

Why go Gamma Phi?

Gamma Phi Beta is one of 26 organizations that belong to the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC). All NPC groups provide educational opportunities, sisterhood and ways to contribute to the community. So what makes Gamma Phi Beta unique?

Our Heritage

Gamma Phi Beta is one of the ten oldest women's organizations in North America. We are one of the seven founding members of the National Panhellenic Conference, founded to create a cooperative environment among all groups. Today, Gamma Phi Beta chairs NPC and has provided significant leadership throughout NPC's history.

The very term "sorority" was coined for Gamma Phi Beta, and our organization is the first to be incorporated as a sorority—many other NPC groups are incorporated as fraternities. Our founders were among a handful of women admitted to universities in the 1870s, and their foresight in creating the core values we share still today—as well as the ritual that celebrates these values—is remarkable.

We connect to our heritage and to the messages our founders set forth, which are still relevant today. That makes Gamma Phi Beta unique.

Our Contributions

Beyond the long-term connections we share with sisters across time and place, as Gamma Phi Betas we contribute in endless ways to the world around us. Alumnae serve as political leaders, doctors, artists, lawyers, moms, corporate



executives, scientists, missionaries, community leaders, judges, musicians, teachers, wives, business leaders, entertainers, writers, and activists.

Our collegians are recognized across North America as student body presidents, noted scholars and researchers, activity leaders, and philanthropic servants. They are the women who shape our future. In short, Gamma

In short, Gamma Phi Betas across the continent and around the world impact communities through leadership and service. As

sisters, we begin while in college to develop these leadership skills and determine the direction our lives will take.

In Gamma Phi Beta, learning doesn't end at college graduation. Alumnae continue learning through interaction with alumnae groups and sisters, through community service opportunities, and by volunteering at various levels within our organization. Gamma Phi Beta provides outstanding training for our volunteers, including the only online training for advisors within the interfraternal world. And that makes Gamma Phi Beta unique.

Our Members

From campus to campus, community to community, Gamma Phi Betas develop strong bonds of sisterhood and reach out in friendship to those outside our circle. Gamma Phi Betas are considered friendly, inclusive and outgoing– not closed off or exclusive. Gamma Phi Betas have fun and provide a "home away from home" for thousands of college women in the United States and Canada. We hold high standards and pursue excellence, and the many honors our



members and groups are awarded stand testament to our achievements.

However, the many smiling faces of Gamma Phi Betas around the world reveal so much more than any trophy case could. Our members care about each other and about those facing difficult circumstances. Our members develop their talents to inspire others. Our members help to create, maintain and perpetuate the very elements that make our society better at every level of community. Our members shine.

And that makes Gamma Phi Beta unique.

Diary of a CLC at Gamma Phi's most recent

On February 3, 2007, Gamma Phi Beta welcomed our newest colony—and our first-ever collegiate chapter in the state of Arkansas! Gamma Phi Beta worked cooperatively with university officials and Delta Gamma representatives to begin an interfraternal system at the University of Arkansas-Fort Smith throughout the fall semester and January. Two men's fraternities are also starting chapters at UA Fort Smith. Here's a sample of how we did it through the eyes of a collegiate leadership consultant.

Oct 20-Arrive at Fort Smith, met with university and Delta Gamma representatives to finalize plans. Many conference calls were held prior to my arrival among the university and the two NPC groups to set us up for success.

Oct 22-Attended an alumnae meeting at the home of the future chapter advisor, Carol "Penny" Nichols Pendleton (Indiana State). These contacts are crucial to garnering support for our new colony.

Week of Oct 23-Work a table with a Delta Gamma representative at the student union, spread our Go Greek! message, meet prospective members! There are terrific students here and we're excited! I made a lot of public relations items like Go Greek banners, door hangers, magnets, table tents, flyers, etc. We're on campus as much as possible, attending student activities. There's a lot of buzz on campus about Greek life. Students are curious about sororities. Some students are skeptical, but the more we explain to them the more excited they become.

Oct 26-Go Greek! Night introduces the new Greek system to UA Fort Smith families. The university's Greek advisor and vice chancellor spoke and showed support for the new Greek system. I spoke and explained what it's like to be Greek, talking about all the activities students could be involved in as sorority members. We had a full house! Potential new members (PNMs) begin to catch the vision: they could create a legacy as founding members of something special on this campus.

Week of Nov 27-Return to campus to encourage women to register for recruitment. Help host several Go Greek! events like morning breakfasts, "Grey's Anatomy" watch parties, morning hot chocolate sponsored by Greek Life and long lunches in the cafeteria. I hosted a pre-game barbeque outside the athletics building before a basketball game. I distributed recruitment registration forms, FAQ sheets and informational handouts. This visit, we're able to talk a little more beyond the basics of what a sorority is and really grab their interest. Women are getting excited about recruitment!

Dec 8-Leave Fort Smith students as they prepare for finals, and I prepare for a holiday break.

Jan 19-Arrive for PR weeks with Jamie Shultz (Oklahoma), resident CLC for this new colony. The buzz continues on campus. We chalk sidewalks, make banners, talk to several students, pass out recruitment registration forms. PNMs really want to know which sorority each consultant represents. I only have to keep my affiliation secret for one more week!

Jan 22-Hosted a welcome pizza party in the student apartments leasing center.

Jan 23-Spaghetti dinner with the Greek consultants. Two fraternities are also beginning groups. The chancellor attended this meeting and gave a speech promoting Greek life.

Jan 24-Sorority orientation and "Grey's Anatomy" watch party in the campus center. The PNMs are ready to go; they just want recruitment to start!

Jan 25-What Not to Wear recruitment attire fashion slide show. Sorority consultants are very entertaining, and a large crowd gathers to watch the show.

Jan 26-Called at least 200 PNMs today to encourage them to participate in recruitment. Working with the sorority director-collegiate extension and getting ready for

other Gamma Phi Betas to arrive to implement all our recruitment plans is exciting—recruitment is almost here (finally!).

Jan 28—The recruitment team arrives today. We work together to finalize preparations for recruitment week.

Jan 29–Informational Night brings in about 60. I finally got to reveal that I'm a Gamma Phi Beta!

Jan 30–Individual interviews all day with PNMs. Since I've been on campus so much, I've met most of these women before.

Jan 31–More individual interviews. It's fun to talk to PNMs about Gamma Phi Beta and begin to get a sense of what our new colony might be like!

Feb 1-Bad weather! Ice and snow storm yesterday and during the night—hope the bad weather doesn't keep PNMs from recruitment. Our team gets everything ready for preference and bid day activities. We are so excited to find out who our new members will be!

Feb 2–Preference! Women from Psi Chapter (Oklahoma) hop on a bus and brave the nasty winter weather to host our preference party. They were wonderful! Every PNM we invited to preference attends our event.

Feb 3—Bid Day! We match 24 wonderful new members, and all accept our bids! After a fun celebration, we attend the Miss UA Fort Smith pageant, which feeds into the Miss Arkansas and Miss America pageants. We watch Brooke Whitney, a new Gamma Phi Beta and the current Miss UA Fort Smith, sing during breaks in the competition. Two other Gamma Phi Betas competed for the crown. Colony members sit together in the auditorium and cheer every time one of our new sisters take the stage. At the end of the event, we watch one sister pass her crown onto another as the next Miss UA Fort Smith pageant winner: Ashleigh Painter is crowned!

Feb 4—We have a great new group who can't wait to offer the opportunity to join Gamma Phi Beta to their friends. I am so excited to have been a part of this historic milestone!

Gamma Phi Beta will colonize at Texas Christian University (TCU) in Fort Worth, Texas, implementing a special recruitment in the Fall of 2007. Gamma Phi Beta will join 10 other National Panhellenic Conference organizations at TCU. Along with more than 400 Fort Worth alumnae, Gamma Phi Beta's international volunteers and International Headquarters staff look forward to a promising partnership among the Sorority, the TCU Panhellenic and the University.

At press time, other decisions regarding colonizations for the 2007–08 school year are pending.

Legacy Tips for a Great Recruitment



Tensions and anxiety can run high in recruitment, especially when legacies are involved. Here are a few tips:

If you are a legacy's alumna relative...

- Carefully read and then fill out the legacy introduction form (at right).
- Talk to your legacy before recruitment starts. Encourage her to make decisions based on what she learns during recruitment.
- Assure her you'll still care for her regardless of her recruitment decisions.

If you are a legacy...

- Talk to your Gamma Phi Beta relative before recruitment starts. Let her know you'll make decisions based on what you learn during recruitment and not on her recommendations alone.
- Keep an open mind throughout recruitment. You may find what you're looking for at Gamma Phi Beta—or maybe at with another sorority.

If you are a current collegiate member...

- Regard each legacy as a wonderful potential new member—just as you would any guest. Build a relationship with every woman you meet.
- Don't ever discount a young woman because she is a legacy. The number of legacies you may pledge is not limited. If she meets the four core values and can contribute positively to your chapter's goals, invite her to membership!
- Be careful to remember that your decisions affect not only you and your chapter.

If you are an advisor ...

- Remind collegiate members of Gamma Phi Beta's legacy policy well in advance of recruitment.
- Hold chapter members accountable for their decisionmaking throughout recruitment. Are they considering how every guest meets Gamma Phi Beta's four core values?

Gamma Phi Beta recognizes that legacies are important to our Sorority because they bring a tradition of pride and support to our Greek-letter chapters. Because it may be impossible for Greek-letter chapters to pledge and initiate every legacy referred to them, they are guided by Gamma Phi Beta's legacy policy, which states, "Legacies are to be given special consideration by the chapters." <u>This means</u> they are invited to at least the first round of events.

If a legacy is invited into membership, her name is placed alphabetically on the first bid list. In those unfortunate situations where a legacy is not invited back to the next set of events, notification of friends and relations is left to the legacy. This is to protect her privacy.

All National Panhellenic Conference sororities have similar goals and ideals. Emphasizing Gamma Phi Beta as a sole choice for your legacy may be unfair to her if the chapter is unable to extend her a bid. Most importantly, we hope that recruitment is a positive experience.

Collegiate Housing & Infrastructure Act

The Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act would allow tax-deductible charitable contributions given to educational foundations (such as the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation) to be used to make improvements to housing owned and operated for the benefit of college students. This bill would make it substantially easier for Greeks nationwide to raise the money needed to install critical life-safety



improvements in chapter housing, expand housing capacity, and otherwise modernize the housing we provide to our student members.

The current bill has 44 sponsors in the House of Representatives and 11 sponsors in the Senate. No other piece of pending legislation would do more to help sustain and improve the Greek experience, and Congress needs to hear how important this bill is to constituents. We urge you to contact your Congressional representative and both of your Senators and ask them to become co-sponsors of the Act, if they are not already. Remembering "Grif"

How do you remember and honor a loved one who gave so much to her family, her community and her Sorority? Larry Hickey knows. Larry has honored his wife with the Virginia Griffin Hickey Memorial Leadership Endowment. The Endowment will provide funding for



leadership development for members of Beta Alpha Chapter at the University of Southern California.

Affectionately known as "Grif," Virginia was initiated into Sigma Chapter (Kansas). However, the Sorority placed Virginia at the Beta Alpha Colony (Southern California) in 1938 as their "pledge trainer." She completed her education at USC, graduating summa cum laude and as a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

Described by one of her sisters as "pretty, perky and smart," Virginia had endless talents. "There isn't a tribute you could pay Virginia Griffin that would be great enough," stated a Beta Alpha member in the December 1938 issue of *The Crescent*, "but the nearest that one could come close would be to say that she is 'the model Gamma Phi Beta." Beta Alpha members all loved her, beneficing from her cheerfulness, her sincerity, and "her ability to work 24-hours a day for the chapter."

Virginia married sweetheart Louis Scruggs after graduation. They made their home in Hutchinson, Kansas, and had two children, Susan and Bill. Following Louis' death, Virginia became President of the Hutchinson Coca-Cola Bottling Company, the family business. She later met widower, Larry Hickey; they wed in 1962 and moved to Joplin, Missouri.

Active in her community, Virginia was the first woman elder in the First Presbyterian Church of Joplin and was involved with the Community Concert, Joplin Public Library and the Missouri Southern International Piano Competition. She was instrumental in the founding of Channel 16, a PBS station, and served as its Chairman of the Board. Together, she and Larry established the Store Front School, an alternative school for high school dropouts. They were also active in political campaigns at all levels of government and were members of the U.S. Senate Round Table.

Virginia was named Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Citizen of the Year, and Soroptimist Woman of the Year. She also is in the PBS Hall of Fame. Many other organizations have honored her with distinguished citizen awards.

Perhaps Larry provides the greatest compliment when he says, "In 41 years of marriage, I know of not one fault she ever exhibited. She had great faith in God and lived her life that way every day."



Gamma Phi Beta Leads in Web-Based Training

Sorority First to Launch Online Advisor Education Program

magine training individuals located on opposite ends of the continent without spending time and money on travel.

That is exactly what Gamma Phi Beta is doing with the aid of Axio Learning. Implemented last fall, Gamma Phi Beta boasts the first online advisor training program in the Greek world.

Historically, Gamma Phi Beta has offered formal advisor training at biennial Conventions and Regional Leadership Conferences (RLC). Sometimes, an advisor waited as long as a year and a half for formal training.

Gamma Phi Beta wanted to go beyond presenting a new advisor a box of books and telling her "good luck." So, after the 2004 Convention, Collegiate Vice President Krista Davis and I had a long conversation about advisor training: the need for more frequent training, and how to make training available to all chapter advisors.

Krista and I discussed online training, and I offered to speak with the Vice Provost for Academic Services and Technology at Kansas State University. Dr. Elizabeth Unger, a 1961 graduate of Michigan State University, is also a 1971 Gamma Phi Beta alumna initiate. Beth recognized the need, and generously offered to allow Gamma Phi Beta to set up a training program through a group called Axio Learning. Axio Learning is a project of "Universal K-State," a not-for-profit corporation held by Kansas State.

"I am thrilled to see Gamma Phi Beta take the lead in this type of training," Beth said. "We've used this technology in the university setting for some time, and it is exciting to see it used successfully in a non-academic environment."

Now, no matter when an advisor is appointed, she can immediately access the course and get the basic training and resources she needs to be successful in advising her collegiate chapter.

The Collegiate Advisor Development Program features self-guided modules covering all aspects of advising. Information is presented in a variety of forms ranging from text documentation to media-rich audio/video and interactive Flash presentations. Course instructors are able

to communicate with advisors enrolled in the class through live chat rooms, threaded message boards, e-mail, course and institutional calendars, and file uploading. Advisors are encouraged to set up their profile, including a photo and personal information, to share on the course. Through the message boards, advisors post questions and receive feedback and new ideas from other advisors. Nine modules are currently available with more on the way. Learning is evaluated by online assessment complete with a grade book. Advisors who complete the entire course will be deemed an "Accredited Gamma Phi Beta Advisor" and will receive special recognition jewelry.

Well-trained advisors help ensure that our collegiate members have a positive Greek experience. With the rising cost of travel and meeting management, the online learning environment provides a cost-effective means of training the volunteers who are crucial to Gamma Phi Beta's success. Using the advisor program as a template, International Council recently announced the development of online education for the Sorority's entire volunteer leadership.

"I hope that we can continue to explore the development of additional online communities within the Sorority, in addition to the advisor course," Beth states. "The possibilities are endless!"

As a Michigan State undergrad, Elizabeth "Beth" Unger desperately wanted to be a Gamma Phi Beta. "All my good friends were Gamma Phi's," Beth says. "I studied at the chapter house and ate meals there on occasion, but I just didn't have the money to join."

Beth was one of 11 women to enter the Michigan State University College of Engineering in 1957 and one of only two to graduate. In 1966, Beth, her husband and young son moved to Manhattan, Kansas, where she obtained a faculty position at Kansas State. There, the Ungers were reacquainted with fellow Michigan Stater Don Wissman and his wife, Jan. "Jan went to K-State and one day we started talking about campus organizations we'd been involved with and she mentioned that she is a Gamma Phi Beta," Beth remembers, "I was thrilled when she, on behalf of the Manhattan Alumnae Chapter, invited me to become an alumna initiate."

Since her initiation in 1971, Beth has been active in the Manhattan Alumnae Chapter and has served on Beta Upsilon's House Corporation Board, currently as vice president. Through her leadership and expertise, the chapter was one of the first on K-State's campus to have high-speed internet access.

Patricia has made a dramatic impact on the regional agricultural industry by promoting high quality commodities for markets around the world. She has traveled extensively to the Asian rim countries, South America, Central America, Europe and northern Africa in promotion of high quality cereal crops and oilseeds.

In Fargo, Patricia serves as Secretary on the Board of Directors for the Neuropsychiatric Research Institute, is on the Board of Directors for the Center for Agricultural Policy and Trade Studies at NDSU, and is very active in the Church of the Nativity. She currently serves on the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Advisory Board.

Prior to her current work, she taught for 25 years at the high school and university levels in both North Dakota and Minnesota. She has received several awards for her teaching and educational accomplishments. She also has published articles in many professional journals, magazines of the Grain Trade and Agri-business Industry and various crop producer newsletters.

Florida Tech Alumna Builds Successful Career Following Her Own Advice

"Respect the person you're going to be—give that person a chance," advised Catharina Dubbelday Haynes (Florida Institute of Technology). Catharina always seemed to know where she wanted to go and didn't waste time getting there. She graduated from Satellite High School at age 16,



and from Florida Tech three years later. She earned her Juris Doctorate at Emory Law School in Atlanta. She then went on to become a judge of the 191st Civil District Court in Texas. Catharina has now rejoined the litigation department of Baker Botts, L.L.P. after serving eight years as a state district judge.

Her forward-thinking outlook began at an early age. "I decided I wanted to go into law when I was 10 years old because I was interested in the cause of justice—justice for all—and how I could be a part of that," she said.

Catharina volunteers for several organizations, such as Vickery Meadow Learning Center in Dallas, where she teaches Pre-GED to adults for whom English is a second language.

Haynes is a member of the Dallas Association of Young Lawyers, and recently received an excellence award from this group for her efforts. In February 2006, she received an Outstanding Achievement Award from the Florida Tech Alumni Association.

Why does she volunteer her time? "It's rewarding. I get back so much more than I give," she said. "To whom much is given, much is expected."


