. Songs and toasts combined to make merry the remainder of the time and at an early hour the company separated, feeling the occasion had been one to strengthen and unite more closely all in the bonds of Gamma Phi Beta.*

Another clipping torn from an 1877 issue of the Syracuse newspaper has this to say about the young Sorority:

*Sixteen of the young ladies of this society enjoyed a delightful excursion Friday afternoon to the pleasant village of Baldwinsville, where they were most charmingly entertained at the beautiful home of one of their members, Miss Della Quivey, class of '77, Syracuse University. The afternoon was spent in drives about the village, croquet, songs, and last but not least, a delicious banquet, followed by a concert directed by Miss Addie J. Whitbread and Miss Carrie L. Hull. The event was one never to be forgotten by the young ladies.*

The June 1900 issue of THE CRESCENT carried this report from the Alpha chapter:

*We were hostesses at a large reception to college and city friends. Nearly 800 invitations were sent out. The old Standard Club House, where we gave our reception, was elaborately decorated. The most noticeable part of the decorations was the electrical display which hung over the stage. A special part of that display was a representation of our sorority pin, with the monogram in red, green and blue lights surrounded by the crescent in white lights.*

Among the other treasures we have found at Alpha are an engraved invitation to the wedding of E. Adeline Curtis to Mr.

Frank Lionel Curtis at the University Avenue M. E. church on Tuesday evening, July 2, 1878. It is interesting to note that the invitation extended by Rev. and Mrs. Curtis referred to their daughter as "Addie." A reception card announced an evening party from 8:30 until 11, immediately following the ceremony.

Another interesting thing the Alpha girls found was an engraved calling card used by Mary A. Bingham, printed in Old English lettering, and reading "Minnie A. Bingham."

This is just a small sampling of the fascinating material we have uncovered as we begin our "glimpse into the past." We highly recommend this rewarding activity to all collegiate and alumnae chapters!

#### **Beta's Bounty of Badges**

Beta girls have been preparing historical treasures for the Gamma Phi Beta Centennial. We have always proudly displayed pre-twentieth century pictures of the chapter in our chapter room, but in the last year we have begun to organize our materials more enthusiastically. Last year's pledge class made a project of making a special show board for them and framing many photographs that had previously been hidden away in scrapbooks. The photographs on the board range from 1884 vintage through the thirties and forties.

We have scrapbooks from scattered years also dating back before 1900 up to the present time. Among those are also a fiftieth anniversary book and a quite extensive scrapbook from the 1946 Convention.

Mrs. Ralph Mason, province alumnae director, is obtaining a shadow box for our four very old badges worn by the chapter officers. They include a badge with a large black crescent, rose-engraved gold Gamma and Beta and opal-set Phi, which was given by Georgia E. Mayford, 1891. This pin is awarded each semester to the girl with the most improved scholarship record. Two of the badges are given to the chapter president for her term of office. These pins were given to the chapter by I. M. Andrews and Nettie E. Daniels. The fourth badge was given by Margaret Cahill Bartholomew of Beta and is dated 1893.

Beta is looking forward to more preparation for the Centennial along these lines and hopes that other chapters are following similar procedures. You'll find it a rewarding way to contribute to your chapter's permanent records and to the international history of Gamma Phi Beta. And, it's a lot of fun, too!

# Nebraska Program Zeroes in On 'The Total Woman!'

What makes a woman cultured? What gives individuals the ability to converse intelligently with others on many levels?

Pi chapter at the University of Nebraska concentrated many of its 1968-69 efforts on developing the aspect of the "Total Woman." The initial step was to form a new committee. In previous years the activities program included cultural events but a division gave cultural advancement its own prominence.

June Waggoner headed the cultural committee and used her ideas to develop the aesthetic values of her sisters. Major events of the program included weekly calendars, speakers on current controversial topics and an emphasis on taking advantage of Lincoln's artistic opportunities.

At Monday night meetings, June presented a calendar listing events for the coming week. These included speakers at student forums, performing artists brought to Lincoln by either university or community groups, and showings at Sheldon Art Gallery. Ella Fitzgerald, P.D.Q. Bach and Ravi Shankar were artists sponsored by the Lincoln Community Concert series. Plays like "The Hostage" and "Electra" performed by university students offered other opportunities for Gamma Phis to appreciate the dramatic role of art. Usually, every Wednesday night a group of sisters walked to a Lincoln theater and indulged in the foreign film hosting directors like Bergman and Godard.

Free University classes, many of them taught by students, also opened the way for group discussions. Sensitivity projects and talks on the black-white situation gave the girls involved a chance to contact people outside their usual realm of friends.

June presented all of these opportunities and a majority of Pi chapter participated in at least one of the events.

Another of June's ideas involved bringing speakers to the house. She assigned girls to sit at the speaker's table so all would have a chance. These girls had the privilege of discovering the guest's background and presenting him to the group.

Professor Ivan Volgyes, instructor in the political science department, visited the house late in October. At that time the Czechoslovakian crisis arose and Volgyes openly discussed his views on the situation. After giving his audience the background he explained the whys of the Soviet invasion, as he saw them.

Another of June's aids made question and answer sessions more relaxed. She made sure that girls had questions to ask, ones that pertained to the subject and could be answered with more than a yes or no. Such prepared questions were useful when Dr. Joseph Butler, head of university housing for colored students, spoke. Gamma Phis were anxious to understand circumstances on their campus and asked Dr. Butler for suggestions on how they could help the situation. After the discussion, several coke dates were arranged and new friends were found.

One evening, June persuaded five Nebraska football players to join the Gamma Phis for dinner. Dick Davis, Jim McFarland, Joe Orduna, Ernie Zielger and Randy Reeves were the "entertainers." But instead of a scheduled program, the men informally explained their feelings during the games. Their own companionship showed why the team is unified and works as a whole. They also told the girls the importance of the Christian Athletic Association in their lives.

Political interest prompted an invitation to Governor and Mrs. Norbert Tiemann for dinner in November. The Governor's reflections of his own college days preceded an explanation of Nebraska's tax program. Questions concerning possible changing the legislature to a bicameral arose. Gov. Tiemann felt a unicameral situation was better because it offered more direct communication between the legislative and executive branches of government.

Pi chapter's cultural program began this year with an emphasis on present day living. Possibly this beginning will carry over into each girl's future life. Efforts to bring out the "Total Woman" in every Gamma Phi will hopefully lead to a greater awareness of the college environment and the various people who can share their personal opinions on public situations.

# Where are we going?



An Interview with International Collegiate Vice President,  
Elna Erickson Simons

Mrs. Simons, because many of our members are not familiar with the work of the Grand Council of Gamma Phi Beta, we are doing a series of interviews with our international officers. We hope that the facts we glean from each of you will promote better understanding of our work and the programs we are seeking to establish. In the May issue of *THE CRESCENT*, we talked with Mrs. Hiscock about the work of the Grand President and now we would like to find out more about the office of Collegiate Vice President.

*Just what does the office of Collegiate Vice President entail?*

It is my privilege and responsibility to represent more than 5,000 collegiate members. Since one person cannot be in continuous contact with 89 chapters, a large staff of capable and dedicated alumnae keeps me informed about the various activities of our chapters. Working closely with me are our four field secretaries who travel and visit collegiate chapters from the opening of some schools in August until the closings in May. Their main responsibility is to bring the best from each chapter to every other chapter. It is the aim of the collegiate department to have each Greek-letter chapter visited by a field secretary at least once during the biennium. In the specific areas of membership, rituals, scholarships and standards, international chairmen assist me in the promotion and observance of our international policies. In the past the one assistant to the Collegiate Vice President has had the responsibility of reviewing the bylaws of each Greek-letter chapter and determining whether each is in compliance with our national bylaws. Beginning this fall a second assistant will join us to supervise our pledge program. Serving on the province level are the 15 province collegiate directors who make annual visits to each chapter and keep in touch between visits with the chapter officers and local alumnae advisers through monthly reports and letters. In addition to my work with these officers, I am always available to any collegiate member, officer or interested alumna who may require special attention. My final responsibility is to plan the future course of the collegiate department.

*As you have traveled from campus to campus, or in your correspondence with our field secretaries, what are the most significant changes in our chapters and our members?*

During the last three years I have noticed a steady change in the thinking, philosophy and the activities of both chapters and their members. College is no longer just a social and learning experience, but it is a preparation for these young women to assume intelligent and active roles in their adult

lives. In general, I have nothing but praise for their thinking. They have questioning minds, showing a reluctance and an unwillingness to accept traditional modes of life just for tradition's sake. They are mature; they are eager to explore various fields of learning; they have an acute awareness of the world's problems. In groups, they are openly discussing and looking for solutions to the concerns of poverty, war and social injustices. At one time girls came to college merely to get a degree, or to get a husband, but this is no longer true. They are really coming to prepare themselves for the roles that they must play in adult life. In their activities, such as Greek Week, they are beginning to think in terms of philanthropic projects, scholastic achievements, something that is relevant to community and school improvement.

*Do you feel that Gamma Phi Beta is keeping pace with the times in our programs for undergraduate women? In what areas do you think we need to improve?*

Yes, I feel that we are moving with the times. Definitely. We are well aware of the change in thinking about accepted social behavior, membership selection policies and the meaningfulness of the ritual. In order to learn what our young people and our alumnae are thinking, we have set up three *ad hoc* committees to discuss freely these three areas of concern. (Related story on page 16.) These committees will study these problems in depth during the next year and will prepare reports to be presented at the 1970 Convention.

*We have discussed in an earlier question what the college students are seeking, but are they achieving their goals? Is Gamma Phi Beta helping them?*

Yes, they are working hard to achieve their goals and they are making strides in the right direction. They realize that not always is a solution forthcoming immediately. The girls are deeply concerned about the Greek system and especially the campus opinion of the Greek system. They know that we are in a period of transition and they are looking for an effective way to make their chapters contributing factors in campus life. They are looking at the word "sister" in "sisterhood" and are seeking to make it a reality, not just a name. They want the chapter house to be more than a rooming house situation and they are seeking out the little things that go to make a house a home, a family-type group. They are seeking to eliminate pledge pranks, busy work and the Mickey Mouse of campus life, and to substitute worthwhile activities that will prepare them for womanhood. And, yes, Gamma Phi Beta is helping

them by encouraging them to conduct dialogues and to participate in philanthropic endeavors that will add meaning to their lives and to those less privileged. We want them to be a contributing part of the campus.

*What are we doing about leadership training?*

We are a democratic organization. We elect our officers and carry out our business according to democratic processes. Every girl, by the time she graduates, knows how to conduct a meeting by parliamentary procedure. We encourage each girl to enter one or more outside activities in which she can first work and, later, assume leadership. Leadership in itself is not enough; girls must first learn to work together for a common cause. We are not developing only chiefs; we are developing good workers with a spirit of cooperation and a willingness to pull together. Our Province Conferences this year were built around the theme "Leads to Leadership"; our officer retreats and our Convention are all aids to know-how in furthering good leadership traits.

*Do you feel that sororities and fraternities should take a more active part in combatting the disruptive forces on our campuses? If so, in what way?*

I think the pitfall in that question is the word "active." No, we don't want them to be "activists" in the sense that that word connotes today. But we feel that sororities should set an example in knowing how, in a dignified and democratic fashion, to sit down and talk and listen, with respect, to college administrators and their own peers. Together they can solve the problems that are facing the students, the faculties and the administrators. If the students want to assume new roles in the universities, then they must do so with dignity and respect and prove that they are worthy and capable of any new responsibilities. They must realize that it is a privilege to have added responsibility and they must be willing to carry through.

*What do you see in the future for Gamma Phi Beta?*

For any building or institution to survive for 100 years, it must have been built on a firm and solid foundation. We all know that Gamma Phi Beta had this firm foundation. As we have grown through the years, we have met the challenges of each new decade and this present decade of dilemma and unrest is no different from those of the past. We are going to continue to face the issues and challenges and to select those worthy ideas that will bring added meaning and strength to Gamma Phi Beta. I have complete faith and confidence that our young women will combine the sound judgment of today's thinking with that of our heritage. Together we will work for a most promising next 100 years.



# Lucy Lennox Stays Young at Heart

A lovely lady in Colorado Springs is Lucy Moore Lennox (Denver '08). Her eighty-odd years have been filled with love for many people and many things. Her art collection and antique furnishings depict the history of Colorado from its earliest days. Her community service is listed on the rosters of many organizations throughout the state. But, perhaps her un-failing love for young people is her outstanding contribution to the world around her.

She was graduated in 1908 from Denver University, where she was a member of Theta chapter of Gamma Phi Beta, when that chapter was less than 10 years old. After graduation and her marriage to Sigma Chi Loring C. Lennox, she continued her interest in alumnæ work and was instrumental in the establishment of Alpha Phi chapter at Colorado College.

Modestly she admits, "It was an awful fight to get the sorority installed." The dean of women at that time, a Mrs. Lee, ordered Lucy off the campus, which made her husband irate, she recalls, suppressing a giggle.

But, the chapter was installed and has been one of her continuing interests. Her collection of memorabilia from the early days of Gamma Phi Beta (including letters from the Four Founders) is a source of inspiration to the new initiates each year.

A walking source of history (another of her great loves), Lucy talks animatedly about the early days in Colorado. She has a silver certificate, dated 1886 (the year of her birth), which was given her by her father. The rare certificate was issued by the Bank of Aspen, which was founded by her father. Lucy grew up in Aspen and relates many interesting tales of the mining days and the beginning of the skiing site for which Aspen is now famous.

Relishing her history with a twinkle in her bright blue eyes, Lucy is quick to remind her listeners that the marble for the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery comes from near Aspen—at Marble.

As a girl, she made many trips to Denver with her family

and tells many tales of the vibrant characters of those days, like "the unsinkable Molly Brown."

Laughingly Lucy shares one of her notable firsts. Her new husband of a few weeks was so eager to make his bride comfortable in her small house in Cripple Creek that he pumped the steam from the Strong Mine into the house. She had the first steam-heated house in town.

Many things of beauty now decorate her home in Colorado Springs. Accessories for table settings are of special pride to her. There are the fluted, gold-etched, indescribably fragile Florentine crystal goblets which had belonged to her mother. Other appointments include Dresden bouillon cups, Wedgewood china, silver candlesticks and various footed serving pieces. Many of her favorites decorated with wild flowers, have been handed down from generation to generation.

Surrounded as she is with her cherished possessions, Lucy's first love is still people. Her list of activities during the last 50 years is awe-inspiring.

She is credited with starting the Panhellenic association in Colorado Springs and has been one of the mainstays of the McAllister House which is sponsored by the Colonial Dames. She has given time and aid to the Daughters of the American Revolution, serving on both the local and state levels. She has been active in the AAUW and the USO. She has followed closely the Sigma Chis, worked actively with the Colonial Dames, has established several scholarships for women students; belongs to the Tuesday Luncheon club and worked as a Red Cross Grey Lady during World War I.

But she always comes back to her love for young people. "Always the things I have done with young people have been wonderful," she says. Solemnly she adds, "I always listen to young people."

Penny James, staff writer for the Colorado Springs *Gazette Telegraph*, writes, "One gets the feeling that young people always listen to her, too. She communicates; she cares. This lively octogenarian is still young at heart."

The subjects covered at the meetings were: membership selection, standards, scholarship, philanthropy, Panhellenic, controversial organizations (NSA, SDS, YAF), Mothers' clubs, pledge development and group unity. As a result, the Greek-letter, alumnæ, and joint meetings were lively, interesting and abundant with new ideas. On the following pages are brief resumes of these Conferences.*

# Province Conferences

## PROVINCE I

Meeting in Syracuse in February, Province I was the first to hold its Conference this spring. Dr. Leslie Moser, Toronto alumnae chapter, presided at the general sessions where six Greek-letter and seven alumnae chapters were in attendance. In her report as Province collegiate director, Mrs. Leroy Marek pointed up the theme "Leads to Leadership." She noted that the publicized trend on campuses was toward unrest, but, she said, "the vocal minorities move against, not for anything; in contrast to the Greeks who are working for something."

Mrs. Marek also read the report of the province alumnae director, Mrs. John Lippincott who had moved to California. Mrs. Lippincott's report stressed the work of several alumnae chapters to increase the Province I scholarship fund. Mrs. C. W. Kenney, magazine chairman, explained the purpose and goals of the magazine agency to the members.

Greek-letter roundtables on Saturday morning discussed rush and membership policies, scholarship and Panhellenic. The experience of each chapter in each area was discussed and evaluated. Perhaps the greatest area of interest was in Panhellenic: "How—should we go about creating a new image?"; How can we better relate to the world?"; How can the key word 'cooperation' be applied?"

Alumnae round tables centered around rush and membership policies and service opportunities.

Miss Linda Zingerline was toastmistress at a luncheon where Dr. Bernice Wright, dean of the College of Home Economics at Syracuse University, spoke on "Women's Role in Education." Dean Wright emphasized the current period of change and predicted that "countours of life will be changed in the closing decades of this century more significantly than at any other time in history."

At the Pink Carnation banquet at Drumlins Country Club, Mrs. Marek made the following award: Chapter efficiency to Beta Nu (Vermont) and scholarship for 1967-68 to Delta with a 3.01 average.

Mrs. Charles Simons, Collegiate Vice President, spoke on "The Challenge of Leadership" in which she urged the collegiate members to accept and act upon their responsibilities on their college campuses. "A unified minority can accomplish a great deal in an orderly manner," she said. "The challenge is here; the time is now."

## PROVINCE II

The opening session of the Province II Conference was held on April 19 at the Little Theater of the Campus Center at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Debbie Ostergard, president of Alpha Chi (William and Mary), conducted the opening exercises and introduced the officers of the Conference: Mrs. Paul R. Conway (Washington D.C. alumnae chapter), chairman; Miss Elizabeth Sturges (Philadelphia North Suburban alumnae), secretary and Mrs. C. E. Schildknecht (Gettysburg alumnae), parliamentarian. Five Greek-letter and 14 alumnae chapters were represented.

Mary Jean Hart, province collegiate director, presented the following awards: Highest scholarship during the biennium—Alpha Chi; greatest improvement in scholarship—Gamma Beta (Gettysburg) and efficiency—Alpha Pi (West Virginia). Since this is the third consecutive time the efficiency award has been won by Alpha Pi, they will keep the trophy permanently. It was also announced that Virginia Vogel (Alpha Chi) has been awarded a gold charm by the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation for maintaining a straight A average.

Mrs. David Goldsmith, province philanthropy chairman, presented the rotating \$150 philanthropy awards to Alpha Pi and Alpha Upsilon (Penn State) chapters to be used to further their philanthropic work. Alpha Pi will use its \$150 check to augment the scholarship fund and Alpha Upsilon will support an orphan through the Christian Children's Fund.

During the business session two resolutions were adopted: 1. **RESOLVED:** That recommendations should be on a voluntary basis, or as requested by active chapters; and 2. **RESOLVED:** That it is strongly suggested that each active chapter stress positive action of Greeks by devoting a combined pledge-active meeting to university, community and national problems, and by having the chapter Panhellenic delegate bring up before college Panhellenic the need for united group action to stimulate Greek thinking into more outward channels; by encouraging Panhellenic to work toward increasing the quality of and the opportunities for education, by increasing student participation in philanthropic endeavors of all types rather than an over-emphasis on social activities.

At the closing of the Conference, Susan Solie extended the invitation of Beta Beta chapter to attend the 1971 Province II Conference at the University of Maryland at College Park.

## PROVINCE III-IV

Province III and IV delegates and visitors met at the Holiday Inn in Bowling Green, Ohio on April 11 for a series of meetings and discussion centered around the international theme "Leads to Leadership." Hostess chapters were Toledo and Bowling Green alumnae and Beta Gamma Greek-letter chapters. Mrs. William Frank of Toledo was general chairman.

Province III directors attending the sessions were Mrs. Donald Heffner, alumnae and Mrs. Hal Dronberger, collegiate; Province IV directors were Mrs. Ralph Erb, alumnae and Mrs. Frank Mason, collegiate.

Mrs. James Blaylock, international collegiate membership chairman, representing Grand Council, was a guest and spoke at the evening Carnation Banquet.

During the afternoon session, round table groups discussed all the topics proposed by international officers. During the final joint collegiate-alumnae meeting, there was a question-and-answer period and reports of the findings committee on province recommendations.

At the Carnation Banquet, Mrs. Heffner presented the award for the greatest improvement in scholarship in Province

III to the Beta Gamma chapter at Bowling Green State University. The award for scholarship in Province IV went to Gamma Omicron chapter at the University of Kentucky. This chapter rose from tenth place among 14 sororities two years ago to first place this year. This award was presented the first time at this Conference as the Helen Brandt Award for scholastic improvement. 
