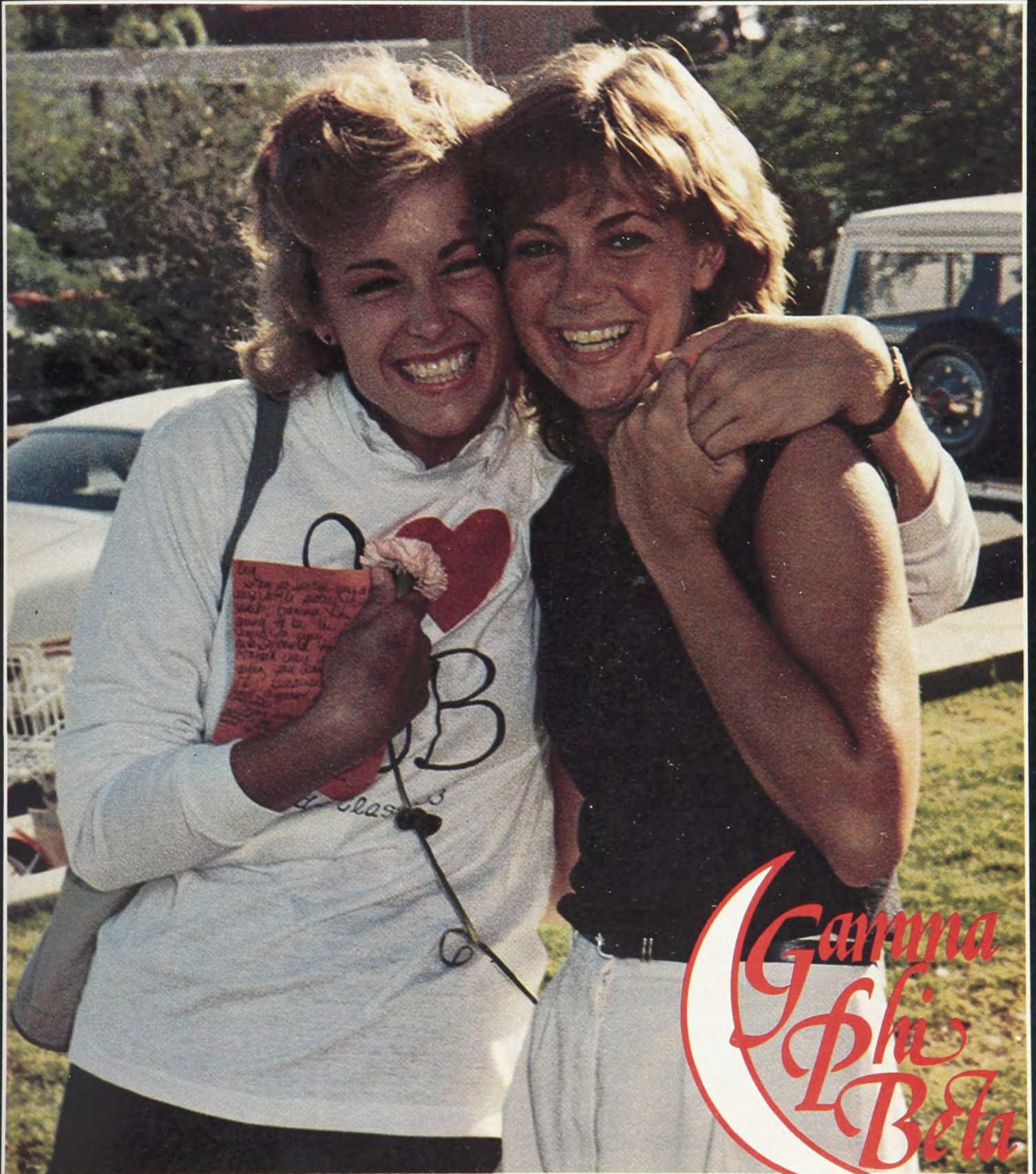

Our international officers serve with that goal in mind. They must also maintain sound business practices in directing their areas of responsibility, and depend on strong financial support from our membership.

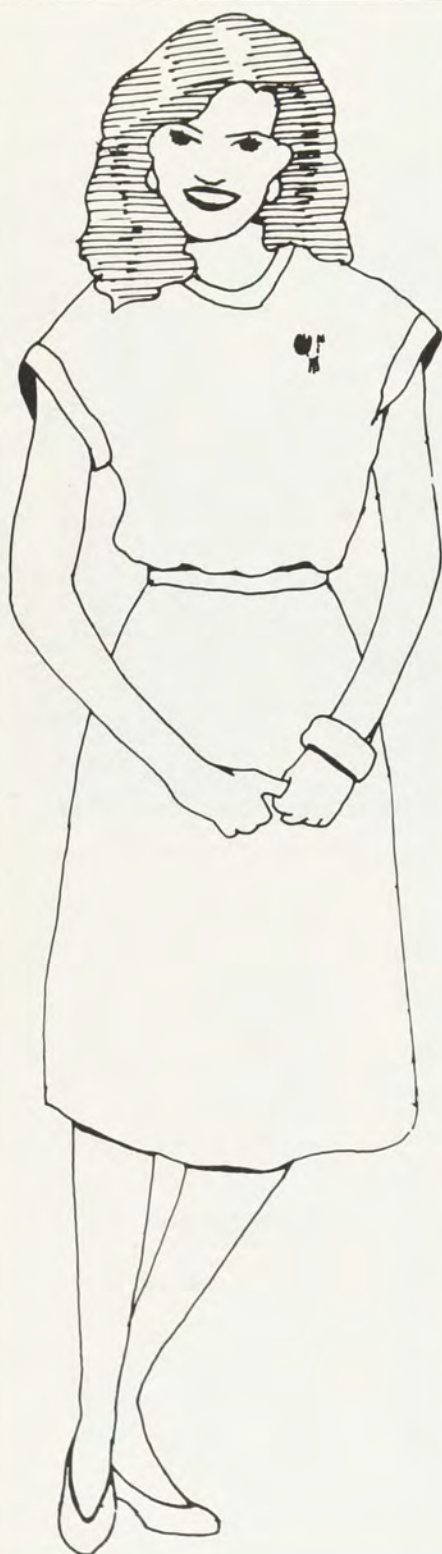

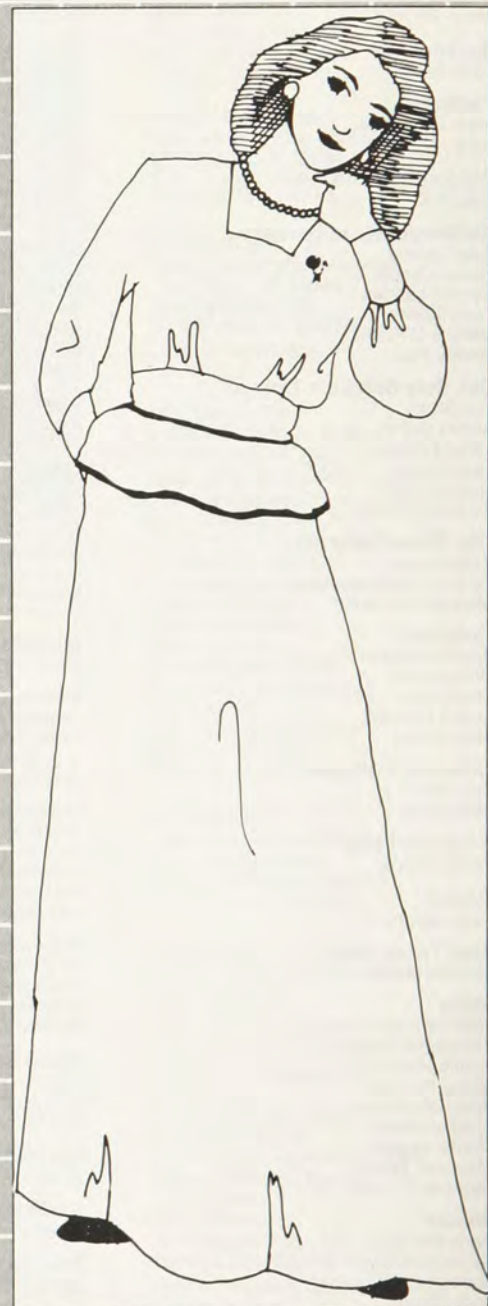

McCormick Medallion



There is a special banquet at each Gamma Phi Beta Convention. That evening, awards are presented to collegians and alumnae for outstanding participation in Sorority activities, scholastic achievement and fulfillment of the ideals of Gamma Phi Beta.

An award that has been coveted by hopeful collegians since 1962 is the McCormick Medallion. It recognizes outstanding chapter and member participation in campus, community and philanthropic activities. The awards are given in two categories, based on college or university enrollment.

The inspiration for the McCormick Medallion came from Mr. and Mrs. Charles P. McCormick when the late Mr. McCormick was chairman of the board of McCormick and Company, manufacturers of spices, extracts and teas. Mr. McCormick, a Phi Gamma Delta, and his wife, Anne Woolman McCormick Almond (Goucher), requested that the award be for collegiate activities. Funds to produce the McCormick Medallions, which are mounted on wood plaques, were donated by the McCormicks.

Announced at the 1962 Convention by the late

Director of Expansion Mary T. McCurley (Goucher), the McCormick Medallion was first awarded in 1964. Miss McCurley summarized the spirit of the award in her presentation.

"Mr. and Mrs. McCormick believe in young people and in Gamma Phi Beta. They want to encourage our chapters in work and play together—team-play and team-spirit—because they are confident that leadership is developed through sorority activities. To this end the award will be made to the chapter which has shown the highest degree of cooperative participation in campus activities during the previous biennium, and whose members, through their participation, are preparing themselves for team work in larger communities; in civic, educational and religious organizations, in politics, and in world affairs. If we set high standards for ourselves, for our chapters, for our Sorority—and we work together as a team—we can and will—achieve our goal which is the development of the highest type of womanhood through education, social life and service to country and humanity."

The Olympic Flame

The Olympic Flame burns in the
Roses' Long Beach, Cal. water heater

The Olympic spirit burns figuratively and literally in the Long Beach, Cal. home of Province XVI Alumnae Director Susan Badgley Jacobsen Rose (UCLA). That's where Susan and husband Jack have the Olympic flame burning in their water heater.

The story of why it burns perpetually in Long Beach is unbelievable but true. First a bit of history as to why the Olympics mean so much to this couple who enjoy doing everything together.

Jack's interest in the Olympic Games was piqued in 1952 when he failed at an attempt to make the United States team as a triple jumper. Undaunted, he decided to go to Helsinki as a spectator and convinced his father to underwrite half the cost by finding a college course offering eight credits for attending the Olympics. Since then Susan has become so caught up in the spirit that she has attended the 1968 Mexico City, 1972 Munich and 1976 Montreal Olympics.

This summer will find the Roses working for the Olympics closer to home in Los Angeles. As Victory Ceremonies coordinator, Jack will take care of dignitaries like the International Olympic Committee chairman and the Los Angeles Olympic Committee president. Susan wrote, "I have been assigned to the Athlete's Control Center, which probably means I will be Jack's assistant, handling athletes who will be receiving the 158 track and field medals." The Roses will also be working the modern pentathlon at Cota de Casa where Jack will be head starter and Susan an umpire for the final event, running.

Now about that flame in the water heater. . . . Three years before the 1976 Olympics, Jack, now a retired professor of physical education at California State University-Long Beach (CSULB), had founded the National Track and Field Hall of Fame. "The flame is probably the greatest symbol of the Olympic movement, and track and field is probably the sport most identified with the Olympics," he said, "so I could think of nothing more important or appropriate than to have an eternal Olympic flame burning in the National Track and Field Hall of Fame."

The only problem was that the flame was in Montreal and the hall of Fame in Charleston, W.V., a distance of 1,100 miles. Even though Jack had captured the flame by candle from the torch in Montreal, trans-

ferred it to two kerosene lanterns and kept it alive in a cousin's summer lodge in Watertown, N.Y., he still had to get it to Charleston.

Starting with a handoff from the late track star Jesse Owens, the Roses and many others began the flame relay. "We were overwhelmed by the interest of crowds that followed us, even in the middle of the night, and greeted us on city hall steps in some of the towns where we were scheduled for ceremonies," Susan wrote. "We had five teams of six runners, each with a prescribed route and time allotment. When Jack and I finished our relay leg, we would race to our overnight layover and make calls to be sure all was set up for the next day. We still keep in touch with our fellow runners."

The flame, in its kerosene lanterns and troublesome to protect in rain storms, had become a part of their lives. The Roses couldn't bear to leave it behind in Charleston, so after igniting the flame in the Hall of Fame, they and their two kerosene lanterns started across country. They protected it from weather and Volkswagen bus breakdown, impressing mechanics during a three day layover for repairs in Norman, Okla. that it was vital to keep the flames burning.

Its reception in Long Beach was smaller than the original in Montreal—just family. But it was done with appropriate ceremony. "With the Olympic theme blaring from a tape deck, the pilot light on the water heater was blown out and relighted with the Olympic flame. As a backup, the heating system for the CSULB swimming pool was also relighted from the flame.

"This is not only an athletic event to us, but a way of life," Susan wrote. "The aim of the Olympic movement is to promote the development of those fine physical and moral qualities that are the basis of amateur sport; to bring together athletes of the world in a great festival of sports, thereby creating international respect and good will, thus helping to construct a better and more peaceful world. The Olympic motto, 'Citius, Altius, Fortius,' means 'faster, higher, stronger,' but to me it means, 'Citius—do something worthwhile, Altius—raise your thoughts higher, Fortius—be stronger against materialism.' In other words, get involved, volunteer, take part in life!"

Careers: Interviewing Essentials

Before The Interview

Do your homework. Plan for a career, not just a job. If the door to your specific choice is closed temporarily, find intermediate measures that will move you toward your goals. For example, you may not recognize your career goal of becoming a systems analyst right out of school. Research companies that offer training and internal advancement. Then be willing to start in a related position which offers the potential for advancement into your chosen field.

Read the want ads. Who is listing jobs? How do salaries compare? Do they ask you to phone or send a resume? Follow the instructions in the ad.

Talk with people in your selected field. Network with alumnae. Leave every "information gathering interview" with the names of three more contacts. Somewhere in those names is a future employer.

Prepare your resume and cover letter. Both should be limited to one page, be typewritten, and presented in action oriented words. Consider the difference between, "I seek a job offering entry level training and career potential" to "Seek training opportunity and career advancement based on personal merit." The resume is often the employer's first look at you, so make it a lasting impression. Also, talk with employers during informational interviews to find out what they look for in a resume.

Send out resumes and stay by your phone. Or, give the employer two or three days to receive and review your credentials before placing a follow-up call or sending a "still interested" letter. Be persistent, but

polite. No one hires pests.

Arrange interviews around the company's schedule, not yours. If you're looking for a new job while hanging on to an old one, don't jeopardize your future by asking interested parties to come in early, skip lunch, or stay late just for the pleasure talking with you will bring to their day.

Once an interview has been arranged, do more homework. Prepare to dazzle the interviewer with well thought out questions about the company which show a solid interest and commitment.

During The Interview

Arrive 15 to 20 minutes early. Parking may be difficult to find or there may be an application form for you to complete. Never write on an application, "Please see resume." We've seen the resume. Now we're asking for your time on our form. Humor us.

Dress for success in the interview. Suit yourself to the style of the company or business. A tailored suit may be too conservative for a creative design firm. If you're not sure what the style of the company is, play it safe. A nice suit with a soft silk blouse will always make a good impression. Or sit in the company's lobby the day before during lunch hour and see what the women are wearing.

While waiting for the interviewer, sit upright, both feet on the floor. Curb the urge for a cigarette and never chew gum. Avoid "final fix-ups" in the lobby by taking care of all personal grooming in the restroom

or in your car.

When the interviewer appears, stand up and extend your hand. Etiquette requires that the woman always extend her hand first, and if the interviewer is a woman, you'll reach a mutual point of greeting. Don't load yourself down with coat, purse and briefcase, because it makes for awkward greetings at times. Practice shaking hands with friends. A woman's handshake should be firm.

Throughout the interview, sit upright, hands in lap, slightly forward on your chair. Maintain steady eye contact but do not stare down the interviewer. Listen for appropriate spots in the interview to pause, break contact, reflect and then resume contact as you respond.

Do not fiddle with your hair!

If you aren't sure of the intent of the interviewer's question, paraphrase it first before inquiring, "Is that what you were asking?" Avoid unimpressive remarks such as, "I don't understand the question," or "Could you repeat that?"

Just as a good interviewer will avoid yes/no questions, an applicant should steer clear of yes/no answers. Sometimes they are inevitable, but take every opportunity to give as full a picture of yourself as possible. Similarly, sell your experience. It's better to say, "I spent the last few years devoting time to a careful rearing of my children" rather than "Oh, I stayed home to raise the kids."

Target your answers to the specific job in which you are interested. Try to draw parallels between past experiences and how they will impact your ability to succeed in the position.

Bring with you a list of four or five carefully prepared questions (from your research on the company). Avoid questions such as, "What do you like about this company?" because that won't net you as much critical information as will more strategic inquiries such as, "Your recent annual report indicates significant gains in the fourth quarter. Can you explain what was happening there?"

Thank the interviewer for his or her time and express your interest in the job. Exit. Relax. You'll soon land that job!

After The Interview

Send a typewritten, brief letter of thanks to the interviewer (do this after every interview as it reinforces your name in the mind's eye). Mail the letter promptly along with any requested further information.

If you are really interested in the position and have heard nothing from the company after a few days, call the interviewer and reaffirm your interest. Ask if there is any additional information you can provide.

Always end follow-up calls on a positive, enthusiastic note. If this position doesn't work out it may be

Women in war: a different battle

September, 1943 was the beginning of a Red Cross career that would last 39 years and include three wars for Elaine M. Lynch (Northwestern). Her experiences were many in military field hospitals in France, Germany, Korea, Japan, Vietnam and the United States. She was living a part of history. As a Red Cross social worker she did whatever she could to improve the quality of life for Americans far from home.

World War II in Europe yielded memories of bouncing around in two and one-half ton trucks in full military field gear, minus guns; of wading ashore near LeHavre, France

and many hardships. But sharing in "the great thrill of a wounded patient who found his own brother in the same hospital," and other dramatic moments made it all worthwhile.

Other memories from her first war include a patient with bullet holes in the back of his field jacket, the only survivor of the Malmedy massacre in Belgium during the Battle of the Bulge. German soldiers had tied up a group of Americans and shot them, rather than take them prisoner. And "on V.J. day when the war ended, it was exciting to experience the overwhelming joy and relief of combat troupes in Marseille when they realized they would not have to board transports to fight on in the Pacific against Japan," she said.

In Korea, severe injuries seemed even harder to bear for patients far from home and in an unfamiliar environment. As a Red Cross social worker, she tried to make life as good as possible for the men by arranging entertainment, helping them write painful letters home which sometimes forewarned of amputations, helping them accept disabilities and trying to improve the quality of their lives.

Headquartered in Saigon as assistant director of Hospital Service, Elaine visited hospitals to give supervisory support, found herself living in high walled, guarded compounds with mesh over the windows, and traveling about the countryside by helicopter. "Some of the military nurses we worked with had also had experience in World War II and Korea, and yet they found it was more traumatic than ever to work with young men with incredibly serious wounds which for many resulted in permanent disabilities—even triple amputations," she

said.

Between wars, Elaine had various responsibilities in the United States, still mainly working with servicemen and their families. Occasionally she was assigned to disaster relief operations, such as those following hurricane Agnes which hit the east coast in 1972. Her final years before retirement were spent in Albuquerque providing guidance and consultation in management and administration to Red Cross chapters in New Mexico.

An interest in improving the quality of life for the elderly has resulted in volunteer work and her appointment to the board of directors of an Albuquerque nursing home.

Since retirement she has finally had an opportunity to join a Gamma Phi Beta alumnae chapter, finding the Albuquerque women "a delightful and outstanding group. Regrettably, for many years I was not involved, as in most of my assignments there were no alumnae groups nearby. Fortunately, I still have close friendships formed during college days at Epsilon Chapter," she added.

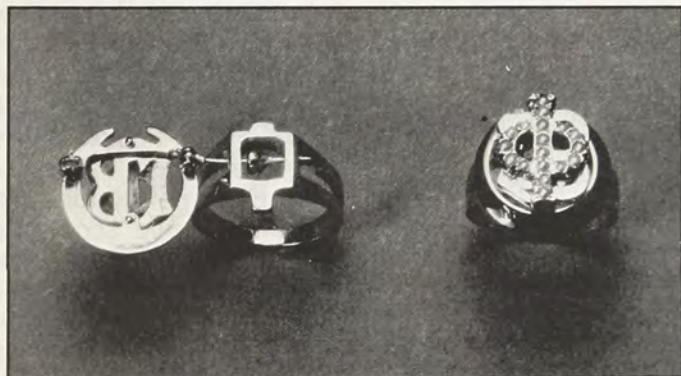

Camping belongs to all children, and spina bifida children are no exception. Although camping involves special equipment, medical personnel and lots of extras, there are more and more spina bifida children from Nebraska enjoying this new experience each year.

Proceeds from a large fundraiser coupled with matching funds from the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation enabled eight children to attend the Kiwanis Camp in Milford, Neb. last summer. The cost of each campership was \$287. Located on the Big Blue River, the camp serv-

ices 300 to 400 handicapped children each year. It offers a variety of activities, including swimming, "mud rubs," softball, archery and overnight campouts.

The funds also helped send five individuals to the adolescent/adult weekend camp, Camp Hitchcock, in Iowa. Its goal is career motivation for people with spina bifida who are 13 to 32 years old. Campers are encouraged to become physically independent and to develop a positive self-image.

Omaha alumnae thank the Spina Bifida Association of Nebraska for enlightening their minds and hearts, and encourage other collegiate chapters and alumnae groups to become involved with local camping philanthropies.

Every Gamma Phi Beta chapter can apply for camperships through the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation and receive supplemental funds for local camps that serve "special girls."
