

PRESIDENT'S PERCEPTION

KEEPING OUR PROMISES

Two important considerations in every question of conduct are: does the situation involve us personally; and what is our responsibility to others who might be affected? We can never be certain whether we will influence other people. However, we can determine if our actions are a hindrance or a help to them. The important issue is how we conduct ourselves.

Today we find ourselves in a society that is changing more rapidly than ever before. Technology, our socioeconomic structure, our family structure, and our business culture are examples of areas that have changed dramatically over just the past few years. Each of those changes has created, and continues to create its own ripple effect in our attitudes and behavior. The truth is that in our hurry-up society, we have gradually been letting go of traditional values. Many of these are Gamma Phi values, as found in our ritual.

Are those values relevant in today's society and within our Sorority? Yes, I believe so. For values still play an important role in uncovering the ideal self and that was the ultimate vision of our founders. It remains important for us today in order to reach our full potential. Whose responsibility is it to teach values to our new members and remain true to those values? The responsibility belongs to each of us. Whether we realize it or not, we are always teaching values. However, today, we must put more of a conscious effort into that teaching. The values we impart to our new members today, consciously or unconsciously, will have a major impact tomorrow on Gamma Phi Beta, the Greek system, society and all of us as leaders. If we continue to leave the teaching of Gamma Phi Beta's ritual to chance alone, we, as a Sorority, risk losing an integral piece of our culture.

This is a time that requires a special kind of courage, for today the Greek system and Gamma Phi Beta are being challenged by growing accounts of inappropriate behavior, which do not reflect the founding principles of any of the fraternal organizations. Gamma Phi, like other Greek groups, is values-based. The shift from that strong foundation to more party-based organizations has changed our image and hampered appropriate recognition for our worthwhile academic, community and leadership achievements.

As Gamma Phi Betas, we have made promises to each other and our Sorority. We have a shared understanding of our ritual and its teachings. The values we learn from these teachings provide the foundation upon which many of our promises are made. We make commitments to our family, friends and sisters every day, which are based on our declarations or promises about what we will do. In our busy lives, and being influenced by the ever-changing environment of our society, it becomes easy to fall short of "doing what we say we will do." And this is what shapes our character and our credibility. Our actions become the evidence of our commitment to the core values that influence every action of our membership.

So, as we approach our Founders Day this November 11, let us reflect on the promises those four founders made, and kept, in 1874. Then we might ask ourselves, "Are we living up to our promises made yesterday and today and will we abide by the promises we make tomorrow?" Let us not forget, the integrity of our Sorority. Our membership, relies on keeping our promises.



CAMPUS CLIPS



 With widespread Internet access. college librarians saw a decline in library use in recent years. According to the Association of College and Research Libraries, in 1999-2000. students at the country's top research

libraries checked out fewer materials and utilized librarian's services less than they had in a decade. To combat the problem, 50 institutions have added coffee shops and cafes inside their libraries to attract more students and faculty. Besides added library use, these "Latte Libraries" include other bonuses: the coffee shops make money; students don't have to leave for a study break; and faculty are using the facility to meet students in an academic space with a nice atmosphere.

- Ohio University has changed its judiciary system to allow for the anonymous reporting of hate crimes. Students who want to report an incident to the university. but would prefer to remain unidentified, can now do it by telephone or by visiting one of 12 campus offices. According to Janice Edwards, student affairs associate vice president, this enables the university to use this information in their statistics and research to gain a more accurate reflection of campus activities and conditions. However, according to students, drawbacks include allowing perpetrators to go unpunished and it does not offer a deterrent to future hate crimes.
- . The University of Virginia's honor committee is examining the institution's 160-year-old honor code, as well as its role in shaping opinion of the honor code itself. They are revamping a video that is used to introduce freshmen to the honor system. The new video uses celebrity alumni and current students to relay a broader discussion focusing around the ideal of honor, rather than expulsion being the only sanction for a range of violations. The honor committee is also addressing some of the drawbacks of the honor system in the new video, including students who feel uncomfortable initiating a case that would result in another student's dismissal.
- . In an effort to compete with the growing demand for students' time, money and interest, today's college Greek organizations are making many efforts to distance themselves from the stereotypes of wild parties and bad behavior according to the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. In the late 1980's, membership in Greek organizations peaked, but numbers have fallen as much as 30% in the past decade. This decline can be attributed to a variety of factors, including new ways for students to connect with each other, nicer residence halls that overshadow aging Greek houses and a shifting student population. To combat this problem, sororities are showcasing their positive contributions to campus and community, advertising their high grade point averages and marketing themselves as organizations for academically minded students.

to be a model Gamma Phi.



NPC Programming Making a Difference

Something of Value was developed by National Panhellenic Conference representatives alarmed at growing incidences of alcohol related problems on campuses across the nation. The program enables young women in the Greek community to work together to change behaviors and norms and develop an action plan designed to eliminate or decrease their risk-taking behavior.

The first program was presented at Pennsylvania State University in 1995. Since that time, the program has been refined and presented on 74 campuses, 10 Conventions/leadership schools and seven regional conferences. It is scheduled on seven more campuses in the fall of 2002 and at all four Greek regional conferences in the spring of 2003.

On February 8-9, 2002, Something of Value was presented at Texas A&M University in College Station, Texas for the 11 NPC chapters on that campus. It was one of eight campuses benefiting from the presentation during the spring of 2002.

The campus Panhellenic sponsors each Something of Value program. Panhellenic executive officers commit to full participation in the weekend. Each individual chapter participates by sending 11 chapter officers and representatives and their chapter advisor. Every national group on campus supports the collegiate chapter by sending a national representative to campus for the weekend program.




Texas A&M collegians enjoy their small group experience wit Barbara Probst, $\Delta\Gamma$ national representative.

A popular component of the program is an abbreviated mock trial held on Saturday morning, facilitated by an attorney and using College Panhellenic officers as witnesses while chapter members in attendance act as jury members. Common subjects of the "trial," which always involves a civil lawsuit brought by a member or her parents,

are alcohol abuse, underage drinking, hazing and failure to follow risk-management procedures.

Equally important are the Saturday afternoon small group sessions in which like officers from each chapter on campus are grouped together to identify and discuss campus specific risky behaviors and develop a plan to address these behaviors. For many, it is surprising to learn that all of the chapters struggle with similar behavior issues. It is also empowering to realize that by working together chapters have a much stronger impact. Small group sessions end with a segment on building confrontation



skills to deal with sisters who place the chapter members in difficult or uncomfortable situations.

After Texas A&M University's Something of Value weekend, participants volunteered to make a difference in their chapter by:

- Speaking up about consequences and liabilities to everyone
- Offering more opportunities for non-alcoholic functions
- Encouraging other chapter members to hold their sisters accountable
- Caring more about the chapter's welfare
- Looking at my chapter to see what I can do to change it
- Serving as a positive role model
- Standing up for what is right





And to her mother's amazement, she witnessed with surprise A room full of daddies and children, all starting to close their eyes


Who knows what they saw before them, who knows what they felt inside Perhaps for merely a second, they saw him at her side
