YOUR CRASH COURSE ON REMEMBERING NAMES

Whether you start a new job, join a student organization, participate in sorority recruitment or attend a networking event (like Convention 2020 in Palm Springs!), committing names to memory almost always feels like an impossible task. Avoid the embarrassment of asking Betty Beta what her name is for the twentieth time with these helpful tips to remember people's names.

TRUST YOURSELF

Stop the "I'm bad with names" narrative. You resign yourself to never making progress when admitting defeat from the get-go. Believe in yourself and your abilities. Replace "I have such a poor memory with names" with "I got this. I will practice these names until I have them down to a T." As soon as you start giving yourself the benefit of the doubt and make a conscious effort to remember, you'll come to find that you're good with names.

REPETITION

Repeat the name in your head. Repeat it out loud. Repeat it during a conversation with the individual (without it sounding forced). Repeat, repeat, repeat! This tip is especially helpful when you're trying to remember more unique names.

FACE ASSOCIATION

A name is just a name without a face. When introduced to someone, examine their facial features for something that stands out. Maybe it's their curly red hair, piercing blue eyes, a birthmark or their purple glasses. Create an association between that characteristic and their name in your mind. If the name is more tangible, you'll recall it faster.

WRITE IT DOWN

Writing aids with memorization. Grab a piece of paper and pen — studies show that writing notes by hand is more effective than digitally — and start jotting down names repeatedly. Sound out each letter of the name as you write it out. This tip is extremely helpful for visual learners.

FROM COURT TO CONFECTIONERY

Daphne Blumin Subar quit her day job to follow her sweet passion

Everyone is a dreamer. Whether you dream about a better tomorrow or traveling the world or finding work you're passionate about, you dream. On the latter, there are people (the lucky ones) who nestle into their dream job fast. For most, the dream job remains a fantasy. Daphne Blumin Subar (California-Santa Barbara) can relate. That is until she quit her day job as an attorney to pursue her dream of becoming a bakery owner.

"I have never regretted taking the jump from practicing law to [opening my own bakery] because I learn so much about the business and myself every day." Daphne adds, "Even if [the bakery] was not successful, I reminded myself that I would never regret trying."

Daphne studied at American University's Washington College of Law and spent 26 years working as an attorney. Her legal practice focused on civil litigation with cases ranging from product liability to pharmaceutical to insurance coverage. During her legal tenure, Daphne found respite in her kitchen baking for her family. Their rave reviews of her treats prompted the attorney to consider baking more seriously.

"I loved to bake and hoped to always open a bakery. My three daughters and husband encouraged me and told me there is no time like the present."

And just like that, she founded Subarz in 2016. Her online bakery specializes in unique confectionery bars dubbed Subarz. Subarz are a cross between mandelbread, or biscotti, and a cookie. They are crunchy in texture and sweet in taste. Daphne's youngest daughter, Shira, helped inspire the concept of a bar-focused bakery.

"Shira had to create a business when she was in third grade and came up with the idea of a bakery called Subars, which would be 'all bars, one bakery.' I kept that idea in mind when developing [my

business] and just decided Subarz sounded better than Subar," she chuckles.

Subarz started out of Daphne's home kitchen. Traditional Chocolate Chip with Cinnamon Sugar was the first-ever flavor she introduced to the public. Three years later, Daphne is currently transitioning into a commercial kitchen to fulfill her steady stream of orders. Plus, there are 12 flavors on the menu now, including classics like Double Chocolate Chip Almond and Peanut Butter Delight. For the more adventurous sweet tooth, Luscious Lavender and Gotcha Matcha are must-tries. Several flavors can be ordered gluten-free, with nut-free and dairy-free options as well.

"Several customers will actually order the gluten-free even if they don't have an issue with gluten because they prefer the texture of those bars!" Daphne adds, "Our plan is that all 12 flavors of Subarz will be available gluten-free within the next year."

In today's online shopping world, the packaging is just as important as the product itself. Good thing Subarz delivers. Depending on the amount of Subarz ordered — four sizes available — treats come wrapped in cellophane bags tied with a ribbon or in beautiful gift boxes with handwritten notes. Subarz ship nationwide and, because they don't contain butter, last for weeks without refrigeration.

So, what's the best thing about being a full-time boss baker (besides taste-testing everything, of course)? According to Daphne, doing what she loves and spreading happiness along the way.

"I love making people happy. Many people send Subarz as a gift to thank or congratulate someone, and I feel like I get to play a small role in that celebration. I also feel that Subarz makes this crazy world we live in a little bit sweeter. Everyone loves homemade goodies and I love to share my unique product with others," she smiles.

Shira, Daphne's daughter, joined Gamma Phi Beta in April at Delta Chapter (Boston). Daphne plans to send Shira back to school with boxes of Subarz for her and her sisters to enjoy together.



Alpha Alpha paved the way for our other Canada-based chapters, including Alpha Lambda (British Columbia) in 1928 and Alpha Tau (McGill) in 1931. Courtesy of Alpha Alpha, we, as a Sorority, get to wave the U.S. and Canadian flags with pride.

In two short months, Gamma Phi Beta's first Canadian chapter will turn 100! That's 5,218 weeks of confident women leading by example in Love, Labor, Learning and Loyalty; 36,524 days of sisterhood that knows no bounds; 100 years of cherished memories. Alumna Allana Scott says it best:

"For 100 years, Alpha Alpha has encouraged young women at the University of Toronto to be the best they can be and do everything in their power to accomplish their dreams. Once I accomplish [my dreams], I will have the Sorority to thank for giving me a shoulder to cry on, a reason to smile during the hard times and the push I needed to continue moving forward."




PRIMARY COLORS


SECONDARY COLORS



At Delta Upsilon (Georgia), giving back is second nature. The University of Georgia (UGA) is in one of the state's most impoverished cities, Athens, and because of this, members constantly look for opportunities to help their community. Game days and Girls on the Run events are a few ways they accomplish that.

"Game days bring in a lot of revenue for the community, which is incredibly impactful," says chapter president Madi Balfe.

Philanthropy exceeds the state line for this chapter. In fact, members extend a helping hand to Palestine Children's Relief Fund. PCRF is an organization committed to providing Middle Eastern children with essential medical care. For collegian and Palestinian Ayah Ibrahim, PCRF hits close to home.

During the 2018-19 academic year, Delta
Upsilon sponsored Reem, a young Palestinian
girl with congenital cerebral palsy, through
PCRF's sponsorship program. Members sent the
organization \$62 a month to cover Reem's medical
expenses. Additionally, sisters set up percentage
nights at Athens businesses to raise even more
money for the young girl.

But wait, there's more! Ayah took a medical mission trip with PCRF to her native land over the summer. She assisted in several complex neurosurgeries while there.

"It means so much to me that [my sisters and I] get to help my own people in Palestine," she smiles.

Early in the morning before anyone else is up or when I'm on a solo drive somewhere. I call that "windshield time" and it's where some of my best ideas have come from.




WHAT'S SOMETHING YOU CANNOT LIVE WITHOUT?

(Goucher, 1941)


