

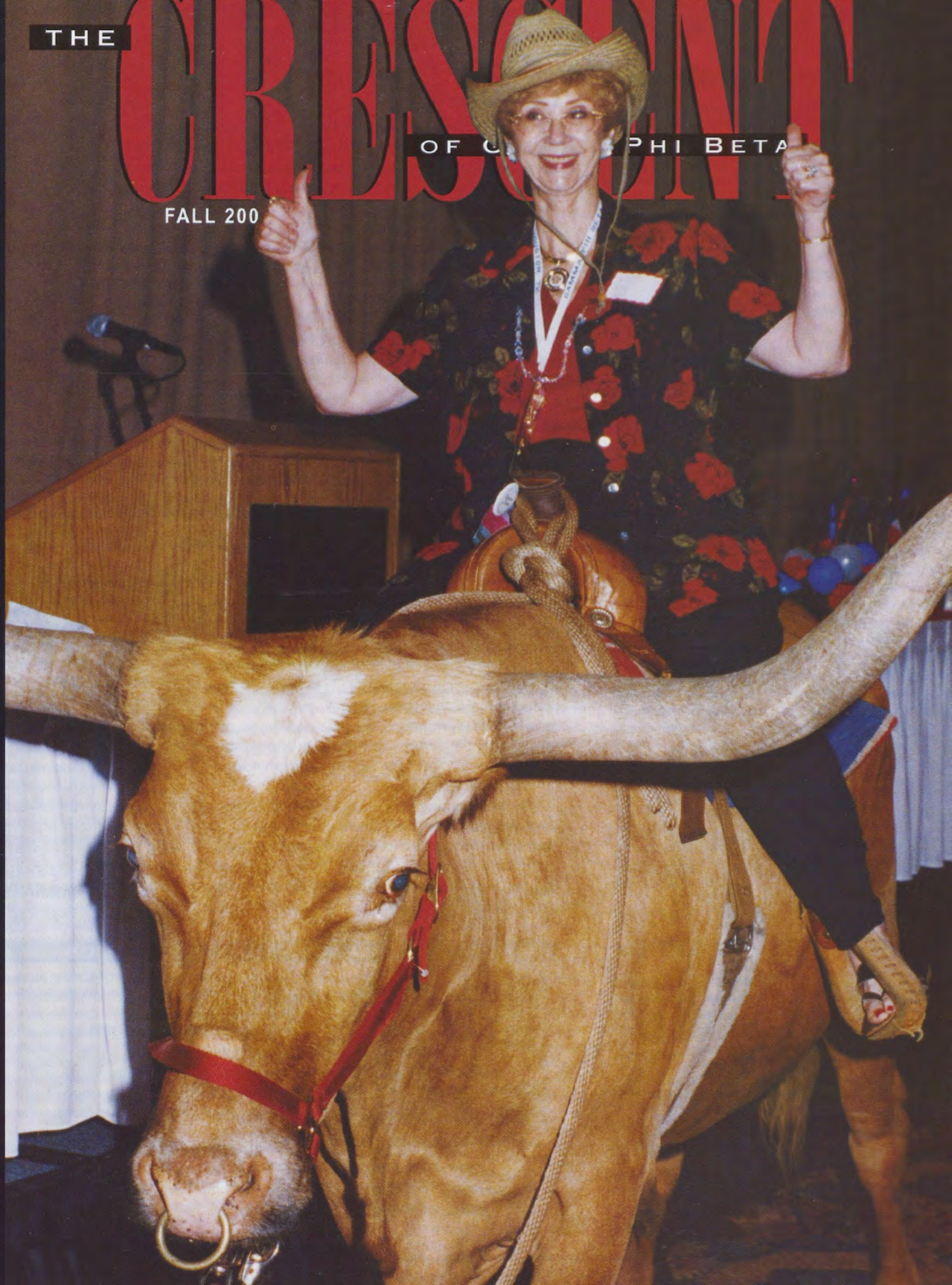

There's No Place Like Home . . .

a Gamma Phi Beta home.

Last summer, we went on a family trip to visit colleges with our 17-year-old son. Because of my work with so many Gamma Phi chapters across the United States and Canada, I think that I was more excited about this trip than he was! So my first request to the family each time we arrived on a new campus (after the visit to the Admissions Office) was "Let's find the Gamma Phi Beta house!". Or "Let's drive by the sorority houses". The reaction was always, "Ah, Mom, not again" and "Do you have to take another picture of a Gamma Phi Beta house?"

But what fun it was to find out about the Greeks on each campus we visited! On some campuses Greeks were very visible. There were pamphlets in the Admissions Office, a Greek Row, and Greek residences as part of the neighborhood surrounding the campus. Some campuses had Greeks living in specific dorms within the residential complex while others did not have Greek housing, but instead had meeting rooms in the University Commons. But the impact was still there, regardless of the type of gathering place.

I learned that where Greeks gather is still very important. Potential new members want to know: Where do Greek women live and where do they gather for their meetings? Chapter members want to know: When is it my turn to live in the house or on the Gamma Phi Beta dorm floor? If there is no community housing, where can we live so that we are near each other? Parents want to know: Where will my daughter be living next year? Is it safe and is it well managed? How much does it cost? and Alumnae want to know: How is the house decorated now? Did they upgrade that third floor bathroom? What

about the basement office? Have they changed the furniture in our suite? Where does the chapter hold its chapter meetings? What happened to the graffiti on the telephone booth wall? When can we come back and visit?

Gathering together builds community and is an important part of the Greek experience. Our strategic plan highlighted that for us in the survey answers that came back from collegians, alumnae and parents. Friendships, sisterhood, lifelong friendships, communication, living together, personal development, leadership opportunity and family are all words that were repeated time and time again.

We build community through our gathering places. Currently, Gamma Phi Beta has 47 owned houses, 6 rented houses, 7 University-owned houses, 2 lodges, 15 dorms, and 7 suites. The rest of our chapters use University facilities for their meetings and gatherings.

An important part of these gathering places are the alumnae who manage the facilities, the House Corporation Boards (HCBs). These volunteer women spend much of their own time making sure the facility is in the best condition possible. It is a tremendous responsibility and the women who serve on HCBs are dedicated and knowledgeable. It may be a house for 104 members or one for six women. It could be a chapter room on a dormitory floor. But these women plan, they meet, they work, they worry, they recruit, they hire and fire employees, they clean, they paint, they volunteer their families to help, and they build community together.

There are many important property management issues that face our HCBs today. Safety is one of the biggest



concerns, which includes security issues, fire safety, and care of aging properties inside and out. Updating the facilities with Internet access is crucial for our facilities to remain competitive with campus dormitories. Hiring and training qualified house directors is a recurring task. Prudent fiscal management has always been a goal and a challenge. Gamma Phi Beta and its volunteers own and/or manage millions of dollars of property assets.

Do **your** part to make this community of friends continue! As a collegian, cherish your time to live in a Gamma Phi Beta facility. You will never have this opportunity again. Take care of the property and take care of each other. The learning experience cannot be replicated anywhere else. Take the opportunity to thank those volunteers on your House Corporation Board. As an alumna, volunteer to be a member on the local House Corporation Board. Visit a Gamma Phi Beta house whenever possible and introduce yourself to the members living there. Remember what it was like for you to gather together with other sisters and how the group felt like a family.. There really is no place like a Gamma Phi Beta home or gathering place (whether an actual physical facility exists or not).

I hope my son will find a "home" like I did with Gamma Phi Beta. And may he also have lasting friendships and family just as I have had because of my membership in Gamma Phi Beta! ●

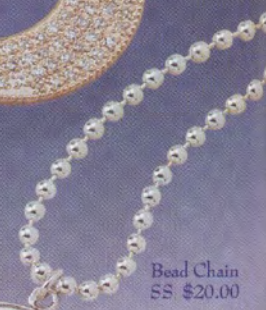

"To think that less than a dozen women put their heads together to finance the then princely sum of \$30,000 is incredible," says Lynn Jorgenson Jacobs, Alpha Beta Educational Foundation. Constructed of deep rose colored stucco over brick with brick and antiqued timbered trim, the home at the University of North Dakota followed the French chateau style with turrets and steep pitched roof with many gables. It is lovingly referred to as "The Pink Castle."

All Gamma Phi's know that the first official meeting of the Sorority was on November 11, 1874. But, how many remember that where our founders met on this rainy afternoon and for many months to follow was the study of Dr. J. J. Brown? So transformed by the opportunity to collaborate as a group, the original celestial colors of dark and light blue were changed. Thus, the significance of working and living together was realized from the beginning.

Each chapter home today tells a story. From arduous fund raising and long-awaited amenities, to threatened mortgages and borrowed space, our members have battled constant challenges in building and maintaining a home to call their own. Just as architectural styles have changed, our homes reflect the changing attitudes in college administrations and what opportunities existed for Greeks throughout our history. With each change in décor, technological progress has been incorporated. (How many of today's collegians can even envision where the old phone booths used to be?)

So much of a chapter's journey is felt within its home. The year the third-floor fire necessitated repairs; the legend about the sophomore who used to live in this room; the recruitment that had to be held at the fraternity house. While learning the important lessons of group living, members acquire a sense of tradition that is shared by all having resided there—and with those who will. Whether its a university-owned dorm or a home on the historical registry, each Gamma Phi home is an integral part of the member's experience.

HOME away from HOME

Housing became a reality for our earliest chapters through sheer tenacity. Back in the days when women weren't expected to carry a pocketbook, let alone finance a home, such a purchase required vision and determination—and infinite patience! When the early petitions were accepted from existing local societies, usually a rented house continued to be used until funding became available. In 1908, newly chartered **Nu** chapter began planting the seeds toward owning their own house at the University of Oregon. Each initiate pledged \$50 to be paid to the chapter within five years of graduation. The ultimate ground breaking 17 years later also reflected the visionary purchase of two lots. At the University of North Dakota, the local group was relatively new so there was only a handful of alumnae available to tackle the housing challenge. Yet it was this small group of women who had the vision to build a home for **Alpha Beta** on the prairie in Grand Forks. It literally sat next to dirt farm fields when it was constructed in 1922.

Influenced in part by what other NPC groups are doing, having a house that's comparable has always been vital in staying at the top of the competition. But each university defines what housing opportunities are available. On many campuses, Greeks must share a university dormitory. When these structures age and/or pale in comparison to other campus housing, negotiations become paramount as groups work with their university to make improvements.

At Oklahoma City University, sororities had met in a former Army barrack. Although bricked on the outside,

the conditions of the lodge were limited. "The alumnae never (even) had hot water to wash a glass during recruitment," said *Adra Cheek*, Director at Collegiate Operations-West. Agreeing that a new building could be put on the university-owned land, the university ultimately responded to assistance requested by **Beta Omicron**. Citing that none of the sororities had the financial means to build accommodations on their own, the university offered to match the \$325,000 raised by the university Panhellenic. **Gamma Tau's** at St. Louis University just moved to DeMattias Hall which provides a chapter room and 27 single-student rooms on each floor. All sororities share the hall, including a large chapel that can be used for meetings.

When housing was taken over in Toronto, **Alpha Alpha** Chapter had to relocate. "This land was expropriated by the University of Toronto to build the world-renowned Robarts Library and all the Greek houses were bought by the university," tells *Suzanne Slinn-Higgins*, Province 1c Financial Director. Their new home on Madison Avenue in downtown Toronto's trendy, fashionable district is larger than the first house, and boasts a recently added rooftop patio. In 1994, well over 100 alumnae celebrated the home's 25th anniversary.

Not all of our Gamma Phi Beta homes have been constructed for the purpose of a sorority house. **Beta Alpha** at the University of Southern California is the only sorority whose house was originally built as a private residence. Built in the 1890's, it was previously home to a Portuguese ambassador. At the University

of Western Ontario, **Alpha Omega's** reside in a house formerly occupied by the Mayor of London. Built in the late 1800's, a historic bookcase in the library is placed in front of the window and nailed to the floor, prompting the legend that it was placed there to keep political spies from peeking in during confidential meetings. Officially designated a 'Heritage Property' due to its original wood moldings and staircase, one of the home's mysteries is a secret hiding place at the top of the staircase.

Best known Alpha Omega legend concerns the mayor's daughter. Little Dottie was only six, so the story goes, when she drowned in the Thames River that flows through the City of London. She is purported to have spooked everyone from construction workers to visitors over the years, but they say she is a friendly spirit.

The rich history of some of our homes interests not only Gamma Phi's, but that of local communities as well. After Urbana's Greek Historical Home Tour last year at the University of Illinois, the *News-Gazette* featured pictures of **Omicron's** refurbished living room. Shown were two camelback sofas from the set of *Gone With The Wind*. It seems that one of our members was set designer for the film, who also donated two walnut Victorian side chairs. On the National Register of Historic Places, Omicron's elegant home was originally an Arts and Crafts-style duplex. In 1926 it was remodeled into a Georgian Revival—red brick with white pillars and black shutters.

Changing social customs can be seen a home's story, as well as theories about architecture and the evolution of technology. Housemothers who once enforced curfew and to whom the most genteel of social graces were always shown, have long since been replaced by House Directors. At San Diego State, many young alumnae have filled this role for **Beta Lambda** as a modern day house manager. Sleeping porches, originating during architectural experimentation to provide daily exposure to the elements, are mostly gone now and even community dining takes on a lesser role as varied schedules demand greater flexibility. A 'girl's kitchen' is becoming a standard feature in many houses, allowing for simple meal preparation when the main kitchen is closed. Such a remodel is currently underway at **Psi** Chapter at the University of Oklahoma.

Computers generate schoolwork once prepared in long-hand and then on portable typewriters. *Barbara Carpenter* recalls college life at **Gamma Eta** Chapter in Long Beach when records were played on a turntable. Where once a chapter may have had only one phone—a pay phone in a walk-in hallway closet—today, private lines

in every bedroom reflect a need for both conversation as well as internet hook-up.

Even decorative changes can surprise a returning alumna. During last year's redecoration at **Delta Eta**, the house was re-done in Irvine's school colors - yellow and blue. The kitchen shutters have the Greek letters, "Gamma Phi Beta," painted on them and crescent moons are stenciled around the windows that lead up to the bedrooms. The bathroom has a crescent moon shelf and rug, as seen in The Pottery Barn Kids catalog.

Unlike a personal residence, Gamma Phi homes have faced far more than economic adversity and natural disasters. The surging enrollments at universities that created a period of housing prosperity in the 50's and 60's, ultimately wreaked havoc a short time later. While chapters were investing in many new homes and numerous renovations, college administrations had begun implementing major policy changes that would attempt to undermine the entire fraternal structure. During the subsequent years of social protest and Greek adversity, it was not uncommon for alumnae to personally contribute to a chapter's mortgage to ensure the chapter's survival.

Fellow Greeks also provide "housing" assistance to our chapters. This fall, **Beta Upsilon**'s at Kansas State University will begin enjoying several *single* rooms after living at the Sigma Sigma Sigma house during renovation of their former sleeping dorms. Thanks to the hospitality of Kappa Kappa Gamma, **Beta Xi** Chapter was able to join the well-established Greek system at Ohio State University in 1950. Our recruitment took place at the Kappa house and the visiting Gamma Phi Beta officers were housed there. The use of Phi Delta Theta's housing facilitated the creation **Beta Epsilon** at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. Housed in a suite, the women still often use fraternity facilities today, such as Beta Theta Pi's international headquarters for ritual services.

As housing challenges continue, we are reminded of the perseverance of visionary Gamma Phi's who overcame hurdles in the past. With every expansion opportunity there has been a challenge, with every campus administration; an obstacle. To realize the dream of a home at the turn of the century must have been daunting in an era of teas, bazaars and bake sales. Our early sisters' pioneer spirit and the business acumen of today's members inspire us all.

Each chapter home has its traditions deeply rooted in shared experiences. Each too is part of the greater organization, rushing to aid those impacted by hurricanes and floods and celebrating news of each other's success. Every home represents a vital relationship in the life of the Sorority. Never limited to our own residences, this relationship encompasses the current struggle by fraternities to adopt alcohol-free housing, the momentous occasion of *Jessie Wilson's* 1913 wedding in the White House, and the preservation of the buildings on our campuses. Each one denotes a place where ideas exchanged and lives were changed.

Beginning as Gamma Women's Group in the spring of 1999, the 27 women of Zeta Xi had a vision of someday wearing the letters of Gamma Phi Beta. The group had heard of Gamma Phi's positive image and contacted International Headquarters about the extension process. After obtaining the guidelines on what Gamma Phi looks for in a local group and with local alumnae support, the women began the process of preparing to show Gamma Phi how successful they could be. Once they became a colony, the extreme efforts didn't stop there.

As a new sorority on a campus of only 750 students, these women faced the challenges of not only forming their own identity, but also the integration into a difficult Greek system. Before Gamma Phi came onto Albertson College of Idaho's campus, it consisted of two local sororities and one local fraternity as well as the national organizations of Kappa Kappa Gamma, Delta Tau Delta, Kappa Sigma, and Sigma Chi. In the absence of both a Panhellenic and Intrafraternal Conference, the Greek governing body consisted of only a Greek Council. As a result, campus norms and regulations were quite different than what may be on a larger campus. However, Zeta Xi's extraordinary women very much lived up to the ideals and expectations of Gamma Phi Beta members by understanding and supporting what we stand for and promote.

Throughout the short eight-week period of colonization, the members worked extremely hard. They organized and planned events that included a Sisterhood Sleepover and an Ultimate Frisbee philanthropy to raise funds for camping. The women also decorated children's books with "touchable" crafts and donated them to the Boise library to be used by sight-impaired children.

Although most of the women of Zeta Xi are very involved in campus and community activities, they poured their hearts into the installation of their chapter. The hard work paid off. Gamma Phi Beta welcomed these twenty-seven new members into her sisterhood on May 13, 2000 with a beautiful Initiation conducted by International Director of Ritual, Elizabeth "Kiki" Phillips, International President L'Cena Rice, and members of Xi chapter at the University of Idaho.

An installation banquet was held at the Boise Centre on the Grove where Paul Bennion, Director of Student Activities and Operations, gave a welcome speech from Albertson College of Idaho. Additionally, Gamma Phi Beta welcomed First Lady of Idaho, Patricia Kempthorne, who moved the new initiates with her memories of Gamma Phi and the positive influences it had on her. The entire day was a true example of the exceptional lifetime commitment of Gamma Phi Beta.

After twenty-eight years at the same newspaper, 1971 journalism graduate **Tonia Cuning** (Alpha Gamma, University of Nevada-Reno) has reached the top. This past winter she was promoted to the *Reno Gazette-Journal's* executive editor. The *Reno Gazette-Journal* is a flagship newspaper of the western division of Gannett Newspapers Inc., the world's largest newspaper chain.

While other journalists of her era worked their way up the ranks of small community papers to large metropolitan dailies, Ms. Cuning began an internship with *Gazette-Journal* that provided her a succession of roles. Chosen among people nationwide, she is known not only for her excellent journalism, but also for her grace and hard work. Ms. Cuning is most comfortable as a mentor, either in the newsroom or as a guest lecturer at the university. She was quoted in her alumni magazine, *Silver & Blue*, as saying, 'Working at a newspaper means assuming a watchdog role in our community, while at the same time being responsible, fair and balanced.'



International tuberculosis control was the topic of **Kim Field's** (Beta Lambda, San Diego State University) speech in Hungary last spring. "TB Today: Are Patients Getting Sicker?" was presented in Budapest to over forty attendees. "This (was) the first time this conference was held in an east European country," said Ms. Field, "and (it) provided an excellent opportunity for dialogue with the international community."

TB Controller for the Department of Health in Washington State and an RN, she reports that 60% of all tuberculosis cases in 1999 were among persons born outside the United States. Dialogue with conference attendees allowed Ms. Field to begin developing culturally sensitive methods for working with recently arrived immigrants to the U.S.

Beth Gross (Alpha, Syracuse University) was honored with the Harold M. Dwyer Award for Outstanding Leadership and Academic Achievement at Syracuse. A child and family studies major in the College for Human Development, Ms. Gross visited the Ronald McDonald House as part of her coursework. There she saw many children afflicted with cancer wearing hats because chemotherapy had caused their hair to fall out. "It dawned on me that, for so many of these kids, their hats are a huge part of their identity," Ms. Gross was quoted as saying in her alumni magazine.

"Caps for Cancer" was the hat drive she organized, collecting hats not only for Ronald McDonald House, but for Crouse Hospital and the American Cancer Society. A wall was set up for her in the University Bookstore to display more than 70 hats along with information about the project and empty shelves for donations. Expanding the drive off campus, Ms. Gross also received donations from several businesses including Ward Sales Company, a wholesale hat manufacturer in Syracuse, which donated 300 hats.

Kali Kurdy (Xi Chapter, University of Idaho), was honored as the first Grand Winner of the Nasdaq National Teaching Awards

recognizing excellence in economic education. Kurdy, a teacher at Borah High School in Boise, Idaho for the past 28 years, was selected from among five regional winners. Kurdy developed a project entitled "The Economic Summit," which provides students with an opportunity to use thinking skills outside of the classroom and apply what they are learning in school to real world experiences. Kurdy claims that the Summit is a wonderful opportunity for students from different schools to form friendships and learn to use teamwork to accomplish goals.

Barbara Craven Motos (Beta Mu, Florida State University), currently the principal of Dimon Elementary, a science and technology magnet school in Georgia, was once in the circus. While a freshman at FSU, scheduling conflicts left her without a physical education class, so she signed up with the school's Flying High Circus for the required credit.

At a spry 87 pounds, she learned and performed circus stunts such as the double trapeze, the unicycle and the bicycle built for five. Ms. Motos also served as circus coo, costume mistress and circus barber— anything she showed an aptitude for, she was asked to do and was always willing to take on. As a camp counselor during the summer program, she was responsible for the safety of groups of children and adults. 'You have to be aware especially of young children in the recreation program,' she was quoted as saying in her local Columbus newspaper, noting the importance of being a role model for them as well.

Ultimately, she chose a career with children, and has been an elementary teacher and administrator for twenty-two years. She and husband, Jimmy, also a principal, have two children, James, Jr., a business graduate and Jennifer, a law school graduate.



Tammy Perkins (Gamma Upsilon, Drake University) was named to direct Phoenix's Neighborhood Services Department after 17 years of hard work to improve the city. Overseeing a 215-member department, she'll bring new life to deteriorating neighborhoods and improve neighborhoods that are stable. "She is especially skillful at working with all sorts of people," said City Manager Frank Fairbanks, who explains that neighborhood activists, business leaders, officials of nonprofit agencies are among the kinds of people Ms. Perkins interfaces with to find solutions to problems facing their neighborhoods.

Starting as a management intern in the budget department, Ms. Perkins spent years with the Intergovernmental Programs Office representing the city's interests before the Arizona Legislature. She also worked on the staff of the mayor and as an assistant in the City Manager's Office before earning a promotion to deputy neighborhood services director six years ago.

Ms. Perkins earned her master's degree in public administration from the University of Denver and a bachelor's degree from Drake. Before joining Phoenix, she held posts with the state of Colorado and the city of Boulder.

Pacesetters



Veteran New York actress, **Shelia Smith** (Beta Zeta, Kent State University), returned to Ohio last spring to star in Stephen Sondheim's *A Little Night Music* at Cincinnati's Playhouse in the Park. A member of the original cast of Sondheim's *Follies* in 1971, Ms. Smith commanded the stage with her notorious lovely singing voice. 'Fabulous (and) foggy' is how Jackie Demaline described it in the *The Cincinnati Enquirer*; Jerry Stein of the *Post* said it's 'as dark and rich as chocolate syrup.' Critics loved her performance as Madam Armfeldt,

with her "Liaisons" the show's high point.

Ms. Smith has more than a dozen Broadway appearances to her credit, including the recent *Show Boat* revival, *42nd Street*, *Sugar*, *Mame*, *Company* and *Fiorello*. National Tours include *La Cage Aux Folles*, *Follies*, *Mame*, *Forty Carats*, *Sound of Music*, and *No No Nanette*. Television credits include *Taking My Turn* (PBS), *All My Children*, *Young and the Restless* and *Omnibus* (live) with Leonard Bernstein.

A recipient of the Kent State University Performing Arts Special Achievement Award, Ms. Smith received the New York World Theatre Award for *Mame* and the San Francisco Drama Critics Award for *Follies*.

The University of Denver honored **Jean Yoliffe Yancey** (Theta, University of Denver) with "Grandma Jean's Story Garden" at the Fisher Early Learning Center. Serving kids between 6 weeks and 5 years of age, Fisher is an outdoor story and performing arts center for reading, drama, dance and artistic productions.

In an entrepreneurial career spanning some 60-plus years, Ms. Yancey has become a legend in Denver business circles. Founder of Jean Yancey and Associates in 1973, her wisdom has nurtured some of Denver's leading businesswomen. Ms. Yancey gladly gives her time to the younger generations of women trying to climb the ladder of success. There are no roadblocks, she tells them, just detours.

She's seen much change in her lifetime. At the age of six, her mother was granted the right to vote. As a high school student in 1929, Ms. Yancey talked the president of Denver Dry Goods into allowing her to present the nation's first high school fashion show for teenage girls. It lasted three days and welcomed 5000 women and girls. In the 1970s and '80s, when women role models in the corporate world were scarce and networking organizations didn't yet exist, she was one of the few people who wasn't afraid to speak out for women.

Ms. Yancey has received countless awards, including Advocate of the Year to Women in Small Business, presented by President Reagan. She was inducted into the Colorado Women's Hall of Fame and received the Community Recognition Award. She can still be found dispensing business advice in Cherry Creek Park from a bench that friends dedicated to her. The stone bench says "Rest and meditate here, and know that you make a difference in the world."

In IIKE

I would like to share with my sisters how fortunate I feel to be a Gamma Phi Beta. I pledged the Sorority in '71 at Indiana University and for three years lived in the Beta Phi chapter house. Although I felt the closeness of sisters then, it has only been since becoming an alumna that I have realized the true meaning of sisterhood.

In 1987, I was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis. I was active in the Sorority attending alumnae activities and serving on the House Corporation Board and did substitute teaching while staying involved in the life and activities of my family. In 1995, my condition deteriorated to the point that I was confined to a wheelchair. I had limited use of my hands and I had difficulty speaking. My husband left the family and stopped providing support in 1997 and I was forced to move my two daughters into a small apartment. Since that time, we have depended on my family and what government aid is available.

For two years the alumnae group has brought me meals once a week. And, during the last year the collegians have joined in that project by doing the same while school is in session. The food has been wonderful, but more importantly, it has helped me to continue to feel connected to Gamma Phi.

The Bloomington Alumnae chapter applied for the Doris B. Gordon endowment grant on my behalf in order for me to obtain a computer and printer. This is something that I have not only wanted for a long time, but it had been recommended to me by my doctor to help with my motor skills.

By receiving this gift I again realized how much our sisterhood really cares about the individual members and that being a Gamma Phi Beta is for life.

The business session, which were spread out across three days, was actually one of the highlights of Convention 2000. International President L'Cena Rice conducted the meetings with dignity and elegance. Professional Parliamentarian Donna Reed kept the meetings friendly yet business-like. The flag processional at the opening business session was incredible. I don't think that anyone can truly understand the enormous size of our organization until they watch 114 chapter flags enter the meeting room, each bearing the colors of the institution where it is located. The election process was also exciting and the delegates expressed what an honor it was to cast a vote for the women who would run our organization for the next biennium.

Another amazing evening was the awards dinner on the second night. The galactic decorations were stunning and everyone seemed anxious for dinner to end so that we could all find out who the winners were. This truly was the Oscars Night of Gamma Phi Beta Sorority. Although my chapter only took home several honorable mentions, I was able to talk with Nicole Allaire, chapter advisor for Omega chapter at Iowa State University. Her chapter took home the Mary A. Bingham Award, the most prestigious collegiate award. She was ecstatic and kept remarking about how the girls in her chapter had worked so hard and truly deserved the award. Day 3

At the Philanthropy Breakfast, the attendees were all entertained by children from the Quillian Center in Houston. This is a philanthropy that the Houston Alumnae Chapter has supported in recent years. They performed a dance and some cheers that they had made up for Gamma Phi Beta. At the end of the meal, the Foundation presented the founder of the Quillian Center with another check for the continued support of their efforts. It was great to see the talents of these girls and know that Gamma Phi Beta supported their efforts.

The most eye-opening event at Convention came on this day. The attendees were privileged to be able to see the presentation of Something of Value, a traveling mock trial that is sponsored by the National Panhellenic Conference. The program was a reality check for many collegians in that it demonstrated the sort of civil trial involving fraternities and sororities that are taking place quite often around the nation. The mock trial was based on an incident in which an underage sorority woman drank too much alcohol prior to and at a sorority function and died as a result. Perhaps the most dramatic testimo-

Liz's character had provided the girl with some alcohol at the event and had also put her to bed for the evening. I think that many collegians were astonished by the reality of what can really happen as a result of situations which many of us had witnessed at one point or another.

Perhaps the most fun event at Convention was the Confirmed Conventioneers dinner. The theme was "Down on the Bayou" and it was truly a "Cajun" event. As a Chicago native, I had never experienced a dinner of catfish, jambalaya, and bourbon bread pudding. The dinner was served family-style, which meant we had to pass platters of food around big tables. This gave me a great opportunity to talk with a number of my sisters in my Gamma Phi Beta family. The live band played "Oklahoma" and "California Girls" so that the attendees from those areas could serenade the rest of us. I even jumped in on a group of about 250 women doing the "Electric Slide" and was whipped around by a fast moving "human train."

At each Convention, the attendees receive a hat to wear at the Confirmed Conventioneers Dinner. It's no surprise

To win the race, attendees had to get 100% of their Province to donate money to the Foundation. The donations could be as little as five dollars, which was perfect for collegians with our tight budgets. Another award was given to the Province that contributed the most money per Province member. By the end of Convention, the Foundation had raised a record-breaking \$70,000. Vesta Spurgeon Odell Voss were all recipients of the Pink Carnation Award. These women were an inspiration to everyone in the room. Their personal testimonies of their lifelong experiences with Gamma Phi Beta were amazing. I was so inspired to hear the many accomplishments Gamma Phi sisters are achieving around the world.

One of the surprises of Convention was the presentation of the Honor Roll Award to Jennie Curtis (Beta Omega, '74). The Honor Roll Award is the highest award that Gamma Phi Beta can bestow on a member. Jennie's list of accomplishments were astounding and included serving as Nominating Committee Chairwoman, International Parliamentarian, and a Director of Camp Sechelt. 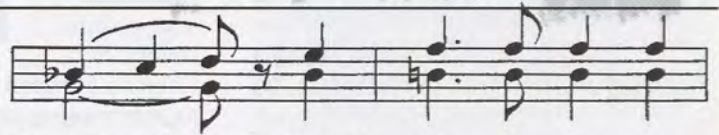


Campus Clips

 Alcohol consumption among freshmen on college campuses has fallen to the lowest point in 34 years, according to a study by the Higher Education Research Institute at the University of California-Los Angeles. The number of freshmen, who drank beer frequently or occasionally was down to 50 percent in 1999, compared to 75 percent in 1981.

 An annual survey of college freshmen suggests that stress levels may be growing worse among college students, especially for women. Thirty percent of students reported that they frequently felt "overwhelmed by all I have to do." Women reported those feelings almost twice as much as men. Women reported spending more time studying, volunteering, participating in student activities and tending to housework, while men reported spending more time exercising, watching TV, partying and playing video games.

 The University of Maryland is targeting the entire Greek community in an effort to promote smoke-free living on campus. Through a formal program, contests and community support, it debuted the idea of encouraging sorority members to quit smoking. This fall, fraternities will be included in the program, as fraternities and sororities will be paired for a month-long smoke-free contest.

NPC Officer Selection Information

HOW? The National Panhellenic Conference uses "rotation" for the selection of their officers. The purpose of rotation is to be certain that each member organization has the opportunity and the responsibility to participate in the leadership of the organization. The leadership preparation begins when the NPC Delegate of the organization next in rotation is selected by her organization to serve on the NPC Budget Committee. The term of each office is two years.

WHO? The organization selects the member who will assume the leadership role by electing or selecting that member as their NPC Delegate.

WHEN? The time an organization will have a member begin the rotation cycle is based on the year the organization joined NPC. The rotation process was explained to the 1998 Nominating Committee and to the 1998 Convention attendees. Betty Quick was elected as NPC Delegate at the 1998 Convention and was appointed to the 1998-2001 Budget Committee. Representing Gamma Phi Beta, she will assume the role of treasurer in 2001.

WHERE? The site for the 2001 biennial session will be the La Paloma Resort in Tucson, Arizona. The date is October 3-7 2001.

New Education Programs

The guarding of good health is part of the NPC Creed. NPC has a special opportunity to collaborate on two programs that impact women's health.

1. College Women and Depression

The program to address depression in college women will be designed by the National Mental Health Association in collaboration with NPC and other organizations.

2. Women & Girls, Tobacco and Lung Cancer

This program is to educate college women on the dangers of smoking and to encourage them not to begin, or, if they have begun to quit. This program is being developed by McCarthy Medical Management and is sponsored by the American College of Chest Physicians through the Chest Foundation. NPC will be part of the collaboration.

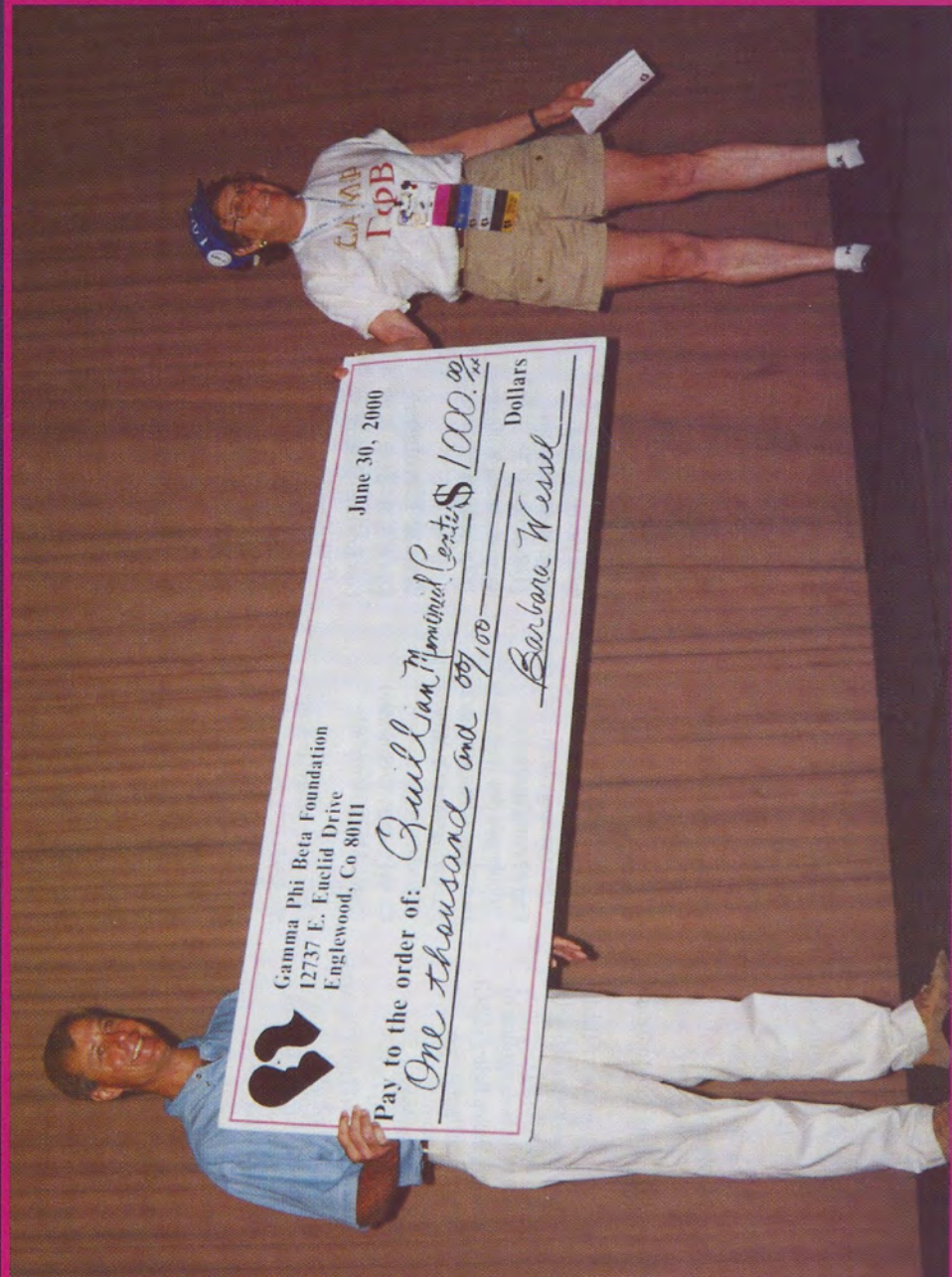

Doris Gorden Recipient Feels Fortunate to be a Gamma Phi

Pam Freeman, a Gamma Phi from Bloomington, Ind., who has multiple sclerosis, received the Doris Gorden Special Sister Grant last year to help her purchase a computer and printer. She wrote a letter recently to the Crescent, and we felt it was appropriate for you to see how much your gifts can help our sisters:

Dear Sisters:

I would like to share with my sisters how fortunate I feel to be a Gamma Phi Beta. I pledged the sorority in 1971 at Indiana University and for three years lived in the Beta Phi Chapter house. Although I felt the closeness of sisters then and met a woman who to this day is still my best friend, it has only been since becoming an alumna that I have realized the true meaning of sisterhood.

In 1987 I was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis but I was able to still be active in the sorority, participating in alumnae activities and serving on the Corporation Board of the Beta Phi Chapter. I did a lot of substitute teaching and was involved in the life of my family and the activities of my two daughters. My condition deteriorated over the next eight years and by 1995, I was confined to a wheelchair, unable to walk and with limited use of my hands and some difficulty with my speech. My husband left the family and stopped providing support in 1997 and I was forced to move my two daughters and myself from our home to a small apartment. Since that time we have been dependent on help from my family and what government aid is available.

For two years the alumnae group has helped out by bringing meals once a week and during the last year the active chapter has joined in that project by doing the same when school is in session. The food has been wonderful, but more importantly it has helped me to continue to feel connected to Gamma Phi. Last January the alumnae chapter had a household "shower" for me and my daughters and in November I was able to attend Founders Day at the chapter house.

In the fall of 1999 the Bloomington Alumnae Chapter applied for the Doris B. Gorden endowment grant on my behalf in order for me to obtain a computer and printer for my use and my 14-year-old daughter. This is something that I not only had wanted for a long time, but had been recommended by my doctor to help with my motor skills.

By receiving this gift I again realized how much our sisterhood really cared about the individual members and that being a Gamma Phi Beta is for life. The love and concern of my sisters over the past few years has truly made it easier to cope with my difficulties.
