












On October 29, 2000, the Alpha Iota chapter at the University of California – Los Angeles received its charter to become the most recently installed chapter of ΓΦΒ.



According to the National Fire Protection Association, nearly onethird (32%) of the fires at university housing were intentionally set or sus-

pected of being intentionally set. There are 515 fires each year. The second most common cause is cooking (19%), followed by smoking (12%), electrical distribution (7%), other heat, flame or spark (7%), and appliances/air conditioners (6%).

- The job market for the class of 2001 could be the best liberal arts graduates have seen in years, according to an annual survey of 380 employers. Employment opportunities will expand by an average of 6 to 10% during the 2000-2001 academic year and as much as 25% in some sectors. The study "Recruiting Trends 2000-2001" indicates a strong demand for engineers and account to a property and account to a strong demand for engineers. neers and computer-science majors, but the hiring of communications, telecommunications, and business majors will also expand significantly. Industries that expect the largest growth in employment of college graduates include retail sales, professional services like accounting and consulting services, manufacturing, and food and lodging.
- Eleven national organizations in the North American Interfraternity Conference have voted to become alcohol-free, meaning about 1,500 of the 5,300 fraternities in the United States would become alcoholfree, according to executive vice president Jon Williamson. Sororities also have signed on, as the National Panhellenic Conferences recently passed a resolution that prohibits its chapters from co-hosting a party at a fraternity house that serves alcohol. These moves come in the midst of information that supports the theory that potential fraternity and sorority members prefer an alcohol-free environment. According to Mike Johnson, director of alcohol education at Phi Gamma Delta, one of the national fraternities to swear off alcohol, a 1997 study found that more than half of all incoming freshmen would rather live in a substance-free environ-
- A new website helps college students make informed choices regarding alcohol and other drugs.

Alcoholandotherdrugs.com was constructed with input from more than 160 undergraduates, including 18 who participated in recorded interviews focusing on their alcohol and other drug use.

Alpha Jota

On October 29, 2000 the Alpha Iota chapter at the University of California - Los Angeles received its charter to become the most recently installed chapter of Gamma Phi Beta. The result of a successful extension project, the installation of Alpha Iota was a highly anticipated event. Alpha Iota was originally established at UCLA in 1924. However, a decreasing interest in the UCLA Greek system resulted in the closing of many National Panhellenic Conference chapters. Gamma Phi Beta left the UCLA campus in 1995, but it retained the chapter house with the hope of recolonizing at a later date. That long-awaited day came last year when Gamma Phi Beta was selected to become the eleventh National Panhellenic Conference chapter at UCLA.

The recolonization process began last Spring when the extension team recruited 42 women to become the charter members of Gamma Phi Beta's new Alpha Iota chapter. The charter class consisted of a talented and diverse group of women who had a sincere interest in reestablishing Gamma Phi Beta at UCLA. These char-

ter members were supported by a number of Gamma Phi Beta alumnae in Southern California whose lifetime commitment to the organization inspired them to become chapter advisors and serve on the House Corporation Board. Once a foundation

consisting of members and advisors had been established, the remaining six weeks of the spring quarter was devoted to educating the new charter members and helping them create the bylaws under which their chapter would be governed.


While the charter members were beginning to publicize the recolonization of Gamma Phi Beta, another group of women was busy planning for the reopening of the chapter's house on sorority row. The House Corporation Board spent the summer months improving the condition of the original chapter house and restoring its natural beauty. Thanks to the combined efforts of many individuals, the historic chapter house was restored to its place at "the top of the row." The house was officially rededicated on November 5, 2000.

Along with the reopening of the chapter house this fall, the Alpha Iota members were also able to celebrate the success of their first formal recruitment and COB at UCLA. Their efforts were rewarded with the addition of 26 new members. The chapter organized a weekend sisterhood retreat at a campsite in Big Bear, a Big Sister program for their new members and a fatherdaughter barbecue tailgate before a UCLA football game. The women of Alpha Iota also took part in UCLA's annual 'Presents' celebration. In addition, the new officers of Alpha Iota worked within their departments to develop public relations, scholarship, and merit policy programs.

The women of Alpha Iota demonstrated their devotion to each other and to Gamma Phi Beta through their numerous accomplishments as new members. This commitment was acknowl-

> edged by International Gamma Phi Beta on Saturday, October 28th when the 42 charter members of Alpha Iota were initiated at their chapter house. The Initiation ceremony was conducted by International Director of Ritual, Elizabeth "Kiki" Phillips, International President Vicki Carlson Read, and members of the Epsilon Nu chapter at Chapman University.

The Alpha Iota charter was presented by Vicki Carlson Read and Lila Hanson-Wallich, an original charter member of Alpha Iota. 

You Can Make a Difference

No matter how busy your schedule is, there is always something you can do to help.

Do you remember going through "rush"? Think back to that special day ... close your eyes, what do you visualize? Remember? I remember receiving my bid and running as fast as I could to 415 North 16th Street — home of Gamma Phi Beta. One of my most cherished pictures of that day is when a dear friend from high school and I first saw each other and realized we were going to be sorority sisters. We are facing each other, our arms at our sides with hands full of presents, balloons, bid cards, and our mouths are open wide. As I recall, we were screaming our lungs out, so excited to see each other. Wow! It still gives me chills to this day! It is interesting to think that as excited as I was at that moment, little did I know then, or would I

ever imagine, the impact Gamma Phi Beta would have on my four years of college and my life thereafter.

Pledging Gamma Phi Beta, becoming an active and then an alumna is the natural cycle we go through. Most of us, upon pledging, think of our Sorority as a collegiate experience. Ironically, the majority of our Sorority experience is spent as an alumna. The lifetime commitment we make as new members is only fulfilled by our commitment as alumnae.

Are you fulfilling your lifetime commitment to Gamma Phi Beta as an alumna? Throughout our alumnae years we have numerous responsibilities and priorities. For most of us, sustaining a major volunteer commitment over a number

of years is not realistic with raising children, family responsibilities, caring for aging parents, careers, adult life challenges, volunteer work within our communities, etc. At these times when our "plate is just too full" there are still many ways we can fulfill our lifetime commitment.

Think about "rush" or in today's terminology, think recruitment. Recruitment is the life and breadth of our sisterhood. Without recruiting new members, Gamma Phi Beta would cease to exist. You can help with recruitment. Alumnae involvement is essential for Gamma Phi Beta to continue and we need you!

In recruitment, there are various levels of involvement for you to participate. When you are at your "maximum" and are feeling over-extended, there are ways you can assist with recruitment without spending any time.

- 1. Consider your lifetime commitment in the present tense, you <u>are</u> a Gamma Phi Beta. State your involvement as "I am a member of Gamma Phi Beta" not "I was a Gamma Phi Beta."
- 2. Let your community know you are a Gamma Phi Beta. Everyday you

share a part of who you are with people you encounter. When appropriate, let them know you are a Gamma Phi Beta. Whenever you have your membership listed (i.e. on a resume, in the newspaper, etc.), include Gamma Phi Beta. Because you are an outstanding person, you are "selling Gamma Phi Beta" by just being you—but others have to know you are a Gamma Phi Beta.

In the Panhellenic spirit, let young women in your community know about the importance of being Greek.

While the above ideas may be a part of your daily life, the next few suggestions will take a little time.

Pay your local and International dues. Your financial contribution is part

of your lifetime commitment and is the foundation for all that we do.

- Write a reference for a potential member. References are key for our collegiate chapters' pledging quality women.
- If you live close to a collegiate chapter, take treats or snacks for recruitment school.

These next ideas are for women who are within driving distance of a collegiate chapter and are options that do require a few hours once a year.

- Participate on a pre-review or application review committee. These alumnae/collegian committees meet to assist the collegiate chapter with evaluating potential members prior to the recruitment process.
- 2. Prepare and/or serve refreshments during recruitment.
- Lend whatever skills, abilities or talents you have to the recruitment process.

And finally, for those who would like to spend a few hours periodically through the year.

- Be a local recruitment advisor or another advisor who assists with various components of recruitment.
- 2. Be the Alumnae Reference Committee (ARC) Chair.
- 3. Volunteer to become involved at the International level with recruitment.

As Gamma Phi Betas, we have been privileged to share in a special sister-hood. You are essential to the continued growth and strength of this sister-hood. It's time you got involved; we need you! Pick what is right for you and fulfill your lifetime commitment. A good place to start is to contact your local advisory board or International Headquarters. Other options include your province collegiate director (PCD), province alumnae director (PAD), province membership director (PMD) or me, Kris Baack, director of collegiate recruitment (DCR).

Reference Guidelines

Who May Write A Reference?

Any initiated member of Gamma Phi Beta may write a reference, including alumnae and collegians. Our Greek-letter chapters count on alumnae support in the form of writing references each year.

What Should A Reference Writer Send?

Send a completed reference form #38 for each potential member. These forms may be obtained from: this issue of The Crescent; Gamma Phi Beta International Headquarters - 303.799.1874; an Alumnae Reference Chairwoman (ARC); or by accessing the My G-Phi-B section under resources on the Gamma Phi Beta website at www.gammaphibeta.org. Please provide as much information about your potential member as possible and include a photo, if available. You may get this information from the potential member or her family if she is an acquaintance. You may not contact her during formal recruitment, as this puts the chapter in danger of receiving a violation from their College Panhellenic. Type or print clearly - legibility is important! List talents, hobbies, interests, grades, and honors to inform the chapter of the potential member's personality and help the chapter develop a recruitment strategy.

Where Should Reference Forms Be Sent?

Send references to the ARC listed in this issue of The Crescent by August 1 for fall recruitment chapters and January 1 for deferred recruitment chapters. Be sure to locate the chapter for the university your candidate will be attending.

Many of our chapters are still in need of an ARC who will receive references for them. If a Greek-letter chapter does not currently have an ARC, the MVP is listed with the chapter address.

Do you know any qualified young women who would be candidates for membership in Gamma Phi Beta?

How Can You Help?

If you are asked to provide a reference, please respond promptly with as much information as possible. Let the ARC or chapter's MVP know if you are unable to do so. If you would like to help with the reference process, contact a local chapter.

Why Are References Required?

Greek-letter chapters need complete information to successfully recruit and make sound membership selection decisions. It is a lifetime privilege and responsibility of all members to seek out and recommend young women who have the potential to make a positive contribution to Gamma Phi Beta.

Writing References For Legacies

Gamma Phi Beta's legacy policy states that a legacy is a daughter, sister, granddaughter, or great-granddaughter of a Gamma Phi Beta. At the discretion of the Gamma Phi Beta relative, a stepsister, stepdaughter, or step-granddaughter may be considered a legacy. A legacy is entitled to special consideration by the Greekletter chapters, which is defined as an invitation to the first round of events, where possible. If a bid is extended, special consideration also includes alphabetical placement on the first bid list. The chapter makes the final decision on any potential member and judges legacies by the same standards and at the same time as all other potential members. If a legacy does not pledge Gamma Phi Beta, notifying relatives and friends is left to the potential member to protect her privacy.

It is most helpful to send the Legacy Introduction Form from this issue of The Crescent to the Greek-letter chapter. The legacy will also need a completed reference form #38.

Remember that all legacies do not choose Gamma Phi Beta. Conversely, many of our chapters do not have spaces to pledge all legacies. All legacies should enter recruitment with an open mind about all sororities. Each sorority chapter has unique qualities to offer potential members and each woman should seek the chapter with which she is most compatible.

Recommend them to a Gamma Phi Beta Greek-letter chapter today!

Connecting the Disconnected

"Of course I am going to the Gamma Phi alumnac meeting. I look forward to the fun and fellowship I find there with my sisters." We probably do not verbalize the above, but I am sure we have felt this way as we shared the camaraderie of sisters in a functioning alumnae chapter. How fortunate are those who have an alumnae chapter available.

Gamma Phi Beta was an exciting sister-hood that we embraced during our collegiate years, but our membership did not end when we left the college campus. We continue to be members, but for many Gamma Phi Betas there is no alumnae chapter available that offers them the opportunity to be active. The Alumnae Extension (AE) division of the Membership Department works to help alumnae in all areas of the country and Canada to re-connect with Gamma Phi Beta by helping them establish new or reactivated alumnae chapters.

There are three types of target areas on which we focus.

- First, an alumna may contact International Headquarters looking for the nearest alumnae chapter to her. If there is no alumnae chapter available, a member of the AE team works with that alumna to research the area and determines the possibilities for either an alumnae chapter (minimum of 12 dues paying-members) or a Crescent Circle (minimum of 6). The process is as simple as setting up a first meeting and sending out invitations. AE pays for the first mailing and helps each step of the way through installation.
- Second, AE looks for areas where a collegiate chapter exists but there is no alumnae chapter there to support it. Because we believe that collegiate success is based, in part, on alumnae support, we survey the area for interest and facilitate the process for alumnae in that area.

■ Third, AE analyzes areas where there are large numbers of alumnae and either no alumnae chapter or only one. For example, an area with over 1,000 alumnae is a good prospect for adding a second chapter. In some cities it takes more than 30 minutes (our recommended distance to travel to a meeting) to drive from one part of the city to another. We could develop a north, east, west, or south chapter in these areas.

Do you fall into any of the above categories? Are you willing to take the lead in establishing an alumnae chapter or do you have a suggestion of an area where there is a need? Gamma Phi Beta recognizes that legacies are important to our Sorority because they bring a long tradition of pride and support to our Greek-letter chapters. Because it may be impossible for Greek-letter chapters to pledge and initiate every legacy referred to them, they are guided by Gamma Phi Beta's legacy policy, which states, "Legacies are to be given special consideration by the chapters." This means they are invited to at least the first round of events. If a legacy is invited to pledge, her name is placed alphabetically on the first bid list. In those unfortunate situations where a legacy is not invited back to the next set of events, notification of friends and relations is left to the legacy. This is to protect her privacy. The best way to avoid potential disappointment is to discuss the total Greek community with legacies. All National Panhellenic Conference sororities have similar goals and ideals. Emphasizing Gamma Phi Beta as a sole choice for your legacy may be unfair to her if we are unable to extend her a bid. Most importantly, we hope that recruitment is a positive experience.

I am one of the many alumnae of Gamma Phi Beta whose hectic schedule currently precludes me from helping the sorority in such traditional ways as advising a chapter or belonging to an alumnae group. This is not something I like and not something I want to continue in the years ahead. However, rather then feel guilty that I cannot help Gamma Phi Beta in a

"big" way right now; I recently decided to help her in a way most conducive to my life at the moment.

I am a freelance writer and one afternoon as I sat down at my computer to work, I decided to take some time and write about the positive impact Greek membership has had on my own life and the world around me. As *The Crescent* said, "positive payback can be done in a variety of ways," so I encourage my fellow sisters to use a talent of their own to do so too. All it takes to help others learn about the rewards of Gamma Phi Beta is a bit of labor, a spurt of loyalty and a lot of love.

CRESCENT ARTICLE BECOMES SPRINGBOARD FOR IOWA LEGISLATION

State Representative Rosemary (Clinebell) Thomson, Beta Eta, was prompted by an article on reducing underage and binge drinking in the summer 1999 issue of *The Crescent* to introduce related legislation in the Iowa House during the 2000 session.

Her efforts resulted in the passage of a bill that now permits postsecondary institutions in Iowa to notify parents if their underage students become involved in alcohol or other drugs. House File 2036 eventually became another tool to help Iowa's public and private colleges and universities deal with the concerns associated with underage and binge drinking.

The original bill draft would have required alcohol-free dorms for students under the age of 21 — the national legal drinking age. Representative Thomson and co-sponsors of the bill traveled to both public and private campuses to discuss the measure and get input from students as well as college and university officials. Thomson eventually received strong bi-partisan support and the bill was signed into law in the spring of 2000.

NPC's 2000 INTERIM MEETING

Delegates, Presidents, Executive Directors and Editors of the 26 members of the National Panhellenic Conference gathered at the DFW Lakes Hilton Executive Conference Center in Grapevine, TX, October 20-22 for the 2000 Interim Meeting. Representing Gamma Phi Beta: Elizabeth (Betty) Ahlemeyer Quick, ΒΦ, NPC Delegate; Margaret West Pape, V, First Alternate Delegate; Karen Gamel Urette, W, Second Alternate Delegate and Linda Daniel Johnson, AΘ, Third Alternate Delegate. Also attending were Vicki Carlson Read, AE, International President and Deborah Borak, Θ, The Crescent Editor. Attending special post meeting seminars on Alumna Advisor Education and Academic Excellence were Barbie Chadwick, AΘ, Collegiate Vice President and Cheryl Speer, ΔΔ, Scholarship Program Coordinator.

Chairman Marion Williams, KKT, opened the meeting with the theme remarks, Leading the Way, Sharing the Vision. Noting the continued concern on campuses of the misuse and abuse of alcohol, Marion stressed that the time has come for new initiatives requiring NPC's vision, leadership and courage to create change in the culture on the college campus. Marion challenged all fraternity and sorority members to use the vision, the ability to communicate and collaborate and the leadership to address the concerns and help accomplish needed change.

In closing, we were reminded that NPC is now in its 98th year and eagerly anticipating its Centennial celebration in 2002, As

Marion said, "NPC is not great because she is old; she is old because she is great...a legacy earned which has been time honored and for which each of us is responsible."

Special sessions were held to hear reports of the Women & Girls, Tobacco & Lung Cancer and College Women & Depression Programs, and of the Long Range Planning Committee.

Tim Burke, NPC Legal Counsel, stressed the need for everyone to protect and advocate our Constitutional First Amendment rights: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the Freedom of Speech, or of the Press; or the right of the people to peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for redress of grievances." The First Amendment and other provisions of the Constitution are our sources for broad freedoms of association and privacy rights.

Other legal issues discussed included preserving the single sex status of NPC organizations. Title IX of the Education Act, prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sex does "not apply to membership practices...of a social fraternity or social sorority..., the active membership of which consists primarily of students in attendance at an institution of higher education."

An Alcohol Free Housing Initiative update was given, and although not yet universal, many positive steps are being taken on campuses around the country to change the perceived alcohol-centered culture. More and more Panhellenic women are stepping forward to take responsibility for addressing substance abuse. Women are the key to making the necessary changes; and when joined together in a Panhellenic, they represent the largest organization of women on most campuses. Beth Stathos, Assistant Director for Student Life, University of Oklahoma, stressed the need for more education of all collegiate members toward the goal of greater understanding of both the NPC Alcohol Free Resolution and their individual groups' resolutions and policies.

Chairman of the NPC Foundation, Jean Scott, reported the success of the Centennial Endowment Fund. In honor of NPC's upcoming centennial in 2002, this fund was established in October 1999 to support the educational and leadership programs of the National Panhellenic Conference and to provide Conference leadership with flexibility to respond to campus situations as needs arise.

2000 RESOLUTIONS

Resolved, That the National Panhellenic Conference develop and pilot during the calendar years 2001 and 2002 a program titled, "FOCUS ON CONFRONTATION. Interviews with, evaluations by, and observation of College Panhellenic women have shown the need for confrontation skills in relation to risk management. Funding is possible through the NPC Foundation.

Resolved. That the National Panhellenic conference develop and pilot during the calendar years 2001 and 2002 a program titled, "FOCUS ON SELF-ESTEEM." Interviews with, evaluations by, and observation of College Panhellenic women have shown the need for enhanced self-esteem in relation to risk management. Funding is possible through the NPC Foundation.

Resolved, That the mission statement of NPC be: The National Panhellenic Conference supports its women's fraternities by promoting values, education, leadership, friendships, cooperation, and citizenship

Resolved, That beginning in 2001, the National Panhellenic Conference will officially recognize October as the Month of the Scholar; and

Resolved, That NPC, through partnership of the member groups, the College Panhellenics Committee and the Alumnae Panhellenics Committee, will promote the Month of the Scholar

Resolved, That the National Panhellenic conference sponsor, in kind, the National Alcohol Screening Day of the years 2001, 2002, and 2003, through mailings to those campuses where College Panhellenics are established, encouraging all members of NPC groups on those campuses to participate in the program.

Resolved, That the directors of the Conference, the executive committee members, and the administrative director sign a Conflict of Interest Agreement annually.

The Gamma Phi Beta Foundation is overseen by an eight-member Board of Trustees. Trustees are sought for the specific expertise they bring to the management of the Foundation and each is elected for a two-year term and may serve no more than three consecutive terms in one position. Trustee positions include the Foundation

Chairwoman and Chairwoman for Development, Public Relations and Marketing, Finance and Investment, Financial Aid, and Camping. The Sorority's International president or her designee, serves as a trustee; and the Sorority's Executive Director and the Foundation's Executive Director serve as ex officio members of the Board. This year, the Board of Trustees welcomed three new members:

L'Cena Brunskill Rice (Southern California) joins us as our Camping Trustee after serving two terms as International President for the Sorority. Prior to being elected International President, L'Cena served on the International Financial Advisory Board, was a Foundation Regent and helped out the local collegiate and alumnae chapters in Southern California. Outside of Gamma Phi Beta, she is very involved with the University of Southern California, where she was elected president of the USC Alumni Association in 1992 and served on the Board of Trustees for the university from 1991-1997.

Deborah L. Floyd (East Texas St.) joins us as our Public Relations Trustee. Deborah was initiated at Texas A&M University (Gamma Zeta). Her experiences in Gamma Phi Beta have included president for the Commerce, Texas alumnae chapter and receiving a foundation fellowship for her doctoral studies at Virginia Tech. In 1999, Deborah was awarded the Gamma Phi Beta Carnation award at

Convention, the highest award the Sorority gives to recognize outstanding accomplishment outside Gamma Phi Beta. In the same year, she was also awarded the Woman in Higher Education Achievement Award by the National Panhellenic Council. Deborah currently serves as Executive Assistant to the Chancellor at the University of Kentucky, Lexington after serving eight years as a community college president.





Ginny Harris Hammond

Ginny Harris Hammond (Colorado-Boulder) joins us as our Finance and Investment Trustee. Before joining the Foundation Board of Trustees, Ginny served as president of the Gamma Phi Beta Colorado Camp Board of Directors from 1975-1977, has been a member of the Foundation Camping Committee and was a member of the Sorority's Financial Advisory Board. She has also received the "Merit Roll" and "Service Roll"

awards showing her local and international commitment to the sorority. Outside of Gamma Phi Beta, Ginny is a certified financial planner affiliated with American Express Financial Advisors, Inc.

Other continuing members include Phyllis Donaldson Choat (Nebraska-Lincoln) as our Development Trustee, Verona Dilbeck Lynam (Oklahoma City) as our Financial Aid Trustee, Vicki Carlson Read (Arizona) as our International Council Representative and Bonnie Payne (Denver) as our Executive Director.

The Gamma Phi Beta Foundation has assets of almost \$6 million and enjoyed a 13.73% asset growth in Fiscal year 2000. We have had a felicitous relationship with PaineWebber since 1994 and in the past six years have seen an overall investment return of 14.8%. For the second consecutive year, our auditors have declined to issue a management letter because they can find no areas of concern related to our fiscal policies and practices. Please know, however, that this clean slate does not mean that we shall relax in our vigilance to ensure the finest stewardship of our donors' gifts.

We anticipate another strong year for the Loyalty Fund: Building Tomorrow's Leaders. Our annual fund is so named because the Foundation uses annual gifts to supplement endowment distributions in supporting the Sorority's educational programs, granting scholarships and fellowships, and supporting life-changing camping experiences for special girls.

The Board of Trustees meets three or four times a year at International Headquarters. On November 5, 2000 they met to



discuss, among other business items, the grants they would make to the Sorority this year. We are pleased to report that we were able to fund a total of \$104,714 in grants for Gamma Phi Beta leadership programs. We awarded \$93,859 to leadership programs including the leadership education portion of the CLC program and RLC's. Of that, \$57,252 came from the leadership endowment, \$12,500 is from the foundation educational grant and \$24,107 is from an unrestricted bequest from Mary Jane Soechtig (Rho '31). We awarded an additional \$10,855 for the Gamma Phi Beta museum and archives at International Headquarters and to help fund philanthropic workshops at each of the RLC's.

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
